Bank notes air birthday

Silver medallions, commemorating the 25th anniversary of the Air Force, were presented to Holloman AFB officials Monday by Dan King, chairman of the board of Security Bank & Trust of Alamogordo.

Monday marked the actual silver anniversary date for the Air Force. On September 18, 1947, the Air Force became a separate military service.

Presented with proof medallions were Col. O. D. Cunningham, Jr., base commander, and Col. Earl M. Thompson, commander of the 6585th Test Group. Mrs. Wayne E. Whitlatch, wife of the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing commander, accepted a medallion on behalf of her husband, who presently is deployed with the wing at Takhli, Thailand.

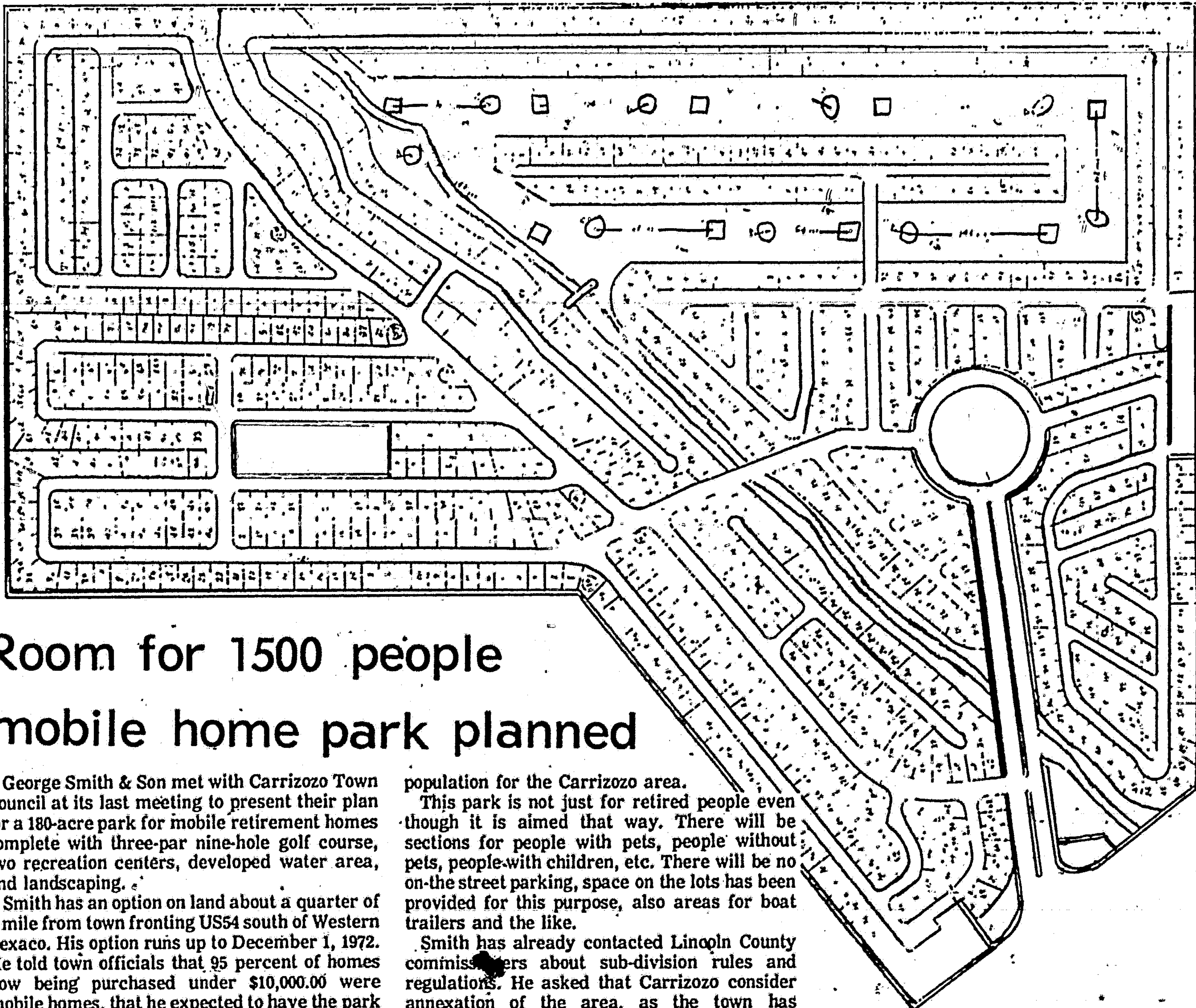
The medallions were produced by Southwest

Medallion Co. of Albuquerque which holds the national rights for production. Security Bank & Trust commissioned the company to produce the proof medallions for the base presentation.

