

More than 60 youngsters are expected to compete for some \$600 in prize money this weekend at the fifth annual Billy the Kid rodeo in Carrizozo.

The eight-event show, which starts both Saturday and Sunday at 2 p.m., will be at the Joe Sargent Memorial Arena.

Youngsters up to 15-years-old from throughout southern New Mexico will be entered in the rodeo, which is sponsored by the chamber of commerce.

A highlight of the rodeo weekend is the annual Billy the Kid dance at the Carrizozo Country Club. Music for the audience of youngsters and adults alike will be provided by the well-known Aggie Ramblers, of Las Cruces.

Many of the eight events include categories for two age groups. They are: bronc riding, up to 12-

years-old and 13 and 14-year-olds; barrel racing, up to 12 and 13 through 15; pole bending, up to 12 and 13 to 15; goat hair pull, up to 12; goat tying, up to 12 and 13 to 15; rawhide race, 11 to 15; flag race, up to 12 and 13 to 15; and steer riding, up to 12 and 13 to 15.

Mike Hernandez, of Ruidoso, is providing the stock and is the rodeo producer. Rodeo chairman is Wesley Lindsay.

Entries for the rodeo close at noon on each performing day. All entry fees are \$5 per event and will be split with 50 percent to the winner, 30 percent for second and 20 percent for third place.

In addition, a \$50 cash award will be made to both the all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl.

Ruidosan elected GOP chairman

A 30-year-old Ruidoso pharmacist has been elected Lincoln County Republican chairman.

He is Don L. Swalander, who replaces Bill Shrecengost, of Lincoln. Shrecengost, who was elected to the post earlier this year, resigned.

Swalander, a five-year resident of Ruidoso, had been the county party's vice chairman. That position is now vacant, though Betty Shrecengost, of

Lincoln, remains as secretary and S.M. Cozzens, of Capitan, remains as treasurer.

The election was at the GOP central committee's meeting last Friday in Capitan.

Swalander, a Kansas native who came to this area from Tulsa, Okla., is owner of Don's Prescription Pharmacy in Ruidoso Downs. The University of Oklahoma graduate is married and has two children.

Two winners in the name game; another new contest this week

There were two winners among the record number of entries submitted in the Lincoln County News' weekly "names in the news" contest.

First bell rings Monday

Back to school for 2,000 county students

Most of Lincoln County's schools will open next week for a nine-month run of business--which means nearly 2,000 students will soon be back in the classrooms.

Classes start in Capitan Monday, Carrizozo, Tuesday, and Corona Wednesday. In Hondo and Ruidoso, the first day is Sept. 7.

And for some 109 teachers, as well as dozens of administrative officials and other school staff members, the summer vacation ends a day or so before the first bell rings.

Teachers' workshops in preparation for the start of school are scheduled in Capitan Friday, Carrizozo Monday, Corona Tuesday, Ruidoso Sept. 2 and 3, and Hondo Sept. 3.

Carrizozo superintendent Jim Steinpriels said enrollment is expected to total 434 students; Capitan superintendent Ica Caster is expecting 230 students; Hondo superintendent Ernest Booky said enrollment should be 260 students; Corona superintendent Lewis Stratton said enrollment there will be about 170 students; and in Ruidoso enrollment is expected to be 860 students.

In Carrizozo this week, two new teachers were hired to fill the staff--but another resigned, still leaving one vacancy.

Steinpriels said Jake R. Trujillo, a spring graduate of Highlands University, was hired to teach high school Spanish; and Miss Katherine Myer, a University of Southern California graduate with one year experience in Canada, was named to teach language arts in the upper elementary grades.

However, Wayland Ollard, who would have been new to the staff as the assistant coach and drivers education teacher, accepted the position of head coach at Cuba.

There are four new teachers on the Capitan staff, according to Caster. They are F. D. Hornbaker, science and math, who taught at Capitan two years ago but last year was at Clayton; Mrs. Joanne Lease, special reading, who last year taught at Espanola; Richard House,

athletic coach, science and drivers education, who last year was at Lamy, Texas; and Mrs. Elaine Bell, first grade teacher, who just graduated from Eastern New Mexico University.

Corona has seven new teachers, Stratton said. They are Miss Donna Harper, home economics; David Strecker, English and librarian; Dr. Ed Clark, science; Mike Brown, math; Miss Shirley Dougherty, business education; Mrs. Nancy Strecker, second grade; and Mrs. Veda Wright, fourth grade.

