## County valuation jumps \$13 million after re-appraisal

Conforming to state law, the job of re-appraisal of Lincoln County is all but done, this after at least two false starts and waste of over \$50,000 from snafu caused by original re-appraisal contractor.

The re-appraisal job will be presented to Lincoln County commissioners at their regular meeting December 7 by the American Appraisal & Consultants, Inc. for final approval. According to Commissioner Don Stark there have been approximately 400 new building

permits issued in Ruidoso since the re-appraisal work was started and these will have to be picked up by the county. In addition there are a great many mobile homes and trailer homes in the county, 4,000 or more by best guess, and these along with new home construction could bring the total assessed valuation up another million dollars or more.

Approximate, not official or final, figures of 100 percent valuation of real estate in Lincoln County, by districts, plus location of property owners, are shown here:

The District valuations total \$88,547,009, divided by three brings it down to \$29,515,699, the figure used for tax assessment. Add to this the value of corporate land in the county of \$13,924,073 (one-third of total valuation), plus personal property figure of \$1,479,133 and you arrive at a grand total of \$44,918,905.

Lincoln County assessed valuation in 1971 was \$27,450,195; in 1972 it was \$30,373,187.

The appraiser estimate that there are some 75,000 individual parcels of land in Lincoln County, plus 15 to 25 of unknown ownership. This unknown factor stems from no deed being on record, or other recorded instrument that might show ownership. In counties such as Mora this unknown factor will run as high as 40 percent of total property.

A job the new county commissioners will face at coming meetings will be that of keeping the re-appraisal job going to keep up with new additions, new building, new mobile homes, and new personal property in the county.

## Good chance for action on State 14

Town and county officials from Torrance, Socorro and Lincoln Counties were present at the special meeting called by Lincoln County Commissioners Monday in the courthouse to discuss possible realignment and improvement of State Road 14 (formerly 10) which now forks off northwest from US54 about 16 miles north of Carrizozo and goes to Gran Quivira and on to Mountainair.

Road 14 is in bad shape now, barely passable with all the ruts and snow that has fallen in the area. Comments at the meeting indicated that this road was never in real good condition for the past 30 years.

The point of discussion which took most time was best alignment of the road, which also took in necessity of fencing, possible livestock passes under the road, cost of right-of-way and cost of fencing.

State highway men at the meeting, Charles A. Sayre, Bill Garner, James A. Bird, Jim Gerhart and Bob Harcrow, made two points clear: 1) That this project would have to be done as economical as possible and still would cost \$500,000 or more, 2) that the Highway Department was not in the business of putting up fence, though it would furnish the materials.

You can look at the drawing accompanying this news story and see the present route and the proposed realignment that was generally agreed on - all of this information considered to be "in the talking stage."

State Road 14 would serve a lot more ranchers if it were to head south down the Socorro-Lincoln County line, and come into US54 at the Gallacher-Shafer ranch road entrance but this route would necessitate 8-12 miles or more of new road and the state does not figure to spend

that kind of money.

Alternate routes that were presented and discussed at the meeting would cut east three miles north of the present route hitting US54 a half mile south of Ancho turnoff, another would follow a straight line from the Socorro-Lincoln County line and connect US54 a mile north of Harkey turnoff. One other possible alternate would stay north of present route for five miles then dip south to US54.

For reasons of right-of-way, canyons, and new construction, none of these proposed routes found favor. Land owners in the area include BLM, Jackson, State, Hightower, Knight.

J.A. Hightower would go either of two ways, he give the right-of-way and state do the fencing, or state buy the right-of-way and he'd do the fencing. He was not interested in a fence construction job. Hightower said that he had Angus cows and they don't survive on blacktop road without fences. He also wants his land along the Ancho road fenced.

The state is willing to provide fencing material for this new road, would only put his name on the list for materials for the Ancho road.

Commissioner Holt Lovelace presided at the meeting, this road being in his district. Commissioner Don Stark also in attendance.

The corner where 14 heads north is on Jackson land and some 400 feet of land will be used to make a 60 MPH turn, extending quarter mile each way.

