Region I Tournament at Corona

A moment of truth comes each year in basketball. A team can win games all season long, like the Ruidoso Warriors with no losses in district play, and then comes tournament time when the marbles all ride on one game. Win your in, lose your out.

Corona Cardinal basketball team finished district play with one loss and a tie with Estancia for first place, they were seeded to the semi-finals in the District 3 tournament held at Mountainair.

There are ten schools in District 3, most of them bigger than Corona but not on the basketball court. The Cardinals really didn't have too much trouble beating Magdalena 71-48 and than Cuba 60-52 for the championship.

The Region I tournament starts at 7:00 p.m. Friday in Corona with Kirtland Central playing Cuba, followed by Corona vs. Rehobeth Mission. Consolation and championship games Saturday night. Both Friday night winners go to the state tournament in Albuquerque. The Saturday games decide the seeding in state playoffs.

For whatever it means, Rehobeth Mission lost to Kirtland 51-48 in the 8AA championship game. Cuba, second place winner in 3AA plays the 8AA champ.

A number of surprises were sprung at the District 5 tournament in Artesia. One of the big ones, a 14-year-old boy made the difference, name of Buddy Shotton, 6-foot-3-inch freshman, was almost unstoppable in two games both won by Jal. Buddy's team beat Ruidoso Warriors 93-92 in overtime, then the next night Jal beat Carrizozo 68-58.

Zozo played a real beautiful first half, ahead 5 to 8 points most of the way, forcing turnovers and hitting their share. In the second-half they were dead, Jal's platooning could have run them down some, Shotton had little defense on his shots under the bucket and it ceased to be a contest in the last five minutes.

There are nights when Carrizozo has beat Jal. Last Saturday was not one of them.

The Grizzlies go to Silver City to play in the Region III tournament. They can win, and must win Friday to make the state tournament. Carrizozo will be playing the District 4 champ, Reserve, a team that beat Weed 65-46, then beat Cliff 3 points, and downed Lordsburg 63-58 for the championship.

Reserve has a big strong squad, plays deliberate ball, and is deadly from the free throw line. Coach Gerald Lee says his team will have to be on the move, play their own game and take it to the tall Reserve bunch. Lordsburg had beaten Reserve twice before the tournament, T or C won over Reserve once.

The other game at Silver City is Lordsburg vs. Jal, both teams with same season record.

Other district winners are: 1AA, Cimarron, Clayton; Des Moines and Mora, all four going to the regionals, same for 2AA, 6AA and 7AA. In 2AA its Mesa Vista, McCurdy Mission, Pojoaque and St. Catherine's of Santa Fe.

In 6AA its Ft. Sumner, Texico, Elida and Tatum. In 7AA its Santa Rosa, Amistad, San Jon and Logan. In 8AA its Kirtland Central and Rehobeth Mission.

Clerk's office open Saturday

Lincoln County Clerk Alice King told the News that her office will be open until 4:00 p.m. Saturday, March 4, to allow people to change or indicate party affiliation.

The governor issues the primary election proclamation on Monday, March 6 and no change of or indication of party affiliation on existing registrations shall be made between the day of the governor issues this proclamation and the day after election day.

Saturday, March 4 is your last chance to indicate your party affiliation.

March 13 last day trains to stop, SP paycheck go from 2700 to 4

Effective March 13, 1972 at 12:01 all trains that formerly stopped and changed crews at Carrizozo will no longer do so. This information comes from labor organization addressed to union members.

Southern Pacific Co. has issued official information that effective at 6:00 a.m. March 13 the SP cafe will be closed and at the same time the railroad is relinquishing its lease of rooms at the Petty Motel. T. J. Carey has been operating the cafe in the Yucca building, Mr. and Mrs. Bud Payne operate the motel.

According to Agent Floyd Siegrist approximately 12 trains crews of 72 men have been changing over each day in Carrizozo.

The local SP station will remain open 24 hours a day to handle train orders and carload freight. In addition to Siegrist, Rick Coca, J. D. Siegrist, and J. Schumacher are employed at the depot a total of four men.

