Tuesday deadline for town office

Town and village elections in New Mexico will be held March 7, 1972. In most instances there will be three officials to elect, a mayor and two councilmen.

In Carrizozo the terms of Mayor Johnson Stearns and Councilmen Duff May and Joe Ortiz will expire. In Capitán the terms of Mayor Valton Hall, Councilmen Jay Johnston and Bill Randle are up. At Corona the terms of Mayor Tom Huey and Councilmen Earl Roper and Kennan Fuller are up.

Books for registering to vote at the regular municipal election closed January 25.

Declarations for candidacy must be filed by 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 1. The town office in Carrizozo will be open from 8 to 5 and through the noon hour on the filing day, February 1 for the convenience of possible candidates.

Historic district ordinance hearing Friday

A public hearing will be conducted by Lincoln County commissioners Friday, January 28, starting at 1:00 p.m. in the commission room in Carrizozo on the proposed Lincoln County Historic District Ordinance.

The complete text of this ordinance was published in the News last week. The purpose of the ordinance is to promote and protect the public welfare of Lincoln County by preserving buildings which have historic significance and by developing an appropriate setting for these buildings.

The county would be divided into three districts: No. 1 being the Town of Lincoln, No. 2 White Oaks, and No. 3 the rest of Lincoln County.

In District 1, the area of greatest concern, requirements of the ordinance do not affect houses and buildings already in existence for most part.

Seven regulations will become law. 1) Exterior construction of adobe, or appearance of adobe, etc. 2) Wood doors and windows encouraged. 3) Trailers and mobile homes excluded. 4) Exterior construction etc. shall be submitted to the review board. 5) No new businesses unless first submitted to review board for approval or disapproval. 6) Signs limited in size and placement. 7) Junk cars, trash or junk shall be removed.

In District 2 the same regulations and restrictions shall apply as in District 1 except that trailer and-or mobile homes shall be permitted and also new businesses with some exceptions.

The administration of this ordinance shall be under the direction of a planning commission which would be established, consisting of five members appointed by the county commissioners, under authority of the ordinance.

The planning commission should prepare ordinance and amendments thereto, for the county, hold public hearings etc. There shall be historic review board for each of the towns of Lincoln and White Oaks, each board consisting of five members. These boards will be elected by property owners and-or residents of the respective communities.

This ordinance, effects only Lincoln as presently written. There will be no historic review board for District 3, the rest of the county which includes Carrizozo, Capitán, Ancho, Nogal and other points.

There will be people at the hearing Friday who can answer questions you may have and the commissioners will be pleased to hear public opinion at this time.

REPORT FROM... Senator Conway

The Second Session of the Thirtieth Legislature opened at high noon on Tuesday, January 18th. The initial Senate Session began with the formalities of opening the Senate, the election of the officials for this Session, the swearing-in of one new member, and all of the Senators signing the record. We then adjourned for a joint meeting with the House to hear Governor King's message on his legislative proposals for this Session.

Basically the Governor's message did not contain a great deal that had not been in the newspapers. I was surprised that he did not mention some areas of legislation that he had previously indicated would be introduced this Session, but I assume these would come down on a special Governor's message. During the thirty-day session, the Legislature can only consider financial matters, including taxation, matters that come down from the Governor's office in a Governor's message, and bills that were vetoed in the last session.

Friday the Governor sent down his message on the proposed land subdivision act. In his message he directed the Legislature to consider the water aspects of land subdivision and a few other areas. In the message it says that these are the only areas we are to consider, and as the bill had already been prepared, it was introduced on Friday. This bill has stimulated a great deal of interest and I will keep you advised of its progress.

