Griz demolish Reserve to win class A District

The stage was set, the crowd was cheering and the Gaby Chavez led Grizzlies continued its dominance of district 3A by defeating the previously unbeaten Mountaineers of Reserve, 47-0.

Carrizozo continued to demolish the opposition as Gaby Chavez and David Roper combined to put on the air show while Steve Ortiz and Ernie Beltran put together an awesome ground game. The defense was never better on a cloudy afternoon as the district championship went to Carrizozo once again. Reserve took the opening kick off and drove 40 yards mostly through the air before David Roper picked off a pass intended for Mountaineer Rex Roberts, who managed to catch only on pass for 12 yards. On the third play from scrimmage after the interception, Gaby Chavez found David Roper behind Reserve's Dennis Trujillo and completed 49 yard Touchdown pass as Roper out ran Trujillo to the end zone. David Roper's kick was good to make the score - 7-0.

Caught deep in their own territory, Reserve on third down quick kicked and Carrizozo took over on Reserve's 42 yard line. From there Beltran and Ortiz chewed up yardage with Ortiz going the final 11 yards for the touchdown. Beltran ran the PAT to make the score 14-0 at the end of the first period.

The second quarter saw Reserve move the ball in spurts while Carrizozo mixed the air and ground game to dominate the quarter.

Ortiz opened the 2nd quarter scoring by going the final 22 yards of a 64 yard drive aided by a 28 yard pass - Chavez to Hoff. Ortiz bulled over for the extra point. Score 22-0

With five minutes gone, Robert Schlarb intercepted an Estrada pass and returned it to Reserve's 31 yard line. On the next play Chavez once again threw to Roper and another touchdown. The try for the extra point failed. (28-0)

Ernie Beltran completed the 2nd quarter scoring by going 57 yards on a quick opener with Chavez adding the extra point. (36-0)

Reserve did drive to the Grizzly 8 yard line but could not find pay dirt before the quarter ended.

In the third quarter, Beltran again found daylight with a 34 yard gallop. Beltran also added the pat (44-0).

The defense continued to discourage Reserve runners and muffle their air game, as Gaby Chavez intercepted a quick jump pass, Straley took over at quarterback and was greeted by a stiff defense. Straley did move the ball to the 39 yard line but could move the team no further. There was an exchange of the football before the quarter ended but neither team was able to score.

The fourth stanza saw Reserve dominate the quarter but were unable to put a score on the board. Carrizozo's second offensive unit did manage to move the ball to the Mountaineers 18 yard via a Straley to Herrera pas. But unable to move the ball any further David Roper came in on a fourth and ten situation and kicked a 28 yard field goal to end the scoring at 47-0 and a chance at a fourth consecutive State championship.

The defense got outstanding performances by Monreal, Herrera, Ventura, and Samora, with Schlarb also showing well.

On offense Chavez completed 10 of 16 passes for 163 yards. Beltran had 106 yards in 9 carries while Ortiz had 113 yards in 10 carries, Hoff chipped in 57 yards in 7 carries. Roper caught 6 passes for 120 yards.

3rd Mobile Communications Group

Ups population by 24 people

Carrizozo is providing lodging, food and some recreation for 24 men, all members of the 3rd Mobile Communications Group under command of Lt. John Paulson.

This communications group is on a special exercise for training purposes and to try out some new equipment. Their mission is to set up a communications link from Phoenix, Arizona to Oklahoma City, Okla.

The site near Carrizozo is located in Largo Canyon (actually on top of low mountain) 12 miles west of USS4 on Highway 10 toward Claunch.

The 24 men are staying at the Crossroads Motel. Arriving here October 6, they will terminate the exercise on November 15. Lt. Paulson said they were enjoying the bowling and ping pong facilities at the Recreation Center.

Largo Canyon is literally full of sophisticated equipment. Two small antenna (ANTRC97) were set up in three hours and fifty minutes, and are in direct contact two ways with Holloman AFB. The big antennas (ANMRC113) took three to four days to get in operation.

The means of communication is known as tropospheric scatter, meaning that a signal is sent up to bounce and scatter off the troposphere some seven to nine miles up, and come back to earth at points 50 to 200 miles from the point of origin.

