## Wild weather hits the county

Dear Paul:  
Friday evening I was down in the Sacatone field a mile south of the house, checking the coits and keeping one eye on a long, low, grey cigar-shaped cloud moving swiftly in from the northeast out across the valley to the west, parallel to the ground.  
Suddenly a small dust devil swirled up toward the point of the "cigar" and within minutes grew into a great pinky-red, swirling dust storm with the unmistakable blue-black rope of a Twister in its center.

All along the length of the grey "cigar" cloud (which stretched from west of Coyote north out of sight beyond the old Ham place) seven or eight red dust devils swirled up to meet it, whereupon it seemed to explode with clouds whirling every direction, exactly like one of those speeded up T. V. films of storm build-ups.

Very spectacular and about then, I high tailed it for the house, wishing for a color camera.

By the time I'd reached the top of our hill, the whole length west of highway 54 was a solid wall of red dust, rolling toward the ranch.

I drove over the hill to tell the men to "better down the hatches, we're in for a blow" and made it back up in time to see the funnel cross near Coyote in our S. W. pasture, before wind and dust hit like a wall of bricks.

The north windows nearly folded and everything crashed and banged against the house. I closed the inside doors on the north side and opened the front and back doors on the south in case there was more than one twister. As a child, I lived in tornado country and that's what you were supposed to do to keep from having a vacuum explosion or something.

The 20 foot windmill groaned and billowed but held. My poor old rose trellis came loose in the middle and waved like a flag. The heavy metal porch furniture began "walking" (which over the years we've figured it takes about 80 MPH to shift), and this was on the down wind, protected side! The wind changed back and forth from west to north to northeast without a break. From Lone Mountain direction came a tremendous thunder clap (no lightning that I could see) which may or may not have been the twister breaking up.

Oh! The local crashes later turned out to be (besides branches and flying objects of all kinds) half an elm tree that whacked the house, a full heavy oil trash barrel which tipped crazily up hill into the second barrel, but didn't spill, all of Barham's rain-gutter, a telephone pole, a cedar tree, some chaise lounge cushions found hanging on a fence along with a perfectly strange brand new window screen that doesn't belong to this ranch! Callachers are you missing anything beside your barn roof? Of course everyone knows we don't have tornados in this part of the country, but we really haven't had a chance to see if anything else dropped in - or out - in that gentle Lincoln County Breeze.

Jody Ventura and David Lee continued to show well while taking over for Rusty Leslie and Chris Monrreal. Both Leslie and Monrreal will see action in Colonia Juarez as well as Willie Gallegos. Gerald Wells also did an excellent job for the Grizzlies both on offense and defense.



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

# EDITOR'S CORNER

## A seat on the sidelines -

Pretty nice there, Coffee, pop, peanuts are handy, folks to visit with, band to listen to, and lots of athletes on the field to cheer for. Hell or high water would not keep people away from watching their favorite team.

Must be a lot of people got the habit of sitting on the sidelines when they were young enough to compete, which is no matter because they're too old for the "hitting" on the field this week.

Trouble with these small towns we love and have always lived in -- there is a lot of action going on in town with about ninety per cent of the town's residents sitting on the sidelines. Like as not they're jeering instead of cheering. Rather poor sportsmanship, that.

What are you doing about what's wrong with your community? You, Not the fellow next to you, You.

You know about all the problems because they're common talk around town. Undoubtedly you also know a lot of the answers because they are also common talk even though such answers rarely solve the problem.

The dying small town is sure to be full of sideline sitters who

have jeered all their life without ever making a move to get involved.

Getting involved can be tough on business, a strain on friendships, take time away from TV, and real rough on the patience. It's also the only way out for a struggling town. We mean one that is struggling to keep enough services around to make up a town--things like a school, a dentist, a watch repair guy, your church, a lawyer, a horse doctor . . . the sort of thing we all drive 50 or a 100 miles for now.

