

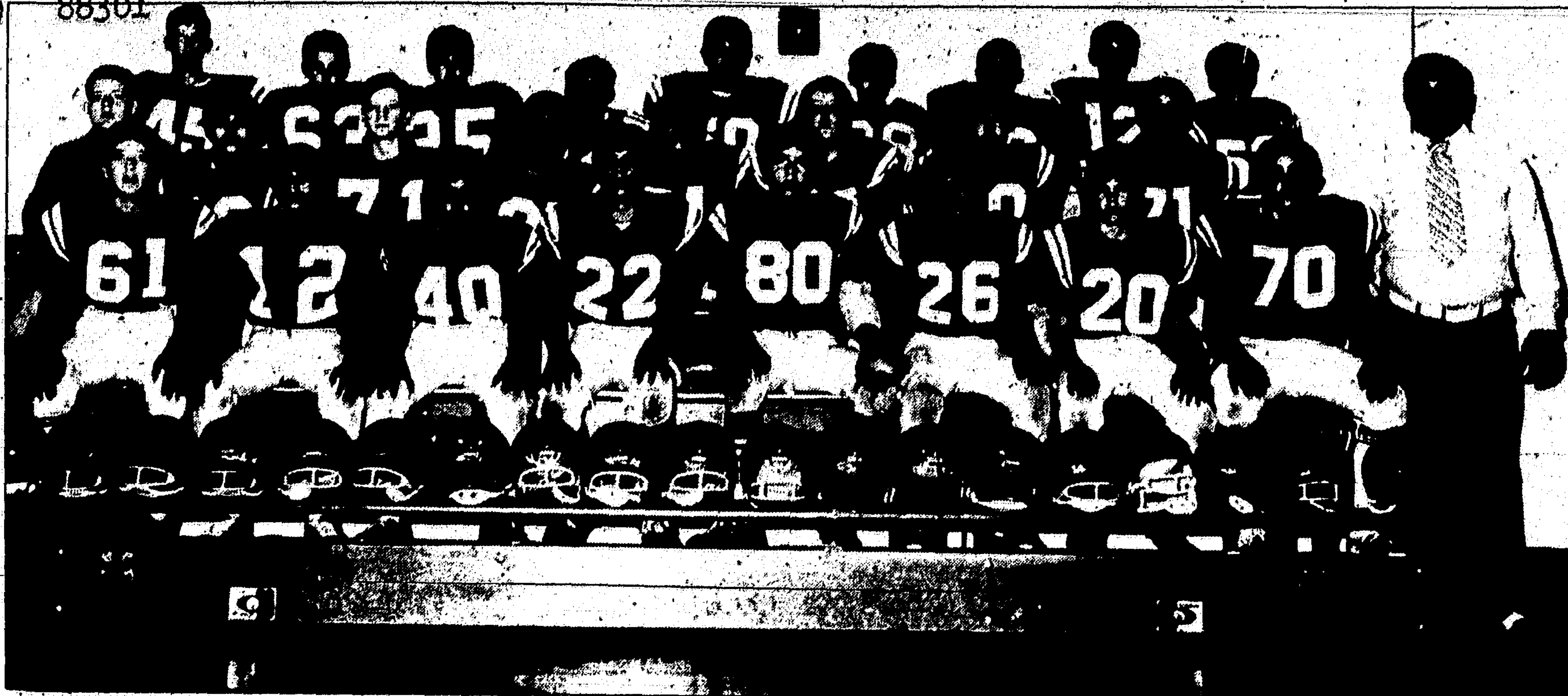

Grizzlies have big 1st half

The Carrizozo Grizzlies looked the sharpest they have been all year Friday night when they played the Lobos of Colonia Juarez of Mexico. Penalties still were a problem as the Grizzlies amassed 135 yds against themselves.

The game opened at a fast pace as the Lobos caught the Grizzly secondary off guard. Lobo Quarterback Matthew Judd faked once into the line then faded back and hit Armando Beall with a perfectly thrown pass that carried to the one yard line. Two plays later Armando Beall swept his left end for 6 points. The run for the extra point was no good.

