
Griz demolish Reserve to win class A District

The means of communication is known as tropospheric scatter, meaning that a signal is sentup to bounce and scatter off the troposphere some seven to nine miles up, and come back to earth at points 50 to 200 miles from the point of orgin.

One purpose of the exercise is to determine that communications can be set up and maintained on an emergency basis. The hookup using troposoheric routing is from Ft. Huachuca to Williams AFB at Phoenix, where the signals can go world-wide via satellite. A Davis Mothen AFB Site sends signals to Williams AFB also. From Williams to Lordsburg, to Holloman AFB, to the Largo site, to Canon AFB at Clovis, to Reese AFB at Lubbock to Altus AFB to Tinker AFB at Oklahoma City, to Ft. Wolters toand to Garland, Texas. This Air Force project involves both Army and National Guard.

A function tof the mission is to provice emergency communications for the Air Force and Defense Department. Emergency telephone circuits are being set up from Phoenix back to Oklahoma City, along with the tropo-scatter means of communication.

Lt. Paulson said that the mission is not classified or secret, that people are welcome to stop in and visit. The pictures will give you some idea of the view you get in or on Largo Canyon.

CHAPTER 13 AN ACT

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF AND STATE - EDUCATIONAL SALE OF INSTITUTION LIBRARY BONDS - SERIES 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 AND 1977, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CAPITAL EXPENDITURES OF LIBRARIES AT STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, THE JUNIOR COLLEGE AND BRANCH COMMUNITY COLLEGES; PROVIDING A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF THE BONDS; AND PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THIS ACT TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

any funds, establish a quantitative formula for such allocations to the higher education institutions and colleges. Such formula shall take into consideration the full-time equivalent of faculty members, the full-time equivalent graduate enrollment, the full-time equivalent undergraduate enrollment, the undergraduates in honors or independent study programs, the fields of undergraduate concentration, the fields of graduate concentration in master's work or equivalent, the fields of graduate concentration in doctoral work or equivalent, and the existing collections of each institution and college. The board shall submit the formula to the foard of finance for concurrence. The formula shall be subject to change only as a result of a major change in the anticipated program or enrollment of an institution or upon appeal and justification of a change by the institution or college or when the board determines that a change is needed as a result of its monitoring of actual espenditures made from allocated funds, as hereinafter provided. The change, if made by the board, must have the concurrence of the board of finance.

Based upon such formula and the percentage of each issue to be allocated on this basis, the board shall establish for each higher education institution and college a projected approximate allocation of such institution's share of the total funds to be allocated on this basis from the bond issues authorized by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act. On the basis of this projection, each institution and college shall develop a five-year plan for acquisition of academic library collections. The plan and any subsequent modifications shall be reported to the board.

As a part of its long-range planning study, the board shall project, for the institutional and college libraries individually and collectively, those capital outlay requirements other than acquisition of academic library collections and construction of buildings, necessary for the implementation of proven techniques for utilization of modern technology and other recent developments in the performance of the academic library function. The board shall reexamine and adjust such 'projections periodically. Using the projections as a framework, that portion of the proceeds from each issue not allocated for acquisition of academic library collections shall be allocated by the board to the individual institutions and colleges and or consortia of the institutions and colleges for such capital outlay requirements. All such allocations shall be for the funding of specific, detailed projects submitted by the institutions or sonsortia of the institutions and colleges. Each institution shall submit such reports as the board may prescribe on the actual expenditures made from allocated funds. The board shall, using such reports, monitor the progress made by the institutions individually and collectively in implementing the development plan projected by the board and the institutions' and colleges' five-year plans for acquisition of academic library collections. Based on such monitoring, the board may change the formula for the allocations for acquisition of academic library collections. Section 5. The principal of the bonds shall be payable to bearer, or if registered as provided in the State Institution Library Bond Act, to the registered holder, as the same becomes due. Interest coupons payable to bearer shall be attached to each of the bonds and shall be consecutively numbered specifying the number of the bond to which they are attached. The coupons shall bear the engraved lithographed facsimile of the signature of the state treasurer in office at the time the bonds and coupons are prepared and ordered to be engraved or lithographed. The bonds, when duly signed, attested, counter-signed, issued and sold asprovided in the State Institution Library Bond Act, shall be valid obligations of the state. The bonds may be executed in accordance with the Uniform Facsimile Signature of public Officials Act: Section 6. The bonds authorized under the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect, to the highest bidder for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery. The state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and also in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The publication shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of the sale. The-notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day and hour at which sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the -bidder or bidders offering the highest price therefor. No bid shall be accepted which is less

