Willie Gallegos made the shift from top state scorer in New Mexico football to handling a basketball and also helped by chipping in 5 points. Shawn Lock, Michael Barla and Kuco Chavez saw limited action but also got in the score column with 3, 2, and 2 points respectively. Matt Ellison demonstrated that he could jump with the tall ones as he hauled down 16 rebounds and did an outstanding job in the backcourt with Gallegos and Lee. Gaby Chavez, starting in his first varsity game, show a lot of poise and really helped with his scoring and vital rebounding. The win pleased Head Coach Lee as the Grizzlies defeated the team that was ranked third in the 3A district while the Griz are rated as a darkhorse in the 5A district. WHILE SEARCHERS ROAM THE MOUNTAINS

Hyden figures he wasn't lost

A large number of Lincoln County officers and citizens got enough exercise to hold them through the holidays while two men presumed lost were safe and sound in the sack.

State Policemen Andy Renevidez, Bill Mascarenas, Sheriff Ernest Sanchez and Deputy Leandro Vega, Jr., John Langendorf, Henry Vega, Bud Crenshaw, Truman Spencer, Jr., Preacher Dobbs, Chuck Wetzell, Randy Kirkpatrick, Obie Simmons now know what Water Canyon and Carrizo Mountain look like in December - from both sides of the mountain.

The snafu started when Truman Hyden, age 42, and son Zelmer age 19 of Roswell were hunting in the Water Canyon area and the senior Hyden became ill. They were on the north side of Carrizo Mountain. Randy

Kirkpatrick had got his deer and met up with the Hydens about this time.

Randy pointed the way to White Oaks for Hyden and son, not expecting them to make the trip, and then he took off over the mountain for Carrizozo to get help. The men named above responded in due time and became a search party when the Hydens couldn't be located.

The searchers first went to the Leroy Acker home up Water Canyon above White Oaks. From there they started southwest on search trip. They got to where the Hydens had been but could not locate them, and then decided to go around south part of the Mountain to where the hunters had originally camped.

Once the searchers got to the camp site, and no one there, the decision was made to go over

Carrizo Mountain from the south and come down on the north side, which they did, arriving back at the Acker place around 11:00 a.m. Sunday.

Meanwhile another search party including Henry, Andy, Ernie, Bill, Bud, Truman, Preacher, Chuck and Obie had set out to intersect Randy and John who had started at 4:00 a.m. from the south side.

Shortly after 11:00 word was received from Carrizozo that the lost people were at the home of George Spires in White Oaks. They had walked from the point where they left Randy Kirkpatrick to the Spires home, were warm and safe and at no time had they thought they were lost or that a dozen people might be spending the night searching for them.

Mayfield Coach Blasts All-State Selections

Reprinted from Albuquerque Journal. Las Cruces - Jim Bradley, coach of the state champion Mayfield Trojans, blasted the selection process and the results of the 1971 Associated Press Class AAAA all-state team. Bradley told the Journal, "I am unhappy to say the least. First of all, the ballots had to be in by Nov. 16, which was before the playoff games. Secondly, the team itself didn't make sense. One of the defensive backs, Jim Ferguson of Artesia, didn't even play defense this year. If he did, it's news to me. We have eight game films of Artesia, and he played offense. The Mayfield mentor continued, "It looks like L. G. (Henderson, Artesia coach) just recommended him and he made it. "It seems to me," Bradley said, "that when you win the state championship your players should get some kind of recommendation." Mayfield placed only one player on the team, split end Rudy Padilla. "There is no finer quarterback in this state than Bill Hamilton, and I feel that both he and fullback Don Booth are tremendously deserving."

It was Hamilton's pinpoint passing that carried the Trojans to a narrow victory over West Mesa for the state championship. Neither made the All-State first team, although both were honorable mention selections. Bradley said he also thought Trojan defensive backs Steve Blue and Wilbur Harin deserved all-state recognition. Bradley said, "Every year I send out recommendations to other coaches about players on our team who might be worthy of all-state consideration. They send recommendations to me. It helps us all to find out about players we might not have had a chance to see. I sent out my recommendations as usual this year, but I didn't get a single one in return. "I don't know if they got together on the east side and block-voted or what, but I do know they sure got the votes." He continued, "We played Hobbs, and I saw films of Carlsbad, and they had some pretty good people. I voted for them. I presume they did no voting for us at all." Bradley concluded, "I just hope the UPI selections coming up will be a truer indication of the state's best football players."

Christmas trees can be the "highlight" of your Holiday decorating. They can also be the "headache" of the season. Freshness of the tree is what makes the difference. Tree quality is not easy to judge, but here are a few pointers: Needles should be resilient, and should adhere to branches when handled. If only a few needles drop when the tree is shaken or bounced lightly, the product is fresh. The tree should have a strong fragrance and display the best qualities of its species, especially color.

If you want to know more about selecting a tree, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has a booklet entitled "How to Buy a Christmas Tree," G-157, write: Office of Information, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington D.C. 20250.

There is a wide selection of foods on the "Plentiful" list for December. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service recommends that you shop for these foods: Broil-Fryers, potatoes, apples, fresh pears, rice, eggs and split peas. They will be good buys during December.

EDITORIAL

Christmas gift for county

Old Santa Claus is now packing up to make his annual trip, with gifts of various kinds for all the youngsters and a few of the oldsters. Right now is a dandy time for a lot of adults, particularly property owners in the county, to lay claim to a gift that could well be bigger and better than any in Santa's bag this year.

Lincoln County is being re-appraised, about the last county in the state to arrive at this point. Along with re-appraisal is coming jolts in two areas, 1) to the property owners whose property has not been on the tax rolls at any time, estimated at around 18 percent of the total, 2) a more equitable assessment of all properties which again is really jolting some property owners.

