### Contest opens Friday: more solicitors needed

A few more workers are still needed in the big subscription contest being kicked off Thursday by The Lincoln County News.

A total of \$1,200 in prizes will be awarded at the contest's close.

Contest manager Larry B. Hempel said that anybody willing to work and to earn good money should get in touch with him at the offices of The News. The phone number is 648-2333.

The contest will be in progress through the next 30 days. During this time the enrolled contestant who accumulates the highest number of points will be awarded \$500 in cash for his or her efforts. ## Highway 10 plea favored

The State Highway Commission at a recent meeting in Ruidoso indicated informally it would pave Highway 10 from Gran Quivira to Highway 54 north of Carrizozo if the necessary right-of-way can be acquired.

Although the Commission made no hard commitment, a spokesman for the Mountainair Chamber of Commerce - Oscar Hewett - told The Village Press "they gave us some indication" they would precede with pre-paving work, grading and drainage preparation if the right-of-way can be purchased.

Hewett said "people here who know some of the land owners along the proposed project don't believe there'll be any trouble getting tight-of-way."

The project involves paving of approximately 30 miles of Highway 10 - from Highway 54 north of Carrizozo to Gran Quivira, site of a national monument. The road is paved from Gran Quivira

to Mountainair. Paving of the road has been sought for several years by Mountainair interests.

The Mountainair proposal has the endorsement of both the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and the Town of Carrizozo.

Hewett and the Mountainair Chamber delegation to the Ruidoso meeting conferred before that meeting with Carrizozo Mayor Johnson Stearns and Carrizozo Chamber President Welcom Armstrong.

The Gran Quivira national monument is visited each year by many out-of-New Mexico tourists, despite the difficulty of reaching it from the south and east.

Obviously, should the highway be paved, it would greatly increase tourist traffic through the area - from both north and south.

If the Commission decides eventually to pave the road, it would be realigned and somewhat shortened, Hewett said.

### White Oaks Leader; 1890:

## 'Who can blame Billy the Kid?'

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The White Oaks Historical Association met last Saturday night to work on its plan for preservation of that remarkable old town's past. The flavor of what is sought to be preserved is in the following article - a letter from a Mr. G. Gauss to The White Oaks Leader, printed March 1, 1890. The Leader was then edited by Major William Caffery. The letter was called to our attention recently by John J. Kelt of Tucumcari, who is writing a history of White Oaks).

DEAR MAJOR: You promised to the readers of your Leader that I would tell all I knew about the escape of Billy the Kid from the county jail at Lincoln after killing the two deputy sheriffs. I would have done so long before this had I not been slightly indisposed during the holidays. It is certainly very singular that during my long life, I have, since I can remember, generally about Christmas time, been afflicted with the same symptoms, and as I am not the only sufferer, but all my acquaintances generally complain of a like indisposition, I am under the impression that this Christmas distemper was over 1800 years ago imported from the Orient by the three wise men who came to adore the Jesus child, and that it has followed the Christians who celebrate properly, wherever they go. The disease is happily not in the least dangerous. If any man is fool enough to consult his family physician the doctor is very apt to inform him that he is similarly affected, and that the only medicine he himself take and that he would advise others to take is SPTS. VIN. GALL, in small and often repeated doses, to be well shaken before taken. If you are moderate in taking your medicine the

disease will leave as it came as soon as the holidays are over.

That I am right in the theory that the Christmas distemper was imported from the East nobody will dispute who takes into consideration that Asiatic Cholera, Influenza, or La Grippe, and perhaps many other infirmities human flesh is heir to travel from East to West speaking of the grippe, I hope Providence will preserve our statesmen in Washington in such manner that Congress may continue in working order and enabled to pass at least the most pressing laws, for instance, to reimburse the members who were robbed by the Democratic rascal, Silcott, and a pension law to divide the surplus in the Treasury among the veterans, their widows and descendants.

But I have been digressing, as I started in only to tell of the escape of Billy the Kid. Once upon a time, it was, if I mistake not, in the month of April 1880, 1881 or perhaps 1882, whilst Mr. Sam Wortley, the now possessor of a coal mine at Salado, and myself, were raising a vegetable garden behind the courthouse at Lincoln, that Billy the Kid was brought back from Don Ana County, where he was traced for murder, and sentenced; to be hanged in Lincoln. About a week after the date I am writing about, he killed his two keepers and escaped. As the County had no jail then he was kept under guard in the upper story of the courthouse. Sam and myself lived in a house together, behind the courthouse. That memorable day I came out of my room, whence I had gone to light my pipe, and was crossing the yard behind the courthouse when I heard a shot fired, a tussle up stairs in the courthouse, somebody hurrying down stairs and deputy sheriff Bell emerging from the door running toward me. He ran right into my arms, expired

CLOUDCROFT - In an exchange of deeds and dollars, Cloudfcroft's Lodge Hotel changed hands Thursday.

