## Joining of town and county police suggested

Lincoln County commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace were at their job until 5:30 p.m. Monday with most of the business routine.

Holt Lovelace suggested to County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez and Mayor Johnson Stearns of Carrizozo that the job of law enforcement in Carrizozo could be placed under the control of the county with several advantages. The county now patrols Town of Carrizozo much of the time, is on call during hours when no law officer is on duty in town, takes care of prisoners, radio calls, and other chores for the town.

Major Stearns will take the matter up with the town council. If it were to be worked out, should save town some money, and an officer would be on radio call (in close area) at all times.

The road viewing party on Road 113 came in to report. Guck and Talley have no objection to one mile of this road, from cattle guard to LaMay property, being closed.

No decision on Road 91, also viewed by appointed party.



## Lincoln voting put through grinder

The new House reapportionment bill, signed into law by Gov. Bruce King with the emergency clause, is a Chinese puzzle according to Fred Buckles.

After you have checked the split you'll probably agree with Mr. Buckles.

Lincoln County is cut three ways, into Districts 50, 51, 52.

District 50 - includes 9 Lincoln County precincts as follows, (Buckles leaves Nogal out of his story)

1. Capitan
2. Nogal
- 11-13-14. Ruidoso
15. Ruidoso Downs
16. San Patricio
17. Hondo

Through in this same voting pot are all of Guadalupe County precincts, 5 Torrance County precincts and 1 precinct in DeBaca County. How two Representatives (Bigbee, R-Encino and Petty, D-Ruidoso) can effectively represent this conglomerate is hard to visualize.

District 51 - includes only the Angus precinct, No. 12, of Lincoln County. Angus has 84 registered voters, 42 Democratic, 37 Republican and 5 decline to state their affiliation. This small precinct is dropped in with 13 Otero County precincts of 13,787 population. If Angus ever sees, or has ever seen, Rep. Mershon, D-Clouderoff it would be classed as a flat-running miracle.

Mrs. Frank Vega, Sr. asked that Block A be vacated. She will have to check with the town board.

Holt Lovelace was appointed as member to the Executive Board of New Mexico Association of Counties.

The commissioners will meet April 3 as board of equalization. Their next regular meeting will be April 10.

## Zozo bands going to Capitan

An exchange of band concerts has been worked out, between Capitan music director Bartley McDonough and Carrizozo music director Arnold Boyce. On March 14 three Carrizozo bands will load in the school bus and go to Capitan for a concert at 10:00 a.m. in the school.

Making the trip will be the concert band of 35 members, the stage band of 13 members, and the jazz rock group of 5 members.

Then, comes graduation day, the horn or fiddle is put away, maybe handed down, but on that day-of-days the investment of time (by the student) and money (by the parents) becomes very much a loss because the pattern of the past is that the kid will never play again, with only minor exceptions.

Like we said, times are a changing and music director Arnold Boyce in Carrizozo is going right along with good results for a lot of youngsters and parents.

What is going on now comes in the form of stage bands, rock bands, and other small "pickup" groups who get together and play for fun, play for dances, play for entertainment of fellow students and they are playing a kind of music that has a place in the community after school is out, or has a place in college should the student go.

It makes money spent on music instruments a lot more worthwhile. Playing a music instrument becomes "the thing to do" because it's fun, recreation, my thing, or whatever.

High school students, back 40-50 years have wanted to play "jazz" music, or whatever the popular kind of the day happened to be. It was as easy as the band and orchestra tunes usually performed by school groups. Takes a more controlled tone, sharp sense of rhythm, good group playing, and only in recent years has this kind of music successfully crept into school world.

Like the heading says music gets sweeter all the time in Carrizozo.

## Zozo Seniors Busy, Busy!


Got a trip to make to El Paso, sights to see, all takes money so Carrizozo seniors are out hustling.

A clipping about "Inflation? Look at 1865" came our way. Pair of child's shoes \$50, 10 yards calico \$130, hat \$100, quire of paper \$10, pair of boots \$150 and prices were climbing higher and higher daily. The date was March 12, 1865 during the Confederacy's waning days and the indication of what inflation was like is contained in a letter written from Grenada, Miss., by a man who apparently served as scout and buyer for several central Mississippi families.