Some 40 to 45 electric and utility hookups will be abandoned by the train crews who have spent nights here.

There was a time when the railroad was by far the biggest business in the county. Siegrist said that in 1950 there were 2700 employees working in or out of Carrizozo and 2700 paychecks distributed each week - Floyd handled the checks, he is sure of the figure.

Seems impossible that there could have been that many jobs here no further back than 20 years ago. There were two water gangs, water service supervisor and his force, two extra gangs, round house force, coal shute operators, two signal gangs, two section gangs, road master and train masters office here with their clerks.

There was a signal supervisor, yard masters around the clock, the "Old Beany" (now Western Hotel) was open around the clock, 18 or more men on the machinist crew here, call boys around the clock, freight clerks, agent and first trick operator plus clerks, plus floating gangs that were in and out of Carrizozo at various times. Something like 1600 jobs were wiped out at one time several years ago.

The change in transportation has been too rapid for a lot of people to keep up with, and other changes in the local business world have followed right along. You can still see signs of filling stations on Railroad Avenue of empty buildings remain from a once flourishing area of town.

On the far side of the tracks is a brick roundhouse which was built to last and it has, long enough to become another "empty" in Carrizozo. Up above the tracks are numerous small shacks and trailers used by train crews which will probably remain for years as testimony that here was once a thriving railroad center.

March 13 is Monday - not the blackest Monday in history of Carrizozo but one that marks the rock-bottom of railroad business here.

OPENINGS FOR TWO COMMISSIONERS

At the Republican convention held in Carrizozo last week, seven people indicated that they will be candidates for county office.

Barbara Lovelace, now working in clerk's office, candidate for clerk; Julia Samora, now working in assessor's office, candidate for assessor; Leandro Vega, Jr., now deputy sheriff, candidate for sheriff; Leland Stone of Ruidoso, candidate for senate seat; and Proceso Salcido, a candidate for commissioner in District 1.

Austin Wooten of Carrizozo has told the News that he will be a candidate on the Democratic ticket for Probate Judge.

Walt Jones of Capitan, called Wednesday morning to say that he will be a candidate for county commissioner in District 1. Wall has been real active in Lincoln County but this is the first time he has campaigned for public office. He has been president of Farm Bureau for five years, is training sargent for the Mounted Patrol, is chairman of the White Oaks review board, and has helped with many other civic organizations. The Jones family of Walt, wife, and three children live on ranch north of Capitan.

Grizzlies 2nd in district play

The Carrizozo High Grizzlies ignored opening game jitters and went on to take the runner-up position in the district 5-AA tournament in Artesia.

In the opening game against Cloudfroft both teams seemed to feel the pressure of the tournament. Neither team being able to hit the basket with any consistency. Cloudfroft stayed in the game throughout the contest by keeping pressure on the stray shooting Grizzlies. The first quarter saw both teams tied at 7 all, while the half time margin was 17-12 in favor of the Grizzlies. Chance of the Bears kept his team in the game by making 11 of 13 free throws, and Cloudfroft, as a team, sank 20 or 25 charity tosses for 80 per cent. The Grizzlies could manage only 14 of 22 for 64 per cent.

David Lee (22) and Willie Gallegos (15) were top scorers for Carrizozo while Chance hit for 17 in a losing effort. The final score when the game ended was 50-42.

Friday Night
On the following night the Grizzlies were taking on last year's state champion, the Cardinals from Eunice. It was a hard fought game for both teams as each was seeking a bid to the regional tournament. The Grizzlies finished on top by a score of 54-51 led once again by David Lee and Willie Gallegos with 15 and 14 respectively. Jones and Baiser were tops for the Cardinals. The win enabled Carrizozo to meet Jal in the finals who had upset the state's third ranked team by a score of 93-92 in overtime.