Established in 1899 by the El Paso and Northeastern Railroad, the Lodge was acquired by John B. Ritter in 1953 and has remained in the Ritter family until today.

Representing the Ritter family in the sale was Mrs. Billie Ruth Ritter Simpson of Las Cruces. Jack Stahl transacted business for the newly-formed "Cloud Nine" joint venture.

The Cloud Nine venture is a four-way partnership with each partner holding 25 per cent of their initial multi-million dollar investment.

In addition to the Lodge, the acquisition included the adjacent golf course, the ski area and two adjacent farm properties.

The Village Press understands the farms may be subdivided.

"Considering the limited amount of fee property in the Cloudfcroft area, this is a major acquisition amassing more than 1,100 acres in the Lincoln National Forest," said C. W. Ritter, managing partner.

Partners in Cloud Nine are:

C. W. Ritter of Cloudfcroft; Hooten-Stahl, Inc. of Albuquerque; Sky-Hi Development Corporation of Alamogordo; and Western Empire Financial, Inc., Denver, Colo.

As co-owner and general manager, C. W. Ritter has operated the Lodge since 1959. As a partner in Cloud Nine, Ritter continues in his role of chief operating executive of the new venture.

Hooten-Stahl, Inc. is New Mexico's largest real estate firm. It is wholly owned by Consolidated Investment Trust, Inc., whose stock is publicly traded.

Sky-Hi Development is an Alamogordo-based firm headed by T. A. Bonnell, president and chief executive of Bank Securities, Inc.

Western Empire Financial, Inc., is a financial holding company which manages life insurance properties and mutual fund assets.

## NM Methodists wind up meeting

GLORIETA—Projects in five cities and two special programs affecting the ministry and local churches will benefit from funds voted last week at the annual meeting of the New Mexico Conference of the United Methodist Church. Delegates to the conference voted to allocate \$110,000 for 1973, to assist projects in Albuquerque, Carlsbad, and Alamogordo, El Paso and Odessa, Tex. They also voted to continue the allocation of funds to assist the conference pension program and to build a revolving loan fund to secure land for new church sites and to help fund specialized ministries.

The money will come from the sale three years ago of Bataan Memorial Hospital in Albuquerque. Funds are being handled by the New Mexico Conference Methodist Foundation. Dividends and interests from more than \$2 million are being used to support various programs and projects within the New Mexico Conference area.

Delegates approved the following breakdown of the \$110,000 which will be available to them; \$50,000 for the New Mexico Conference Pension program—A continuation of an allocation made last year; \$25,000 which will go into a revolving loan administered by the Conference Board of Missions and used for the establishment of new churches and creative ministries—an eight year program which will eventually produce \$200,000 in the fund; \$14,000 to the Albuquerque District Committee on Reconciliation; \$9,500 to Landsum Homes, Inc., of Carlsbad, to be used to assist patients in the extended care unit who are unable to pay their own way; \$5,000 for Zia School at Alamogordo to provide additional therapy for handicapped children, \$6,000 for the El Paso Metropolitan Board of Missions for an expanded ministry among Mexican-Americans, Blacks, and anglos there, and \$500 to the Inter-Faith Agency of Odessa.

The treasurer of the New Mexico Conference Methodist Foundation, Horrace McKay of Albuquerque, told the Conference that he estimated approximately \$90,000 would be available for distribution during 1972. He said interest and dividends on the Bataan money should produce about \$110,000, but approximately \$20,000 in foundation expenses would have to be deducted from it.

The Bataan proposals were presented by the Conference Program Council. Dr. Ed Hamilton of El Paso made the presentation, assisted by the Rev. Jack Wallis of El Paso, Dr. Brodace Elkins of El Paso, and Dr. Ira Williams of Albuquerque. A special presentation of Key '73 was made to the conference. This is a broad-based interdenominational program designed to allow Christians in the United States and Canada to join other Christians in a concentrated evangelistic emphasis during the year 1973.

The presentation was under the direction of Dr. Robert Templeton, pastor of St. John's United Methodist Church of Santa Fe, and a Las Cruces physicist and layman, Jim Jackson. Assisting was the Rev. Ken Balthrop, Albuquerque Baptist minister who is general chairman of Key '73 for the state of New Mexico. Part of the Key '73 program was a drama,

done by three laymen from the same church: Robert Wood, a high school student; Fred McDonald, director of evaluation of the New Mexico State Department of Education; and David Kock, director of drug education for the State Department of Education. Earlier, Bishop Aisie H. Carleton received a standing vote of confidence from delegates as they approved a resolution calling for his reassignment to the Northwest Texas-New Mexico Area for another four year.

