EXPANDED MANPOWER PROGRAM STARTS HERE
Lincoln County will benefit from an Expanded Manpower Program starting in Carrizozo on Monday, July 12, 1971.

The announcement was made by Louis Pachica, who heads the New Mexico Employment Security Commission.

Louis Lopez, the team manager, said services offered would include recruitment for existing and developing job openings, job applications taking, vocational testing and counseling, referral to employment services. For those who are not immediately job ready, job development and compiling of labor market and related resource information.

At the completion of the project, a report summarizing the information gathered will be available for use in industrial and economic development projects.




Communications at our airport



News and Notes

According to Kathryn Treat, Extension Clothing Specialist at New Mexico State University, these may be some of the trends for fall 1971:

COLORS - Blues and violets in shades such as "wild raspberry, grape, chateau, wine, carbon blue and turquoise; yellows and browns in parchment, bracken; molten gold and saffron."

FABRICS - Knits are still in and the knitted coordinate will be the pace setter. Watch for 2-3 knit patterns combined in one outfit. Jacquard geometrics and tweedy knits will be prominent.

Other important fabrics on the fall scene will be suede and leather, pannel velvet, vinyls, quilted and pile fabrics. Denim will continue to be strong.

Other fabrics will continue to be soft and fluid. The winter print on a dark background will be found on a variety of fabrics. Watch for printed knits.

STYLES - We called them short shorts, now they're hot pants, and a designer has named a lengthened version for fall "warm pants." In the cooler climates, the winter style will be a culotte type skirt which ends just above the knee.

Hems will come in all lengths. However, the coat hems are holding at below the knee length.

"Back to Basics" the theme for a number of designers for emphasis on the classic styles - cardigans, blazers, the shirtwaist, the tartan-plaid-kilt and others.

"You never outgrow your need for milk". How many times have you heard this statement? Too many times to count I suspect; and yet we don't always follow it. Milk and milk products are often neglected in the adult's diet. What better time than June, National Dairy month, to remind you of the delicious ways to add milk to your family's diet.

Milk is essential in the diet for its calcium content. Calcium is a mineral that helps form bones and teeth and keeps them strong. Also, the protein in milk builds and repairs body tissues, helps the body fight infection and supplies energy. Milk contains other nutrients too -- additional vitamins and minerals, fat and sugar.

Milk comes in so many forms; non-fat dry, sweetened condensed, whole fresh, skim fresh,

buttermilk and evaporated. A good way to get more milk in the diet is in cream soups. This is a quick version of "Potato Carrot Soup":
Heavy covered saucepan, 2 quart-Yield: 4 cups
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 - 1/2 cups shredded carrots
1 can (10-1/2 oz) condensed cream of potato soup
2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
Pepper to taste
In saucepan melt butter; stir in onion and carrots. Cover, bring to steam, then simmer over low heat 15 minutes, until carrots are almost tender. Stir into soup; gradually stir in milk. Add salt, celery salt and pepper. Heat to serving temperature, stirring occasionally.

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
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Smokey Bear Stampede Parade In Pictures

Inside the Capitol

The new State Hospitals Institutions Board, meeting in Santa Fe, learned the fiscal 1972 outlook for the sprawling DHI is tight.

Former State Representative Kelly Mora of Raton is on the board. State Miner's Hospital at Raton and Los Lunas Hospital and Training School are D-H I units. Hollis Cummins of Capitan is also a board member. Fort Stanton Hospital in Lincoln County is under the DHI tent. Cummins was elected as vice chairman.

The big DHI has experienced severe problems previously with Medicaid payments for its patients funneled through the State Health - Social Services Department. State officials say problems have been solved.

The State Highway Commission will meet Thursday in Raton at the Colfax County Courthouse. Agreements for state aid to improve streets in Grady, Belen, Cimarron, Des Moines and Springer are on the agenda.

Republicans challenged the 1971 Democratic legislatures legislative reapportionment plan in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque. The GOP asked a 3-judge court to accept Republican reapportionment plans or realign the legislature itself.

The reapportionment plans signed into law by Gov. Bruce King are especially vulnerable in wide variations of population between Senate and House districts. The new district of Rep. George Blocker, D-Jal, is underrepresented a big 16.34 percent in Lea County.

In Other County Rep. John J. Mershon's district is overrepresented 18.78%. The maximum spread is 39.5% between the largest and smallest Senate district in population.

The Union, Harding, and Colfax Senate district of Sen. John Morrow, D-Capulin, is 18.31% overrepresented. The Taos-Mora district of Senator C.B. Trujillo, D-Toas, is close to the norm with 22,189 population.