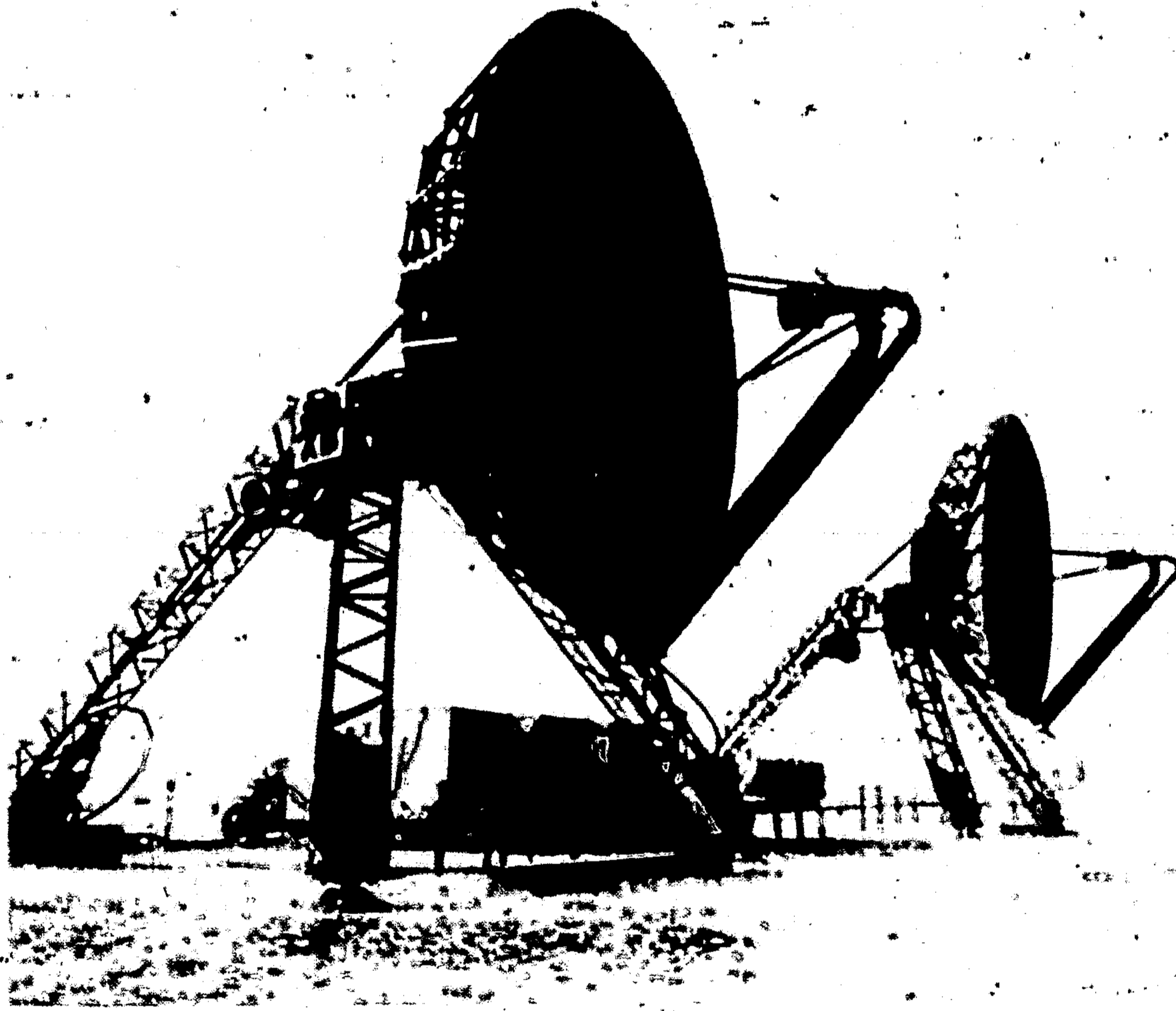
One purpose of the exercise is to determine that communications can be set up and maintained on an emergency basis. The hookup using tropospheric routing is from Ft. Huachuca to Williams AFB at Phoenix, where the signals can go world-wide via satellite. A Davis Mothen AFB Site sends signals to Williams AFB also. From Williams to Lordsburg, to Holloman AFB, to the Largo site, to Canon AFB at Clovis, to Reese AFB at Lubbock to Altus AFB at Tinker AFB at Oklahoma City, to Ft. Wolters toad to Garland, Texas. This Air Force project involves both Army and National Guard.

A function of the mission is to provide emergency communications for the Air Force and Defense Department. Emergency telephone circuits are being set up from Phoenix back to Oklahoma City, along with the tropo-scatter means of communication.

Lt. Paulson said that the mission is not classified or secret, that people are welcome to stop in and visit. The pictures will give you some idea of the view you get in or on Largo Canyon.

Record turnout in Nov. election

Judging from the number of requests by absentee voters, Lincoln County Clerk Alice King predicts a record turnout for the November general election. There have been 160 requests by absentees so far, plus nine requests for residential only, both figures a records for the clerk's office.

This issue of the News carries the complete election proclamation for Lincoln County including all county, district, state and national candidates. Judges, clerks and alternates for all precincts are also listed in the proclamation.

The voter registration report for September 26 shows a total of 4297 voters registered. Democrats have 36 voters in 18-20 group, 2267 in 21 & over group. Republicans 61 in 18-20 age, 1666 in 21 and over age.

Two voters are registered in minor party. On Saturday, October 28 the clerk's office will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to take care of requests for absentee ballots received by mail. All absentee ballots are to be mailed on the 28th.

Also on October 28 the clerk must submit a certified list of all registered voters, their party affiliation and their addresses to the Secretary of State and to the county chairman of each of the major political parties.

Sample ballots are available for each precinct on this same date.

Election proclamations are posted in each precinct by Tuesday, October 31.

There will be a school of instruction for election officials, and any interested persons on Friday, November 3 in the commissioner's room in the courthouse, two sessions at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

The last day for voters to make application for absentee ballots in person is November 2, on Thursday. Ballots may be cast in person up until 5:00 p.m.

