## Report by Senator Conway

The second session of the 30th Legislature will convene at high noon on Tuesday, January 18, 1972. There has been much speculation about what will be contained in the Governor's message, and as to what matters, other than finance, the Legislature will consider; this Session, I am sure that there will be some environmental legislation introduced, and probably a sub-division bill. I know that sub-division regulations are of considerable interest to the people in Lincoln County, and I will try to keep you informed of the progress at this Session. At the last Session a reapportionment bill was passed which has since been declared unconstitutional by the District Court in Santa Fe. A special committee of twelve members of the House and Senate has been considering a new reapportionment bill. I was fortunate enough to be appointed to this committee, and a bill to the Senate, and two bills to the House have been drafted. These bills were drafted by the Legislative Council, which has access to the population figures of each of the precincts.

## Assessor doing tax business

Marion Schlarb, Lincoln County assessor, is making the rounds of Lincoln County taking assessments, Nogal, Capitan and Corona completed. She will be at the Lincoln-Museum-Friday, January 21, at Bowser's Store in Picacho January 25, Elma's Store in Tinnie January 27.

It's a matter of statutory requirement that all property owners must appear before the assessor during January or February each year to declare their property for taxation.

The Lincoln County assessor started January 12 going to various points in the county for the business of taking assessments and completes this work February 25 at Ruidoso.

Mrs. Schlarb suggests that people who have made new purchases of property be sure to bring description when they come to render real and personal property.

Veterans having certificates of exemption must present them when declaring property, to take advantage of the exemption.

Lists of players for the North-South All-Star football game to be played the first week of August in Albuquerque were released last week. Willie Gallegos of Carrizozo, the leading scorer with 184 points for all teams in the state in 1971, was selected to play on the all-star team.

Ernestine Germany has the distinction of buying the last Chevrolet from City Garage.

This business was started back in the days when roads were graveled, or dirt, the railroad was a youngster in these parts, and cars and trucks were a lot different than now.

Buster Smoot, 12 years old when he first started work at the City Garage, and working as call-boy for the railroad at the same time. He was their first call-boy according to Mrs. Reil. The Smoot family has recently moved to the T-75 Ranch north of Arabella and have stock in the corporation that owns the ranch. Buster has shifted from selling cars to mending fence and milking a cow.

The present City Garage building was constructed some 21-22 years ago. Mrs. Reil got the idea for a new home about the same time and the land was cleared of junk cars by Sonny Smoot, Tony Luera and Ignacio also helped clear the ground and Reil's new home was finished about the same time as the garage.

A great many people around south-central New Mexico have known Dutch Reil as an honest dealer, and will be sorry to learn that he has finally had to close the doors on his garage.

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

## LINCOLN COUNTY PROPERTY OWNERS

Lincoln County property owners are being reminded again that January and February are the months set aside by State Law for the rendering of real & personal property for taxes.

Head of the family is entitled to \$200 exemption, but must be claimed each year. New Mexico Veterans with a Certificate of Eligibility are entitled to \$2,000 exemption. Certificate must be presented and proper endorsement made on the certificate, or on exemption can be allowed.



### Fruit growers meet at Hondo

Do you want to cut your spray bill in half? Attend the Fruit Grower Meeting at 7:30 p.m. on January 26th at the Hondo School and find out how Colorado growers have been able to control the codling moth with two sprays. The use of the new sex lure trap for timing codling moth sprays will be explained at the meeting. To obtain control, everyone must cooperate. Bring your neighbors so they too can understand how this works.

**R-R-D**  
Survey forms are being sent to a selected group of farmers and ranchers by the Census Bureau. They ask that these forms be filled out and returned so that they can get a more complete picture of agriculture. The "type of farm" survey report will help get a true estimate of specialization in farming.

**R-R-D**  
Rose lovers who don't like to spray for mildew should consider planting resistant varieties. Resistant climbing varieties include Summer Snow, Blaze, Paul's Scarlet, Bonfire, Cecile Brunner, Red Radiance, Golden Emblem, American Beauty, and Santa Anita. Resistant bush roses include Buccaneer, Capistrano, Comanche, Golden Slippers, Montezuma, Saratoga, Spartan, and Tropicana.