Carrizozo came storming back and marched downfield as the Grizzly backfield alternated carries that carried to the six yard line. On the next play, saw a Grizzly fumble and Mike Barela alertly jumped on the ball for a Carrizozo touchdown. Pacheco ran the ball for a pair of extra points making the score 8-6 in favor of Carrizozo.

In the second Quarter, the Grizzlies got several breaks and capitalized on them to put the game out of reach.

Colonia Juarez caught deep inside their own 5 yd line tried a quick kick only to have it caught by David Roper who raced all the way to the 1 yard line from the Lobo 35. After a loss of 2 yards, Ray Pacheco took the pigskin into the end zone. The try for the point after was short.

The Lobos unable to move the ball gave up the ball to the Grizzlies. Gaby Chavez found David Roper alone and tossed a 40 yd touchdown pass. The run for the extra point was again short.

Lloyd Vigil born in Lincoln Life-long county resident dies

Funeral service was held in St. Rita Catholic Church for Lloyd Vigil, a life-long resident of Lincoln County. His father and mother were both born in Lincoln, as was Lloyd. He shared the same grandfather with recently deceased Fred Chavez, Capt. Boni Baco of early-day Lincoln County history.

He is survived by his wife, Mabel; three sons, Patrick of Albuquerque, Johnny of El Paso and Sammy of Las Cruces; five sisters, Mrs. Boni Marquez of Las Vegas, Cecilia Zamora of Van Nuys, Calif., Mrs. Frank Alcantar of Burbank, Mrs. Peter A. Sanchez of North Hollywood, and Mrs. Gus Montanez of Burbank, one brother Robert of Burbank; a nephew George Banos of Albuquerque, and five grandchildren.

Lloyd attended school at Alamogordo and St. Rita in Carrizozo. He was first employed as a young man at Vidaurri's Store, later was cook at the "Beaery" on Railroad Avenue and operated his own cafe for a time. He worked at Pettys for ten years, and then for Food Mart when they bought the Petty grocery.

The place of business operated by Mr. Vigil for many years got its name from Johnson Stearns who sold the package store business to Lloyd, known as Johnnie's Bar & Package Store.

Lloyd ran for public office and was first elected as Lincoln County assessor in 1953. He served five terms.

In 1942 the Vigils were married in the old St. Rita Church in Carrizozo. Lloyd belonged to the church men's organization at the time the new church was built. He bought his home here in 1943.

One of his loves was cooking, according to his family and those who know him he was always fixing things. There is a barbecue pit in his back yard today. Another of his family interests was the education of his children, and college for his three boys was part of this interest.

Fr. Clive Lyn officiated at services in St. Rita Catholic Church Tuesday at 10:30 for this pioneer and life long resident who died in Ruidoso hospital September 26 after weeks of illness.

HERO courses in Carrizozo

Pilot programs were initiated last year in two Home Economics Related Occupations courses (HERO) to determine the feasibility of offering such courses in the high school. Since both were highly successful in the pilot stage, they are now being held on a full-time basis. Both courses were developed by Emma Catherine Lawson, local home economics teacher.

Child Care and Guidance (HERO) is being taught by Willa E. Stone and is held from 8:30 to 10:30. Students are presently studying the developmental stages of children ages two through six, and the place of play in the intellectual growth of pre-schoolers. The class will be making and collecting play materials to be used in helping pre-schoolers learn and develop dexterity in many areas. Present plans indicate that the class will be able to invite about 15 to 18 pre-schoolers to attend their laboratory beginning about November 1. Five applications have already been received for admission to the pre-school laboratory. Mothers interested in entering a two-year-old, three-year-old, or four-year-old are asked to contact Mrs. Lawson for further information.