A team that is "going all the way to state championship" has to recognize its weak spots back at the beginning and plug them best as possible. A town that is going to start moving up a bit toward being a full-service town has got to recognize its weak spots -- hard to do for life-long residents, who sure don't want any advice from newcomers -- and then a lot more than ten percent of local residents have to get involved.

Really, it's more fun on the field with the winners -- than sitting on the sidelines.

Animals have a lot bigger place in "growing up" than city folks know because times have changed. The big deal on Halloween (getting close, too) was to put a cow, goat or horse in the principal's office. Yet a bigger deal was to take a frog to school, slyly put him on the floor to hop, hopefully, towards the teacher. Got whipped on the ankle with a ruler once for such goings on.

Mules are something else. Even with a hame or two-by-four to get their attention you don't always come out well. What they don't want to understand -- they just don't. They'll work a good day but in between times a few

wagons and sets of harness get torn up.

Nobody around should be calling Tularosa, Clouderoff, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona or Estancia "one-horse" towns. Most of these towns will have around fifty head of horses quartered inside the village limits, and a lot more just outside.

Horses are fine but dogs have one better trait--they'll keep your feet warm on a cold winter night and horses are hard to get in bed.

Advice for this day--don't step on a worm or a bug, you're probably stepping on somebody's mother.



## '71 Credit Act approval urged

Wichita, Kansas, September 15, 1971 -- "The future of over one million American farmers is in the hands of the House Agriculture Committee, which is about to meet on the Farm Credit Act of '71."

William D. Lakey, Sayre, Oklahoma, chairman of the Wichita Farm Credit Board made this statement during the Board's regular monthly meeting here.

With the public hearings over, the Committee is rewriting the bill passed unanimously in July by the Senate where it was cosponsored by Senators James B. Pearson, Kansas; Henry Bellmon and Fred R. Harris, Oklahoma; Gordon Allott, Colorado; and Joseph N. Montoya, New Mexico. Speaking for the Board, Lakey called the Farm Credit Act "the most important piece of farm legislation before the Congress this year."

Lakey said experts predict agricultural credit requirements in this four-state district in 1980 will be two times the '70 figure.

"We must be ready. And that is what the bill in the House Committee is all about. The Farm Credit System must be given the authority and the tools to meet its share of the soaring credit needs of modern agriculture. Without approval by Congress, we will be unable to do the job as efficiently and as well as we have over the past half-century," Lakey said.

He cited the following key points as "the six most essential proposals in the bill":

--Removal of the 65 percent requirement which today is a restriction on established farmers and a barrier for young farmers seeking to buy farmland.

--Loans for non-farm rural housing in open-country areas to help combat two-thirds of the nation's substandard housing, without costing the taxpayer a cent.

--Loans for farm-related businesses which perform on-the-farm services. This provision would enable farmers to have the use of expensive and complex farm machinery and equipment without having to tie up their scarce capital for its purchase.

--Authority to provide financially related services, desperately needed by many family farmers who are doing their financial planning with horse and buggy tools.

--Updating of cooperative lending authority, particularly shifting to a much more realistic eligibility of 66 2/3 percent vs. the outdated 90 percent existing today. The bill would allow Farm Credit loans to cooperatives which have a minimum membership of two-thirds of farmers.

## Lining up buyers for Fair auction

Albuquerque - Officials of the Junior Livestock Sale for the 1971 New Mexico State Fair are currently lining up buyers for the annual auction sale of the top blue-ribbon winners from this year's event.

Frank Gray is chairman of the committee working out details for the Greater Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce, which annually sponsors the sale.

Each year, the top 36 calves, 36 barrows and 36 lambs from the junior livestock departments are sold on the auction block. Last year's sale brought in \$50,062.10 to the junior exhibitors, but it was not a record. Best year for the sale was in 1969, when \$58,481.25 was spent for the 108 animals.

This year's sale will be held in the fair's Junior Livestock Arena on Saturday morning, September 25, starting at 9 a.m. Buyers are provided free tickets to the horse races that afternoon. Gray analyzed the results of the sales from the past three years, and they show that a total of \$159,583.65 was spent in the three year period.