Tom Knight, also speaking for Sally Jackson, asked that the present Road 14 be abandoned should the proposed route be adopted.

State road people were not sure that right-of-way had ever been acquired for the present road, now 60-feet. The state will want 100 feet of right-of-way for the new road.

Towards the end of the meeting it became apparent that doing a fence construction job on 9-10 miles at labor costs of \$300 per mile was the hangup. About this time Howard Abercrombie polled three of the government units present with suggestion that Lincoln County pay half and the towns of Carrizozo and Mountainair each a quarter of the labor cost of fencing. Mayor Johnson Stearns said that his town had just finished running water lines for the Park Service, they ought to be able to do some fencing for the state. The Mountainair people committed their town. Lincoln commissioners were not speaking loud but they went along and that was the way the deal was worked out.

The state will make the survey, get the easements with expectation that this project will be presented to State Highway Commission at its January meeting in Santa Fe.

J. H. Fuller of Mountainair stated that people in his town had been fighting for this road improvement for 15 years. He thought it would be of great benefit to both Carrizozo and Mountainair.

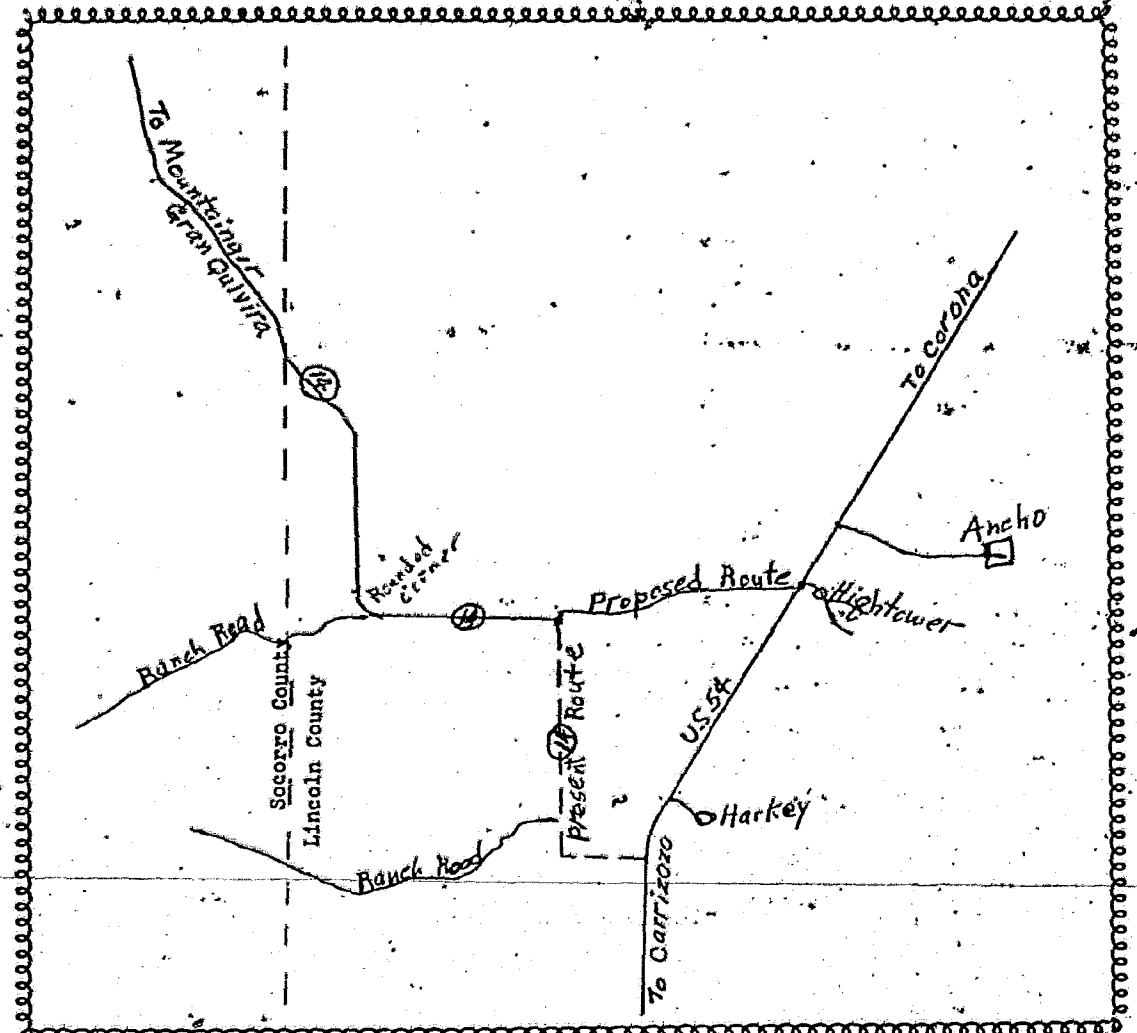
Socorro County Commissioner Clark H. Monette said this was the first time he'd been exposed to this problem, and knew nothing about it prior to this meeting. If the present improvement project goes through, there will be 21 miles of dirt-gravel left, six right on the Socorro-Torrance County line, and 15 more in Torrance County.