Powdery mildew is the most common disease of roses in New Mexico. This fungus disease appears as gray moldy or powdery patches on leaves, stems, and buds. The fungus is spread by wind-borne spores. Mildew resistant varieties should definitely be planted in areas of the garden where the disease is likely to become severe. Most gardeners recognize that this disease is most troublesome in areas that are partially shaded and where plants are crowded. Disease development is also favored by warm days and cool nights.

# Legal Notice

## LINCOLN COUNTY HISTORIC DISTRICT ORDINANCE

### SECTION 1.0 PURPOSE

The purpose of this ordinance is to promote and protect the public welfare of Lincoln County, New Mexico, by preserving buildings which have historic significance, and by developing an appropriate setting for these buildings within the historic district hereby created, or any such district or historic property which may be designated for preservation hereafter, and within such districts to regulate or restrict the erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair or use of buildings, structures or land; to provide for the administration and interpretation of said regulations, to provide for appeals, to provide for amendments; to prescribe for penalties for the violations of its provisions, and to provide for its enforcement.

### SECTION 2.0 CREATION OF HISTORIC DISTRICTS

There is hereby created in and around the Town of Lincoln a historic district to be known as Historic District No. 1 and is as follows:

#### Area "A"

Area "A" shall consist of the main part of Lincoln with the East Boundary of the cemetery being the East Boundary, the Peppin Estate being the West Boundary, the Lincoln National Forest being the North Boundary and the Lincoln Ditch right-of-way being the South Boundary.

#### Area "B"

Area "B" shall consist of all the land, excluding the area described above, from U. S. Highway 380 bridge crossing the Bonito River on the east to the Fort Stanton Boundary line on the west with the north and south boundaries to be one-half mile either side of the median line of U. S. Highway 380.

There is hereby created in and around the Town of White Oaks a historic district to be known as Historic District No. 2 and shall consist of as follows:

The area within a one and one-half mile radius of the Hoyle House in White Oaks.

After excluding the areas above, the rest of Lincoln County, New Mexico, shall constitute District No. 3.

### SECTION 3.0 REGULATIONS FOR DISTRICTS

#### Historic District No. 1

Area "A". The following requirements do not affect houses and buildings already in existence except as herein specifically noted.

1. All exterior construction shall be of adobe, appearance of adobe, plastered, stuccoed, rock or of wood construction, with the architectural style being that of the frontier period or territorial period which has been in existence in this area for the past seventy five years.

2. Doors and windows of wood construction shall be encouraged, however, metal doors and windows shall be permitted. If metal windows are used and are visible from the exterior than in that event the windows must be framed in wood.

3. All trailers and/or mobile homes with the exception of those already established in this area (Area "A") shall be excluded and prohibited from Area "A".

4. All proposed exterior construction, reconstruction and destruction shall be submitted to the Lincoln Historic Review Board, which shall act on such submission, and make such recommendations to the Lincoln County Planning Commission for action.

5. There shall be no new businesses or commercial ventures within Area "A" unless first submitted to the Lincoln Historic Review Board for approval or disapproval prior to their establishment.

6. Signs shall be limited to those painted on walls or small hanging signs no larger than twenty-four square feet. Signs shall not be illuminated with flashing, oscillating or neon lights. The materials used in making signs must be approved by the Lincoln Historic Review Board in advance of their use.

7. All junk cars, trash or junk shall be removed and disposed of at cost to the violator, fourteen days after written notice requesting such removal by the Historic Review Board.

Area "B". The same regulations and restrictions shall apply in Area "B" as apply in Area "A" except that trailers and/or mobile homes shall be permitted and new businesses shall be permitted except those business such as junk yards, wrecking yards, odious or noisy nature shall not be allowed.

### SECTION 4.0 ADMINISTRATION

#### A. Planning Commission.

##### 1. Establishment and Organization.

The Planning Commission is hereby established and consists of five members, appointed by the Lincoln County Commissioners. Upon the effective date of this ordinance, two members shall be appointed for a term of one year, two members shall be appointed for a term of two years, and one member appointed for a term of three years. There shall be one member appointed from the Town of Lincoln, and one member from the Town of White Oaks, with the remainder of the commission from the rest of the County. Upon the expiration of such terms, appointments shall be made for a term of three years. Vacancies shall be filled by appointment by the Lincoln County Commissioners for the unexpired term only. Members of the Planning Commission may nominate persons to fill a vacancy, and if it does, it must submit to the governing body at least two names for each vacancy. A member of the Planning Commission may be removed by the affirmative action of two members of the County Commission, after being given a written notice of charges against him, and a hearing which shall be a public hearing if he so desires. Members of the Planning Commission shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties.