Leo Comallie, president of Southwest Medallion, stated that an unlimited supply of bronze medallions and a limited edition of silver medallions will be minted for sale to interested collectors. Orders will be accepted at Security Bank & Trust for bronze medallions at \$1.00 each or silver medallions at \$10.00.

Nationwide advertising and distribution of the medallions are scheduled to begin soon, Comallie said.

One side of the medallion is engraved with the Air Force insignia. On the other side is the Air Force approved 25th anniversary symbol, with the inscription "Pride in the Past—Faith in the Future."



Room for 1500 people mobile home park planned

George Smith & Son met with Carrizozo Town Council at its last meeting to present their plan for a 180-acre park for mobile retirement homes complete with three-par nine-hole golf course, two recreation centers, developed water area, and landscaping.

Smith has an option on land about a quarter of a mile from town fronting US54 south of Western Texaco. His option runs up to December 1, 1972. He told town officials that 95 percent of homes now being purchased under \$10,000.00 were mobile homes, that he expected to have the park full in 12 years with an increase of 1500

population for the Carrizozo area.

This park is not just for retired people even though it is aimed that way. There will be sections for people with pets, people without pets, people with children, etc. There will be no on-the-street parking, space on the lots has been provided for this purpose, also areas for boat trailers and the like.

Smith has already contacted Lincoln County commissioners about sub-division rules and regulations. He asked that Carrizozo consider annexation of the area, as the town has jurisdiction some three miles out from city limits.

The project presented was a preliminary introduction of Smith's plan to sell lots, complete with trailer if needed. He will finance either or both lots and trailer. He told the council that he had been studying this area for six years and had come to the conclusion that this is a good geographic location.

John Clegg dies in California

Los Angeles—John F. Clegg, 27, son of former Carrizozo school superintendent J. T. Clegg and graduate of Carrizozo high school, died September 15, at UCLA Medical Center. He had been ill with Hodgkin's disease for the past two and a-half years.

He obtained a bachelor's degree in speech pathology from the University of New Mexico and a master's degree in audiology from Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois. While at Northwestern, Mr. Clegg was audiologist for the Chicago Hearing Society and for Cook County Hospital. He recently completed his doctorate in audiology at the University of Southern California.

In addition to his wife, Jean Stapleton, he is survived by his father, J. T. Clegg of Portales, a sister, Netta Page of Lancaster, Calif., and brother Naylor Clegg of Santa Barbara, Calif.

Funeral services were held at 7:30 p. m. September 19 Wilshire United Methodist Church, conducted by Rev. Carolyn Stapleton of St. John's Methodist Church, Corpus Christi, Texas.

Graveside services will be held at 4:00 p. m. September 21 (today) at Sunset Memorial Park in Albuquerque.