Tigers have a big night

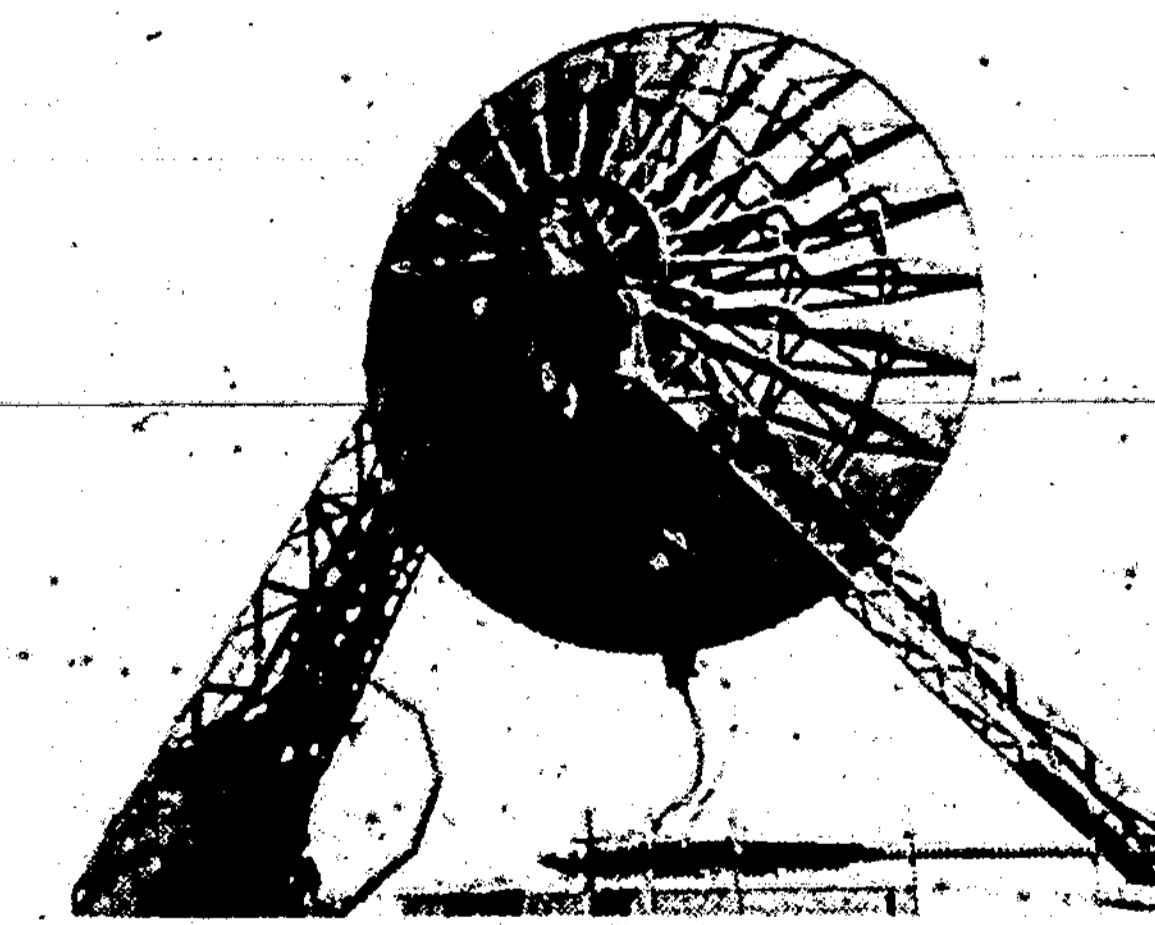
The Fighting Capitan Tigers traveled to Mountainair and chewed out a 41-8 score over the Mountaineers.

Back side of antenna look like this. One of the Communications Group is up on the antenna but hard to see.

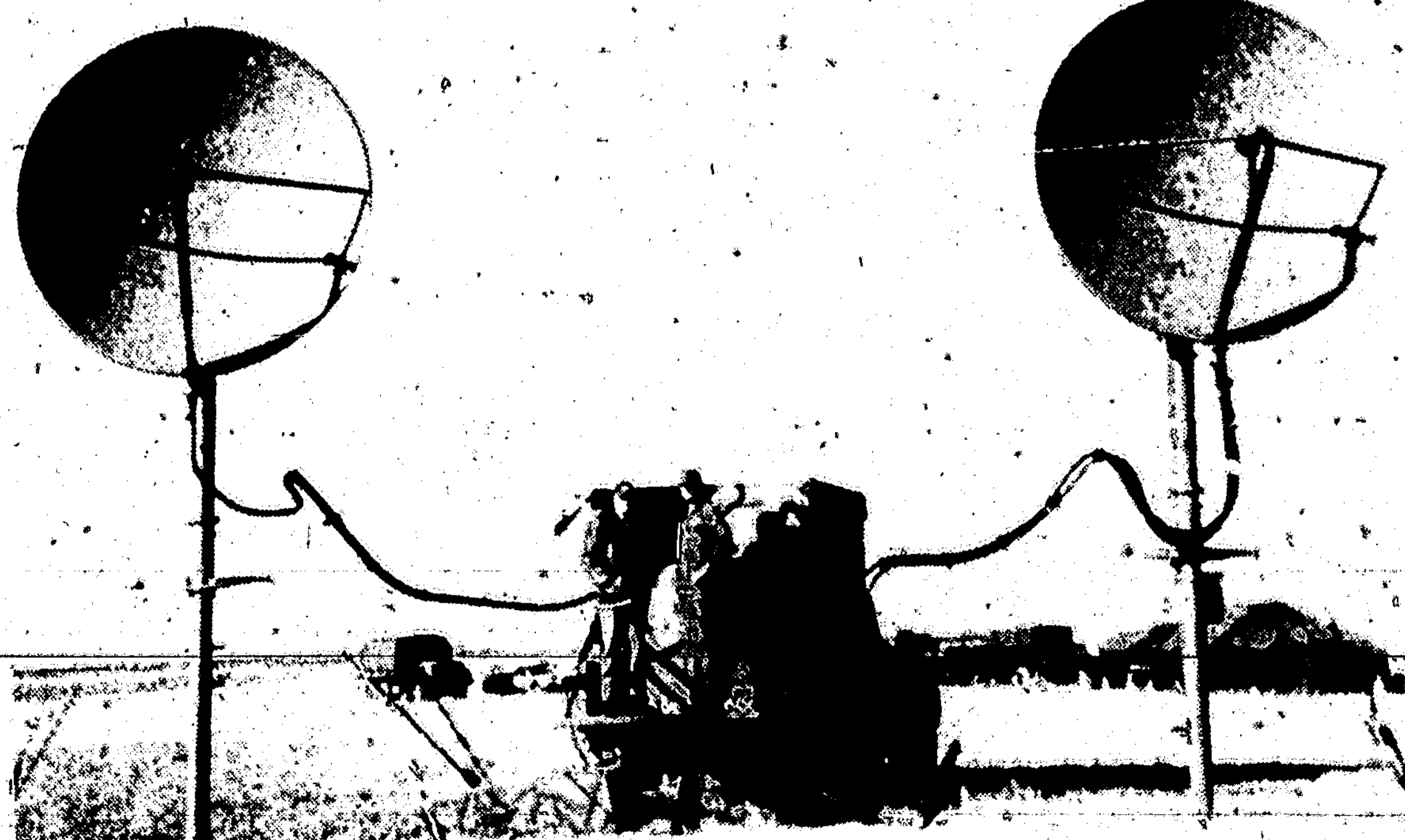
\$45.00 in the football jackpot

A cordial invitation is extended by the First Baptist Church of Capitan. Don't miss this moving personal document on the meaning of life, October 26 at 7 p.m.