Saturday Night
On Saturday night it was too much Shotton from Jal. The Panther freshman found shooting room and took advantage of it as he scored a total of 33 points in Jal's 68-58 upending of the Grizzlies. David Lee's 23 points along with Willie Gallegos' 12 points could not compensate for Shotton's effort.

Carrizozo did hold the lead until late in the third quarter. The Grizzlies held the edge 17-16, and 33-28 in the first half. In the second half the Panthers caught up to Carrizozo and slowly pulled away until the final buzzer.

The game showed pressure of a championship game as at one time the Panther's had six men on the floor without anyone noticing it until a few minutes had elapsed.

Carrizozo people invited to discuss industrial park

All All people of Carrizozo are invited to attend a meeting at 1:30 p.m. Friday, March 3, in the city hall for discussion of proposed Industrial Park.

This project will develop 30 acres of industrial land with the installation of water, gas, electricity, sewers and streets to complement an existing rail siding. The site selected is city-owned land in the area of the "Y" east of US 380 overpass.

Preliminary costs established by an engineering firm indicate the total project cost will be approximately \$100,000 with money coming from these sources: Economic Development Administration \$60,000, F.C.R.C. \$20,000, Town of Carrizozo \$20,000.

The Carrizozo Industrial Development Commission, working with community officials, has put great emphasis on industrial development and potential industries have been located. Sixty jobs would be created through a leather processing company and 40 to 50 jobs by a national candy company which is interested in the Carrizozo area. It is estimated that additional small industries would locate in the area once the park was completed and the "bird-in-hand" industry in operation.

Who cares!

You could have read Sunday - "Civic interest declines inversely with civic growth. In town of 3000 people, everybody knows what's going on, everybody's interested-what else is there to be interested in?-and nobody can get away with anything."

"In a town of 30,000, maybe 1500 people will follow local politics in the newspaper, maybe 300 go to town council meeting once in a while, less than that are going to really know what is going on."

"Multiply by ten again, and who cares? Leave schools alone, stay out of labor squabble, and you've got it made. Crooks can wrap up the town and put in their pocket, and nobody will notice it's gone. They're all too busy making more money than their neighbors, or at least trying to look like they are."

So, what happens in town of 2000, 1000 people. For sure, everybody knows what is going on and nobody gets away with much, at least not for long. But civic interest can decline just as fast with population decline as with growth. As towns like Zozo get smaller, young people leave home for greener pastures, business people grow older and have to scrap harder to make ends meet so they have neither time nor desire for civic growth.

We love the small town, particularly our small town, but somehow there has got to be a shift in thinking of people who prefer their town continually losing people, business places, and services - with the end result of no business like ours and numerous others being able to exist here - to the kind of thinking that our town must have some growth just to survive.

The number of business places that have closed up and people in business who are now gone reads like "The decline and fall of Small