The other HERO course is Food Specialty which has 15 members enrolled, 9 boys and 6 girls. This class, taught by Mrs. Lawson, meets two periods daily and the students are learning bookkeeping methods to use in operating a business located in their own homes. Groups of three have organized a "business" which they will operate from the home economics kitchen. Beginning records for each of the five businesses have already been started. Students will soon start experimenting with various kinds of specialty food items to determine the ones on which they wish to work toward professionalism. When it is agreed they have developed sufficient skill, they will begin to fill orders for their specialty item from townspeople. Accurate bookkeeping records will be a part of their business operations. The purposes of the course are to prepare students to (a) conduct a small business from their homes, (b) for entry-level jobs in bakeries and similar food establishments, and (c) for entry-level work in bookkeeping operations where an experienced bookkeeper is an overseer.

Kline heads oratorical

State Commander Louis A. Santillanes of the American Legion, Department of New Mexico, has appointed Department Chaplain Alfred S. Kline of Capitan to be the Department oratorical representative to attend the national conference of oratorical representatives from the 50 states in Indianapolis this Friday and Saturday. These representatives have all expenses paid, incident to the round trip from their homes.

Kline is representing the 10,000 Legion members in our state. For three years he has headed participation by Legion Posts in District 5 oratorical contests. This includes the high schools of Carrizozo, Capitan, Ruidoso, Tularosa and Alamogordo. During these three years, all five posts have hosted a district contest or have entered a contestant to speak on some part of our U.S. Constitution.

Twice in the past District 5 has had a winner at state level. The other year this district appeared to be a strong second. State winners receive \$500. Most important value, according to Kline, is that the student body in all five schools heard the contestants at one time or another during the school year.

Fort Stanton to remodel

Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School near here will be recipient of approximately \$38,000 for remodeling and purchase of major equipment under a proposed capital outlay request approved Monday (September 18) by the board of directors of the Department of Hospitals and Institutions (DHI).

Hollis Cummins of Capitan is a member of the DHI Board.

Meeting at New Mexico State Hospital in Las Vegas, the board approved a total capital outlay request of \$529,000. The proposal had been prepared by the DHI staff at the direction of the board at its August meeting.

Fort Stanton's share of the capital-outlay funds, if approved by the legislature in January, would be used to remodel four buildings, to repair sidewalks, and purchase miscellaneous equipment for various departments within the facility.

In approving the requested funds, the DHI Board said it was its policy to replace equipment and to provide for upkeep of buildings on a long range planned basis.