Junior Riding Club banquet Sept. 30

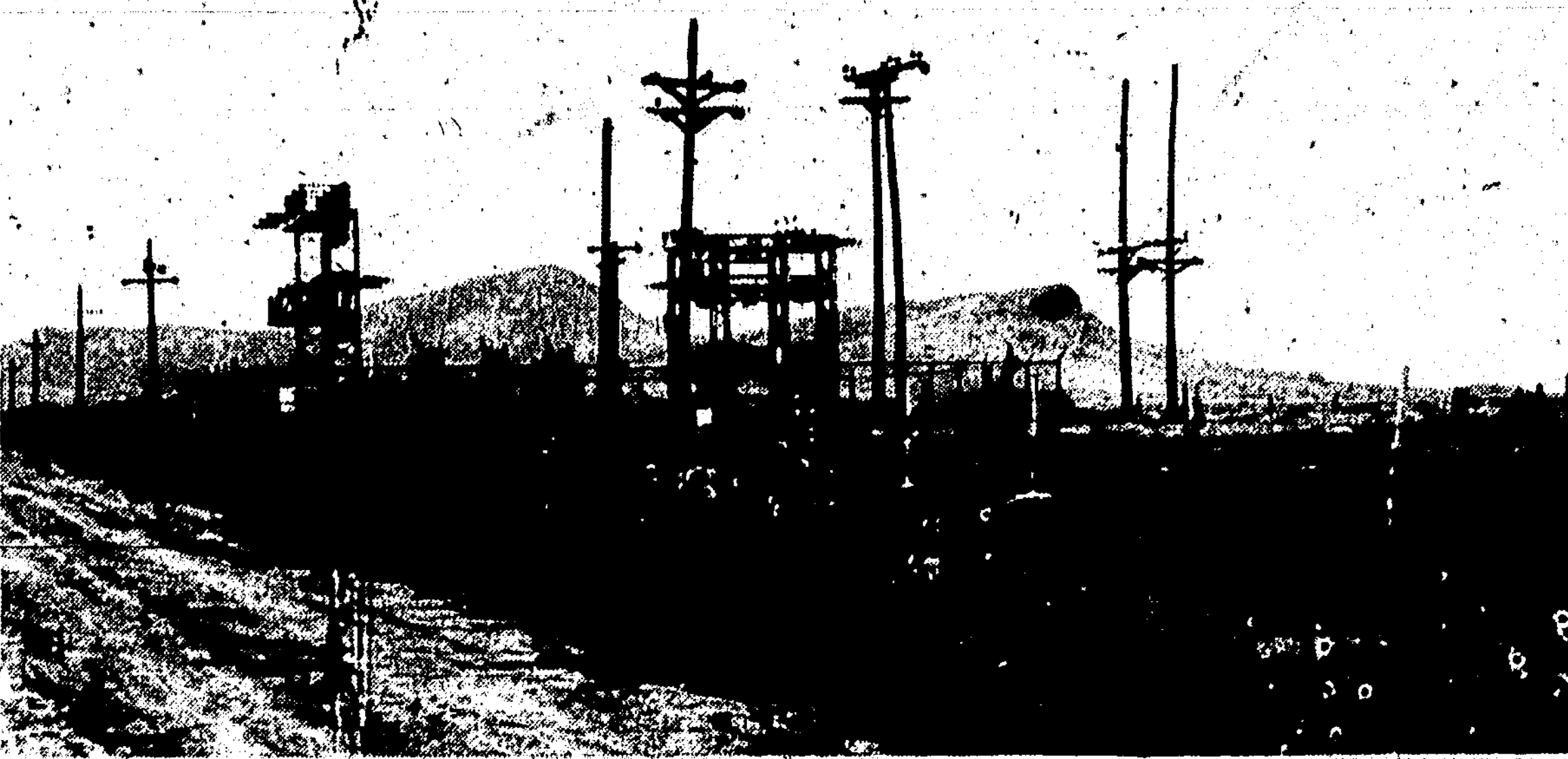

Zozo protesting 115,000 KW line

A proposed high voltage power line to link southern New Mexico with the electric generating station north of Albuquerque would cross right in the middle of prime real estate on three sides of Carrizozo.

As Carrizozo town officials understand the route it would cross the Spencer Bar W Ranch, the south part of Dunning's Mill Iron Laze, 3, cross US380 at the east end of the new golf course, cross right in the middle of 80 acres belonging to Cleo Duggar which she has offered to give the Town of Carrizozo as part of the new recreation facility, cross near the transformer

near Gary Lovelace and another transformer to be built in that area, then cross Stephenson's I Bar X Ranch a couple of miles near town, then stay on the I Bar X to the other side of Oscura.

Mayor Johnson Stearns said that from the standpoint of land planning, this power line ought to stay on the other side of US54, near the Malpais all the way south from Spencer Ranch.

The new Carrizozo recreation facility now under construction at cost of near \$400,000 would be severely blighted by this power line, as would any future housing development in that area. The north end of the Stephenson Ranch is one of the best possible locations for future housing near Carrizozo.

If you care to protest the location of this power line it would be best for you to write or call any one or all of New Mexico's elected officials, Montoya, Rumsfeld, Lujan or King.

Fumble wins for Grizzlies

Capitan threw a scare at the Grizzlies from Carrizozo Friday night in Capitan. It was certainly a battle of defenses as only one penetration was made during the whole game, that by Capitan when the Grizzlies fumbled inside their own 20 yd. line. The only score of the game came when Steve Ortiz got a hold of Tiger Quarterback Renfro while attempting to pass in the 3rd Quarter. Renfro fumbled the ball after being hit by Ortiz as Gaby Chavez picked up the loose ball and carried it 40 yds to the end zone.

In the first Quarter after receiving the opening kickoff, Gaby Chavez and Ray Pacheco tried in vain to mount a scoring drive. The Grizzlies could not overcome a rash of penalties and their drives faltered. Also in the first Quarter, Chavez found Barela behind the Tiger secondary by himself only to drop the ball.