the longrange study and prior to the allocation of sold pursuant to the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds shall be outstanding, an ad valorem tax on all property in the state of New Mexico subject to taxation for state purposes sufficient to produce an amount equal to one year's interest on all bonds then outstanding, together with an amount sufficient to pay the principal of all bonds as they mature. The taxes hereby authorized, imposed and levied shall be levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other taxes for state purposes are levied, assessed and collected, and it shall be the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be levied, assessed and collected.

Section 10. The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected under the taxes hereby imposed and levied, and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the interest and principal of the bonds as they become due.

Section 11. Any holder of any of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act. or any person or officer being a party in interest, may either at law or in equity; by suit, action, or by mandamus enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act of any officer or person herein mentioned. The provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act constitute an irrepealable contract with the holders of any of the bonds and the coupons thereof issued pursuant to the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature of the state, the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds hereby authorized, and the bonds and coupons attached thereto shall have all the qualities of negotiable paper under the law merchant and shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issue and sale thereof and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act are exempt from taxation. Section 12. The State Educational Institution Library Bond Act shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state at the general election to be held in November, 1972, and if it shall receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, it shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of such election; provided, that no bonds shall be issued or sold under the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act until the qualified electors of this state. shall have voted upon and ratified that act at the general election in 1972, as herein provided. All ballots at the 1972 general election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State. Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977" and in the same square under these words, the following, in brevier type: "The State Educational Institution Library Bond Act provides for the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and 1977-. two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to provide funds for capital expenditures of libraries at state October 26, 1972. educational institutions, and provides for a tax levy for payments of interest and principal of the bonds." A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8, SECTION 3 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF . NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR TAXATION OF COMMERCIAL CHURCH PROPERTY; AND TO ALLOW THE LEGISLATURE TO **PROVIDE EXEMPTIONS OF PERSONAL** PROPERTY FROM TAXATION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 8, Section 3 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The property of the United States, the state and all counties, towns, cities and school districts, and other municipal corporations, public libraries, community ditches and all laterals thereof, all church property not used for commercial purposes, all property used for educational or charitable purposes, all cemeteries not used or held for private or. corporate profit, and all bonds of the state of New Mexico, and of the counties, municipalities and districts thereof shall be exempt fromtaxation. Provided, however, that any property acquired by public libraries, community ditches and all laterals thereof, property acquired by churches, property acquired and used for educational or charitable purposes, and property' acquired by cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit, and property. acquired by the Indian service, and property acquired by the United States government or by the state of New Mexico by outright purchase or trade, where such property was, prior to such transfer, subject to the lien of any tax or assessment for the principal or-interest of any bonded indebtedness shall not be exempt from such lien, nor from the payment of such taxes or assessments. Exemptions of personal property from ad valorem taxation may be provided by law if approved by a three-fourths majority vote of all the members elected to each house of the legislature." Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "State Educational Institution Library Bond Act".

Section 2. For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures of the libraries at state educational institutions as named in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico. branch community colleges thereof and the New Mexico junior colege of Lea County, successive indebtedness of the state is hereby authorized for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two-million-dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-twomillion dollars (\$2,000,000) and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000, or any lesser amount as may be legally issued under constitutional limitations existing at the time of issuance of bonds evidencing the indebtedness, or any lesser amount as may be recommended by the board of educational finance and approved by the state board of finance.