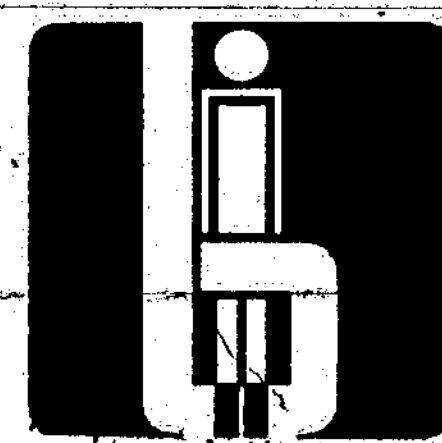

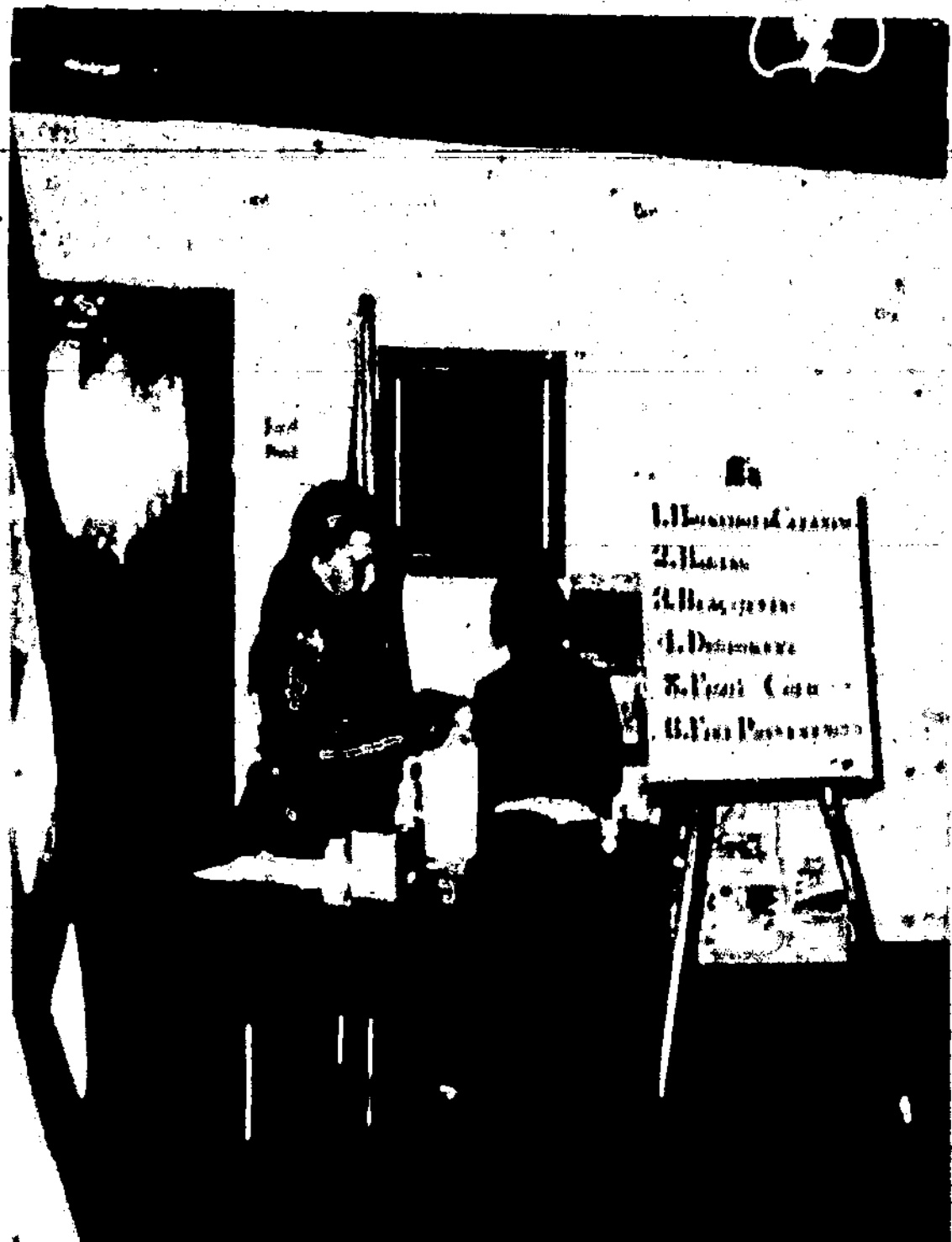

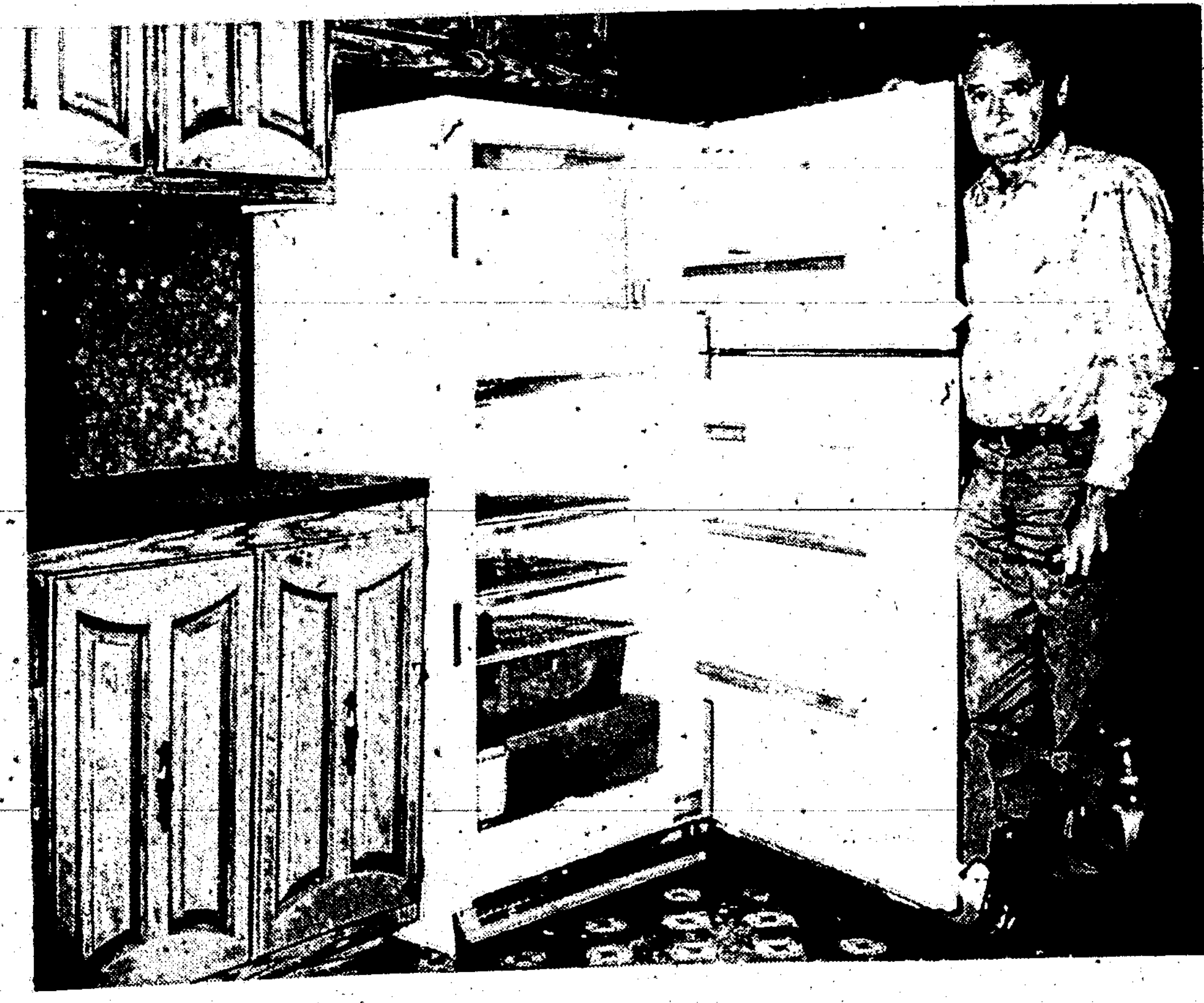

Retirement is a most delightful time for many people. It is thought of as a time of leisure and freedom from day to day responsibilities of a job. Unfortunately, it is still necessary to comply with other responsibilities connected with retirement, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative. For example, the social security office should be notified promptly if any change occurs which may affect monthly payments such as change in mailing address or going to work for more than \$1680 a year. Reporting is necessary when beneficiaries become unable to manage their own funds or die.

Dependents and survivors receiving benefits under social security should also report marriage, divorce, adoption, change in school attendance, or other events affecting their eligibility. Reports may be made by mail, in person, or by telephone. A "Reporting Card" may be obtained from any social security office. "Failure to make these reports timely could result in overpayments which would have to be paid back to social security", Mrs. Graves concluded.

From the Monument

Last week this column talked about an archeological "lucky" find. We have in our museum here at Gran Quivira National Monument and some of you may have in your homes a different archeological detective story, this one based on plain hard work.

As long as modern man has been finding stone axeheads, he's noticed some were much better than others - by strength, by heft, and by beauty. When Pecos, up near Santa Fe, was excavated more than 150 of these special axeheads were found. Kirk Bryan, a Harvard geologist, examined them and found they were made of fibrolite, a type of sillimanite. Fibrolite is great for axeheads. Under a microscope you can see that it is a dense mass of tiny, silk-like fibers, all tangled together and going different directions, which makes it extremely hard and strong; you can hardly break it with a hammer. It is heavy, and incidentally, it takes a