#### 2. Powers and Duties.

The Planning Commission shall prepare ordinances and amendments thereto, for the County, hold public hearings on the ordinances or any amendments and make written recommendations concerning adopting of the ordinances to the governing body. The Planning Commission shall prepare no ordinance or amendments nor make any recommendations without first consulting the respective Historic Review Board when the proposed ordinance, amendment or recommendations shall affect Lincoln or White Oaks at least thirty (30) days in advance of the submission to the governing body.

#### B. Historic Review Boards.

##### 1. Establishment and Organization.

There shall be a Historic Review Board for each of the Towns of Lincoln and White Oaks. Each Board shall consist of five (5) members. Four members of each Board shall be elected by the adult real property owners and/or residents of the respective communities. (The geographic area for voting purposes is defined in the first part of this ordinance) The fifth member of each Board shall be appointed by the Lincoln County Commissioners. The terms of the members shall be two members for one year, two members for two years and the Commissioner's appointee for two years. Upon expiration of these terms each elected member shall be elected for a two year term. In case of a vacancy of any elected member's seat on the Board, the Board shall call a public meeting within ninety (90) days for the purpose of holding an election to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term. All elections shall be at public meeting duly advertised for the particular purpose at least ten (10) days in advance of the meeting. All nominations for Board members shall be made from the floor by a qualified voter.

##### 2. Powers and Duties.

The Historic Review Boards for Lincoln and White Oaks shall make recommendations to the Planning Commission concerning their respective communities, and may make recommendations directly to the governing body, if the Planning Commission fails to take action on recommendations made.

The respective Boards shall act as a liaison between the people and the Planning Commission. The respective Historic Review Boards shall have public meetings as the need arises, but in any event, shall meet at least twice yearly, once every six months. An effort shall be made by Board members to encourage members of the public to attend said meetings. A meeting can be called by any two members of each Board. Any ten adult residents of the community may petition for a meeting of the Board.

#### C. Meetings.

Business of the Planning Commission shall be transacted at a fixed date, time and place as established by law, or at special meetings called by the chairman of the Commission, and conducted in a manner of the regular meetings, provided at least ten (10) days advanced public notice of such meeting is given in a newspaper of general circulation in the County of Lincoln, and the purpose of such special meeting is stated therein.

#### D. Amendments.

The Planning Commission shall accept applications for amendments to the text of this ordinance, hold public hearings, evaluate and make recommendations to the governing body on all proposed amendments to the ordinance. The following listed items shall constitute amendments to the text of this ordinance: 1. District Changes 2. Conditional Uses 3. Administrative Review.

E. Procedure. The following shall be the procedure for making proposals to the Planning Commission: 1. Initiation Petitions to amend this ordinance may be initiated by the Board of County Commissioners, the Planning Commission, the Historic Review Boards, a County Administrative Officer, or a Real Property Owner in the area to be included in the proposed amendment.

2. Any application for change in the text of this ordinance shall be in writing, and filed in duplicate with the County Clerk at least fourteen days prior to its appearance on the agenda and setting of the date of the public hearing. Each application shall be accompanied by an accurate plot plan, site plan, building plan, sketch or related material and information as required by the Planning Commission, or by this ordinance. The application shall be signed by a real property owner in the area included in the application unless initiated by the governing body, the Planning Commission or the Historic Review Boards. If additional real property is included other than that owned by the applicant, a petition in favor of amendment signed by real property owners representing seventy-five per cent of the land owners included in the application shall accompany the application. Submission of inaccurate material or information with the application shall be grounds for denial. Approval of any application shall not be construed as approval of a building permit. Following the date established for a public hearing on any proposed amendment, the Planning Commission may refuse to accept another application for the same amendment for a period of one year. (Any and all building permits or change in use of a particular area or building within Area "A" shall first be submitted to the Historic Review Board).