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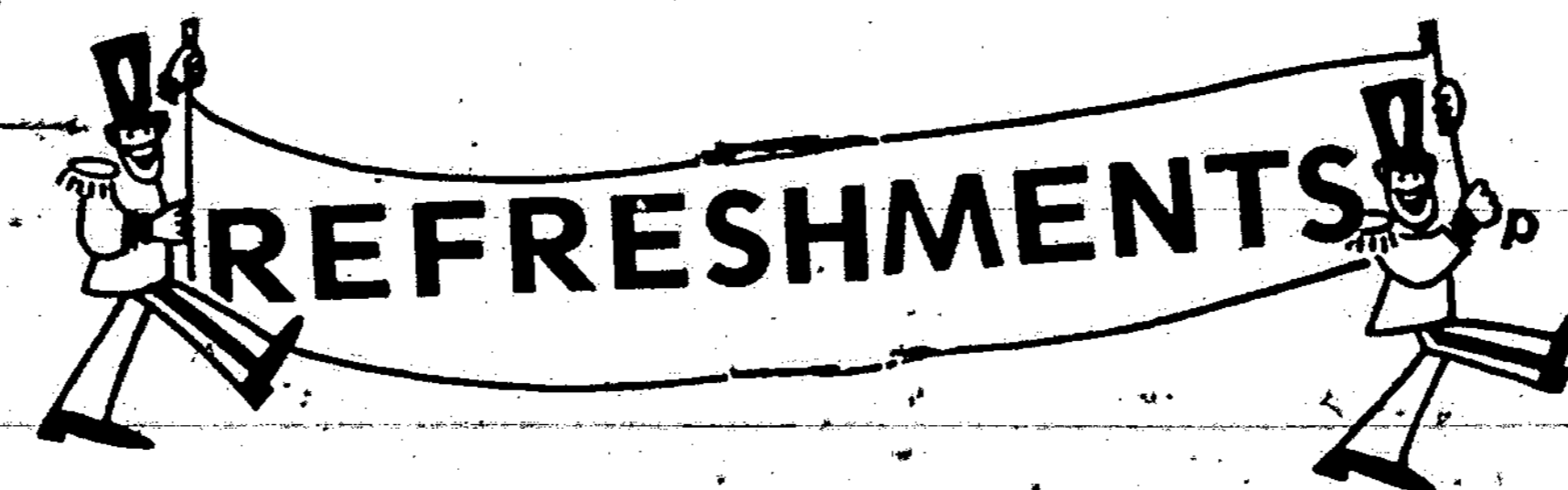