good polish and sometimes is beautiful. But Bryan was puzzled, because fibrolite is ordinarily found as a rare fiber or two in some other rock, not in pure masses. Working backwards, he figured out what geologic events had to have happened to pure masses of it, and predicted that the source would be found "somewhere in the southern Sangre de Cristo Mountains." Unfortunately,

Bryan died before his prediction could be verified.

Aside from their peculiar mineralogy, the technique on these axes is superb. Instead of just a rough pecked surface, they are smooth-ground. And instead of just a couple of notches to tie a stick on, they have a spiral groove that permits a good, tight handle. The way these axes are so well made, and so much alike, indicates that they were all made by the same people, and traded as a finished tool. Archeologists became more and more curious as to just where they came from!

Finally a geologist named Art Montgomery got on to the track of this mineral. He hiked up streams that had likely pebbles in them, and he looked for minerals usually associated with sillimanite. After 10 years of looking, he found it. As Kirk Bryan had predicted it was an outcrop high in the Sange de Cristo, just below Truchas Peak, up above Espanola. And now we are pretty certain that the Indians near there had a regular industry going, manufacturing these superior and highly-prized axes and trading them as far as the Hopi country in northern Arizona.

I wonder what some Indian here at Gran Quivira maybe one whose skeleton we've studied - traded for a fibrolite axehead - maybe one in our display case? My son right now is saving for a B-B gun, and all excited about it. How long did a young Indian here save deer-hides, or pinon nuts, to get that triumph of labor-saving technology, fibrolite axehead? Just like a rancher buying a new pickup!

If you have an axehead that you think might be fibrolite, and would like to bring it in for us to look at, we might be able to identify it for you. They are unusual, and we would like to know just where they got traded to.