Section 3. The state treasurer shall prepare successively negotiable serial bonds of the state of New Mexico, to be known as "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series . 1973," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1974," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1975," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1976," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1977," as the case may be, in denominations as the governor shall determine, to be numbered consecutively, and to be dated January 1, or July 1, of the year in which they are issued. The bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on July 1 and January 1 of each year. Payment on the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance and the bonds shall mature thereafter in substantially equal annual installments in such manner that all of the bonds shall mature not later than five years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the state treasurer in the city of Santa Fe, New Mexico, or at such alternate paying agent at a bank or banks within or without the state of New Mexico as the state board of finance may authorized. The bonds shall be signed by the governor, attested by the secretary of state under the seal of the state, and countersigned by the state treasurer. The full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the prompt payment at maturity of the principal and interest of all the bonds which may be issued and sold as provided in the State Educational Institution Library

The first part allows for the taxation of church property which is being used in a commercial manner. As an example, if a church owns an apartment building and no part of the building is actually used for church services or religious purposes, then this amendment would allow that building to be taxed in the same manner as though you or I owned that building. There are a number of arguments pro and con on this part of the amendment, and I will attempt to summarize-

The original constitutional thinking was that church property meant the church itself and possibly a school or other related structure that went with the church. It probably wasn't contemplated that the church would seek out investments not used directly for religious purposes. As this has happened, the original purpose of the constitutional exemption has been lost, and this loss of revenue hurts areas such as education. The church, when competing against private enterprise, enjoys an unfair tax advantage. Some of the arguments against removing the exemption deal first with the "commercial purposes" mean?: If the churchsells religious articles on part of the actual church property, does this then mean that the

comes from, the end result is that the church uses it to carry out religious and charitable activities. Should the church be forced to pay tax on this money, and then apply it to its activities? You can readily see there are good arguments on both sides of this questions.

the exemption of personal property by the Legislature. What doesn't appear on the ballot is that this exemption would require a threefourths vote of all members elected to both the House and the Senate. The new language in the amendment reads "Exemptions personal property from ad valorem taxation may be provided by law if approved by a threefourths majority vote of all the members elected _to_each_house_of_the_Legislature."As-I-discus with you before, one of the problems on all of these amendments is to put before the voter the entire constitutional amendment. There is simply no way that this can be done on a voting machine because of space, but they should have a copy of the entire amendment at each polling place. I am certainly open to suggestions on how you, as voters, would like to see this changed, because the way it appears on the ballot simply does not give each voter an opportunity to know exactly what he is voting on.


One of the main things we are talking about under this exemption is your personal property that you declare when you render your propert wording, what exactly does the term for taxes. Most County Assessors will add a certain percentage for the value of the personal property based on the value of your house. This may have absolutely no validity, as, for

example, if you live in a \$10,000 house full of antique furniture worth more than the house. your personal property tax would probably be computed on 10 per cent of the value of your house. Contarywise, if your furniture is like what Dorothy Anne and I started out with when we were first married, you would be paying way too much tax. This exemption could also cover a great number of other areas. For instance, to bring in new business, the Legislature might declare manufacturing equipment exempt from personal property tax. On the other hand, the Legislature could attempt to exempt oil and natural gas as being personal property, and this would erode a major area of our tax base Proponents of this amendment say that what we need to do is to uniformly enforce this tax rather than impose a different percentage throughout the State

As a practical matter, I should point out that j is extremely difficult to pass any controversial measure through the Legislature with a threefourths vote in each house, Next week my article will deal with the six--man-jury-amendment-and-the-State-Educational-Institution Library Bond Act. I am one of the three Senators who sponsored the six-man jury amendment, so naturally I am for it, and I am for the Library Bond Act. As I have done whenever I have spoken or written on the constitutional amendments, I will present both sides, but I will urge your support of these two measures. 