I introduced a constitutional amendment this week along with Senator McBride of Albuquerque, to reduce the number of jurors in both civil and criminal cases from twelve to six. This was a recommendation of the New Mexico Judicial Council, of which both Representative Hobson and I are members. The bill provides that the Legislature can establish that a decision of four jurors in a civil case is all that is required for a decision, and five jurors in a criminal case. The Federal Courts at this time have gone to six-member juries in civil cases, but still retain twelve-member juries in criminal cases. I anticipate that there will be a great deal of opposition to this bill from attorneys, but I don't see anything magical in twelve rather than six. The savings to the State both in jury fees and of the time required by the jurors will be substantial. It is a constitutional amendment so if it passes both Houses, and the Governor signs it, it would then be voted on by all of the people in November.

A bill last year which was of considerable interest was again introduced this year in a different form. This is a bill for the taxation of mobile homes. The bill was introduced by Senator Rogers of Los Alamos for the Tax Study Committee. I have sent copies of this bill to several local mobile home park owners and hopefully they will make it available. The bill, in its present form, provides an annual registration of \$5.00 and then the mobile home would be assessed by the County Assessor in accordance with the regulations promulgated by the property appraisal department. I plan on attending the hearings in the Senate Finance Committee on this bill and will be reporting back next week on its progress.

At this time it doesn't look as if we will have a Saturday Session before February 5th, and I will be home on the weekends to discuss legislation. The mouse hunters set up shop on a N.M. ranch

From Green Bay, Wisconsin, Press Gazette. Carrizozo, N. M. - Why would two respected men risk their lives hunting black mice in the dark of night?

"We thought they'd lost their marbles," Mrs. Bob Shafer, wife of the co-owner of Shafer-Gallacher ranches near Carrizozo, N. M. volunteered.

It was 10 years ago that Mrs. Shafer and her husband spotted a light moving slowly through their vast 150,000 acre ranch. Rustlers immediately came to mind, and Shafer grabbed his gun, heading out to investigate.

"I became quite worried when he didn't return for what seemed like an endless amount of time," said Mrs. Shafer.

But eventually her husband returned with a smile, explaining that a couple of loonies were out chasing rats on the ranch.

The "loonies" in question were two University of Wisconsin zoologists who, without regard for their personal safety, were attempting to further man's endless quest for data about the mouse.

From this hazardous and tenuous beginning, a long and fruitful relationship between the UW zoology department and the Shafer-Gallacher ranches has developed.

The two daring zoologists explained their purpose, and for the past 10 years the UW department has used the ranch as a research station.

During the past two summers, Dr. Sue Reichert, a spider specialist, has camped on the ranch. Her research on the spider has brought her prominence, and the Bureau of Land Management has offered to help finance her studies.

Our stop was prompted by a desire to see Sue and her work. We had worked for her in Madison. But, as cold weather had hindered our progress across New Mexico, it also had prompted her return to Madison.

But the ranch and Carrizozo were interesting. Referring to Carrizozo, population 1,546, as a city bespeaks the size of New Mexico's population. Inhabited areas are well scattered and Carrizozo is large by state standards.

Those standards were made readily evident to two weary cyclists who traveled 115 miles west from Clovis, then 80 miles south to Carrizozo. The scarcity of people and a 30 mile an hour headwind made a water supply an essential.

We pedaled over six consecutive hours after leaving Clovis, but were able to amass only 40 miles, putting us over 20 miles short of Fort Sumner, the closest burg west of Clovis. The next day, with the wind still strong, we camped in the semi-ghost town of Yeso, halfway between Fort Sumner and Vaughn, our goal for the day.

We left Yeso with a welcome tailwind and camped about 50 miles short of Carrizozo near Corona, altitude 6,600 feet.

But our change in weather fortunes, brought about by easterly winds, were not to last. Dawn broke and we had to brush off a half inch of new snow.

The snow should not have been a surprise. New Mexico advertises itself as a land of high altitude, and altitude signs are given prominence - often at the expense of signs telling population figures.

New Mexico also bills itself as the Land of Enchantment. We thought it had sold us a bill of goods until we reached Carrizozo. There a change in weather warmed us on the outside and the Coffee Cup cafe warmed us on the inside.

We were introduced to the place when Shafer, driving into town for a meeting, took us along. He and his wife claimed the cafe served the best Mexican food in the country - KOR IN Mexico.

