

## 'Different' kids search underway

New Mexico this week undertakes a massive search aimed at singling out its "exceptional" or "different" children.

The search, ordered by an act of the State Legislature, is to provide, over the next five years, a basis on which can be built special education programs for youngsters whose physical and intellectual capacities may require them.

The search is not confined to children attending school - children from birth to 21 are to be included in the survey which is being conducted by school districts.

Nor does the search aim at isolating only those who are in some way handicapped; it seeks also to locate those whose intellectual gifts are superior to the norm.

Parents are being asked to fill out a detailed questionnaire for each of their children considered in any way to be believed "exceptional."

When the results are tabulated, the data will be computerized at the state level and special programs designed to fit whatever needs the survey reveals.

For those parents who did not this week receive a questionnaire, it is in this issue. Completed questionnaires should be mailed to the local school superintendent (all information is confidential).

Note if you have any other children age 0-21 whom you suspect may have a definite exceptional ability, please contact your superintendent's office for additional forms.

### Description of Exceptionalities

1. Blind - Children whose vision is so restricted that they cannot see as determined by an eye specialist.

2. Visually impaired - Children who have vision problems to such a degree that they require specially-made glasses and must use large print reading materials. Example: Unusually thick glasses, runs into objects, etc.

3. Deaf - Children who cannot benefit from hearing or audio aids as determined by a qualified audiologist.

4. Hard of hearing - Children who require the use of hearing or audio aids.

5. Emotionally handicapped - Children of normal or above normal learning ability whose emotional condition is such that they are unable to function in normal everyday situations. Example: The child may have behavioral problems for no apparent reasons; extreme nervousness; excitable; emotional; withdrawn; easily discouraged with tasks; frustrated; etc.

6. Homebound - Children with severe temporary disabilities which make them unable to attend public school. Example: Accident, surgery, serious illness, etc.

7. Intellectually gifted - Children with superior learning ability and emotional adjustment as determined by school and social history, language evaluation, and standard tests which measure mental ability.

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9. Multiple handicapped - Children who have two or more equally disabling handicaps. Example: Blind, crippled, deaf, mentally retarded, etc.

10. Physically handicapped - Children with physical defects. Example: Crippled, cerebral palsy, polio, heart condition, etc.

11. Speech impaired - Children with definite speech organ defects. Example: Cleft palate; unable to talk like others his age, not a language problem due to bi-lingualism, etc.

12. Educable mentally handicapped - Children who are mildly retarded. Example: slow learners, limited mental ability, low achievement, poor development, etc.

13. Trainable mentally handicapped - Children who are severely retarded. Example: Mongoloids, severe mental disability and development, needs constant care and help, etc.

14. Severely and profoundly handicapped - Children who may require highly specialized supervision and institutional care. These children do not fit other descriptions given above.

## More cattle feeding ahead

LAS CRUCES - Cattle feeders continue to place more cattle on feed than last year, according to Robert Coppersmith, extension livestock marketing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Placements during July in the six leading cattle feeding states were up eight per cent over July, 1971, he said. The total number of cattle and calves on feed Aug. 1, 1972 were up 18 per cent over a year ago.

Increased placements on feed during August are not expected to be more than five per cent more than last year. July placements on feed the last few weeks will discourage rapid placement in August, but placements during the September-November quarter will be increased, Coppersmith says.

"Look for livestock slaughter to be up this winter and next spring by as much as five to seven percent," he said. "The domestic market for beef is good enough to absorb this amount without drastic decreases in cattle prices next spring."

## County championship to be decided Friday at Ruidoso

Nothing like finding out the first game of the season which Lincoln County football team rules all the mountains and valleys of this big county - it's that way again this year when the Carrizozo Grizzlies, last year's undefeated state Class A champions, and the Ruidoso Warriors, a team that played for the state Class AA title losing to Jal last year - meet in Ruidoso Friday, game time at 8:00 p.m.

It's somewhat of a rebuilding year for both teams though both the Grizzlies and the Warriors have quarterbacks Gaby Chavez and Blaine

Miller returning. It would be hard to gauge the relative strength of these two teams at this early season date. The Warriors will have the larger squad, they had that last year when the Grizzlies beat them by two TDs. The Grizzlies went all the way last year more from toughness and skill, demonstrated to Colonia Juarez, in the Wool Bowl and on other occasions.