From the Monument

Last-week-this-column-talked-about-an-Bryan-died-before-his-prediction-could-bearcheological "lucky" find. We have in our museum here at Gran Quivira National Monument- and some of you may have in your homes a different archeological detective story, this one based on plain hard work. As long as modern man has been finding stone axeheads, he's noticed some were much better than others - by strength, by heft, and by beauty. When Pecos, up near Santa Fe, was excavated more than 150 of these special axeheads were found. Kird Bryan, a Harvard geologist, examined them and found they were made of fibrolite, a type of sillimanite. Fibrolite is great for axeheads. Under a microscope you can see that it is a dense mass of tiny, silk-like fibers, all tangled together and going different directions, which makes it extremely hard and strong; you can hardly break it with a hammer. It is heavy, and incidentally, it takes a good polish and sometimes is beautiful. But Bryan was puzzled, because fibrolite is ordinarily found as a rare fiber or two in some other rock, not in pure masses. Working backwards, he figured out what geologic events had to have happened to for . pure masses of it, and predicted that the source would be found "somewhere in the southern Sangre de Cristo Mountains" Unfortunately,

"On the third of next month, over twenty-eight million people will receive a social security check.We are vitally interested in seeing that every check is delivered on time," Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative, emphasized today

Social security checks normally arrive on the third day of the month, but sometimes a check may be late

"If a check is late, we advise the beneficiary to wait three days - until the sixth of the month before notifying us that he did not get his check. During this three day wait, many checks arrive which were simply held up in the mail.

"A beneficiary should definitely contact the nearest social security office if his check does not arrive on the sixth of the month. This contact can be by phone call, letter, or personal visit to the social security office. "We to often find that the problem which delays a check is a recent. o change of address. To insure that all social security checks are delivered on time, we ask every social security beneficiary to notify us, as ' well as the post office, whenever he moves or changes his mailing address," Mrs Graves concluded.

Mrs Graves may be contacted at the County Commissioner's Room, Lincoln-County Court House in Carrizozo, the fourth Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon.

Early mailing recommended

Postmaster Nick Serna recommends you mail your Christmas packages early for best results. . By using PAL or SAM parcels, gifts may be sent to servicemen anywhere in the world at reasonable cost. A PAL package of 15 pounds, for example, will usually cost only about \$4 from; east coast to Indonesia, or less from U.S. midwest or far west points. The SAM parcels cost even less, although they are limited in weight up to five pounds. It is best to identify your package to your serviceman as a SAM or PAL package. 
a rough pecked surface, they are smoothground. And instead of just a couple of notches to tie a stick on, they have a spiral groove that permits a good, tight handle. The way these axes are so well made, and so much alike, indicates that they were all made by the same people, and -traded as a finished-tool. Archeologists became more and more curious as to just where they 'came from!

Finally a geologist named Art Montgomery got on to the track of this mineral. He hiked up streams that had likely pebbles in them, and he looked for minerals usually associated with sillimanite. After 10 years of looking, he found it," As-Kirk Bryan had predicted it was an outcrop high in the Sangre de Cristo, just below Truchas Peak, up above Espanola. And now we are pretty certain that the Indians mear ther had a regular industry going, manufacturing these superior and highly-prized axes and trading theraas far as the Hopi country in northern Arizonz.


I wonder what some Indian here at Gran Quivira maybe one whose skeleton we've studied traded for a fibrolite axehead - maybe one in our display case? My son right now is saving for a B-B gun, and all excited about it." How long did a young Indian here save deerhides, or pinon nuts, to get that triumph of laborsaving technology, figrolite axehead? Just like a rancher buying a new pickup!

.If you have an axehead that you think might be fibrolite, and would like to bring it in for us to look at, we might be able to identify it for you. They are unusual, and we would like to know just where they got traded to.