Two canyon crossings will be needed and the state will probably use three large pipes with dip in road for overflow at the Largo and Short Canyon points. The type of road work will be single penetration, which is the most economical.

## Hunters run school route

The Valeriano family lives 1.2 miles north of US380 west of Carrizozo 18 miles. The father operates a feeder school bus route and usually drives his two girls Sandra and Verónica, one in kindergarten and the other in 3rd grade, to the highway where the school bus takes them on to Carrizozo.

None of the family spoke English when they moved here, the two girls did not start at the beginning of the term, and have been in school two months, and now know some English.

Wednesday morning for some reason the girls walked to the highway, apparently not in time to meet the bus and should have turned around and walked back home but they didn't. A pair of hunters came by at 9:20 a.m. and brought them on to school.

The school bus did stop, running about five minutes late, at the Valeriano point and also 100 yards down the road and picked up the McKinley children who had been driven to the highway by one of their parents.

A problem for all bus drivers is whether or not youngsters are going to school that day. The routine is to wait a few minutes, no youngsters showing up the bus drives on to keep its schedule.

Window clerks at the local Post Office advise that they have been receiving numerous queries about insured mail. Insurance may be obtained against loss or damage of your gift parcels at nominal cost.

Here's a good tip when insuring Christmas parcels: don't overinsure. If you take out the maximum insurance on a gift parcel worth only a few dollars, for example, you can be reimbursed only for the actual value of the gift if it is lost or badly damaged in the mails. Remember, too, that good packaging and correct addressing with ZIP Codes helps provide additional assurance of on-time, safe delivery.

## Gnat wins scholarship

A New Mexico rancher's son who raises sheep, spins and weaves the wool and even makes his own looms and spinning wheels, has won a \$700 scholarship in the 4-H sheep program.

Mel Gnatkowski, 16, Ancho, is one of six national winners announced at the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago, Nov. 26-30.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. A.W. Gnatkowski and a high school junior, he began his sheep project seven years ago with five fat lambs. But he found he didn't like to give up his lambs at market time so switched to breeding sheep instead. Three years ago Gnatkowski borrowed \$1,500 and

bought 70 head of registered Columbia sheep. At the end of one year he had paid off the debt, added 20 ewes and three rams and put \$600 in the bank.

As the price of wool sank over the next year, Gnatkowski's mother got an idea: Why not promote wool throughout the area by giving spinning and weaving demonstrations? The youth and his mother cleaned and repaired the family's old heirloom spinning wheel and began to take lessons. Gnatkowski, who is handy with tools, learned to make looms and spinning wheels as well as operate them. Together with both parents, he formed the nucleus of a group which now travels the state giving demonstrations and exhibits.

One of Gnatkowski's homemade looms cuts the time required for threading the loom from one day to about one hour. He thinks the idea is original and is considering applying for a patent.