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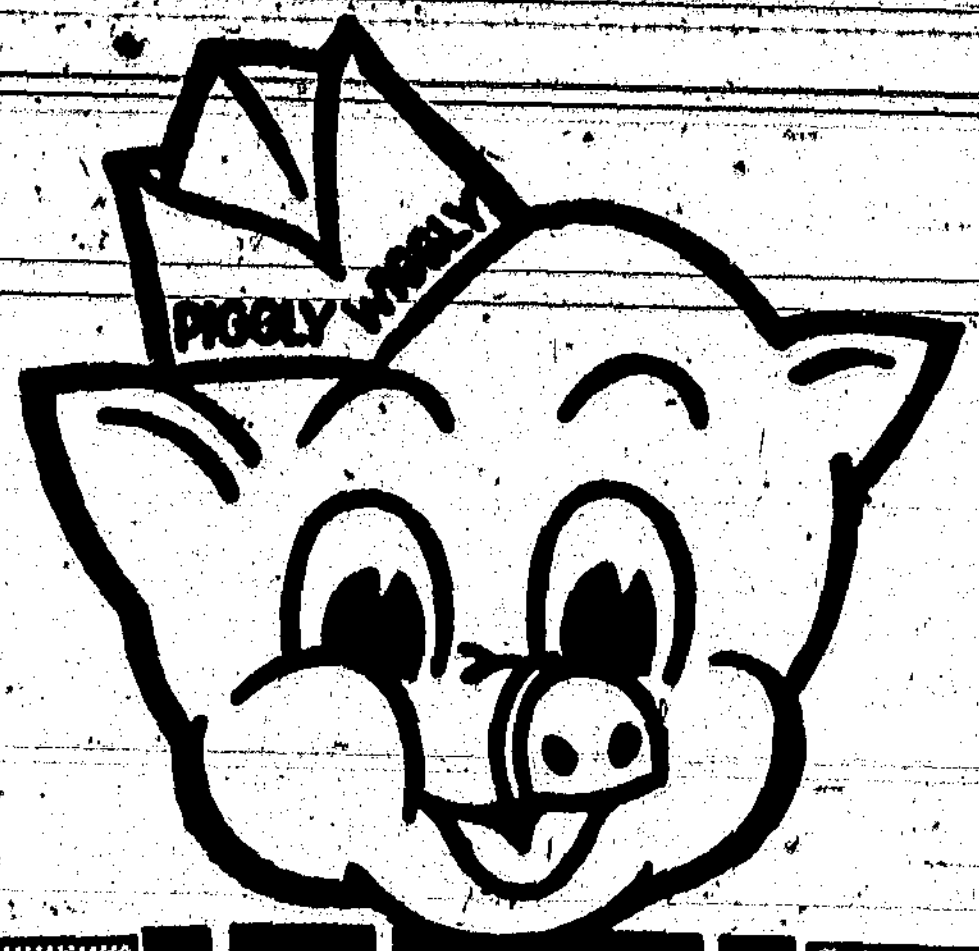

Massey is Lincoln County membership chairman

Sam Massey has been named chairman of Lincoln County membership committee, according to Mr. Jasper Koontz, Ft. Sumner, chairman of the State Membership Committee of New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association.

Reuben Pankey, President of the Association, recognizing the problems facing the livestock industry in New Mexico, formed this committee to gain support of the cattle industry, which is the number one contributor to the economy of New Mexico.

Koontz, a practical rancher, said, "I know as an individual, I can't fight the pressures that are facing the industry without the help of my neighbors. These problems involve legislation, taxation, predator control, land use, ecology, and many others."

Massey says, "You ranchers, who are not now members, can join the club and help the Cattle Growers fight these battles that you can't lick by yourself."

SENATOR JOHN CONWAY REPORTS FROM SANTA FE

The last day in the Senate was pretty hectic. The Control Substances Act, which had previously passed the Senate, was under consideration in the House. Representative George Fettinger of Alamogordo was successful in amending the act to bring the penalties for possession of marijuana to approximately the same level they are at this time. His amendment was virtually the same one that I had introduced in the Senate, which had failed by a 22-15 vote. If the House puts an amendment on a bill that has passed the Senate, then it must come back to the Senate for concurrence on the amendment. We then vote either to concur or not to concur with the amendment, and if we don't concur, a conference committee is appointed. This is where the hassle developed that you have all read about.

Senator Aubrey Dunn of Alamogordo made the motion that the Senate concur in the House amendment. Motion was made for a call of the House which requires all the Senators to be present to vote, and Senator Dunn did not relinquish the floor. In a few well-chosen words he explained exactly why he thought we should not reduce the penalty for possession of marijuana, and what the effects of this bill would be.

At this point in the debate, the chairman of the Drug Abuse Study Committee took offense at what was being said in the debate and announced he was resigning as chairman of the committee and from the committee. As the debate continued, a senator from Gallup delivered what

later turned out to be his resignation to the Chief Clerk and walked out of the Senate Chamber's. The debate was on the philosophical question of whether or not we were going to reduce the penalty on possession of marijuana. It did not strike me as one that these two gentlemen needed to lose their tempers about as no remarks of a personal nature were made; the discussion was simply on the philosophy of reducing the penalty for possession of marijuana. The upshot was that the Senate did not concur in the House amendment, and a conference committee was appointed.