By the way, in case I've been too lavish in praising these fibrolite axes, even though they are better than other stone axes they can't hold a candle to even a poor steel axe. An Indian with some trees to chop down had a long job in front of him; and think how many vigas it took to cover all the rooms in those ruins on our hill!

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF AND SALE OF STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION LIBRARY BONDS SERIES 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 AND 1977, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CAPITAL EXPENDITURES OF LIBRARIES AT STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, THE JUNIOR COLLEGE AND BRANCH COMMUNITY COLLEGES; PROVIDING A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF THE BONDS: AND PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THIS ACT TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "State Educational Institution Library Bond Act". Section 2. For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures of the libraries at state educational institutions as named in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico, branch community colleges thereof and the New Mexico junior colege of Lea County, successive indebtedness of the state is hereby authorized for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000, or any lesser amount as may be legally issued under constitutional limitations existing at the time of issuance of bonds evidencing the indebtedness, or any lesser amount as may be recommended by the board of educational finance and approved by the state board of finance.

Section 3. The state treasurer shall prepare successively negotiable serial bonds of the state of New Mexico, to be known as "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds Series 1974," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds .- Series 1975," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds Series 1976," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1977," as the case may be, in denominations as the governor shall determine, to be numbered consecutively, and to be dated January 1, or July 1, of the year in which they are issued. The bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on July 1 and January 1 of each year. Payment on the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance and the bonds shall mature thereafter in substantially equal annual installments in such manner that all of the bonds shall mature not later than five years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the state treasurer in the city of Santa Fe, New Mexico, or at such alternate paying agent at a bank or banks within or without the state of New Mexico as the state board of finance may authorized. Based upon such formula and the percentage of each issue to be allocated on this basis, the board shall establish for each higher education institution and college a projected approximate allocation of such institution's share of the total funds to be allocated on this basis from the bond. issues authorized by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act. On the basis of this projection, each institution and college shall develop a five-year plan for acquisition of academic library collections. The plan and any sequent modifications shall be reported to the board.

As a part of its long-range planning study, the board shall project, for the institutional and college libraries individually and collectively, those capital outlay requirements other than acquisition of academic library collections and construction of buildings, necessary for the implementation of proven techniques for utilization of modern technology and otherrecent developments in the performance of the academic library function. The board shall reexamine and adjust such projections periodically. Using the projections as a framework, that portion of the proceeds from each issue not allocated for acquisition o academic library collections shall be allocated by the board to the individual institutions and colleges and or consortia of the institutions and colleges for such capital outlay requirements. All such allocations shall be for the funding of specific, detailed projects submitted by the institutions or sonsortia of the institutions and

Each institution shall submit such reports as the board may prescribe on the actual expenditures made from allocated funds. The board shall, using such reports, monitor the progress made by the institutions individually and collectively in implementing the development plan projected by the board and the institutions' and colleges' five-year plans" for acquisition of academic library collections. Based on such monitoring, the board may change the formula for the allocations for acquisition of academic library collections,

Section 5. The principal of the bonds shall be. payable to bearer, or if registered as provided in the State Institution Library Bond Act, to the registered holder, as the same becomes due. Interest coupons payable to bearer shall be attached to each of the bonds and shall be consecutively numbered specifying the number of the bond to which they are attached. The coupons shall bear the engraved lithographed facsimile of the signature of the state treasurer in office at the time the bonds and coupons are prepared and ordered to be engraved or lithographed. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposits of public money.

Section 7. The department of finance and administration shall make a record in a book kept for that purpose in which shall be entered the date, number and amount of each bond sold and the amount for which the same was sold. Any of the bonds sold may be registered by the state treasurer upon presentation of the bonds and may be at the request and in the name of the holder thereof in a book kept for that purpose, registered as to principal only, or as to both principal and interest, in which latter case all coupons attached to such registration with the date thereof shall be endorsed by the state treasurer on each bond so registered,

Section 8. The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds before any proceeds are distributed to the state educational institutions and colleges specified in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act.