In the second Quarter the Grizzlies still dominated play, but Tiger defender Ted Sisneros intercepted the first of his two interceptions and a Carrizozo had the ball halted. Four plays later Carrizozo deep behind Tiger defenders only to have Roper juggle and drop the ball. In the second Quarter Chavez tried to continue an air assault and had another one of his passes intercepted, this time by Renfro, as Chavez made a touchdown saving tackle. At the end of the second stanza had his 3rd pass interception and second by Sisneros.

The second half was completely dominated by the Tigers as the Grizzlies had the ball for only 15 offensive plays but managed 8 points during that time. After Capitan took the second half kick off and failed to move the ball, Carrizozo took over. The Grizzlies seemed to be headed for pay dirt when a Chavez to Ortiz hand off ended in a fumble and a Tiger recovery.

With Capitan having possession set the stage for Chavez' heroics and Oriz chipped in with 2 more points as he rushed for the point after. From then on the Grizzly defense was at its best and despite all the penalties managed to halt the Tiger offense and preserve the Carrizozo victory.

In the rushing department, Chavez was the leading performer with 80 yds on 15 tries not including his 40 yd TD run with the fumble. Pacheco had 41 yds in 10 attempts, Ortiz 42 yds in 8 attempts.

Robert Schlarb had an interception in the fourth Quarter to stop a Tiger drive. Chavez, Ortiz were also standouts defensively for the Grizzlies.

1972 tax rates listed

The Taxpayers Association of New Mexico has included 1972 tax rates for all taxing authorities in its September newsletter. The rates are expressed in dollars per thousand of assessed value.

These figures will be used to compute tax notices mailed in November in the State of New Mexico. Lincoln County Assessor Marian Schlarb said that re-appraisal valuations will not be used for any properties in the 1972 taxing. Much of the re-appraisal is complete and part of the figures could have been used but Mrs. Schlarb stated that would not be fair and the entire set of re-appraisal valuations will be put into use in 1973.

Special levies for both the state and counties are not included in the general listing but are added at the close of the report. The state levy, set this year at \$7.30 per thousand of assessed value, is computed into each total. The breakdowns are by school districts.

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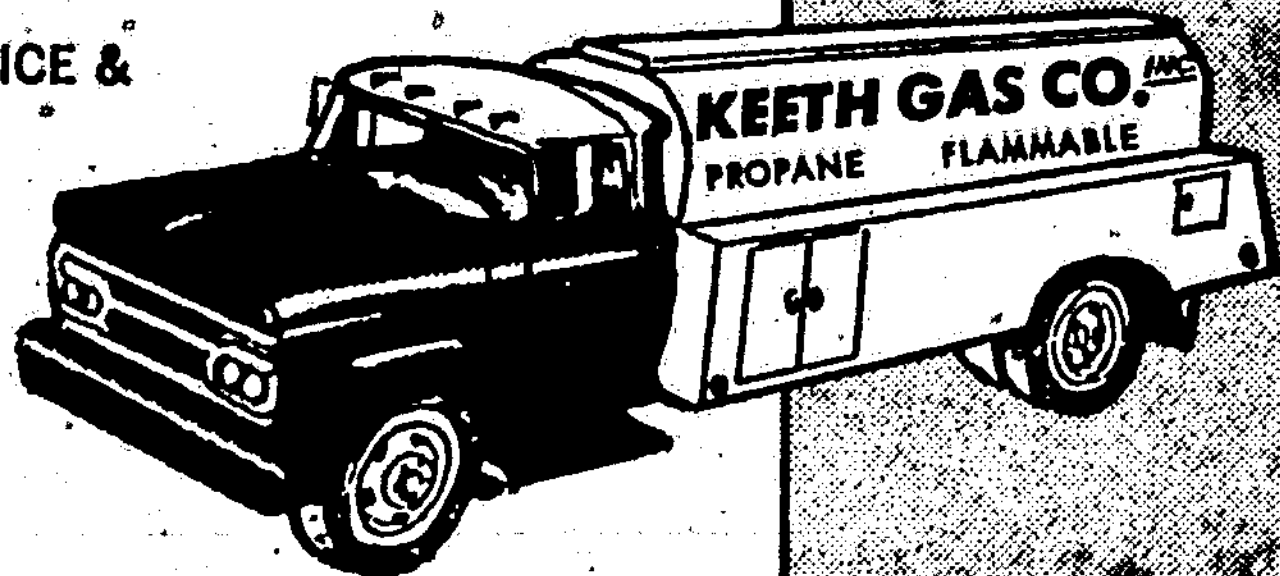