By the way, in case I've been too lavish in praising these fibrolite axes, even though they are better than other stone axes they can't hold a candle to even a poor steel axe. An Indian with some trees to chop down had a long job in front of him; and think how many vigas it took to cover all the rooms in those ruins on our hill!

28 million get SS checks

"On the third of next month, over twenty-eight million people will receive a social security check. We are vitally interested in seeing that every check is delivered on time," Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative, emphasized today. Social security checks normally arrive on the third day of the month, but sometimes a check may be late.

"If a check is late, we advise the beneficiary to wait three days - until the sixth of the month - before notifying us that he did not get his check. During this three day wait, many checks arrive which were simply held up in the mail.

"A beneficiary should definitely contact the nearest social security office if his check does not arrive on the sixth of the month. This contact can be by phone call, letter, or personal visit to the social security office. "We too often find that the problem which delays a check is a recent change of address. To insure that all social security checks are delivered on time, we ask every social security beneficiary to notify us, as well as the post office, whenever he moves or changes his mailing address," Mrs. Graves concluded.

Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the County Commissioner's Room, Lincoln County Court House in Carrizozo, the fourth Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon.

Early mailing recommended

Postmaster Nick Serna recommends you mail your Christmas packages early for best results. By using PAL or SAM parcels, gifts may be sent to servicemen anywhere in the world at reasonable cost. A PAL package of 15 pounds, for example, will usually cost only about \$4 from east coast to Indonesia, or less from U.S. Midwest or far west points. The SAM parcels cost even less, although they are limited in weight up to five pounds. It is best to identify your package to your serviceman as a SAM or PAL package. To avoid heavy charges on parcels to servicemen requiring straight airmail rates, please take special note of the mailing deadlines. For SAM packages to Far East the deadline is November 20; for PAL packages it is November 27. Please plan to shop and mail early now for gifts going to military personnel overseas. Other early deadlines apply for SAM and PAL parcels going to destinations in other parts of the world.

Extension people at workshops

Two county Extension workers are attending a series of workshop sessions on public relations as a part of an annual Extension Conference at New Mexico State University this week. Those attending from Lincoln County are: Ralph R. Dunlap, Lincoln County Extension Agent and Mary Ellen Payne, Lincoln County Home Agent. Extension agents and home agents from all New Mexico's 32 counties will confer at informal meetings with subject-matter specialists and administrators headquartered at NMSU. About 150 are expected to participate.