Archeologists and historians

Meet at Gran Quivira

. . .

Any tourist stopping for lunch in Mountainair last weekend must have been startled that the restaurants were packed. And as he waited he might have caught fragments of conversation like, "We found \$4,000,000 in bullion on that wreck . . ." or "Did that pottery come from the Philippines?" or "What did Coronado do if his horse threw a shoe?" Then he might have realized that this was a conference of historians and archeologists, dealing with Spanish colonial history.

We learned that this was the first annual meeting of The Gran Quivira Conference on Spanish Colonial History. So seeking out Cal Cummings, Park Service archeologist and Superintendent of Gran Quivira National Monument, we asked him what it was all about, and here is his report:

"As everybody must know, this is a Centennial Year for the National Park Service. It was just a hundred years ago at a campfire of explorers in what is now Yellowstone National Park that the national park idea was born. Not so well known is the fact that it was 300 years ago"this year (so closely as we can tell) that the mission and village here at Gran Quivira National Monument were abandoned. Seeking a way to commemorate this double anniversary, we decided to combine it with a very real scholarly need. For 30 or 40 years there has been a strong -push in Spanish colonial history. Many great historians have spent years in dusty archives in Mexico and Spain, have walked old trails on blazing hot days and sought out yellowed documents. Archeologists have meanwhile removed the debris of centuries from Spanish mission floors, for instance here at Gran Quivira National Monument: In the last few years, particularly, we in the United States have beenthinking of the value of our many cultural heritages, and seeking ways to define and preserve them. "Yet though many persons have been working in this area, there has been no consistant communication between them. Often - and this was very clear at the Conference - two scholars may be working on the same subject, translating the same documents, solving the same problems - and not know about each other's work. So with the cooperation and support of the Director of the

Southwest Region of the National Park Service, we sent invitations to major historians and archeologists working in this area of history to gather to talk over our mutual problems; and to exchange our latest findings,

"The response was tremendous. We had 82 participants, some from as far away as Florida, Nebraska and California, and of course many from New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas. We heard reports on such diverse research as 16th century Spanish Shipwrecks, attempts to trace different types of pottery, and 17th century blacksmithing. Some were exciting - Indian attacks, great adventures - while others were the tough research that is the backbone of history, such as population figures deduced from mission records, and language studies. And

the little corner conversations we didn't all hear, where two people got together who perhaps hadn't seen each other since they taught together 15 years ago, and found that each had been doing some research that would help the other.

"The National Park Service is involved in this on two levels. We are proud that some of these emminent scholars are Park Service people, Then too, our job is to take the newly discovered information and incorporate it into our park programs, to get accurate and up-to-date information to our visitors. This Conference puts us right in the middle of things,

"We are pleased that the participants thought the Conference useful enough that they voted to .make it an annual affair. (Next year's will be in Tucson, Arizona.) The name "Gran Quivira Conference" was officially adopted, both because this is where the first one was held and where it will return every third year, and because "Quivira" came to stand for that will-o'the-wisp that led the great conquistadores and settlers up to our plains and mountains,

at a Federal Power Commission hearing. The state will support the application of Southern Union Gathering Co. The firm asks that it not be required to continue to buy gas from the Aztec Oil and Gas Co. well. Aztec posted a 94 percent price increase.

Gov. Bruce King opposes the increase because of a possible chain reaction with the boost passed on to New Mexico gas consumers, .

In State Senate races Lovington rancher Bill Lee, a Democrat, is favored over A.C. Holder, Lovington Republican, in the district that includes Jal and Eunice. Sen. Finis Heidel, Lovington Democrat, did not seek reelection. Heidel ran unsuccessfully for the party nomination for the State Supreme Court in June. Dan C. Berry, Eunice Democrat, is unopposed for election Nov. 7 to succeed retiring State Rep. George Blocker, Jal Democrat. Berry is president of the New Mexico School Boards Assocation.