The chef had started on the restaurant trail by

Willis rides a rough road

Not too many people around Lincoln County know about the sport of motorcycle racing but it's a going thing on the east side of the state and in west Texas. Wesley Willis, who works at the Citizen State Bank, (soon going to Roswell with First National Bank) bought his first racing cycle last August and has moved up in the sport to become a winner in some big events.

Wesley and his wife, Nancy, both ride but there's just one racer in the family. Their weekends are taken up with trips in all directions, to El Paso, Alamogordo, Odessa, Clovis and to Albuquerque where Wes had his biggest win over 20 competitors.

He rides a 250 Husqvarna cycle made in Sweden, does all his own service work. Just last week he was busy putting in a new transmission. The race courses are rough, dirt tracks with lots of jumps and sharp turns. The distance will be anywhere from one mile to one and three-quarters, usually a four to five lap race. Speeds range up to 55 MPH on the straight-aways.

Wesley has been racing as an amateur but with four good wins under his seat he expects to move up to expert class soon. The Willis bike will be entered in the Permian Basin Motor X this Sunday, probably riding against 15 or more contestants.

The racers all line up in front of a surgical elastic cord which is pulled tight, engines ready to roar, then when cord is released - off they go. There have been lots of spills for Wes since starting in August. One of his worst came when a bike attempting to pass hooked his handle bars and they both went down. He says the good riders rarely spill and that he is heading that way.

The Willis family will be moving to Roswell at the end of this month.

WHITE OAKS HISTORICAL DISCUSSES BUILDING REPAIR



Indoor garden is interesting subject

The Carrizozo Woman's Club enjoyed an outstanding program at their regular meeting on Thursday, January 20, at the clubhouse. Introduced by program chairman Mrs. Paul Payton, the speaker was Mrs. Lawrence Hanway of Tularosa, better known to her many friends in Carrizozo as "Babe." The announced subject was "Indoor Gardening," but it wasn't long before the interested audience had her answering questions from all over. The substance of Mrs. Hanway's talk at the beginning was the preparation of soil, which she said was the big gardening first in New Mexico. Far better that, she said, than problems of extremely high or low humidity. She brought samples and discussed the use and mixing of such substances as perlite, peat moss, sphagnum moss, and such basic fertilizers, as those designed for the Southwest which contain iron, sulphur, magnesium, and phosphoric acid. These substances, in various combinations, make appropriate soil for different plants. It was at this time that the questions came pouring in. Some well-informed "Ghost Writer"

ought to follow Mrs. Hanway around for weeks with a tape recorder, and put her "green thumb tricks for the southwest" into book form. I regret that space allows only a few of these words of wisdom. Such as, that our volcanic cinder from the Malpais is the best soil conditioner you can find; that if you water first thing in the morning (in this area, that is), you will never have mildew; that any time after January 15th is the time to transplant, and that most natives, such as greasewood, yucca, etc., when dug up should be inverted for a month to allow the roots to heal before being planted; and that when planting a tree, the hole should be dug and then a hole augered through the caliche 18" to 20" and filled with volcanic cinders.

These are only a teaser for that hoped-for book. Mrs. Payton had quite a job shoeing members into the dining room to enjoy the delicious refreshments prepared by the hostesses, Mrs. Frank Lindsey, Mrs. Lewis Farris, and Mrs. George Maki, and served by Omy Lindsey.

The type and amount will vary greatly, so it's very important that you understand how to prune each plant on your property. To understand the proper pruning methods, you'll have to study, practice and observe. Study the plant, its growth habits and flowering characteristics. Practice removing stems and branches. Observe the effect of your pruning job on the shape, vigor, flowering, etc., of the plant. Proper pruning makes your plants look young, vigorous and beautiful for many years. Think of your plants in groups rather than individually. Group in your mind all plants having similar growing and flowering habits, or which have similar uses. Each group requires a special type of pruning. It is easier to remember the special pruning methods for particular groups of plants than for each individual plant.