Out of all this re-appraisal is bound to come more tax money. Right now no taxes of consequence are being lowered, and much new tax money is being found.

Two other items of particular importance, 1) Lincoln County commissioners do not have the power to readjust our tax structure - this matter will be up to the legislature, 2) according to comment from all three commissioners, Lincoln County could use a little more operating money (\$80,000 more or less) but does not need a big lot.

Lincoln County property owners could well put at the top of their Christmas gift list, a request to the legislature that our county have the right to readjust property tax levies to an amount that supplies our need - and no more. Let's keep our county free of excessive tax burdens.

Such surplus funds as will be generated in the county can go two places - neither direction being back to the tax payers. 1) Schools could grab the money, and we think they are getting their share, around two-thirds of the total pie. 2) The surplus could revert to the state general fund.

Your Santa Claus messages should be directed two ways, to the commission so they can pass the message on to the right people, and to members of the legislature, so it can act like a good Santa Claus should.

We hope it is a happy Christmas for all people in Lincoln County.

Capitan Youth Found In Wreck

Stephen T. Pumphrey, 18, missing since Nov. 28 was found dead in the car he was driving after the wreckage was spotted Saturday from a Civil Air Patrol search plane seven miles east of Carrizozo on U.S. Highway 390.

The demolished late model station wagon he was driving was partially hidden beneath a highway bridge.

The New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology student left Socorro on Nov. 27 to visit his mother in Capitan. He was reported missing when he failed to arrive at the family home. Civil Air Patrol ground and air search parties entered the search early Saturday after other attempts to locate the youth during the week had proved fruitless. At 10 a.m. State Police Lt. J.E. Syling, flying as an observer in a plane piloted by John Oliver of Alamogordo, spotted what appeared to be a vehicle beneath a bridge over a dry creek bed on U.S. 390 east of Carrizozo. After circling the area briefly, ground parties were contacted and directed to the scene by radio.

The 1971 Toyota station wagon apparently went off the left shoulder of the road, went east and down a 21-foot embankment. Traveling a total of 303 feet - the last 78 in the air - it came to rest partially under the bridge, which obscured it from view.

Young Pumphrey apparently died instantly of internal injuries, according to State Police, who estimated the time of the accident at 2 a.m. Nov. 28. The body was taken to the Wooten-Clark Funeral Home in Carrizozo.

The CAP search mission was headed by Lt. Col. Charles Nichols. Eldon Peterson flew as an additional observer. The accident was investigated by Officer B. Mascarenas of the Carrizozo State Police office.





Inside the Capital

by FRED BUCKLES

The 1972 Legislature meeting Jan. 18 will receive a no-fault insurance bill, a proposal to hike truck taxes, a measure to centralize house-keeping duties of 24 state examining and licensing boards and a series of education bills. Drug abuse legislation will also be introduced.

Rep. Alvaro Castillo, D-Colfax County, is vice chairman of an interim committee that will consider a compromise modified no-fault insurance bill in Santa Fe Dec. 17-18. Under no-fault insurance most claims are paid promptly by the policyholder's insurer without negotiation or litigation. The New Mexico insurance industry says the proposed bill would cut auto insurance premiums 15 per cent.

Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, is chairman of the drug abuse committee shaping legislation after extensive hearings. Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, is vice chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee that will sponsor highly controversial truck tax increase proposals again. The LFC received bill drafts on the legislation last week with alternatives. A decision on the LFC's recommendation to the legislature will be made later this month.

Sen. John Morrow, D-Union-Colfax-Harding, is on the Examining and Licensing Committee that proposes to centralize administrative duties of many state examining and

licensing boards for public convenience and more efficiency. House Majority Leader David Salman, D-Union-Mora-Harding, is chairman of the Legislative School Study Committee. The LSSC proposals for the 1972 Legislature, Salman says, are these: a 9 percent increase in public school money; a boost in special education money for about 37,000 New Mexico children; allow \$25 to each school district for textbooks for each new student; a law to expedite a takeover of a malfunctioning school system by the State Education Department and State Public School Finance Chief Harry Wugalter. Salman said more vocational education money and equality among schools will also be sought from the legislature in the coming 90-day session.

The LFC received an encouraging state money report. It projects state general fund revenue this fiscal year at \$278,569 million, up \$10.1 million, over fiscal 1971. The fiscal 1973 revenue forecast is \$294,680 million, up \$16.1 million over the present fiscal year that will end next June 30.

Carrie Tingley hospital for Crippled Children at Truth or Consequences seeks legislative authority to build a \$200,000 education building - \$140,000 in a general fund appropriation and \$60,000, allocated but unused in the present fiscal year.

Administrator Charles J. Ederer told State Budget Chief Lloyd Frost: "The existing school facility is small, inadequate and non-functional,

consisting of four rooms totaling 3,940 gross square feet and approximately 2,900 square feet of usable teaching area." The present building accommodates 30-45 children.

Carrie Tingley Hospital's proposed fiscal 1973 operating budget totals \$1,116,376. Included is \$725,330 for salaries and \$125,500 for supplies and materials. The hospital would add two employees to its roster of 128 staff members - an associate surgeon and orthopedic resident with combined annual salaries of \$33,812. Ederer said the associate surgeon is needed because of major expansion of crippled children service clinics.

The State Board of Finance loaned \$5,000 to the Sierra-Catron-Socorro-Torrance Counties Judicial District and \$2,000 to the Valencia-Sandoval

Counties Judicial District to finance jury trials. Court Administrator John Carroody told the board funds are so scarce in the Sierra-Catron-Socorro-Torrance district for jury fees new District Judge Edmund Kase has canceled most jury trials until January. The legislature will be asked to vote money to repay the loans.
