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## Oktoberfest calendar shaping up



A large group of people interested in developing tourism in the Lincoln-Otero county area met at the Recreation Center Tuesday as guests of Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce. One of the interesting presentations was made by Fablan Chavez, seated center, about reprints of New Mexico magazine which will be distributed nation-wide. Representatives from towns in Otero and Lincoln County met at the recreation center in Carrizozo Tuesday to complete the program of events planned for the first three weekends in October.

This special celebration will include a large number of attractions to be held in Cloudercroft La Luz, Lincoln, Ruidoso, Carrizozo, Alamogordo, Tularosa and on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation.

Fablan Chavez, director of tourism for the Department of Development and Jerry Baker, industrial development representative for the DOD were special guests at the meeting.

Chavez said it was appalling the number of people who come into New Mexico as far as Carlsbad and then leave the state. The situation has been over the nation that people know about, or want to see, the caverns at Carlsbad, the White Sands, Palace of Governors, Indian Pueblos and they don't realize that there is much more to see in the state.

It is almost equally true of people living in the northern part of New Mexico, know very little about the beauty of Otero and Lincoln counties, maybe know that there is a race track in the area and that is all, Chavez told the Oktoberfest people. Somewhat the same is true of people in Southern New Mexico who are not well versed about things to see and do in northern part of the state.

Fablan brought along several copies of a New Mexico Travel guide, which is actually the center 16 pages of a recent New Mexico Magazine, all about the Rio Grande River area, and this 16 pages made into a beautiful brochure using color photographs, separations, and stories right out of the magazine. The DOD plans to repeat this issue, using coming features about other sections of the state.

The Oktoberfest idea is intended to bring people into the Lincoln-Otero area after the normal tourist season closes. For this purpose the several towns in the area are planning special events, a calendar will get wide circulation over the nation, as will the special brochure to be printed in the next month. Another publicity plan is to print a large number of place mats to be used in places where tourists stop, and try to have these available in June.

Most of the special events will be in Ruidoso, Cloudercroft and Alamogordo area, with Lincoln, Tularosa, La Luz, San Patricio and Carrizozo on the schedule for one or two events.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce was host at the noon lunch Tuesday. The next meeting will be in Lincoln June 15.

Halls are cluttered with furniture in boxes, man is busy putting down carpet in all the rooms, doors are off and have to be reworked a bit to allow for carpeting -- with a little bit of luck the building will be ready by Sunday but probably not in time for the pictures we'd like to take for next week's paper.

Mary Barber of Capitan is spending a lot of her time and energy giving out "Help Our POWs" cards and getting people to send them for Hanol. The cards are addressed to President Ton Duc Thang, Hanol, and conclude with this message -- I join with millions the world over in urging you to take these steps, meaning repatriation of sick and wounded captives.



## Openhouse May 30 for The Annex

A new idea in care for people who can take care of themselves, yet want such service as having nurse on duty at all times, help with daily routines such as bathing, medication, meals, even recreation -- is back of the Intermediate Care Facility, which will be better known as The Annex, to Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo.

This new structure is as modern and well equipped as any such facility and/or most hospitals in the southwest. It was built with \$142,000.00 in bonds voted by Lincoln County people along with money for the hospital at Ruidoso, plus \$110,000.00 given by the A. N. Spencer family of Carrizozo.

Dedication Day for the Annex has been set for Sunday, May 30 in the afternoon. Invitations are going out to people in the field of medicine and business of personal care all over the state. All people of the Lincoln County are invited to attend this open house and program.

Many questions will be asked, such as... who is eligible to become a resident of The Annex? Answer, anyone who is able to help take care of themselves and be up and around. Guests are free to go to town or visit overnight with friends or family. They simply check out with nurse on duty so their whereabouts is known.

Why was this facility built here? This Intermediate Care Facility is especially for retired people who want a nice home without having the responsibility of keeping up a residence. One where worries can be forgotten and life enjoyed in a warm, friendly town. Recreational facilities are provided at The Annex, and others readily available at the recreation center.

Cost? You can rent a private room for \$350 a month or semi-private room for \$325 per month, all rents payable in advance. Meals will be served family style, beauty salon will be

maintained at The Annex, doctor and complete hospital facilities just next door, washer and dryer are located in the building, churches of most faiths are close by, lots of recreation available in the Annex.

Each guest will take care of his/her room and bed. Cleaning of floors will be taken care of by ICF employees. Guests will do their own laundry, or have it done.

Guests will sign an agreement which states, among other things, that it (the agreement) may be terminated by either party upon 10 days notice after completion of one month's stay. The guest, executors, administrators of guests, will make it known that he/she or they are financially able to make payments and continue to do so. Regulations will be kept to a minimum but some may be necessary or desirable for the safety, preservation and comfort of the facility and its occupants. Guests will agree to abide by the rules.

**Missile Range to  
hire young people**

White Sands Missile Range-- More than 350 young people will be hired next month by White Sands Missile Range as full-time summer employees, under the Youth Opportunity Program, sponsored by the United States Civil Service Commission.

Two hundred and sixteen of the youths are working part-time at the range now, and approximately 160 more will be hired during the first week in June.

The program, begun at WSMR in 1965 is actually a year-long endeavor, split into two parts--full-time work in summer to support a back-to-school campaign and part-time work in winter to support a stay-in-school campaign.