He proposes to raise the earning limitations on Social Security benefits to permit retirees to earn \$2,400 a year rather than the present \$1,680 limitation. He will propose relief from income and property taxes for the aging.

## S'west ethnic center publishes

**EL PASO** - The Cross-Cultural Southwest Ethnic Study Center of the University of Texas at El Paso has issued the first in a planned series of publications to keep specialists in sociology, linguistics, political science and related fields - as well as the general public - abreast of the center's activities.

The center, established through a grant of more than \$63,000 from the Spencer Foundation of Chicago, is co-directed by Drs. Jacob Ornstein of the Department of Modern Languages and Z. Anthony Kruszewski of the Department of Political Science. The center's primary objective is to investigate the relationships, and conflicts among ethnic groups of the Southwest with the main emphasis on Mexican-Americans and American Indians in a six-year program divided into three two-year stages.

The center's activities during the "First Stage" (1971-73), as related in the new publication, are concerned with the collection, analysis and interpretation of basic data relating to the ethnic groups of the Southwest. Special attention is being paid to the study of "informal aspects of Southwest cultures which show inter-ethnic relationships and growing ethnic awareness and militancy."

## Hunters okay game agency

**SANTA FE** - A total of 10,000 New Mexico hunters were recently asked if they thought the Department of Game and Fish is doing an adequate overall job of managing the fish and wildlife. Of those who replied to the question, 84.8 per cent said "yes," while only 12.2 per cent answered no.

The question was one of 10 that was included in a hunter attitude questionnaire that went to 10,000 hunters whose names were picked at random from hunting license purchasers. A total of 51.6 per cent of the hunters who received the cards answered the questions and returned them. The Department conducted the survey to find the attitudes of the hunters themselves on the various ways many of the hunting seasons can be conducted.

The survey showed that the big game hunting license is, by far, the most popular with the hunters as 43.5 per cent of them purchased it. Approximately one-third of the hunters

purchased the general hunting and fishing license.

Deer are definitely the most popular game animals. A total of 89.6 per cent of the hunters who answered the questionnaire hunted deer.

Opportunity to hunt was more important to 80.8 per cent of the hunters than less opportunity to participate in specific hunts but with increased hunter success. A total of 70.9 per cent of the hunters had rather hunt every year without a permit than every two years with a permit system.

A favorable reply on the department's exotic animal program was received from 75.3 per cent, while only 13.8 per cent did not favor the program.

Answers to other questions indicated that most hunters are satisfied with the current general bull elk hunting system and that the majority would be interested in hunting elk under a season with no limit on bull licenses, but with a limited number of cow validations. The answers also indicated that a majority of the hunters would be interested in trying a new antelope hunting system that would increase the opportunity to hunt this animal but would lower the hunter success.

## S-S rep tells medicare rules

Certain conditions must be met before Medicare can pay hospital bills, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative told the Village Press.

The level of care needed is of primary concern. The services received must be medically necessary. Further, the needed services must be of the type usually provided only in a hospital. From this standpoint, consideration must be given to whether some less expensive means of treatment might be available, such as outpatient treatment. The majority of Medicare patients hospitalized in Southeastern New Mexico have met the level of care required for medicare to pay the hospital bill.

"The same 'level of care' concept is followed in determining what care in a skilled nursing home

may be paid by Medicare," Mrs. Graves said. In order for skilled nursing care in a participating nursing home to be covered, the patient must require skilled nursing care on a continuous basis and the care provided must be of a type that can be furnished only by a skilled nursing staff. A patient requiring these services generally does not need such intensive care as a hospital would provide, but still needs a high level of skilled nursing services.

There is no provision in the Medicare law for paying for strictly "custodial" care.

**Inside the capital . . .**

**SANTA FE**—The 25-candidate Democratic U. S. Senate campaign is in its final frantic stages with about 150,000 voters expected to ballot statewide in the party primary Tuesday.

Jack Daniels of Hobbs and Tom Morris of Albuquerque and Tucumcari appeared to hold an edge over Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon, formerly of Guadalupe County, and Atty. Gen. David Norvell, ex-Clovis resident, as the final campaign week opened. State Treasurer Jesse D. Konegay of Santa Fe, an able elected official keying his drive on courthouse support, seemed to trail other major U. S. Senate candidates.