The Quay, Guadalupe and Torrance Counties Senate district of Sen. Emmett Hart, D-Tucumcari, is 6.26 per cent overrepresented. The new Roosevelt-DeBaca Counties Senate district is nearly 16 per cent overrepresented. Sen. R.C. (Ike) Morgan, D-Portales, resigned his seat.

Signs showed New Mexico Republicans were not united behind the federal court challenge. Rep. Ralph Fruit, R-Clovis, said the suit was not endorsed by the Republican Party. Plaintiffs are Sen. John Eastham, Albuquerque; Rep. Tom Hoover, Albuquerque; former Rep. Eugene Peirce, Albuquerque; George P. Martinez, Bernalillo County GOP vice chairman; Dr. Thomas M. Prescott, Tucumcari physician; former Rep. Carter Kirk, Deming; Hobbs attorney Lawrence Johnson, former Lea County Republican chairman, and Stanley Tenorio of San Felipe Pueblo.

News from the County Agent

Summertime, pets, and gals and guys make a happy combination. One possible cloud on this fun time scene is the danger of rabies. Most authorities agree that the main reservoir of infection in the United States is in the wild animals—skunks, foxes, wolves, bats, squirrels, and racoons are considered sources of this virus disease affecting the central nervous system.

Rabid animals are the source of infection for other animals and man. Transmission is by infected saliva on broken skin or abrasions. Here are some recommendations for 4-H'ers and every youth handling animals: Rabies does not occur as often in cats as dogs, but when it does occur several humans are usually exposed.

Vaccinate all family pets and eliminate all stray dogs and cats. Keep wild animal population to a minimum.

In pet or farm animals exposure, contact veterinarian. Do not attempt home treatment. Unvaccinated dogs that have been exposed should be confined for six months. Vaccinated dogs that have been exposed should be revaccinated and observed for 30 days. In case of human exposure, flush the wound and contact family doctor. Capture the offending animal or get a good description. If it is necessary to kill the animal, try to protect the brain. The head of a suspicious animal should be prepared for laboratory examination by trained personnel only.

Have some of your woody shrubs suddenly wilted and died back? This is probably due to injuries inflicted by the severe area-wide freeze during the first week of January. As long as the weather remained cool the plants could keep sap flowing in sufficient quantities, but summers heat was too much. Cut back to live wood (some may have loose bark right to the ground), water and feed gently, and hope for the best.

Think seriously about including native plants such as pinyon pine, juniper, chamisa, etc., in your landscape planting next fall. Natives can take the climate better than most "foreigners."

Range scientists at Colorado State University's experiment station at Hesperus, Colo., say Angora goats could be used to get rid of Gambel oak, a type of brush which covers millions of acres of potentially productive range land in western states.

During a two year period in the experiment area, the goats killed 85 percent of the Gambel oak. They preferred the oak root sprouts over all other plant species in the test pastures and did not interfere with the feeding pattern of the cattle grazing with them. The goats chose to forage rabbit brush, snakeweed, hairy golden aster and other weedy plants not palatable to cattle. Grass was grazed by fewer than five percent of the goats when Gambel oak was available.

2 championships to be decided
Two major championships will be decided during the upcoming weekend at Ruidoso Downs, with one each in both the quarter horse and the thoroughbred categories.
Race fans will be treated to the Top Deck Handicap on Saturday, July 17, when ten topnotch quarter horses, 3-year-old and up vie for the crown and the \$3,500-added purse over 400-yards. It will be the fourth running for the classic for older horses. Nominations were due to close Monday, July 12. The field is to be filled through the entry box on July 14, with the ten top-weighted horses preferred.
Expected to bid for a chance to defend his championship is Cinder Leo, the tough-running gelding owned by the Fitzgerald Brothers. Cinder Leo posted a good 20.07 seconds last year to wrest the victory away from Go Together and Dixie Man, who finished second and third, respectively.
The Top Deck Handicap could bring about another matchup of Cinder Leo, Junior Meyers and Cee Bar Deck. Cee Bar Deck, fast becoming one of the most prominent quarter horses in New Mexico holds wins over both Cinder Leo and Junior Meyers. However, Cinder Leo gained revenge by besting Cee Bar Deck two weeks ago in a 440-yard encounter.
Junior Meyers, the all distance specialist, has a win and a place in two outs at Ruidoso Downs this season. The Simon Brothers blue-ribbon horse bested Cinder Leo in an early season test at 350-yards, only to lose a photo finish to Cee Bar Deck at 400-yards.
There is a strong possibility the Top Deck attraction will lure Barr Passum and the swift Druclita, who is asserting authority on southwestern tracks.
The fifth running of The Peter Hurd Handicap will be unreeled Sunday, July 18, scheduled as a 6-panel test for 3-year olds, nominations were due to close Tuesday, July 13, with draws made Thursday, July 15. Preference is to be given the ten topweighted candidates.
Last year The Reprobate toured the distance in 1:08.2 to defeat Tammykin and Fast Gas. Since the race is limited to 3-year olds the way is left open for a new champion to be crowned and the list of prime runners is likely to be lengthy.
With four-day racing each weekend in July, the program of major attractions will feature both quarter horses and thoroughbreds. Following The Top Deck Handicap, the calendar holds special markings for the Zia Stakes on July 24 and the Billy The Kid Handicap on July 25. A chance for the longer-gated horses will come on Sunday, August 8, with The Ruidoso Jockey Club Handicap at 7-furlongs. Trials for the second leg of Tres Coronas (the Rainbow Quarter Horse Futurity) will be staged on Saturday, August 7.