Since the program began here six years ago, 2,160 students have worked full-time during the summer, and 1,107 have had part-time employment during the school year.

The program is basically designed for under-privileged young people, 16-22 years old. In summer, the state Employment Commission receives applications, determines the eligibility (economic need, primarily) and refers the applicants to the WSMR Civilian Personnel Office. During winter, the schools do the same.



allocate \$220,000 to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee to develop livestock water sources. The affected counties include Colfax, Hidalgo, Lea, Lincoln, Luna, Quay and Valencia. Public school superintendents are receiving moderate annual pay raises at traditional fiscal 1972 budget hearings over the state. New salaries and increases pegged so far: Lordsburg, \$14,500, up 4.6 per cent, Carl McMillan; Deming, \$17,000 up 12 per cent, Dr. Emmett Shockley; Los Lunas, \$17,825, up 5.5 per cent, Bernard Baca; Belen, \$17,825, up 5 per cent, John S. Aragon. Vaughn, \$12,500, up 8.8 per cent, Tom Tenorio replacing B.R. Taylor; Santa Rosa, \$13,790, up 3.9 per cent, Louis J. Flores; Texico, \$13,000, up 7 per cent, A. D. McDonald; Clovis, \$19,000, up 3.2 per cent, Vernon R. Mills; and Fort Sumner, \$13,000, unchanged, James R. Fincke. Average pay of Lordsburg teachers will be \$7,658, up \$337, next fiscal year. Starting pay of a teacher with a B.A. was left unchanged at \$6,500 annually at Lordsburg. Predicted Lordsburg enrollment is 1,164, up 34.

**INSIDE THE CAPITOL --**

SANTA FE -- Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, elected as chairman of a new Legislative Drug Abuse Study Committee, says: "This committee must understand the problem."

The new lawmaker panel recommended spending of \$100,000 on drug abuse, voted by the 1971 Legislature, via the State Planning Office. Sen. Echols said \$400,000 to \$500,000 could be generated in state and federal funds for drug abuse programs.

Echols' committee asked President Richard M. Nixon, the U. S. Department of Labor and Congress to give Mountainair Job Corps Center to the state at no cost for drug abuse purposes.

Sen. Echols says: "If we're going to have any tough laws, they must apply to the volume pusher who makes a living by selling drugs and to fences who buy stolen merchandise to finance drug purchases." The committee heard testimony at its first meeting that the U. S. Supreme Court says a drug addict is a medical problem and not a criminal problem.

Sen. John Morrow, D-Colfax-Union-Harding is on the Legislative Examining and Licensing Committee that also held its initial meeting here. The panel will hold two-day hearings in June, July and August on the feasibility of centralizing certain functions of the many independent state occupational licensing boards.


Gov. Bruce King requested the study. Use of a common office, secretarial pool and similar housekeeping facilities will be considered. First hearings will be June 3-4 in Santa Fe. Board representatives will be invited to attend.

Possibility of construction of an oil refinery near Las Cruces was raised by Walter Famariss, president of Famariss Oil Co. of Lea County, at a Las Cruces meeting. Sen. Frank Papp, D-Las Cruces, and other Cruces area leaders met with Famariss and Richard Downey, vice president of Famariss Oil Co. The refinery's capacity would be 15,000 barrels of oil daily. The plant investment would be \$12 to \$14 million. The refinery would employ at least 50 persons. A tank farm with a capacity of one million barrels would be established. Famariss said more than 112 million barrels of New Mexico crude oil was exported last year from the state.

If the refinery is built, it would provide an in-state market for New Mexico-produced crude oil from Lea County and other major sources.

The state is spending \$50,000 meanwhile on litigation before the Federal Power Commission seeking a boost in New Mexico natural gas prices at the well-head.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced extended aid to 22 New Mexico drought-stricken counties. The federal agency will

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Public School Finance Director Harry Wugalter said Rep. William J. Upton, D-Hidalgo-Luna, attended the Lordsburg Schools annual budget hearing. Wugalter said the upper part of the teacher salary scale was revised with increases. "This modification provided an average salary increase of between \$200 and \$1,000," Wugalter said.

Atty. Gen. David Norvell, Clovis Democrat, asked District Judge Santiago E. Campos to reopen a complex Clovis liquor license case on issues related to the 1970 federal census effective date.

Judge Campos had ruled State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo should be restrained from cancelling two Clovis liquor licenses issued last Dec. 26 by ex-Liquor Director David Sierra. The permits went to Dr. Charles W. Plett and Jack Zarris of Roswell and Western Continental Motels Inc. of Hobbs, Clovis City Commission had rejected the licenses.

Judge Campos said Jaramillo did not follow proper procedures. He also said part of a state liquor law which appears to give a city commission the right to disapprove issuance of a liquor license is unconstitutional for lack of proper standards.

Norvell, who is moving his voting residence to Santa Fe, said the 1970 federal census became official Feb. 9 this year -- 46 days after Sierra acted. The two new Clovis licenses were based on population increases in the census.

Norvell argued 12 of the 13 existing Clovis liquor licenses may have been issued in violation of state law. He noted they before the 1960 federal census was official.

The State Corporation Commission granted authority to Oakley Transfer and Storage Co., Albuquerque, for general commodity motor freight hauling.