F. Public Hearings. The Planning Commission shall hold at least one public hearing in relation to the proposed amendment at which parties in interest and citizens shall have the opportunity to be heard. Public notice of the date, time and place of the hearing along with the nature of the amendment requested shall be given in a newspaper of general circulation in the County at least fifteen days prior to such public hearing. The Planning Commission shall keep minutes of its proceedings, including a record of the vote of each member on each amendment, and the minutes shall be public record.

G. Notification and Recording. A written report of the recommendation of the Planning Commission on all applications for amendment to the ordinance shall be made within thirty days from the date of the public hearing and forward to the governing body and appropriate County administrators, and to all parties who formally request a copy. The recommendation shall be either for approval, for conditional approval, or for disapproval, and the

report shall contain a brief summary of the reasoning behind the recommendation and any conditions for approval. In the event special conditions are imposed in connection with any approval amendment, the County Clerk must have the special conditions recorded in the County Clerk's Office before a building permit may be issued, the recorded notice being for the purpose of giving notice to a subsequent purchaser of the property that special conditions have been granted and imposed. Upon failure of the Planning Commission to make a determination within the specified time limit of thirty days, it shall lose jurisdiction and the applicant may appeal to the governing body as herein provided.

H. Appeals. Any action of the Planning Commission so authorized by this ordinance shall be final unless written notice of appeal to the governing body is filed within fifteen days after mailing to the applicant of written notification of the decision of the Planning Commission. No permit, license, or certificate of land use shall be issued until the time for filing an appeal has expired or until an appeal has been heard and decided. The written notice of appeal shall be filed in duplicate with the County Clerk, and shall set forth specifically wherein the Planning Commission erred in its decision. Upon receipt of an appeal, the governing body shall refer one copy of the appeal to the Planning Commission, and thereon the commission shall make an additional report to the governing body of the minutes of the public hearing that concerned the action for the amendment which has been appealed. The County Clerk shall mail written notice of the time, place and date for the hearing of the Commission, and to all parties who formally appeared and protested the application before the commission. Public notice of appeal shall be given in the manner prescribed. Appeals shall be presented to the governing body at their next regular meeting following the filing of the appeal with the County, at which time a date for the public hearing before the governing body shall be determined. The concurring vote of a majority of a quorum of all members of the governing body shall be required to overrule a decision of the Planning Commission.

I. Violations. Violation of any condition imposed by the Planning Commission in approving an application shall constitute a violation of this ordinance and shall be subject to the same penalties as any other violation of this ordinance. Any condition imposed by the Planning Commission shall become effective and shall be strictly complied with immediately upon execution or utilization of any portion of the rights and privileges authorized by approval of an application.

J. Enforcement. Enforcement of this ordinance shall be by prosecution in the District Court of the County. Penalties for violation of this ordinance shall not exceed a fine of three hundred dollars or imprisonment for ninety days or both. The District Attorney and Sheriff shall enforce this ordinance.

K. Certificate of Occupancy and/or Building Permits.

No building, or addition thereof constructed after the effective date of this ordinance and no addition to a previously existing building shall be occupied and no vacant land on the effective date of this ordinance, shall be excavated or used for any purpose, until a certificate of occupancy or building permit has been issued by the County Clerk which states that the building or premises complies with the provisions of this ordinance.

#### L. Records.

The County Clerk shall function as, or appoint or hire an administrative officer subject to the approval of the Planning Commission.

The administrative officer's duties shall be: 1. Maintain permanent and correct records of this ordinance, including, but not limited to all maps, amendments, and conditional use permits, variances, and appeals. 2. Provide and maintain a public information bureau relative to all matters arising out of this ordinance.

3. Issue all certificates as required, and make and maintain records thereof. 4. Be responsible for the publishing and mailing such notices as required by this ordinance for the public hearings. 5. Institute any appropriate action or proceedings, in the event any buildings or structures are erected, constructed, reconstructed, altered, repaired, converted, relocated, or maintained, or any building structure, or land is used in violation of this ordinance and to prevent such unlawful action, to restrain, correct, or abate such violation, to prevent the occupation of such buildings, structures, or land or to prevent any illegal act, conduct, business or use on or about such premises.