The figures show that Bernalillo County residents spent \$106,824.45 for some 247 animals in that time. Second were Lea County residents who spent more than \$28,000 in the three-year period. Third was El Paso County, Texas, citizens who put down \$10,979 for some 28 animals over the past three years.

## Round-Up

So you want to be a 4-H'er? At least you are wanting to know more about what this "Head, Heart, Hand, and Health" program offers for a gal or guy like yourself.

Perhaps you have read in the papers or heard on radio and TV about exciting 4-H trips and events, how 8-to-19 year-olds "learn by doing" such skills as sewing and food preparation, gardening, and operation and care of a bicycle or auto.

If you know some 4-H'ers visit them. Ask them to tell you about their projects, the meetings they attend, and highlights of camps and fairs. Maybe your parents know some 4-H leaders.

Visit your county extension office and meet your extension agent. They can tell you about the community 4-H clubs and special interest groups in the county. They'll give you booklets explaining projects and the overall 4-H program.

As you become interested and learn more about 4-H, share this enthusiasm with your friends. Maybe you can all join a 4-H club or form the nucleus of a new club or special interest group. Parents are important in the success of any 4-H'er, so share your interest with them. Keep them in the know on what you would like to do.

## News & Notes

Freezing poor quality or less than fresh foods just because they'd go to waste otherwise is the wrong approach toward freezing. Only good quality foods should be frozen because food doesn't improve in quality with freezing.

With sweet corn, for instance, and all vegetables, a quick hike from the garden to the freezer is recommended. A delay of more than a few hours from picking to processing with corn is apt to result in significant loss of quality if it is refrigerated.

It is still necessary to scald corn properly before freezing or it may have a taste like hay, or the cob, or be mushy. Corn should be husked, all silks removed, and ends trimmed. In a very large kettle (allowing one quart of boiling water for each ear of sweet corn) medium size ears should be scalded eight minutes and larger ears 11 minutes. Corn should be scalded in a covered kettle. The same

boiling water can be added to for new batches of corn. When the water begins to look murky, it's time to change it.

From the scalding water, plunge corn immediately into cold water; this generally means water with ice cubes in it unless the water supply is very cold well water. Ears must be submerged in the ice water to cool the cob thoroughly. Cooling takes twice as long as scalding—usually 16 to 20 minutes.

Don't process too much corn at once and be sure before starting that adequate cooling space is available.





 noon. A small twister hit the Robert Shaffer ranch home about four o'clock in the afternoon Friday blowing out windows on the west side of the house, taking some shingles off the roof, and lifting the clothes line poles right out of the ground. It also broke a large apricot tree in the yard. The same cloud hit down on the Pat Dunning Ranch taking some eave trough off of the house and doing other damage. Saturday the wind blew strong from the east and Carrizozo received forty-four hundreds of an inch of rain. Sunday things began to settle down. However the temperature fell to 33 Sunday night and several people reported frost, with some damage to late gardens. Corona had snow and it came as far south as the El Paso Gas Station. Looks like winter is on the way.

**Two Survive Plane Crash**  
 An aircraft carrying four people on flight from Albuquerque to Roswell was reported missing about 10:15 a.m. Saturday and was located 24 hours later by a Civil Air Patrol search plane which directed Rancher Chalk Norton and Bruce Hunter to the craft. They found Gary and July Bensing huddled beneath a torn-off wing. Lying near the couple was the plane's pilot, James Smith, 35, of San Mateo, Calif.

Smith's brother Doyle, 23, of Farmington was found beneath the wreckage along the 5200-foot ridge in the Capitan Mountain foothills.  
 The Bensings were taken to Ruidoso Hospital and reported in satisfactory condition Sunday. Mrs. Bensing had broken left leg.  
 Bensing said the pilot apparently had lived two to three hours following the crash. His brother apparently died immediately.  
 The plane was found where it smashed into a thicket of stunted cedar about 50 miles east of New Mexico 48 on a cold drizzly and foggy day. Sheriff Ernest Sanchez posted a guard at the site until FAA officials arrived.


