


# Strong possibility Ft. Stanton Cave warrants visitor development

SANTA FE, N. M. — Fort Stanton Cave in Lincoln County will be the subject of a research project conducted for the Bureau of Land Management by the National Speleological Society.

The project was announced recently by William Campbell of Roswell, district manager for the BLM.

He said a team known as the Fort Stanton study group has been formed within the National Speleological Society to conduct the research.

"This unusual group offers an impressive array of scientific expertise in a number of research fields," Campbell said. "Additionally, the NSS will continue their program of precision computer-checked mapping of the cave's interior and exploration for new areas of the cave."

Campbell said the BLM will install cave passage gates a short distance inside the main entrance to the cave. This will provide protection for the complex electronic instrumentation to be placed in the cave by the research team, and eliminate the problem of formation damage caused by illegal entry into the cave.

The BLM has administrative jurisdiction over the cave and has been concerned about improperly equipped and poorly informed explorers entering the cave.

"The Bureau of Land Management considers this research project to be most significant from our point of view," Campbell said. "There is a strong possibility that the rare and colorful formations within this cave will warrant visitor development in the future."

Carrizozo people should understand that the prices (\$325 semi-private, \$350 month private) are rather reasonable for people who want this kind of service. It's no chore at all to pay from \$12 to \$20 a day for motel and no food or nurse included. It is rather easy to pay \$25 a day and up in most hospitals --

where the care is not a whole lot different.

We read article on cost of intensive care facilities in several hospitals over the country -- now about \$500.00 per day and going up. One man was quoted as saying that the day is not too far off when decisions will have to be made -- this or that person just can not afford intensive care, or the hospital staff is not adequate to care for all patients in need of such care -- it will be a matter of life or death in some instances.

We've never forgotten the talking about having photographic prints made by out-of-town studio, about \$5.00 each including the camera work. The guy thought the price was outrageous -- so Blakely can't afford to operate his studio and no professional photographer could make out here. Sure hope our people will realize that living in The Annex is a bargain -- you really should put some trust in the judgment of guys like A. P. Sifton, Dimmit Bond, Bill Edgar and Johnson Stearns -- they had a hand in the figuring.

SANTA FE -- House Majority Leader David Salman, D-Union-Mora-Harding, says 1972 U. S. Senate Democratic prospects are ex-Gov. Jack M. Campbell, former U. S. Rep. Tom Morris of Albuquerque and Tucumcari, ex-State Rep. Jack Daniels of Hobbs, State Treasurer Jesse D. Kornegay of Santa Fe and Atty. Gen. David Norvell of Clovis.

Salman is a Norvell admirer but believes the young attorney general's publicity is overdone. He questions Kornegay's political strength and doubts that Jesse is well-known statewide. Campbell, Morris and Daniels are unlikely to enter the race because all would appeal to the same moderate vote.

Norvell, 36, appeals to the young, liberal vote. If the field is big, State Sen. Mike Alarid of Albuquerque might become a candidate.

Corporation Commission officials met with livestock haulers and New Mexico Cattle Growers Association representatives in Albuquerque on a new

law handling the commission authority to set livestock hauling rules and rates. Rubert Madera, Jal Rancher, Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry, and Corporation Commissioner John Abraham attended the meeting of 30 ranchers and 15 livestock haulers. The emergency law was sponsored by Rep. Clifton Moreland, D-Tucumcari. The Corporation Commission set a hearing on livestock hauling rates and rules June 24 in Albuquerque. But the cattle growers association will hold its quarterly meeting June 28 at Truth or Consequences. A hearing postponement was likely.

The Highway Commission will open bids June 18 on a 6.25-mile Lea County project on the Loop Road to Eulice north. The four-lane construction is specified. Completion is required in 180 working days.

Bids will be opened June 18 on an Interstate 10 project in Hidalgo County from one mile east of Lordsburg east. The Continued On Back Page



## ST. JOHN'S DAY

La Fiesta de San Juan de Bautista

In the early 1850's and only four years after New Mexico became a Territory of the United States, a small group of Spanish-American families settled on the Rio Bonito some ten miles above where the river flowed into the Hondo. Jacals, or little picket log houses plastered with adobe clustered around the Torean, a small round fortification built of stone, but large enough to protect the villagers from Indian raids. The settlement became known as La Placita del Rio Bonito -- Placita for short; but later, in 1869 to be changed to Lincoln.

The narrow valley, fed by the Bonito, turned to a deep green during the summer months, in strange contrast to the arid hills that rolled away to the North and South. Gardens bloomed about the adobes and crops thrived on the irrigated fields. The little community cared, one for the other, and it was San Juan de Bautista that they chose as their patron saint.

St. John's Day, June 24, was always a day of special celebration, but in the early years after the turn of the century, it had

become a colorful Fiesta with festivities enjoyed by Catholic and Protestants alike. By that time the "Anglos" had long been established in Lincoln. The Lincoln County War had come and passed, and the bell tower of the new church of San Juan de Bautista looked down on the rooftops of a "quiet" town.

