

The 68th annual convention of NAPUS was held in Salt Lake City, Utah from Sept. 17th thru. 22nd.



He was first employed as a young man at Vidaurri's Store, later was cook at the "Beanery" on Railroad Avenue and operated his own cafe for a time. He worked at Pettys for ten years, and then for Food Mart when they bought the Petty grocery.

The place of business operated by Mr. Vigil for many years got its name from Johnson Stearns who sold the package store business to Lloyd, known as Johnnie's Bar & Package Store,

Lloyd ran for public office and was first elected as Lincoln County assessor in 1953. Heserved five terms.

In 1942 the Vigils were married in the old St. Rita Church in Carrizozo, Lloyd belonged to the church men's organization at the time the new church was built. He bought his home here in



Kline heads oratorical