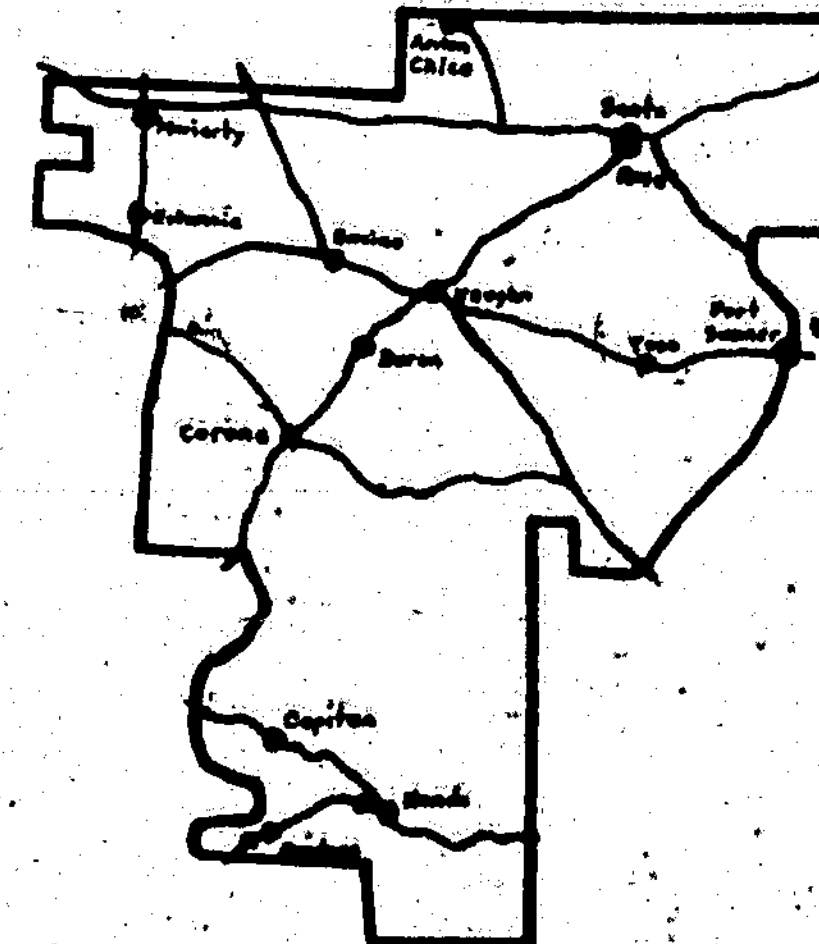

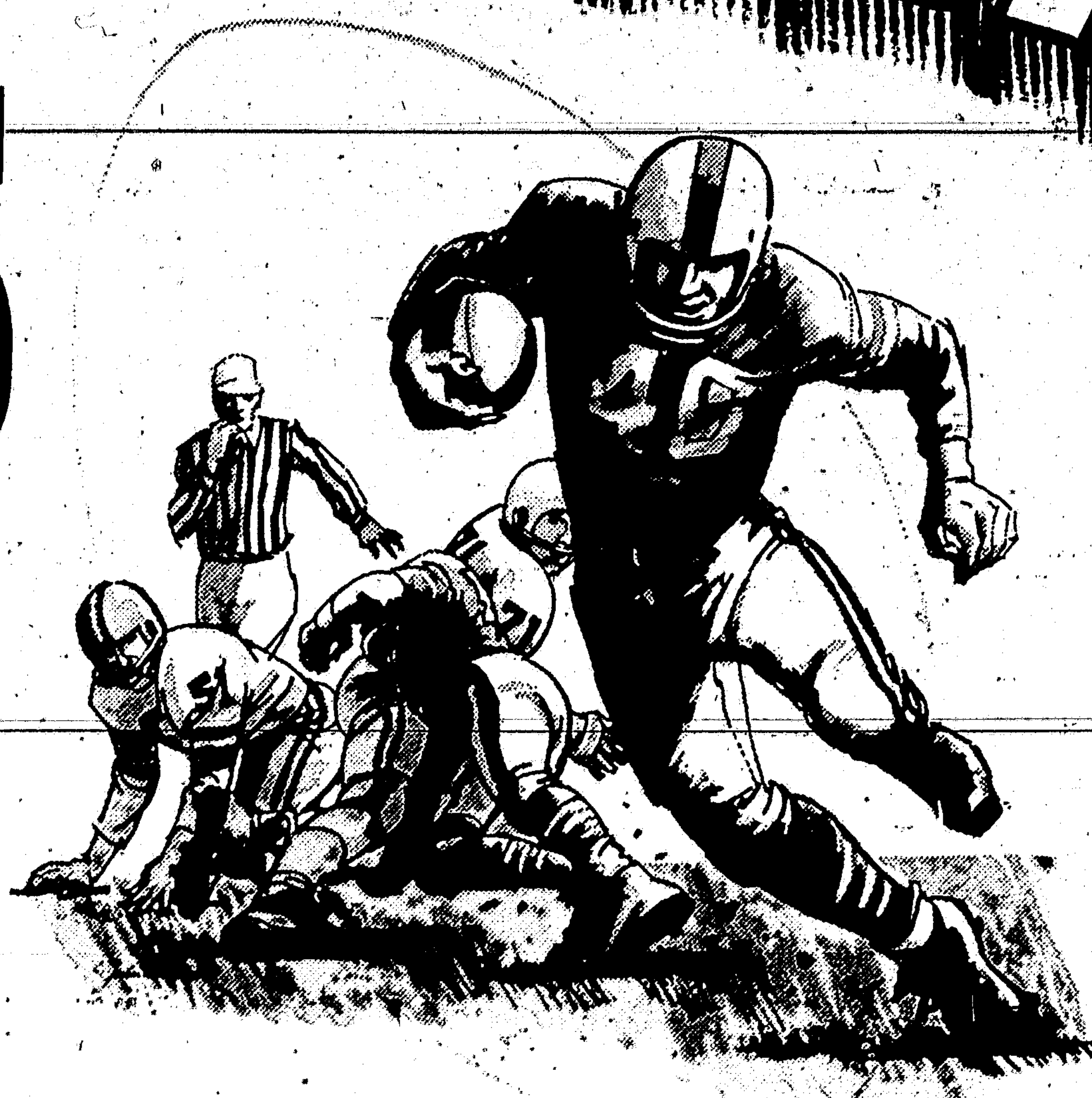

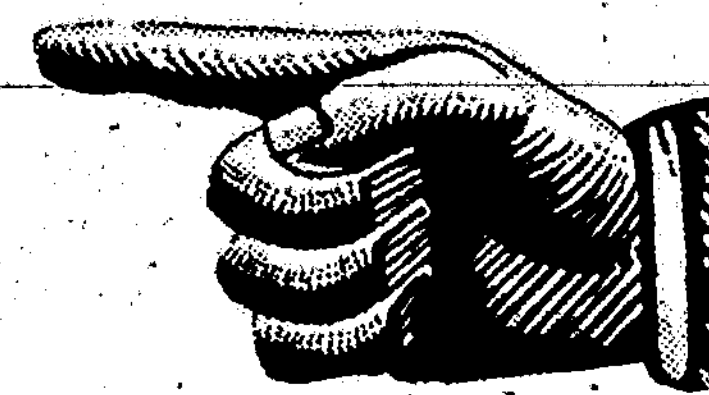

Archeologists and historians

Meet at Gran Quivira

Any tourist stopping for lunch in Mountainair last weekend must have been startled that the restaurants were packed. And as he waited he might have caught fragments of conversation like, "We found \$4,000,000 in bullion on that wreck..." or "Did that pottery come from the Philippines?" or "What did Coronado do if his horse threw a shoe?" Then he might have realized that this was a conference of historians and archeologists, dealing with Spanish colonial history.

We learned that this was the first annual meeting of The Gran Quivira Conference on Spanish Colonial History. So seeking out Cal Cummings, Park Service archeologist and Superintendent of Gran Quivira National Monument, we asked him what it was all about, and here is his report:

"As everybody must know, this is a Centennial Year for the National Park Service. It was just a hundred years ago at a campfire of explorers in what is now Yellowstone National Park that the national park idea was born. Not so well known is the fact that it was 300 years ago this year (so closely as we can tell) that the mission and village here at Gran Quivira National Monument were abandoned. Seeking a way to commemorate this double anniversary, we decided to combine it with a very real scholarly need. For 30 or 40 years there has been a strong push in Spanish colonial history. Many great historians have spent years in dusty archives in Mexico and Spain, have walked old trails on blazing hot days and sought out yellowed documents. Archeologists have meanwhile removed the debris of centuries from Spanish mission floors, for instance here at Gran Quivira National Monument. In the last few years, particularly, we in the United States have been thinking of the value of our many cultural heritages, and seeking ways to define and preserve them.

"Yet though many persons have been working in this area, there has been no consistent communication between them. Often - and this was very clear at the Conference - two scholars may be working on the same subject, translating the same documents, solving the same problems - and not know about each other's work. So with the cooperation and support of the Director of the

Southwest Region of the National Park Service, we sent invitations to major historians and archeologists working in this area of history to gather to talk over our mutual problems, and to exchange our latest findings.

