\$330,000 Recreation Park planned

At a meeting in the town hall last Wednesday Engineer Tom Mann of Roswell clarified plans for a new recreation park for Carrizozo, total cost estimated at \$330,000.

The park will be owned by the Town of Carrizozo, usage will be free to all people except for normal green fees on the nine-hole golf course, and it will have facilities, expected to attract tourists to stay a little longer in this area as well as be a fine recreation spot for local people.

The park will include eleven acres devoted to a new Little League ball park, tennis courts, picnic areas, picnic shelters, two fishing lakes, one at extreme east end and one at the west end. Water from the west lake will be pumped into a sprinkler system for the golf course.

The State Game and Fish Department is expected to keep the lakes stocked with fish. There will be an acequia (ditch) connecting the lakes with clear water.

The plans will be completed by the Mann Engineering firm and taken to Santa Fe by August 1 and presented to the State Planning Office. The committee of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation will meet in the middle of August and is expected to act favorably on the plan.

The project involves a total of 89 acres, 69 acres donated by the Carrizozo Country Club, 20 acres to be purchased from Petty Brothers. Matching funds are available for the purchase of the

20 acres. Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer are providing funds to match the Federal money and in addition will provide funds for maintenance of the park for a number of years. Carrizozo has a good water supply but probably additional wells will be drilled for water to be used on this new park.

It will be a municipal project all the way, no special privileges for Country Club members or other people.

Mayor Valton Hall of Capitan was in District Court clerk's office Tuesday asking that Ray Provine be relieved from jury duty, which can be done. Stubby Huey has drilled new well for Capitan, trench being dug, electric wiring being done, pipe being set, and Mayor Hall will meet engineers flying in to Carrizozo airport Wednesday to take them to Capitan to go over this water project hoping to get water for the town from the new well as speedily as possible. Ray Provine is the only man around town who knows the whole business and Capitan could need the water bad. The town has 110,000 gallon storage which is not enough. They are working for an FHA loan to finance well and piping.


Forty-eight prospective jurors were in court Wednesday, about forty to be selected to serve for the next six months.

No known cases of VEE in Lincoln

The Federal Government through the Department of Agriculture is making vaccine for disease known as Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, or VEE, available for use in Lincoln County and the work of vaccinating horses in this area will start immediately.

VEE is a peculiar disease in that it is thought to be carried by people, as well as mosquitos, and is transferred either way. Being real dry the mosquito problem is not bad in Lincoln County but people coming into this area can bring the disease here, and from that source be spread to horses of the area --

Campbell how many horses they have so enough vaccine will be brought here.

Colts or mares will not be included in the count.

Horses in Town of Carrizozo will be vaccinated on Wednesday, July 28, time and place not yet known.

There is no known case of VEE in New Mexico at this time, so the vaccination program is a preventative measure, however the situation is serious enough that the American Quarter Horse Association has canceled all horse shows, anywhere during the month of August.

Ranchers calling Mrs. Campbell should be able to tell her where they may be reached when vaccine arrives.

There are no known cases of
the Venezuelan Equine Encephal-

VEE is a virus disease which

system and causes high death
losses. Where the disease ex-
ists, birds and some wild animals

are also affected and these serve
as reservoirs of the virus.
Mosquitoes and other blood suck-
ing insects serve as carriers of
the virus from wild birds and
animals to horses and humans.
When horses and humans come
down with the disease, it is
usually fatal. A recent outbreak
of human encephalitis in Mexico
City resulting in at least 50
human deaths, is of VEE origin.

A vaccine against VEE has been
produced and USDA is taking
emergency measures to vacci-
nate 200,000 horses, mules and
donkeys in northern Mexico in
an effort to stop the rapid north-
ward spread of the disease.
Further spread northward in
the U.S. by this deadly virus
disease could imperil both the
health of people and the horse
industry in southwestern U.S.

Wigs are going to American
women's heads. In fact, cash

affected by dampness or hair
spray and are quite durable.
Don't wash the cherries!
Fresh cherries are very per-
ishable and should be refrigerated
as soon as possible after buying.

carefully. For best eating
quality they should be eaten with-
in two days, according to the U.S.





White Oaks Historic Site expects to receive grant for improvements

The Steering Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met Tuesday, July 13, 1971 in Carrizozo, New Mexico and the meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by Robert Bell, Acting Chairman.

The minutes of the June 1, 1971 meeting were read and approved. The program of the afternoon was presented by Jim Dunlap of the Soil Conservation Service, Roswell, New Mexico, regarding agriculture pollution surveys and outlined results of a survey made in Chavez County.

Regarding existing projects measures, Bill Huey of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish discussed P.M. - 81, Sacramento Lake, and its failure to hold water due to faults in the formation. He outlined some of the attempts and methods that had been made to seal the lake to prevent loss of water and indicated that additional investigation and studies are to be made.

Other Project Measures discussed were:

PM - 12 White Oaks Road: Mrs. Snow said improvement work is to start immediately on this road.

PM - 30 & 37 White Oaks Historic Site & Area Plan: A grant is to be received for improvements and preservation of buildings.

PM - 26 Sacramento Road: Work has started on improvements.

PM - 33 Bear Canyon Dam: Ports have been closed and the water level is rising.

PM - 66 Ambrosia - Chavez Ditch: Plans are being completed to start work on this ditch.

PM - 87 Lincoln Water & Sewage: Designs have been completed and funds are being sought.