The young sheep-herder likes to experiment with textile products and recently created a new black and white yarn spun from a combination of wool and cow's hair.


Gnatkowski now has a small business in which he repairs spinning wheels and makes and sells spindles and shuttles of walnut and algeria, a local exotic wood. His first spinning wheel won him \$200 in a national woodworking contest.

The national winner plans to study textiles in college and perhaps start a weaving school.

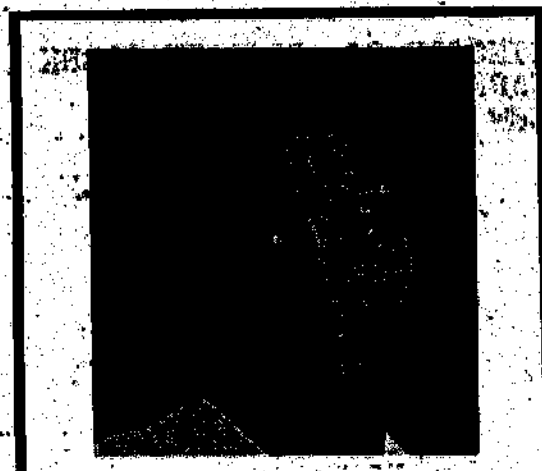
Helen Nalda demonstrated the Christmas angel decoration made from magazines which



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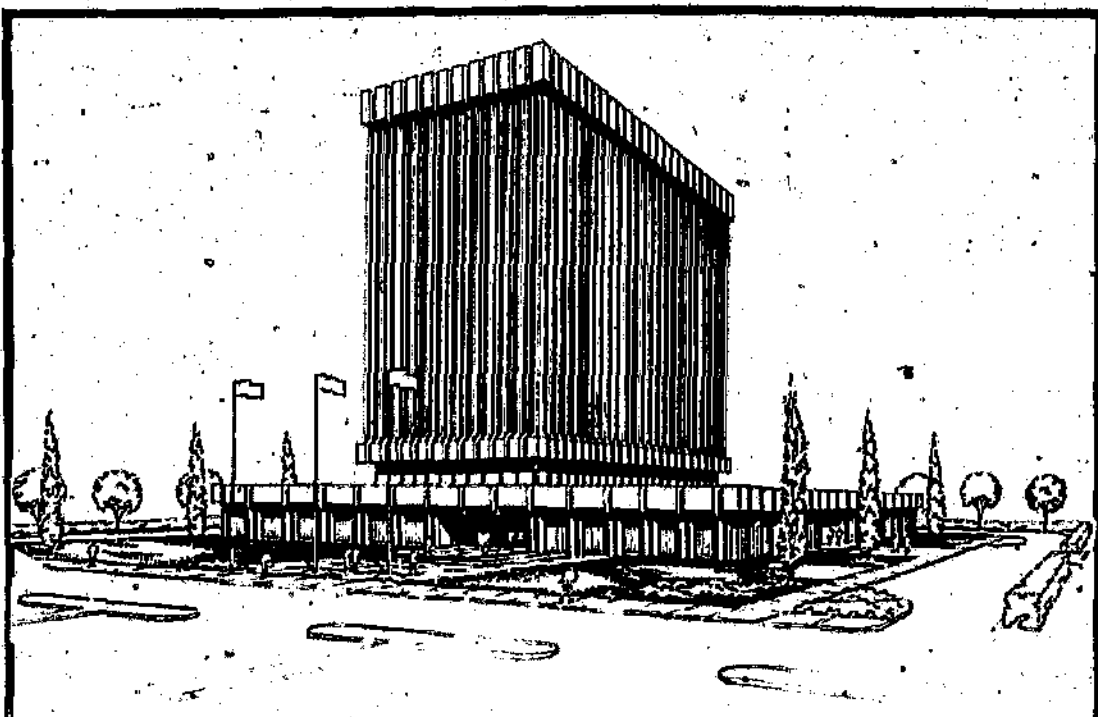
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## ABC complex holds topping out ceremony
