Appraisal crew starting to work



A crew of four men to do field work and two girls for office work started doing the appraisal of Lincoln County, this week—a task that has been delayed about three years.

The American Appraisal and Consultant Company, Inc. with main office in Espanola is doing the job. J.W. McMorris Sr. is

project supervisor J.W. McMorris Jr., Bill Holliday and Ray Carlton are the field appraisers, Barry Ramsey is head draftsman and does the mapping.

Mr. Carlton stated work two weeks ago on ranch land in the northwest part of the county. The rest of the crew got busy this week.

Christine Chavez and Esther Samora are preparing cards and doing other offices work in the Lincoln County headquarters in the courthouse annex in Carrizozo.

American Appraisal people will be calling on all town and country homes in the county. Should the occupants not be home, they will leave a letter which invites people to request a call-back if they like. J.W. McMorris Jr. told the News that they will measure and check exterior of improvements on first call. It is not absolutely necessary to check the interior of a home, but the appraisers will do that if people want it.

About the month of September all county property owners will receive a notice from American Appraisal setting out the amount of the 100 percent appraised value of property. The notice will also include a time and place where people can meet with the appraisers to review appraisal of their property or any other property, if desired.

Airplane rides for \$2 during fly-in

Twelve or more airplanes from Alamogordo will participate in a "fly-in" to Carrizozo under the direction of Lawrence Dyvad on Sunday, June 13. The planes will start landing here between 7:00 and 8:00 a.m.

The pilots and passengers will be met by two busses, arranged by Carrizozo Rotary Club which is sponsoring a breakfast and plane rides. The flying visitors will be transported to Carrizozo Recreation Center for breakfast. The public is invited to attend this Dutch treat breakfast and welcome the visitors from Alamogordo. Profit from the breakfast goes to the Scouts.

Starting at 9:00 a.m., Mr. Dyvad said that all people wanting to take an airplane ride will have that opportunity at \$2.00 per person, all the proceeds going to Carrizozo Boy Scouts.

You will get to see a good chunk of Lincoln County and enjoy an airplane ride for a real small fee. The rides will continue as long as there are takers. This "fly-in" is in observance of General Aviation Week in New Mexico.

BIDDING GOES HIGH ON RUIDOSO HOSPITAL JOB

Lincoln County people voted bond money for the Intermediate Care Facility in Carrizozo and at the same time improvements estimated by architect to cost \$943,298.00 on the Ruidoso hospital.

On June 3 seven bids were opened at the city hall in Ruidoso for the hospital job. The high bid was \$1,136,500. and the lowest \$1,037,700 which is about \$160,000 more than available money.

Felix d'Entremont, Administrator of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley General Hospital told the News that Hill Burton had committed funds of \$377,319.00 which will be available until June 30 of this year, and really no assurance that this amount of money could be carried over the fiscal year.

Mr. d'Entremont said his hospital board would try every possible avenue of coming up with an additional \$160,000 but right now they don't know where the money is coming from.

The possibility of cutting back on the building program was explored. The federal governmentment gives them a five percent negotiation fee, meaning that they could cut back as much as \$50,000 but no more and that is not near enough.

The time delay in getting this construction job to bid could be one of the reasons for the bidding going so much over the estimate. Bids on the job in Carrizozo went under the estimate.

Paden Drug Store sold to Sanchez

C. E. "Curly" Burns has announced the sale of Paden Drug Store to Raymond Sanchez of Alamogordo, the takeover date being July 6. Mr. Sanchez was in the old Bucklin Drug Store at Belen for many years, and two years ago brought the Hospital Pharmacy in Alamogordo.

The Burns family will move to Hobbs where Mr. Burns will work for Reese Pharmacy, owned by Mrs. Naomi Reese whose husband died last fall from a heart attack. Lois Burns will not work in the Reese store.

Curly told the News that he had enjoyed good business ever since coming to Carrizozo from Alamogordo October 1, 1961. He is making this move because he feels that he has reached the time in life when he should not be the only druggist responsible for service in this community.