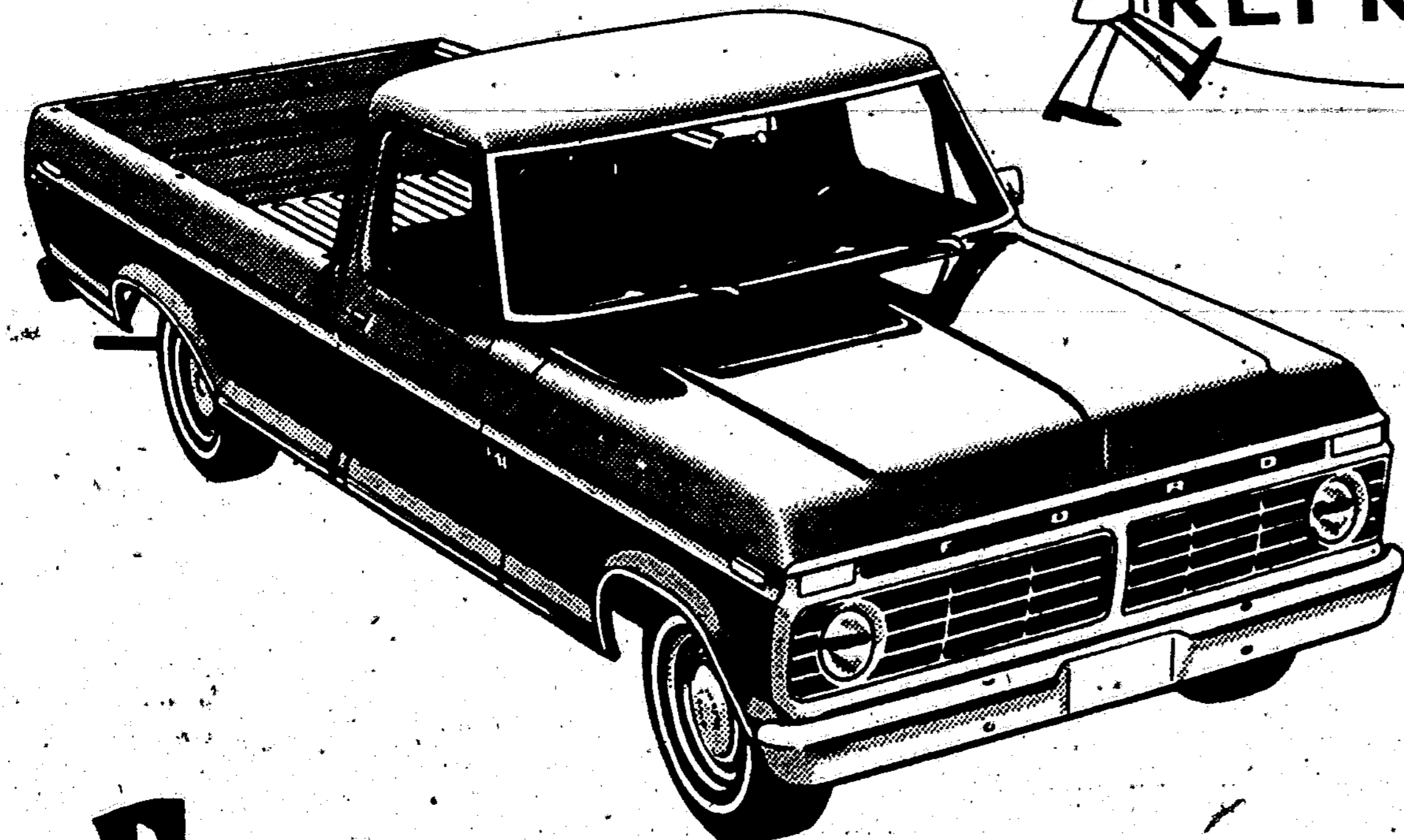
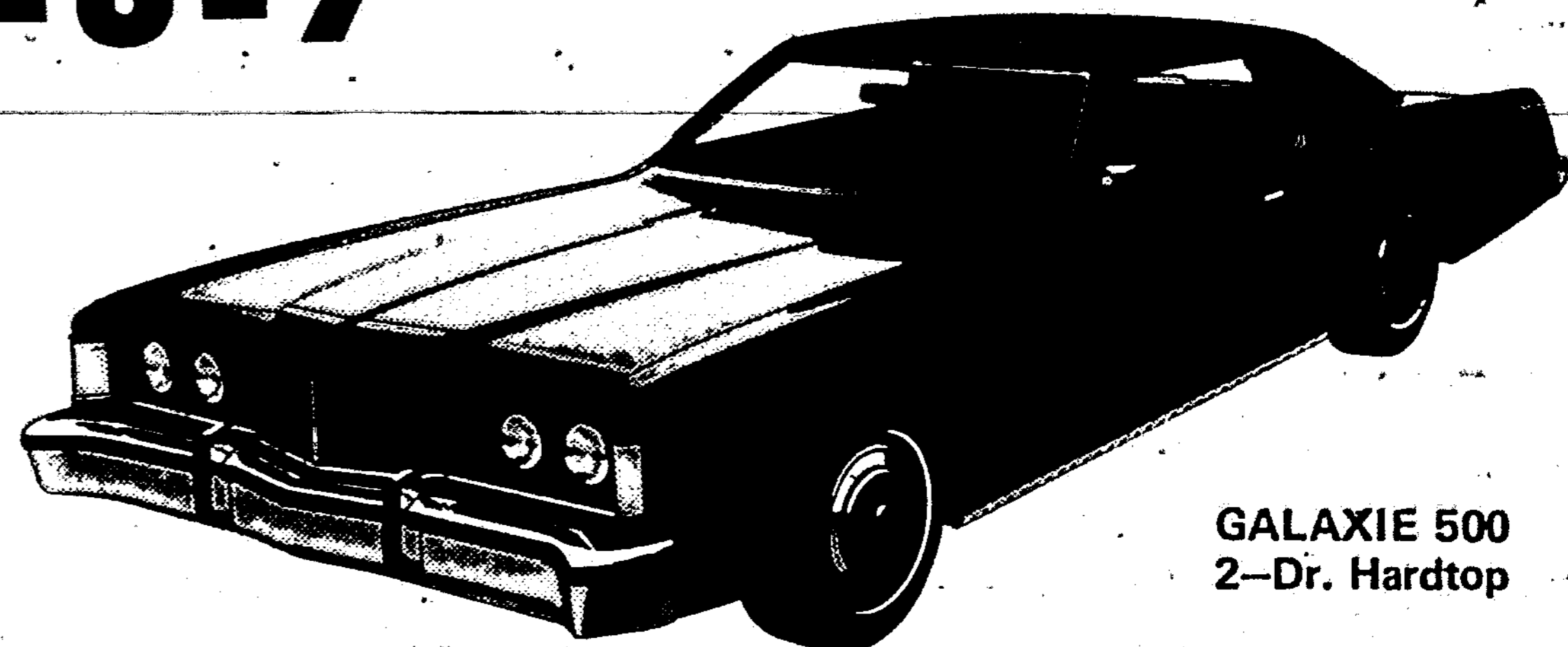