Anti-McGovern sentiment was measured in probably more important that the reports were Southern and Eastern New Mexico counties. The trend against McGovern will cost Daniels votes in the general election but heavy ticket-splitting is also expected.

Daniels must run well outside Bernalillo County to overcome the expected big lead Domenici may pile up in his home county, Daniels challenged estimates Domenici will carry populous Bernalillo. He and his supporters claimed Daniels will hold Domenici to a small -majority in Bernalillo County or even carry the key county.

U.S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, continued to lead Silver City Republican Ed Presson by a wide margin in District 2. Runnels actively campaigned over the Democratic district in the wake of the adjournment of Congress. Secretary of State Betty Fiorina reported. these county voter registration totals for the general election: Lincoln County---total, 4,297; Democrats, 2,353; Republicans, 1,727; declined to state, 215; minor parties, 2; Chaves County--total 20,621; Democrats, 12,823; GOP, 6,910; declined to state, 848; minor parties, 40. Guadalupe County--total, 3,184; Democrats, 2,242; GOP, 860 1,174; declined to state, 167; minor parties, 17; Colfax County---total, 5,905; Democrats, 4,070; GOP, 1,538; declined to state, 277; minor parties, 20. The Vermejo Park bill died on adjournment of the 92nd-Congress. Rep. Jujan said he will reintroduce the bill in the U.S. House again next year if he is reelected. The bill authorizes federal purchase of the 480,000-acre Vermejo Ranch for \$20 million. The land would be under U.S. Forest Service control, The huge ranch is in Colfax and Taos Counties. The Legislative School Study Committee will consider a constitutional amendment at a Santa Fe meeting Nov. 13-14 to establish a governorappointed State Board of Education. State Rep. The 10-member state board, reapportioned by the 1972 Legislature, is elected now for 6-year terms. Members would be named for similar terms under the proposed constitutional amendment.



Santa Fe - State Republican Chairman Tom McKenna predicts Rresident Richard M. Nixon will carry New Mexico by 50,000 votes Nov. 7 over his general election opponent, South Dakota Sen. George McGovern.

Nixon won Inside the Capital polls in Clovis, western Valencia County, Lea, County, Gallup, Alamogordo, Los Alamos, San Juan County and Carlsbad. The polls are not professional surveys. They are a sampling of voter sentiment.

Sen. McGovern won a poll at Las Vegas. Other polls were being taken over the state. Democrats sent Senate Majority Whip Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia to Hobbs to speak for Hobbs Democrat Jack Daniels before a capacity Jundraising dinner crowd of 540.

Daniels is running for the U.S. Senate against Albuquerque Republican Pete Domenici'in a close race. Senate Republican Leader Hugh - Scott of Pennsylvania campaigned for Domenici in Las Cruces and Farmington. South Carolina Sen. Ernest Hollings, chairman of the Senate Democratic Campaign Committee, addressed a \$25-a-person Democratic gala at Albuquerque. Sen. Hollings urged election of Sen. McGovern and Daniels. More than 2,500 tickets were sold for the fund-raising event that also featured entertainers. Lincoln County Democratic Chairman Fern Sawyer of Nogal attended the Hobbs dinner. She said a Lincoln County Democratic Partybarbecue is set Sunday, Oct. 29, at Ruidoso Downs. A champion steer bought at the Lincoln County Fair at Capitan in early September in the names of Daniels and National Democratic Committeewoman Dessie Sawyer of Crossroads, Lea County, will provide the barbecue. Fern Sawyer is Dessie Sawyer's daughter. Santa Fe Democrat Eugene Gallegoscampaigned Tuesday in Guadalupe and Quay Counties. Gallegos, opposing U.S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque Republican, in District 1. is set to attend a barbecue Friday in Tucumcari and a campaign event Saturday in Raton. Lujan was still running ahead of Gallegos in election polls. Jujan, a moderate-conservative, seeks a third term against Gallegos, a moderateliberal.