The Hospital Pharmacy has three or four pharmacist and if one falls sick or not available for other reasons, one of the pharmacists can take care of business in Carrizozo.

News And Notes

"You never outgrow your need for milk". How many times have you heard this statement? Too many times to count I suspect; and yet we don't always follow it. Milk and milk products are often neglected in the adult's diet. What better time than June, National Dairy month, to remind you of the delicious ways to add milk to your family's diet.

Milk is essential in the diet for its calcium content. Calcium is a mineral that helps form bones and teeth and keeps them strong. Also, the protein in milk builds and repairs body tissues, helps the body fight infection and supplies energy. Milk contains other nutrients too -- additional vitamins and minerals, fat and sugar.

Milk comes in so many forms; non-fat dry, sweetened condensed, whole fresh, skim fresh, buttermilk and evaporated. A good way to get more milk in the diet is in cream soups. This is a quick version of "Potato Carrot Soup":

Heavy covered saucepan, 2 quart-Yield: 4 cups
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 - 1/2 cups shredded carrots
1 can (10-1/2 oz) condensed cream of potato soup
2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
Pepper to taste

In saucepan melt butter; stir in onion and carrots. Cover, bring to steam, then simmer over low heat 15 minutes, until carrots are almost tender. Stir into soup; gradually stir in milk. Add salt, celery salt and pepper. Heat to serving temperature, stirring occasionally.

Class IV: "Ole Rosa" All fresh materials and accessories permitted

Class V: "Vintage" A mixed bouquet with colonial accent.

Class VI: (Invitational) Table section. This will feature "Wine and Roses" in candlelight (with three sections: A -- vintage (Exhibition), B -- new wine

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
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Roundtable Club donates to two funds

Inside THE CAPITOL

Santa Fe—New Mexico fire departments will receive a total increase of \$150,000 from the state fire protection fund in fiscal 1972 under a new law effective July 1.

New maximum annual amounts and increases include: Belen, \$11,500, up \$2,000; Capitan, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Carrizozo, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Cimarron, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Clayton, \$9,000 up \$2,000; Clovis, \$13,000 up \$3,500; Corona, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Des Moines, \$7,000, unchanged; Eunice, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Fort Sumner \$8,500 up \$1,500.

Also, Jal, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Logan, \$7,000, unchanged; Lordsburg, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Los Lunas \$8,500 up \$1,500; Maxwell, \$7,000 unchanged; Questa, \$7,000 unchanged; Ruidoso, \$15,500 up \$3,500 Ruidoso Downs, \$8,500 up \$1,500; San Jon, \$7,000, unchanged Santa Rosa, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Springer, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Taos, \$9,000 up \$2,000; Texico, \$8,500 up \$1,500; Tucumcari, \$9,000 up \$2,000, and Vaughn, \$8,500 up \$1,500.

Rep. John Tomlin, D-Dona Ana County, sponsored the bill boosting allotments from the fund which receives taxes on fire insurance premiums.

Special state attorneys will file testimony by state officials Friday (June 11) in Washington before the Federal Power Commission in New Mexico's bid to win a husky price increase in Southeastern New Mexico for natural gas at the wellhead. The Jal-Eunice area is directly affected in the Permian Basin case.

Cross-examination of witnesses before the FPC will begin July 27. The Permian Basin lies in New Mexico and Texas. But the present New Mexico price for natural gas at the wellhead is about 14.5 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Texas-produced gas from the same basin commands 30 cents and up, says ex-Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley, chief New Mexico counsel in the case. Much of New Mexico's gas production is on state and federal land. The state receives 37 1/2 per cent of royalties on federal land.

If the FPC ultimately changes the current pricing formula adopted in 1961, the statewide benefit in increased taxes and other state revenues could be many millions of dollars annually. Besides, the low New Mexico price has sharply cut gas well exploration. A price boost would spur well exploration and greatly aid the Southeastern New Mexico economy.