"The response was tremendous. We had 82 participants, some from as far away as Florida, Nebraska and California, and of course many from New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas. We heard reports on such diverse research as 16th century Spanish Shipwrecks, attempts to trace different types of pottery, and 17th century blacksmithing. Some were exciting - Indian attacks, great adventures - while others were the tough research that is the backbone of history, such as population figures deduced from mission records, and language studies. And probably more important that the reports were the little corner conversations we didn't all hear, where two people got together who perhaps hadn't seen each other since they taught together 15 years ago, and found that each had been doing some research that would help the other.

"The National Park Service is involved in this on two levels. We are proud that some of these eminent scholars are Park Service people. Then too, our job is to take the newly discovered information and incorporate it into our park programs, to get accurate and up-to-date information to our visitors. This Conference puts us right in the middle of things.

"We are pleased that the participants thought the Conference useful enough that they voted to make it an annual affair. (Next year's will be in Tucson, Arizona.) The name "Gran Quivira Conference" was officially adopted, both because this is where the first one was held and where it will return every third year, and because "Quivira" came to stand for that will-o'-the-wisp that led the great conquistadores and settlers up to our plains and mountains.

"We especially want to thank Jay Brown, Superintendent of Mountainair Schools and Gary Johnson, Elementary School Principal for their cooperation and the use of the new school building, where some sessions were held. The Conference could not have been a success without them."



'ROUND THE CAPITOL

Santa Fe - State Republican Chairman Tom McKenna predicts Rresident Richard M. Nixon will carry New Mexico by 50,000 votes Nov. 7 over his general election opponent, South Dakota Sen. George McGovern.

Nixon won inside the Capital polls in Clovis, western Valencia County, Lea County, Gallup, Alamogordo, Los Alamos, San Juan County and Carlsbad. The polls are not professional surveys. They are a sampling of voter sentiment.

Sen. McGovern won a poll at Las Vegas. Other polls were being taken over the state. Democrats sent Senate Majority Whip Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia to Hobbs to speak for Hobbs Democrat Jack Daniels before a capacity fund-raising dinner crowd of 540.

Daniels is running for the U.S. Senate against Albuquerque Republican Pete Domenici in a close race. Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania campaigned for Domenici in Las Cruces and Farmington.

South Carolina Sen. Ernest Hollings, chairman of the Senate Democratic Campaign Committee, addressed a \$25-a-person Democratic gala at Albuquerque. Sen. Hollings urged election of Sen. McGovern and Daniels. More than 2,500 tickets were sold for the fund-raising event that also featured entertainers.

Lincoln County Democratic Chairman Fern Sawyer of Nogaal attended the Hobbs dinner. She said a Lincoln County Democratic Party barbecue is set Sunday, Oct. 29, at Ruidoso Downs. A champion steer bought at the Lincoln County Fair at Capitan in early September in the names of Daniels and National Democratic Committeewoman Dessie Sawyer of Crossroads, Lea County, will provide the barbecue. Fern Sawyer is Dessie Sawyer's daughter.

Santa Fe Democrat Eugene Gallegos campaigned Tuesday in Guadalupe and Quay Counties. Gallegos, opposing U.S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque Republican, in District 1, is set to attend a barbecue Friday in Tucumcari and a campaign event Saturday in Raton.

Lujan was still running ahead of Gallegos in election polls. Lujan, a moderate-conservative, seeks a third term against Gallegos, a moderate-liberal.

The state will oppose a price increase at a gas well in San Juan County. New Mexico Public Service Commission will present evidence Nov. 9

at a Federal Power Commission hearing.

The state will support the application of Southern Union Gathering Co. The firm asks that it not be required to continue to buy gas from the Aztec Oil and Gas Co. well. Aztec posted a 94 percent price increase.

Gov. Bruce King opposes the increase because of a possible chain reaction with the boost passed on to New Mexico gas consumers.

In State Senate races Lovington rancher Bill Lee, a Democrat, is favored over A.C. Holder, Lovington Republican, in the district that includes Jal and Eunice. Sen. Finis Heidel, Lovington Democrat, did not seek reelection. Heidel ran unsuccessfully for the party nomination for the State Supreme Court in June.

Dan C. Berry, Eunice Democrat, is opposed for election Nov. 7 to succeed retiring State Rep. George Blocker, Jal Democrat. Berry is president of the New Mexico School Boards Association.

Anti-McGovern sentiment was measured in Southern and Eastern New Mexico counties. The trend against McGovern will cost Daniels votes in the general election but heavy ticket-splitting is also expected.

Daniels must run well outside Bernalillo County to overcome the expected big lead Domenici may pile up in his home county. Daniels challenged estimates Domenici will carry populous Bernalillo. He and his supporters claimed Daniels will hold Domenici to a small majority in Bernalillo County or even carry the key county.

U.S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, continued to lead Silver City Republican Ed Presson by a wide margin in District 2. Runnels actively campaigned over the Democratic district in the wake of the adjournment of Congress.

Secretary of State Betty Fiorina reported these county voter registration totals for the general election: Lincoln County--total, 4,297; Democrats, 2,353; Republicans, 1,727; declined to state, 215; minor parties, 2; Chaves County--total, 20,621; Democrats, 12,823; GOP, 6,910; declined to state, 848; minor parties, 40.

Guadalupe County--total, 3,184; Democrats, 2,242; GOP, 860; declined to state, 167; minor parties, 17; Colfax County--total, 5,905; Democrats, 4,070; GOP, 1,538; declined to state, 277; minor parties, 20.

The Vermejo Park bill died on adjournment of the 92nd Congress. Rep. Jujan said he will reintroduce the bill in the U.S. House again next year if he is reelected.

The bill authorizes federal purchase of the 480,000-acre Vermejo Ranch for \$20 million. The land would be under U.S. Forest Service control. The huge ranch is in Colfax and Taos Counties.

The Legislative School Study Committee will consider a constitutional amendment at a Santa Fe meeting Nov. 13-14 to establish a governor-appointed State Board of Education. State Rep.

The 10-member state board, reappointed by the 1972 Legislature, is elected now for 6-year terms. Members would be named for similar terms under the proposed constitutional amendment.