For days before the Fiesta, the girls spent long hours shaping paper flowers that would decorate the altar, and they gathered and twisted the wild asparagus fern to form an arch that reached to the balcony at the rear of the church. The women washed the windows set deep in the adobe walls, and on their knees, they scrubbed the floor until "the boards turned white".

On the evening before the Fiesta, small wood fires or "luminarias" burned along each side of the main street. As many as twenty fires burned around the church, throwing a warm glow against the whitewashed walls, while the people gathered inside for Vespers.

After the service, the priest took the statue of San Juan from

beside the altar. He gave it to the two Majordomos and took his place behind them. The altar boys followed, each with a lighted candle. Singing the Ave Maria, they carried the Cross down the aisle and out of the church with the people coming after. The procession moved slowly around the church, up and down the main street, and then finally returned to place the statue once again beside the altar.

Early the next morning, families drove into town from many miles around. Mass was celebrated with the congregation seated on the floor -- benches made and owned by parishioners were of little use on this day of Fiesta. The procession followed as before, but today the two new Majordomos, chosen by the priest and blessed during Mass, stood in the doorway to receive the statue of San Juan from the retiring couple as they reentered the church. Now the care of the church would be in their hands for the coming year. Baseball, horse-racing, and Sacar el Gallo (pulling the

Rooster) were among the most popular activities of the afternoon. For the latter, the unfortunate rooster, feet tied, was buried in a hole to the neck, while contestants, on horses that were trained for the game, lined up some twenty feet away. On the signal a rider started forward. Half way to the rooster, however, another player laid a whip on the horse, which made it no easy task for the rider to grab the poor creature by the neck. (The game was abandoned in 1920).

Dancing at the Courthouse to fiddle and guitar brought St. John's Day to an end. Children, sleeping soundly were lifted into wagons and buggies for the long ride home. Today the Fiesta is a memory, but Mass is still celebrated in the Church of San Juan for the patron saint of Lincoln.

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



 length is 5,161 miles. The stretch will be four-lane to interstate highway standards. A single bridge interchange structure with twin bridges are included. Specifications allow 300 working days for completion.

Norman D. and Ethel Wheeler, doing business as Ruidoso Downs Liquors sued State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo in Santa Fe District Court for approval of transfer of location of their liquor license.

The site is on US-70 one-half miles west of the Ruidoso Downs race track entrance. Jaramillo denied a request to move the license to a location one-quarter mile west of the track entrance.

The Ruidoso Downs village trustees approved the proposed transfer April 26 by a 2-1 vote. But Jaramillo rejected the transfer. He cited a 1969 district court decision and previous actions of the Ruidoso Downs council.

Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler hold in their suit Jaramillo's action in rejecting the transfer was arbitrary, capricious and unlawful.

The Legislative Insurance Regulation Committee voted to assign top priority to no-fault auto insurance. Reps. Alvin Castillo, D-Colfax, and Ralph Pruitt, R-Clovis, are on the committee. Pruitt is an insurance agent.

No-fault auto insurance is a do-it-yourself plan. Insurance companies pay claims immediately under the system to their own policyholders after an accident. Proponents hold the plan cuts red tape, expedites settlement of claims and avoids wasteful, lengthy litigation.

The average teacher salary in Jal next fiscal year will be \$9,274, up 6 per cent over the current year. The Jal teacher pay schedule ranks third in the 89 New Mexico school districts. The Jal district enrollment is set to drop by 41 students to 694 in fiscal 1972.

State Public Schools Finance Director Harry Wugalter said the Jal teacher salary schedule shows no teacher will be paid less than \$6,800 next school year. Jal's beginning B. A. salary schedule was raised from \$6,000 to \$6,200.

Eunice Schools also rank high in New Mexico. Eunice's statewide teacher salary ranking in fiscal 1970 was 15th among 89 districts. The average Eunice teacher pay in fiscal 1972 will be \$8,985, up 7 per cent over the current year. The minimum base salary will be \$6,800.

Eunice enrollment is set to drop by 61 to 840 in fiscal 1972. Salary of Dr. L. W. Byous, Eunice superintendent, was raised 3.5 per cent to \$15,906 a year. The Eunice B.A. beginning salary was boosted from \$6,000 to \$6,200.

The State Game Commission

voted a 3-month open season on hunting of mountain lions in Southwestern New Mexico only. The season was shortened very sharply from an initial proposal of an 8-month season statewide. Mountain lions or cougars were placed under state game law protection by the 1971 Legislature in a bill by Rep. Salman. After the commission action Rep. Salman said: "I'm half-satisfied although I personally would have preferred a moratorium of at least one or two years on killing them at all."

The U. S. Department of Agriculture said 23 counties in New Mexico are eligible for hay transportation assistance to the drought-plagued farmers and the ranchers. The counties include Colfax, DeBaca, Guadalupe, Lea, Hidalgo, Lincoln, Quay, Union and Valencia. The 23 counties had been declared eligible earlier for emergency livestock feed assistance.

Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, is set to inspect ton-mile state tax administration in Oklahoma and Kansas next week on a study of motor carrier taxes and fees for the Legislative Finance Committee. He is a LFC member.