Ruidoso will be offering a kindergarten program for the first time. It is a state-funded program for educationally disadvantaged and will be taught at the White Mountain Elementary School. Hondo will have a kindergarten program, as will Carrizozo and Corona.

In Corona kindergarten students and their parents will meet at the school Aug. 26. Kindergarten in Carrizozo starts Tuesday.

By action taken by the Board of Education of the Hondo Schools, \$13,000 has been allocated for a kindergarten program for the 1971-72 school year.

The purchase of thousands of dollars of furniture, equipment, teaching aids and carpeting has been approved by the board.

Mrs. IdaLeen Eldridge, B.A. from New Mexico Western, has been employed as kindergarten instructor. Her instructional aide will be Mrs. Viola Montes who has served in this capacity for the past two school terms.

This program will be conducted in the same manner as it was the past school term. The children will ride the regularly run seven

school buses and will attend school Monday through Thursday. They will not attend school on Fridays thus allowing them a long week-end.

The program will begin with the opening of school on Sept. 7. Children who are five years of age or will be five by the first of January are eligible to take part in this kindergarten program.

All five superintendents in the county said hot lunches will be served and busses will run for students on the first day of school.

At the regular meeting on Aug. 10, the Carrizozo School Board set the hot lunch price of 30 cents per meal for the 1971-72 school year.

Starting with the first day of school, Aug. 24, the cafeteria will serve type "A" lunches.

This includes: milk, meat or meat substitute, vegetables and or fruit, bread and butter or fortified margarine.

Application blanks and eligibility guidelines for free or reduced price lunches will be sent home with the students the first day of school, and must be returned to the superintendent's office.

Football teams at four of the high schools--Hondo doesn't field a team--began last week in preparation for the opening games the first weekend in September.

Corona has 18 gridders practicing for the Sept. 3 opening game at home against Reserve; while Carrizozo and Ruidoso renew their cross-county rivalry in Carrizozo, also Sept. 3. Capitan also opens at home Sept. 3 against Dexter.

Five grants for law enforcement agencies

Three law enforcement agencies in Lincoln County are the recipients of five federal cost-sharing grants totaling nearly \$10,000.

The grants were announced last week by William L. Jespersen, of Carrizozo, who is coordinator for the State Law Enforcement Planning Commission's region two headquartered at Carrizozo.

The five grants to Lincoln County agencies were among 16 announced by the office, with financial benefits totaling almost \$76,000.

The Lincoln County sheriff's office was the recipient of two grants.

One grant to the county was in the sum of \$1,980 to raise the pay of four members of the sheriff's department staff, including the jailer, dispatcher, matron, undersheriff and deputy. The second grant was in the amount of \$3,000 to renovate the plumbing in the county jail in the new courthouse building. Fixtures in the jail have eroded because of the hard water and the grant will be used to install a water softener and bevalves.

The Village of Ruidoso Downs police department was on the receiving end of two grants, one for \$668 to purchase a mobile radio unit to tie into the state police radio system; and one for \$3,337 to add one additional policeman to the staff and to purchase some police equipment.

The Village of Ruidoso's police department was awarded

a grant totaling \$579 to purchase riot control equipment, including three 30-30 rifles, three 12 gauge shotguns, four riot sticks and six canisters of MACE.

The grant to the Lincoln County agencies were approved July 30 in Santa Fe by the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning. They had been recommended by the region two commission, of which Hoyt Lovelace, of Corona, is

chairman. The federal funds used were awarded to the state by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration of the U. S. Department of Justice.

Jespersen said some of the grants were on a 60-40 basis with the local agency paying the smaller amount, while others were on a 75-25 basis.

The 60-40 grants, he explained, were from federal

funds allocated in 1970, while the 75-25 grants were from funding allocated this year.

The grant to Ruidoso Downs for \$3,337 was a 60-40 grant, while the allocation of \$668 was on a 75-25 basis. The \$579 grant to the Village of Ruidoso was on a 75-25 basis; while the grant to Lincoln County for \$1,980 was on a 60-40 basis and the grant for \$3,000 was on a 75-25 basis.

New young voters lean toward GOP

New young voters registering in Lincoln County, those in the 18 to 20-year-old group, are leaning slightly to the Republican side of the political spectrum.

