### Sands Employees Vote On Union

White Sands Missile Range, N. M. -- Civilian employees of WSMR will go to the polls June 24 to decide whether or not to be represented by a union.

Only Class Act (GS) employees of U. S. Army Test and Evaluation Command (TECOM) organizations at WSMR will be eligible to vote. This will include those working on the main post and at up-range stations such as Stallion Range Center and Rhodes Canyon Range Center, as well as Holloman Air Force Base and the Utah Launch Complex at Green River.

Only two propositions will be on the ballot: whether to be represented by Local 158 of the National Federation of Federal Employees (NFFE), or by no union.

### Bill Ward Handling Race

The third annual Pony Express Race from White Oaks to Lincoln will be run on August 7th, starting from the old Bank Exchange Building in White Oaks at 8:30 a.m. Each entry must use four horses in the .42 mile race.

## More federal prisoners for county jail

The plaintiff has petitioned the court to bring Eugene Hensley, REGISTRATION BOARD GOES OVER COUNTY VOTER LISTS

H. Elfred Jones, Georgia Harkey and Betty Shreengost, Lincoln County Board of Registration, spent Tuesday going over voter registration lists -- surprise was that so many regularly voting people were careless and did not return their cards to qualify them to vote in the next election.

Clerk Alice King, assisting the board, said they would make up lists for both Republican and Democratic county chairman and enlist their help in getting people registered to vote. End of this month is deadline on card returns.

Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez and County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace have made a move that should prove to the advantage of the county.

First, they requested and got an inspection of the county jail by federal authorities. Then they employed a night jailer to meet federal request -- and the jail, new in 1964 with capacity for 49 prisoners, is qualified for federal use.

Lincoln County charges \$3.00 a day for keeping and feeding federal prisoners. Food cost last year averaged out 42¢ per day per prisoner and would be up only a little this year. Laundry and cleaning cost would be the only other cost increased because of more prisoners but bedding is not washed quite as much as at your house so this cost is kept to minimum.

The Lincoln County prison has a clean smell and looks neat in every way. Floor are mopped regularly, lemon wax put down, prisoners are asked to make up their beds and they respond rather well to this request.

The saving to the county comes in the fact that the jail has to be heated, lighted, cooled and kept clean whether there is one or 49 prisoners on hand.

Saloman Sanchez is the day jailer, Lloyd Kirpatrick the night jailer, Mrs. Ernest Sanchez

does the cooking with help from trustees. The county has not had a night jailer before.

After the federal inspection the information was that the government would be sending up to 20 prisoners to Lincoln County for safe keeping.

It used to be that when a group of wetbacks were picked up in this area the county would have to keep them, not forced to feed them but naturally they got fed when other prisoners were fed -- with no recompense from the federal government, all this extra feed, maybe eight or more wetbacks to hand three or four days, at the cost of the county. Now that the prison is federally approved the government pays its way for every prisoner kept here.

The sheriff's department headed by Sanchez, includes Leandro Vega, deputy, short deputy in Ruidoso, Pat Moore, secretary, Mary Ann Paddillo, radio.

It is quite a little trip from being a boy in Dublin, Ireland to taking charge of a Catholic parish in Lincoln County, New Mexico. Rev. Fr. Clive Lynn has made the journey and is fully occupied with his new job in Carrizozo, that of serving the St. Rita Catholic Church Parish in Carrizozo which includes Sacred Heart Church in Capitan, Sacred Heart Church in Fort Stanton, the Boys Camp and San Juan Church in Lincoln.

Quite a few mementos has made the journey with Fr. Lynn. In his study is a collection of football trophies, maybe better known as soccer in England and Ireland, they were won by Fr. Lynn. There is a special piece of artwork with music motif by one of his former chorus members in Albuquerque, plus shelves of books and literature that have been gathered from many corners of the world.

Fr. Lynn worked for the British Ministry of Education in the professional capacity of teaching and youth leadership. What we operate as sponsored boys' clubs in this country are much the same as the government program in the British Islands. All of this before.

He came to New Mexico and worked seven years as a deacon in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe, including three years in the Church of the Annunciation in Albuquerque and also teaching English, theology and choral music in St. Pius High School in Albuquerque.

### State Rep. George Fettinger presents 10 proposed constitution amendments

The steering Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met June 1, in Alamogordo, with the meeting being called to order at 1:30 p.m. by Robert Scribner, Chairman.

The minutes of the meeting of April 13, 1971 were read and approved.

State Representative George E. Fettinger presented the program for the afternoon, with a summary of the ten proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on next fall and they are as follows:

1. Eighteen year old vote.
2. Legislative compensation.
3. Right to carry firearms in recreation.
4. Text book change less than six years.
5. Viet Nam Veterans - waiver of tuition - state college.
6. Property tax assessment rate - not to exceed 33 1/3%.
7. Tax exemptions for water users corporations and associations.
8. Make constitutions more amendable.
9. Control of pollution by legislature.
10. Allocation of money in school funds.

Progress on various measures was reported on as follows:

PM 33 Bear Canyon Dam: Work is to start next week on closing ports to determine if there is sufficient water for an 8 1/2 acre foot lake.

PM 34 Otero County Solid Waste Disposal: The land has been obtained and an FHA grant of \$30,000 received.

PM 59 Amendment to State Statute for Fishing without a License: Stan Green said that the Outdoor Writers Association and the Press Association will provide licenses for the Ft. Stanton residents for 1971. Bob Scribner moved that this project measure be reactivated to obtain legislative action which would allow fishing privileges for retarded children in New Mexico Hospitals. Robert Bell seconded the motion and it was approved.

Under new proposals, Robert Bell moved that action be taken regarding the completion of Sacramento Lake near Clouderoff. The lake was started several years ago, but fails to hold water sufficient for fishing and recreation.

Perhaps additional work and sealing of the structure would be of benefit. Bert Pingsten seconded the motion and it was approved. This is project measure 81.

The annual work plan for fiscal year 1972 was presented and the objectives, actions, and schedules were discussed. Fred Thompson moved that it be adopted, second was made by Stan Green and the motion was approved.

Robert Scribner gave the Chairman's Report on project measures to the present time, indicating the 80 measures had been adopted for action. Of the 80 measures, 36 have been completed and 18 of these were completed during the past year and 17 new measures approved during the same period.

Robert Bell, chairman of the nominating committee, presented the following candidates for office for the coming year and all were elected by acclamation:

The next meeting will be July 13, 1971 in Carrizozo and the one following that was tentatively scheduled for August 24th.


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


rides which the children truly enjoy. Oh, how I did enjoy them.



**Land Bank cuts ranch loan rate**

Vonnie Jasper, manager of the Federal Land Bank Assn. of Roswell, received word this week that effective June 1 The Federal Land Bank of Wichita will reduce its interest on farm loans from 8 to 7-1/2 percent. "In addition to new loans, this reduction affects approximately \$133 million of outstanding variable rate loans on farms and ranches throughout Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico," Mr. Jasper stated.

This is the third reduction since the variable rate plan was introduced by the Land Bank in July, 1969. The first was last November when rates dropped from 9 to 8-1/2 percent, then from 8-1/2 to 8 percent on March 1, 1971. Mr. Jasper pointed out this action is in line with the Bank's policy of providing the farmers and ranchers with credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices.