Mondragon and Norvell were gaining ground on Daniels and Morris. New Mexico political history is loaded with election upsets. The crammed Democratic U. S. Senate race was ripe for surprises in voting Tuesday.

In the 8-candidate Republican U. S. Senate primary Albuquerque lawyer Pete Domenici was favored over ex-Gov. David F. Cargo of Pojoaque, Santa Fe County. Former Lt. Gov. E. Lee Francis of Cubero, Valencia County, was expected to finish third.

But Cargo rocketed to prominence in 1966 by winning the governor's office in a startling upset. Dave has been staging in the current campaign the type of appeal—underfinanced, door-to-door, person-to-person—that won for him in 1966. Besides, Domenici, the 1970 GOP governor candidate, has staged a low-key campaign. Pete's stand on most issues has been moderate. He has taken no position on many subjects.

Domenici apparently feels he will capture the primary without heavy opposition and he is saving his heavy artillery for the general election campaign.

The U. S. House District 1 in the Democratic primary Santa Fe lawyer Gene Gallegos and State Sen. Mike Alarid of Albuquerque are expected to battle for the nomination with Santa Fe former mayor George Gonzales finishing third. But Gonzales, an experienced politician, could stage a major upset.

Beautiful, blonde Miss Sparkle Plenty, 28-year-old cocktail waitress, is in the race. She has attracted much publicity and has pushed hard for pollution and land subdivision controls. She will probably poll a substantial vote and siphon support from Gallegos.

Reuben Pankey, Monticello rancher, Sierra County, and Ed Presson of Silver City are Republican opponents for the U. S. House District 2 nomination.

Conservative Pankey, long identified with the New Mexico GOP leadership, is favored over Presson, former aide to U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr. of Albuquerque.

Presson, 29, has staged an active campaign over the huge 18-county House district. Democratic incumbent U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels of Lovington is unopposed for renomination. Runnels will be a formidable November opponent for the GOP.

Some 60,000 Republicans are expected to vote statewide in the primary. New Mexico voter registration totals about 429,000. This includes some 280,000 Democrats registered for the primary, 123,000 Republicans and about 24,000 in minor parties or declined to state a party affiliation.

In the first New Mexico presidential primary Democrats were expected to pick South Dakota Sen. George McGovern and Minnesota Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey with Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace placing third. The two top vote getters will share New Mexico's 18 Democratic national convention votes in proportion to their primary vote. National convention delegates will be picked at a state Democratic convention June 21. They will be committed on the first ballot only at Miami Beach in the convention July 10-13.

McGovern had an early lead on the strength of a 16-month New Mexico campaign. Humphrey, whose New Mexico campaign opened only two weeks ago, is closing fast on McGovern. Wallace could surprise with a heavy conservative protest vote.

In the GOP presidential primary President Richard M. Nixon was expected to swamp California Rep. Paul (Pete) McCloskey. McCloskey entered many primaries to focus attention on his contention Nixon cannot be reelected unless he sharply modifies his Vietnam policies and adopts dovish positions. New Mexico Republicans will cast 14 votes at the GOP national convention Aug. 21-24, also in Miami Beach.

Rep. John F. Bigbee, R-Encino, says newly reapportioned House District 50 is so big he is campaigning by plane. The huge district is in Guadalupe, DeBaca, Lincoln and Torrance Counties. Antonio D. Sanchez of Santa Rosa opposes Rep. Bigbee, a rancher, in the GOP primary. In the House District 50 Democratic primary Paul Joseph Davis Jr. of Moriarty and A. F. (Lalo) Padilla of Vaughn are matched.

New Mexico Young Democrats elected Rick Campos of Santa Rosa as treasurer and Mike Lucero of Tucumcari as executive vice president at their convention in Albuquerque.

A lively general election race is upcoming in Curry County House District 65 between John Hays Jr., Clovis Democrat, and Clovis farmer-businessman John C. White, the Republican candidate. Both are unopposed in the primary.

Hays is a legislative lobbyist for the United Transportation Union. White, an ex-teacher, narrowly lost a House race several years ago.



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

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

# AN OPEN LETTER TO PARENTS

Children sent to the Juvenile Penitentiary are released back to the community in six to eight months, and 80 per cent of them have learned how to become an adult criminal.

My opponent has promised some people that he will send all offenders to the Juvenile Penitentiary, which will mean that each and every year more than 200 children from this District will be sent to Springer.

In contrast, for most first offenders, I have punished these children by putting them in juvenile detention, placing them on probation under supervision of a probation officer, the schools and parents. Under my system, ninety per cent of the children have been able to overcome their difficulties.