County clerk Alice King reported this week that 40 new voters in the young age bracket have registered in this county. Of this total, she said, 19 have registered as Republicans while 17 have registered as Democrats.

Four of the young voters declined to affiliate with either major party.

These figures indicate that the new young voters are going slightly against the trend of the over-21 group in Lincoln County.

While 47.5 percent of the young voters have registered as Republicans, only 39.8 percent (1,276) of those over 21 are in the GOP. And, 42.5 percent of the

under-21 voters are Democrats, while that Party's over-21 voters represent 56.6 percent (1,817) of the county total.

Not surprisingly, 10 percent of the new young voters declined to register as either Republican or Democrat, while only 3.6 percent of the older voters are in the category.

Currently in Lincoln County there are a total of 3,210 registered voters--a decrease of 515 from last summer just before the election. The decrease represents the number purged from the current lists because they did not vote last year.

With the voter purge earlier this summer, the percentage of Republicans and Democrats remained virtually unchanged, although the numbers of voters was quite different.

A total of 291 Democrats were stricken from the county's voter lists, while 203 Republicans were purged. And, 21 "declined to state" voters were taken from the rolls.

With the deletions, the Democrats represented 56.6 percent of the total--exactly the same percentage total as a year ago. And, the GOP represented 39.8 percent--one-tenth of one percent more than a year ago. The "declined to state" voters now represent 3.6 percent of the county total, which is one-tenth of a percent less than a year ago.

Statewide, the ratio among older voters is about 2.2 Democrats for one Republican. The under-21 registration currently includes 4,407 Democrats and 2,401 Republicans--a ratio of about 1.8 Democrats for each Republican.

EDITOR'S CORNER

The new game plan critics

President Nixon's new "game plan" for the economy is, of course, the biggest news story of the week. It has been the subject of page one stories in the daily newspapers, special programs on network television, as well as bar room and back fence banter.

But we're especially fond of some of the critics that immediately went to work on the President and his new program.

Two well-quoted critics, both conveniently, Democrats, came from right here in New Mexico. Governor Bruce King was the first, less than a day after the Sunday night announcement "too late." And, then, Monday the visiting senator from the state of Washington and would-be candidate for the White House, Henry Jackson, echoed the governor's position—also that the new program is "too late."

There are many valid critics who say the moves should have

come several months ago. This, perhaps, is true. Perhaps not. But to claim that the new program is simply "too late" is to infer that the nation's economy has reached a state of being irreparable—that at this juncture nothing could help.

When considering the merits of the new program for economic stimulation, along with the statements as to how well or how poor it will work, one needs to consider who is saying what—and, at the same time, consider the political faith of those making the statements.

One can expect that Republicans, on the whole, will generally stand behind the program while Democratic politicians will, as a matter of course, choose to be critical. One would hope that what is good for the nation and its people would be the first consideration, regardless of party affiliation or political ambition. — T. P.

Funeral services were yesterday in Carlsbad for Brack Sloan, 80, former longtime Lincoln county rancher, county official who died Monday at the Land-Sun Home in the Eddy county city.

Rites were conducted at the Denton Funeral Home chapel in Carlsbad.

Sloan, a native of Beehouse, Tex., where he was born April 23, 1891, ranched near Claunch prior to his retirement. He served as a Lincoln county commissioner during the 1920's, was a member of the Methodist Church and of the Masonic lodge in Carrizozo.

He was married March 11, 1917 in Corona, and his wife, Mrs. Edith Sloan, also a resident of the Land-Sun Home, survives.

Other survivors, besides the wife and the son, Mark of Alamo-

gordo, include three daughters, the Misses Helen and Joyce Sloan of San Francisco, Calif., and Mrs. James Callahan of Albuquerque; a sister, Mrs. George Simpson, of Albuquerque; five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The family requested that in lieu of flowers, donations to the Land-Sun Home be made in Sloan's memory.

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





A program aimed at benefiting Carrizozo and Lincoln County will start Monday, Aug. 23, in Carrizozo, Louis R. Bachicha, head of the New Mexico Employment Security Commission, announced.

The program is being sponsored by the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and will be carried out by the smaller communities team of the State Employment Service over the next couple of months.

Louis Lopez, team manager, said services offered would include recruitment for existing and developing job openings, job application taking, vocation testing and counseling, referral to employment services such as reference to vocational schools, job development and compiling of labor market and Related Resource information.

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