A similar case is pending in Northwestern New Mexico. Aztec Oil and Gas Co., Dallas, seeks a boost in prices from 12-14 cents per 1,000 cubic feet to 29 cents in the San Juan Basin. State lawyers asked the FPC to apply its ruling throughout Northwestern New Mexico. The vital Permian Basin case will be considered first by the FPC.

State Property Appraisal Director Haskel Smith said during

the weekend he awaits a ruling from Atty. Gen. David Norvell of Clovis in a politically-tinged scrap over a Valencia County property reappraisal maintenance contract.

Valencia County Assessor Cloyis Herrera and the county commission are battling in the controversy. Herrera opposes the faction headed by Valencia County Democratic Chairman Filo Sedillo. The commission is pro-Sedillo.

Smith says the county should award the contract but an award has been long delayed. Three bids were opened June 1—two at Los Lunas and one at Santa Fe. Smith said the State PAD will award a contract if necessary but he prefers the county make the award. Smith asked Norvell if it is necessary for Herrera to sign the contract.

He said the bid opening was not voided because invitations to bid did not state the location where offers should be submitted. Bids ranged from \$65,000 to \$147,000.

Sen. Emmett Hart, D-Quay-De-Baca-Guadalupe, says he may not seek reelection in 1972. A Tucumcari lawyer, Hart landed in a new district of Quay, Guadalupe and Torrance Counties under Senate reapportionment this year.

Hart says he likes the new alignment. Hart is a liberal but his district is conservative. His present 6-year term will expire next year. Hart also served in the Senate in 1961-64. He lost a bid for the Democratic attorney general nomination in 1964 and won election again to the Senate in 1966.

Sen. John Morrow, D-Union-Harding-Coffax, says new Santa Fe Downs race track will not hurt long-established La Mesa Park at Raton. Sen. Morrow noted La Mesa Park draws most fans from Northeastern New Mexico and parts of Kansas, Texas, Colorado and Oklahoma.

Nearly 12,000 spectators, including many non-betters, turned out for Santa Fe Downs' opening Saturday. The pari-mutuel handle of \$198,064 was disappointing. Sen. Morrow says New Mexico Taxpayers Association is qualified to perform a \$50,000 broad state tax study ordered by the 1971 Legislature. He is on the Legislative Examining and Licensing Committee studying the possibility of centralizing part of functions of about 25 state licensing boards. The panel met last week in Santa Fe. Morrow said a central office would be a convenience for persons with business before state boards.

Sen. Morrow says opposition is strong against State Corrections Secretary Howard Leach in his Coffax-Union-Harding district. Morrow sponsored a law creating a new State Corrections Commission July 1. The commission will appoint a corrections secretary. Leach is among applicants for the job.

The State Park and Recreation Commission reported 18 of 23 state parks showed an attendance increase of 155,589 or nearly 9 per cent in January-

April. Included were these parks: Valley of Fires near Carrizozo; Alamogordo Lake near Fort Sumner; Clayton Lake near Clayton and Conchas Lake near Tucumcari. Tres Ruedas Inc. and Hi-Plains Plastics Co. of Clovis were chartered here.

Budget hearing set for July 6

Wugalter reports on budget hearings

SANTA FE - Traditional programs long recognized as the basis for educational enterprise will not work in the Gadsden School District, New Mexico Public School Finance Chief Harry Wugalter said, because of its high influx of non-English speaking students.

Wugalter said the Gadsden district, which lies along the United States-Mexico Border in southern Dona Ana County, is in an area which is a major immigration gateway into the United States.

There are a large number of pupils who are non-English speaking immigrants, Wugalter said, and so the district's superintendent must offer innovative approaches to education and new techniques to offer "decent, honest opportunities" for such students.

He said that during his tenure as public school finance chief, he has examined more than 800 school budgets and "there is no doubt the Gadsden School District is perhaps the best managed."

Wugalter made his comments after a week-long examination of the Gadsden and Corona school districts.