PM - 75 Carrizozo School Beautification: The football field has been reseeded & has a good cover of grass.

PM - 34 Otero Solid Waste Disposal: Still need cost figures. Five new project measures were taken into consideration by the Steering Committee. These are as follows:

A request from the Carrizozo SWCD for assistance regarding Grazing Management Systems and Conservation Practices. The need is to establish better coordination and cooperation between Federal, State, and private agencies and ranchers and land owners in providing research, information, etc., on grazing management systems and conservation practices. It was moved and seconded that this be accepted as a project measure and the motion carried. This is PM - 82.

The next proposal came from the Carrizozo SWCD regarding a Plant Resource Material Plan. Assistance was requested in obtaining maximum use of vegetation and land and would require range plant inventory, plant needs, inventory of erosion control problems, and soil and land ownership inventory and consolidation of information of SCS, Forest Service, BLM, Extension Service, experiment stations, etc. It was moved and seconded that this be adopted as a project measure and the motion carried. This

is PM - 83.

The third proposal to be considered was one regarding Oktoberfest Promotion. Layne Preslar of Clouderoft explained the purpose and plans of Oktoberfest and asked for help in promoting this project. The motion was seconded by Wall Wilson and it was adopted as PM - 84.

Another request given consideration was made by the town of Carrizozo for help on a Carrizozo Recreation Park in the area of planning and obtaining plant materials for a recreation park and golf course. Roy Harmon seconded and the motion carried. This is PM - 85.

The last request also came from the town of Carrizozo for assistance with Carrizozo Airport Improvements. They plan to enlarge and extend the existing airport and need help in overall plans, revegetation, wind breaks and beautification. Second was made by Mrs. Snow and it was approved. This is PM - 86.

Kurt Ziebarth elaborated on the new Implied Consent Law regarding drivers who drink and also informed the group of new speed detection devices. He said you'd better not speed or you will get caught!

The next meeting will be held in Ruidoso, New Mexico August 31, 1971.

Food stamps are popular at Mora

A report for February 1971 on four factors of New Mexico's economy issued by Board of Economic Development shows 55.9 percent of Mora County's 4,673 population using Food Stamps.

Use of food stamps ranges all the way from Otero County's low of 6.9 percent, Lincoln 11.2, Chaves 13.2, Socorro 26.3, Torrance 25.0, up to 35.6 in Taos and the winner Mora.

The state-wide average use of food stamps is 14.6 percent. Other changes noted by the report include unemployment, state average 7.2, population on welfare, state average 7.6; and population change, state average a plus 6.8

Lincoln County has 5.1 percent of its 7,560 population unemployed, against a high of 19.1 in Rio Arriba County.

Lincoln County has 4.3 percent of its population on welfare. This figure goes up to 19.5 percent in Mora County, 17.8 in Taos, 13.1 in Sandoval and Otero County appears to be the lowers with 3.8 percent of its 41,097 population on welfare.

Lincoln did not do so well on population change, recording a drop of 2.4 percent, Otero up 11.1, Eddy down 19.0, Chaves down 24.8, DeBaca down 14.8, Torrance down 16.6, Socorro down 4.0, Sierra up 12.2, Dona Ana up 16.4.

The report estimates that 26,000 of the 368,900 work force in the state is unemployed.

Development Assn. Meets

The Lincoln County Development Assn. recommended that the Buck Mountain Translator station and expansion of the Sierra Blanca Ski area be approved by the Forest Service.

They also recommended that the Wilderness area be kept at the present size and not enlarged. Chaplain Kline reported on the Easter Sunrise Service and suggested that it be called the Four Chaplains Easter Sunrise. The total cost of the 1971 program was \$550, with \$420 still outstanding.

Another recommendation was that any one legislative district include all of Lincoln County and not split up as it has been proposed.

Nona Brecheisen reported that she had arranged for Walter Henn and Bill Ward to be on the KBIM program at 11:30 on July 28th.

Favorable letters on the Fort Stanton Caves and their development were received from all four United States senators and representatives as well as B-LM and NSS.

75,000 Oktoberfest brochures ready

MENTAL HEALTH ADVISORY COMMITTEES ESTABLISHED

A series of Mental Health Advisory Committee meetings in Lincoln and Otero counties have been set for Monday, July 26. Mr. Bob Bell, Community Program Developer for Southwest Mental Health Center, Las Cruces, announces Advisory Committees have been established in Carrizozo, Ruidoso, and Alamogordo by Southwest Mental Health Center to better serve these areas. A fourth committee is currently being organized in Tularosa and is expected to be functioning within a month.

The Advisory Committee meetings are scheduled for July 26 in Carrizozo at 1:30 p.m. in the High School Library; Ruidoso at 4:30 p.m. in the High School Conference Room; and Alamogordo at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall Conference Room. The public is invited to attend any of these meetings, each of which will be followed by a discussion period.

The committee in each community helps the Center staff understand the community

problems and helps coordinate mental health services to that area.

Bell said that negotiations are being considered between the Center and Otero County Mental Health Program to provide training for mental health counselors. "We feel that with our limited staff and a seven and one-half county area to cover, the best way to help outlying areas is through consultation and education," Bell said.

Activities of the Carrizozo Advisory Committee have included a drug panel discussion and presentation of a play by the Living Players. The Living Players is a group of NMSU students who volunteer their talents to produce plays dealing with problems of communication, interpersonal relationships, or

other concerns of living. This group will be available during the 1971-72 school year to stage a play concerning parent-child communication. 