Charley Pride will headline 3 days during three days of N.M. State Fair

Albuquerque -- Charley Pride, one of the top stars of the current country-western scene, has been booked to headline three days of the popular Tingley Coliseum rodeo at the 1971 New Mexico State Fair. He'll star at the fair's rodeo Monday through Wednesday, Sept. 20-22.
Pride, who is called "Country Charley" (after his first hit RCA album), is a guitarist and singer who has had ten top-selling albums and a number of hit singles.
A native of Mississippi (he was born in Sledge, about 60 miles south of Memphis), Pride spent his early childhood picking cotton with his parents and his seven brothers and three sisters. At the age of 17, however, he decided there must be something better in life--and began playing baseball in the Negro American League with Detroit and the Memphis-Red Sox. He interrupted that career for a two-year military hitch, during which time he married his wife Roxanne.

Returning to baseball, he made it to the majors for a brief period in 1961, playing outfield and pitching for the Los Angeles Angels.
It was in 1963 that he was spotted by country star Red Sovine, who talked him into making music his full-time career. A recording session was arranged in Nashville, where he was heard by Chet Atkins. This resulted in his being signed to a long-term recording contract with RCA. His first record was "Snakes Crawl at Night" in 1965. By 1966, he had won a Grammy nomination for his work on "Just Between You and Me." This brought honors from a number of country-western magazines and a 1967 invitation to appear at the Grand Ole Opry.
From that debut, he has been a solid star in the country music

Development of cave to be slow

A letter from John O. Crow, associate director for Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Dept. of Interior, to Rep. Harold Runnels, dated June 15, states that the Bureau's role in development of Fort Stanton Caves as a tourist attraction has been primarily one of providing a system of gates to protect the scientific equipment being used by Speleological Society and to protect the public from undetermined hazards.

The letter continues, "Once the range of opportunities and different values of the caves are known, the facts will be evaluated to determine the proper uses of the cave."

Several years or a decade could be involved in routine outlined by Crow.

Lee H. Skinner, chairman of New Mexico Grotto of National Speleological Society, wrote to Rep. Mammal Lujan on June 21 stating that the SW Region of the Nat'l Society, in cooperation with the Bureau of Land Management, is conducting a scientific study of Fort Stanton Cave.

Instruments have been installed to record temperature, humidity, CO2 pressure and airflow in various parts of the cave. Also, biological and geological studies are being made of the cave. Our exploratory efforts are occasionally discovering new areas of the cave, and we have by now surveyed over three-fourths of the known passages in the cave.

Travel increases at Gran Quivira

Travel to Gran Quivira National Monument has increased greatly in the last five years, according to Superintendent Calvin R. Cummings. Five years ago the total visitors for January through June was 5,197. During the first six months of this year visitors totaled 13,597, an increase of 162%.

In addition to preserving the ruins of a pre-Spanish pueblo and two Spanish mission churches, Gran Quivira offers a picnic area for those who wish to lunch in the area. Guided tours are available to groups by appointment. The Visitor Center is open seven days a week from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

This National Monument is one of more than 270 areas administered by the National Park Service, and is located in central New Mexico, 26 miles south of Mountainair, and 55 miles north west of Carrizozo.

Employment goes up in New Mexico

Employment in New Mexico totaled 193,741 in March, 1970, a 2.0 percent increase from the March 1969 figure, according to a report issued today by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Taxable payrolls in the first quarter of 1970 totaled \$275.3 million, 7.5 percent higher than in the comparable quarter of 1969.

Bernalillo County had the largest employment, 79,195, an increase of 4.2 percent from the first quarter of 1969.


