Grizzlies wallow the Buffaloes in 30-6 score for regional title

A lot of football teams have tried and most of them have found it hard to get any wool off the Carrizozo Grizzly Bears. The game for the state championship, Carrizozo's third in a row, will be played in the Wool Bowl at Roswell with Hagerman (about 20 miles south of Roswell) as the opponent.

This state championship game looked to be in the making several weeks back but things do happen and the two opponents were not a chinch until Carrizozo beat Melrose 30-6 on Laabs field and Hagerman won over Navajo Mission in a game played at Farmington last Friday.

QB Gary Herrell opened the game for the bobcats with a four yard run and Joe Flores kicked the extra point to put Hagerman ahead. Flores scored a 29-yard field goal in the second quarter but Navajo Mission scored three TDs in the first half for a 20-10 lead.

In the second half Melvin Banister scored on a 27-yard run, extra points by Flores. Mission scored its last TD also in the 3rd and the score was 26-17.

Harrel threw a strike good for six to Ernie Garcia going 15 yards, again Flores did his stuff, score 26-24 Navajo leading. Then Harrel threw a 24-yard touch-down pass to Sam Dunnahoo, the Bobcats kicked again and the Bobcats went ahead 31-26.

Herrell completed 16 of 25 passes and the Bobcats ran up a total of 356 yards during the game. No doubt at all but that the Hagerman Bobcats are the most capable team the Grizzlies have faced since the season opener with Ruidoso. The Grizzlies have demonstrated their scoring ability a number of times and in this game, on a neutral field 20 miles from home for the Bobcats, they're going up against a team that can score on the ground or in the air.

It ought to be a real battle, starting at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, between two teams wanting to be state champions.

Words from Coach St. Louis: "The Melrose team was just as fine a coached team as we've played all year. They showed a smooth powerful running attack and a stout defense. Their players showed lots of courage and had no fear of contact. They played their hearts out to the very end."

Coach St. Louis said that a Hagerman scout told him Friday, "We'll beat you by 50 points if you can't beat Melrose more than that." The answer to that comment will be worked out Saturday in the Wool Bowl at Roswell when Carrizozo plays Hagerman for the state championship.




Flagman At Glencoe Job

Jack Harkey outfits trail town

When the James P. Paul Enterprises set out to construct an authentic 1880 Trail Town to be known as Rawhide, Arizona in the Scottsdale area, they employed Jack Harkey of Carrizozo to outfit the complete town.

The job was started early in 1970 and completed in time for the opening November 5.
Mr. Harkey's work took him into several states looking for materials, antiques and equipment. He got the old Tex Richard bar, a very ornately carved wooden bar out of Goldfield, Nevada. From the Cascade Grocery in Silverton, Colorado he got many mining town antiques of the 1880s.
Quite a few interesting objects came from a very old store in Tierra Amarilla, N. M. Jack found a postoffice back in east

Texas where the Dalton Gang had received letters and packages and he acquired a letter authenticating this fact. The postoffice boxes, windows, writing desk and other objects were moved to Rawhide where they were set up for mail business.
Jack worked eight months of 1970 and much of this year outfitting all of the buildings for the trail town which will be a year-around tourist attraction. Plans are to increase the size of the town periodically and it will probably be used for filming of certain television series in the future.
One of the most interesting antiques Jack found was a stained and cut glass dome, approximately six feet in diameter, which was made in the 1880s and shipped to the Tex

Rickard Saloon in Goldfield, Nevada from Czechoslovakia. The original cost in the 1880s was in excess of \$10,000.
Another interesting item is a quaking aspen stump found in the high Colorado mountain country with Kit Carson's initials carved on it and dated 1884. Pictures were taken of the tree in place and information gathered to authentic the item.
Something antique lovers will enjoy viewing is a small table and love seat made entirely from buffalo horns all with ornate carving. These pieces were made for Belle Starr, a famous character of frontier days, all on display in the Rawhide Museum.
Jack bought a total of 18 semi-trailer loads of antiques in the course of his work outfitting an entire frontier town.

"18th Century Furniture" is speech topic

Members of Xi Beta Epsilon chapter of Beta Sigma Phi met Monday, November 1, 1971, in the home of Mrs. Rogene Alford with Miss Sherrill Perkins as speaker.