Our area had three representatives out of six on the conference committee, Senator Dunn, Representative Fettinger and myself. The three of us realized that the bill was going to pass as it had already gone through both Houses at the reduced penalty, and I felt that our job was to try and maintain the penalty for possession of marijuana as close to what we have now as possible. The bill passed with the penalty for possession of under one ounce for the first offense, a fine of \$50 to \$100 and imprisonment for not more than 15 days. The second offense would be a fine of \$100 to \$1,000 and up to one year in jail. The bill originally called for a fine of \$25 to \$50 regardless of which offense. For possession of one to eight ounces of marijuana, a fine of \$100 to \$1,000 and imprisonment up to a year, whereas in the original bill this was a \$50 to \$100 fine and a seven-day jail sentence. Possession of more than eight ounces is a fourth-degree felony punishable by one to five years in jail; in the original bill it was a fine of \$100 to \$1,000 and 30 days to one year in jail. So as you

Lincoln County News, March 2, 1972, Page 7 can see, we were able to work out a compromise which increased the penalties substantially, yet they are still below the present penalties. The bill had a great number of good points which were overshadowed by the discussion on the marijuana penalties. A pusher comes under what is called the "trafficking" section, and the penalties here are good. Any adult who distributes marijuana to a minor is guilty of a third-degree felony which is two to ten years, and for a second offense is guilty of a second-degree felony. Trafficking in hard drugs on the first offense is a second-degree felony, which is ten to fifty years, and on a second or subsequent offense, is guilty of a first-degree felony, which is up to life imprisonment. I don't think any of us had any quarrel with this part of the bill. The Interim Committee on Drug Abuse Study was continued for another year, and I believe that it is doing very worthwhile work. None of us have all the answers for what I think is becoming our number one national problem, drugs, and I am sure that this committee can continue to help the Legislature in this area.

Thank you so very much for continuing to send my very favorite news paper after my subscription expired. The news from home has been very sad this winter. Our county has lost so many of the old timers and loved ones. Hopes for spring will bring good news. Thank You Again Nancy K. Mendlin Carlsie, Pa.

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

Cattle scabies inspection on

By Ralph Dunlap
Cattle scabies inspection has started in Lincoln County. Seven ranchers have been trained and are inspecting cattle in Lincoln County. They are Rand Perkins, Corona; Joe Reynolds, Lon; John Thomas, Lincoln; Zane Leslie, Capitan; Paul Jones, Glencoe; Jiggs Sidwell and Wayne Withers, both of Carrizozo. These men will be contacting the cattle owners in their area to inspect their cattle. They want to see the cattle in the pasture. Often the best way is to feed the cattle and they can be checked at the same time.

The cattle scab shows up generally along the top of the animal from the shoulders to the tail. The animal is nervous and always trying to lick the spot that is infected. They lose the hair and generally develop scabs in the infected area. The scab mite is very small and hard to see. It must be passed by actual contact but is still very contagious.

R-R-D
Green weeds are starting to show up in many areas. Annual peavine is often among these weeds. It can poison livestock if eaten in too large amounts. The first symptoms are lack of coordination, especially crossing of hind legs along with rapid breathing. It is preferred that the livestock be moved to another pasture but if not, increasing the supplemental feed, especially alfalfa hay, will often stop the livestock losses. The annual peavine grows close to the ground and has 11 to 17 leaflets. It has a legume or pea like flower. It can often be mistaken for filaree at a glance. The losses are more prevalent in soils with a caliche layer in the soil.

R-R-D
Interested in wildlands management? A one-day workshop on the subject is scheduled for March 7 at New Mexico State University. Conducting the workshop will be August L. "Gus" Horman, Bureau of Land Management, Berkeley, California, a well known authority on range ecology.

The workshop, sponsored by the New Mexico section and the NMSU chapter of the American Society of Range Management, is open to anyone interested in the development and preservation of wildlands.