Grizzly Coach Roger St. Louis feels his team will give them a good game and that his inexperienced ball players have as good a

chance of winning as do the Warriors. If mistakes can be held to a minimum the Grizzlies can do the job all right.

Pre-game reports indicate that the Warriors will put the ball in the air a lot, plus running some draws and screen passes. Coach Doyle Howell starts off with 22 lettermen and Miller at 185 pounds to do a lot of things besides passing.

The starting defensive lineup for Zozo will include Gilbert and Rito Samora at guard, Steve Ortiz and Jody Ventura as ends, Gaby Chavez, Christy Monreal and Ernie Beltran as linebackers, Robert Schlarb and Michael Barela as cornerbacks, Ray Pacheco and David Roper as safety.

On offense it will be Jody Ventura at center, Robert Schlarb and Gilbert Sambrano at guard, Rito Samora and Christy Monreal at tackle, David Roper and Michael Barela at end position, Gaby Chavez at QB, Steve Ortiz FB, Andre Hoff and Ray Pacheco at HB position.

The Grizzlies have a 20-game win streak going into this game.

## Contest for chili growers

ALBUQUERQUE - Like the Land of Enchantment itself, the New Mexico State Fair is unique in many respects among other shows around the country.

Of course, it has all of the traditional competitions and exhibits of the best of rural life, coupled with the urban additions.

But, it is probably the only major exposition in the country that has a competition for chili growers.

Iowa may have its tall corn, Kentucky its race horses and blue grass and Wisconsin its dairy products, but only in New Mexico can you find a competition for chili.

In the agricultural show at the fair, right along

with the cabbages and beans and pumpkins is a special contest; it is for the best string of chili, five feet in length.

First place honors in the competition takes a blue ribbon and \$35 in cash, second place nets a ribbon and \$25 cash and third is a ribbon and \$15 in cash.

After all, it's only natural - isn't chili the official state vegetable of the Land of Enchantment?

Interested chili growers have until Sept. 15 to enter the competition.

INSIDE THE CAPITAL BY FRED BUCKLES  
**Young Deming alternate Liberal**

MIAMI BEACH -- Alternate Paul Feil, 21, of Deming in the New Mexico GOP national convention delegation disagreed sharply with parts of the party platform drafted at the White House and tailored to President Richard M. Nixon's wishes.

Second youngest New Mexico delegation member, Feil said: "The platform looks a little too conservative for me." The platform opposed amnesty for draft evaders. Feil says: "I favor a work service program for draft evaders."

"The effect of the laws have to be upheld. The term punishment in an institution is not the way to solve the problem to get a piece of revenge." Feil says draft evaders should be tried and assigned, for example, to VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), a federal program in effect in New Mexico.

The national GOP platform took conservative positions or omitted mention of legalization of marijuana and abortion. Feil said of marijuana: "I've lived around marijuana for the last three years at Colorado College." He is a senior biology major and plans to enter a medical school in 1973.

Feil, son of Dr. Paul Arnold Feil, Deming general practitioner, says: "At 21 years old marijuana may be permissible, matching the legal age for alcohol." He said marijuana may be legalized at 21 with proper controls "as long as it is kept out of the hands of 14-16-year-olds."

He would not extend legalization to any other drug. Feil said at parties three groups were often found among college students -- marijuana smokers, alcoholic beverage drinkers and those abstaining from marijuana and alcohol.

Feil and his brother, David, 18, polled 100 voters in 6 Deming precincts in a 2-week period ended Aug. 17. The results: President -- Nixon, 66.5 per cent; McGovern, 8.5; California Rep. John Schmitz, American Party candidate, one per cent; undecided, 23 per cent.

U. S. Senate -- Domenici, 41.3 per cent; Daniels, 19.5; undecided, 38.4; State Representative District 32 (Hidalgo-Luna Counties) -- incumbent Democrat William Upton, Deming, 34.8 per cent; Mrs. Thelma Inmon, Republican, Luna County rancher 15 miles south of Deming, 21.7; undecided, 40.5.

Confined to Deming, the poll did not include Mrs. Inmon's home precinct or Hidalgo County. Dr. Feil is a gop luna County Commission candidate. He formerly lived in Belen.

Dr. and Mrs. Tom Prescott and their son, Michael, 20, drove to the GOP national

convention at Miami Beach in a car. Efforts were unsuccessful to convert a new motor home 27 feet long the Prescotts bought in time for use at the quadrennial powwow.