M. Severability. The provisions of this regulations are severable and if any provision sentence, clause, section or part thereof shall be held to be illegal, invalid, unconstitutional or inapplicable to any person or circumstance, such illegality, invalidity, unconstitutionality or inapplicability shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions, sentences, clauses, sections or parts of these regulations or their application to other persons or circumstances. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that these regulations would have been adopted if such illegal, invalid, unconstitutional or inapplicable provisions, sentence, clause, section or part had been included therein and if the person or circumstances to which these regulations or any part thereof is inapplicable had been specifically exempted therefrom.

Other ordinances or regulations in direct conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

#### N. Existing Conditions.

Conditions existing prior to enactment of this ordinance will be allowed, subject to regulations regarding alteration, destruction, major repair, reconstruction, as listed in this ordinance. Published in the Lincoln County News Thursday, January 20, 1972.

One of the first jobs Jones performed on his arrival in Lincoln County in 1940, after graduation from law school at the University of Oklahoma, was to assist in clearing up titles for land that is now the White Sands Missile Range.

He was gone for a time serving in World War II, then returned to take up the practice of law which he followed until his illness took him away from his business. The Jones office has been kept open by his two secretaries, Dolly Lueras and Dorothy Boyce. They are now in the process of closing out his legal business and Mrs. Boyce continues to do tax work at the office.

Elfred was a sure-fire individualist. He had his own way about things, which was surely an honest way and more often than not the right way. During his many years here he helped a great many people, not only with free legal advice but with money, and was particularly generous to young people.

He was a life-long Republican, and in recent years about the only active party man in Carrizozo. Elfred served as county chairman years ago and had continued his interest in politics, particularly Republican politics, right up to his death.

An incident can now be told about his genuine interest in political affairs. Two years ago a Democratic candidate filed for the office of county treasurer, leaving only about 30 minutes until the filing deadline. Elfred learned of this action within minutes and was on the phone calling. He did secure a candidate, put up the filing fee out of his pocket, and the Republican was elected.

Elfred was a regular at meetings of Carrizozo Town Council and guided this town down an honest legal path. He had patience no end, the smallest detail would get attention with Elfred on the job. He was first appointed as town attorney 14 years ago by Mayor Wayne Withers and served to his death.

The Jones residence, back of his office, is a clutter of books on every possible subject including a great many books of recipes. In addition to this collection he bought music records, practically every month, quite a few he never got around to hearing.

Of more importance, and much greater value, was his penchant for acquiring Lincoln County property. Elfred has been known as the Mayor of Oscura, because he owned a great many town lots of this (now) ghost town. His holdings in White Oaks were of greater value, same in Nogal, the Hondo Valley, and the choicest of all was his purchase, in partnership with Edward and Ruth Penfield, of the Parsons Hotel and mineral properties.

This last acquisition never made him any money, fact is they spent a lot remodeling the property, but it remains one of the best pieces of real estate in the county, high in the mountains, with wild game of all kinds right outside.

A few years back a small music group was called together to perform at a style show at the country club. This group included Elfred Jones, Buster Smoot, Jack Turner, Arnold Boyce, Bartley McDonough and Paul Payton. When he felt like it, Elfred was the "show stopper" at performances of the Malpais Harmonizers. Only a turn of fate kept him from following a stage career. He played in the Arkansas University symphony orchestra while in college and never lost his love for music.

The remaining Harmonizers played "Sentimental Journey, Alley Cat, Basin Street Blues, and Closer Walk With Thee" at funeral service for Elfred held in United Trinity Methodist Church Tuesday.

H. Elfred Jones was born June 14, 1904 in Independence County, Arkansas. He died January 14 at 10:30 p.m. Funeral services were conducted by Chapel of Roses Mortuary in Carrizozo.

Pall bearers were Johnson Stearns, Leandro Vega, Jr., Jete Voss, Vernon Petty, Bunny Osorio and Edward Penfield. Members of Lincoln and Otero County Bar Associations were honorary bearers. Chaplain Alfred S. Kline conducted the service.

He is survived by his sister, Audrey Langfitt of Lubbock, and one brother Preston B. Jones of Denver.

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friend. Sorry we don't have more friends of that kind.