**Fort Stanton re-modeled**

FORT STANTON--A \$66,000 remodeling project on the kitchen and dining facilities at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School was completed last week, according to George McGarrah, head of the Department of Hospitals and Institutions' construction crew.

The work involved re-roofing, re-tiling and repainting the entire structure, which is one of the early buildings at Fort Stanton.

The crew also installed a new boiler and all new heating, piping, wiring and electrical systems. The ceiling was lowered and covered with fireproof acoustical tile, and the dining room was expanded to accommodate about 30 percent more residents.

Additional office space and restrooms also were constructed.

McGarrah said his crew has been working on the project for the past six months. He explained that while new windows and doors were installed, the historic exterior of the building has been preserved.

In addition to the kitchen remodeling, the Department of Hospitals and Institutions has had its crew of eight men working on renovations throughout the facility. The crew usually consists of four full-time DHI employees, and four local workers hired temporarily.



**Pankey supports Nixon in Vietnam**

Conservative Republican rancher Reuben Pankey of Monticello is the apparent front-runner in a GOP primary tussle for nomination to the District 2 Congressional seat now held by Democrat Harold Rummels of Lovington. Pankey, 53, is opposed by 29-year-old Ed Presson of Silver City.

Both campaigned through southeastern New Mexico -- Village Press land -- last week.

Pankey is in a family cattle ranching corporation, Pankey Land and Cattle Co., at Monticello, Sierra County. A longtime active Republican, he was in the State House in 1953-56 and on the Sierra County Commission in 1965-68. He was on the State Board of Finance in 1969-70 and was New Mexico's representative on the Public Land Law Review Commission in 1968-70. He says the commission's 137 recommendations will affect landowners, homeowners, recreation, economic development, subdivision regulations, future expansion of cities and location of municipalities.

Many commission recommendations are pending in Congress. Pankey says some cities are landlocked. For example, he says Farmington is surrounded by federal land.

If outspoken Pankey survives the primary, he will face tough U.S. Rep. Rummels, in the main event Nov. 7. Rummels is "opposed in the Democratic primary for renomination."

Pankey says: "suitable industry can be attracted to District 2. Albuquerque has gotten all of the industry. Light branches of the electronics industry, clothing, light plastics could be located in District 2. We have a suitable climate for it."



**Dripping firs normal now**

 I visited some homes in the Ruidoso area last week. They were having some problems and questions about their trees. The fir trees were dripping. This is a natural occurrence when the trees first put out new leaves and will stop in about two weeks.

A few fir trees had a webbing on the base of the leaves and small stems. This is caused by a spider mite. They can be controlled with Kelthane, Tedion, or Diazinon with two sprays seven days apart.

Some of the Ponderosa Pine trees were infected with mistletoe. The mistletoe is a parasitic plant and has roots about two feet from where it is seen. If the branch can be cut off two feet away, you can usually stop the mistletoe growth. Otherwise, you will need to cut down the entire tree.

To keep your trees vigorous, you can fertilize the tree by putting fertilizer around the drip line of the tree and watering it in or it can be put in holes about a foot deep. Use about one quarter pound of actual nitrogen per inch of trunk diameter.

Ants that are often a problem around the home can be controlled with a liquid household insecticide containing two percent chlordane. Other insecticides such as diazinon, dichlorvos (Vapona), and Baygon, when formulated in a ready to use spray, can also be used indoors.

If ants are a problem outdoors, apply a 5 to 10 per cent chlordane dust to next openings or around foundations. Soak the treated areas with water to wash the insecticide into the ground. A spray or drench of chlordane can also be applied as a spot and foundation application.

DDT HEARINGS--Environmental Protection Agency hearings were concluded in March. Surgeon General Jessie Stanfield said there is no concrete evidence that DDT causes cancer, or that it constitutes a health hazard; and it is "beyond comprehension" how DDT can be blamed for egg shell thinning, when it is known that thickness varies both within and between bird species.

**That promised second recipe**

**NO CRUST PIZZA**

**Ingredients**

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 - 6 oz. can evaporated milk.
- 3/4 cup tomato sauce
- 3 tablespoons mushrooms
- 1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 3/4 cup shredded American cheese
- 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese

Combine first 4 ingredients; press into a pie plate, bring mixture up on sides of pie plate to form a shell. Spread tomato sauce in center. Add mushrooms. Sprinkle Italian seasonings over tomato sauce and mushrooms. Top with shredded American cheese. Bake in 375 F oven for 20 minutes. Remove. Sprinkle grated parmesan cheese over the pie and return to oven for 10 min. Cut in six wedges.