He said the Corona district has 170 pupils spread over 2,061 square miles, an average of one child every 11 square miles.

Nearly 60 per cent of the children are transported to school in Corona over long distances at a transportation cost of \$379 per child, compared with the state average of \$70 per child.

He said the Corona superintendent has requested a salary sufficient to attract and keep quality teachers.

The average teacher salary in Corona next year will be \$7,713, a \$252 increase over the current year.

Wugalter also said the superintendent of Corona schools wants to expand a kindergarten program to allow the teacher to visit children in isolated ranching areas rather than requiring the children to be transported long distances into Corona.

Wugalter's budget tour last week covered school districts in Dona Ana, Otero and Lincoln Counties.

He reported that many of the districts have established strong kindergarten programs with a bilingual approach where needed. The Las Cruces district has been able to offer nine pre-first classes this year, using federal funds.

The Las Cruces district plans to expand this to 11 classes next year to increase the coverage from 320 children to 480 children.

Wugalter also recommended expansion of the kindergarten program at Tularosa, where 31 per cent of the enrollment of 1,452 is from the Mesquero Indian Reservation.

The Tularosa district now has a kindergarten program for 45 children, financed through Johnson-O'Malley federal funds. Wugalter found a serious class overloading problem at the elementary level in Cloudford. The pupil teacher ratio for grades 1-6 is 27.62 to 1 while in grades 7-12 the ratio is 16-1.

The distribution of the children in the elementary grades is such that adding another teacher will not alleviate the overloading problem Wugalter said.

He recommended the school district start an ungraded class project at the second and third grade levels and the fourth and fifth grade levels.

Wugalter approved \$9,547 from state program enrichment funds to establish a pre-school program for 40 children in the Ruidoso system next year.

The district now has a pre-school program for 14 children, financed by Johnson-O'Malley funds. But there are no more Indian children in the five-year old category so this program will be eliminated next year.

Wugalter said the Ruidoso system has a high pupil retention rate, amounting to 21.1 per cent of first graders.

Wugalter had some criticism for his handling of the teacher salary schedule request.

The superintendent accepted the salary schedule as presented by the teacher association after checking the arithmetic. "This reflects a lack of responsibility on the part of the administration," he said. The Carrizozo teachers will be increased to an average of 3 per cent, from \$7,266 to \$7,484 next year.

Not Quite That Simple - Ed.

There was a lot more to the making of Carrizozo school budget and setting of teacher salaries than reported in this Associated Press release. Supt. Jim Steinepries believes in working with people and that was the way it was with teacher salaries -- local teachers agreed that a three percent salary increase would be acceptable when increase across the state were running four and five percent. The salary schedule was reviewed by Carrizozo school board and approved by this governing body, which has the final say in all local school matters.

Round-Up

I have had some calls about the pine trees losing leaves or dying in the Ruidoso area. After checking the trees, I noticed a loss of leaves throughout the area. The leaf loss can be caused by the dry weather or a beetle that pierces the old leaves. The trees will generally recover. Some of the trees dying are infected with mistletoe, others can now be showing the effect of the severe freeze in early January. There is very little that can be done to help these trees recover. Extra care for special trees in a yard might

help but even then the results can be disappointing.

Chemical weed control recommendations are available in a new publication of the NMSU Extension Service. The publication lists chemicals recommended for different crops, lawns, ponds, pastures, and orchards. Instructions on chemicals, rates, and time of application, with remarks on waiting periods necessary for grazing livestock on treated fields, waiting periods before harvest, and methods to use in applying the chemicals are given. The Chemical Weed Control Guide for 1971 is available from county agents or from the Bulletin Office.

Range grasses are four times more efficient in use of water than shrubs are. Under severe moisture stress, grasses used less water and more dry matter.

The apple production in Lincoln and Chaves county has been severely affected by the


frost in late April as well as the poor pollination during bloom. Production in Lincoln County is estimated at 40,000 boxes and Chaves county at 5,000 boxes.