Dr. Prescott and Michael were both New Mexico alternates at the convention, the father-son combination in the 27-member delegation. Michael, who was 20 June 19, was the youngest delegation member.

Mrs. Juanita Marcus Michaels, 36, a Taos Pueblo member, was the only Indian delegate in the New Mexico contingent. She met with minority groups at the national convention.

But Mrs. Michaels, a Santa Fe resident 13 years, says people in minorities should be treated as individuals. They should not be pictured as stereotypes, she says.

Mrs. Michaels favored allotting California Rep. Paul (Pete) McCloskey a committed New Mexico delegate. In pre-convention action the committee on contests and the National GOP Committee unanimously rejected McCloskey's demand for a bona fide New Mexico delegate.

Would-be McCloskey delegate Tom Mayer, 29, of Espanola and McCloskey alternate Pete Duran, Albuquerque, flew to Miami and teamed with McCloskey to push his bid. Mayer piloted his yellow single-engine 1932 design, Beechcraft stagger-wing biplane from New Mexico.

Most New Mexico delegates opposed allotting McCloskey a delegate at the national convention. McCloskey won a delegate by polling 3,367 votes against Nixon in the first New Mexico presidential primary June 6.

The New Mexico delegation, solidly pro-Nixon, complied with state law by casting 13 votes for Nixon and one for McCloskey. But delegates said McCloskey badly damaged his chances of winning a committed delegate at the state GOP convention July 15 in Albuquerque.

McCloskey told the state convention he would not support Nixon for re-election unless Nixon stopped bombing in Vietnam before the general election.

The New Mexico delegation supported a compromise delegate reapportionment plan that favors New Mexico Republicans at the 1976 national convention. New Mexico delegates would be increased from 14 at the 1972 powwow to 19 at the 1976 convention if Nixon carries the state again Nov. 7 under the plan.

National Committeewoman Francine Neff of Albuquerque backed the plan, approved by the National GOP Committee. Mrs. Neff and Albuquerque Ed Hartman, New Mexico members of the convention rules committee, also supported the new plan in rules panel action. The plan favors lightly populated, rural, Midwest, Southern and states that traditionally support the GOP presidential candidate.

It retains the bonus rule vital to the New Mexico GOP. Six of the 14 GOP delegates at Miami Beach were awarded as a bonus because Nixon carried New Mexico in 1968.

The National GOP Committee also

recommended more representation of women, youths and other minorities on 1976 national convention delegations. The 14 New Mexico delegates at Miami Beach counted nine men and five women, two delegates under 30 and five minority group members -- four of Latin American heritage and one Indian.

 speculate:

"Imagine, if you can, the Indians who recorded these symbols. Did they do it to report successes in the hunt?"

"Or were they serving as lookouts who whiled away long hours with ancient games...?"

"Perhaps these markings once held religious meaning."

"There are similar drawings on rocks found throughout the Southwest. And perhaps these people came here to trade with other Indians and these signs were 'billboards' advertising their wares."

"Let your eyes take in the horizons from east to west -- from 12,003-foot Sierra Blanca on the east, once a volcano, to the Java flows and glancing sands in the west -- and then you may know the meaning of the symbols graven here."

Maybe.

Reaction to the carvings, as recorded in the visitor's registration book (and visitors come from everywhere; a man from Moscow, in the Soviet Union, was there recently) range from the thoughtful to the rude and disbelieving.

One reaction, though, rings true and appears most frequently, in forms like this:

"Preserve it."

"Save it for our children."

"Protect it."

"And of course, this one:

"Tell us what it means."

"Perhaps one of the children we are asked to save it for may, one day, 'tell us what it means.'"

Meantime, there it broods, the Three Rivers Petroglyphs Site, its carvings mute, its origin really unknown and with its mysteries intact.

**Security for working women**

Close to 30 million women are earning social security protection for themselves and their families through their own work, according to Mr. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative.

Here in Lincoln County, 541 women 60 and over actually receive social security benefits.

"The working woman has both disability and survivors protection," Mrs. Graves said. "If she becomes unable to work for a year or longer because of a disabling accident or severe illness, she and her dependents may be eligible for monthly cash payments from social security."

If a working woman dies prematurely, monthly cash payments from social security can help her children through school (until they're 22, if they remain full-time students and unmarried).

"If a working woman's husband is 62 or older and dependent upon her for his support, he also can be eligible for monthly social security payments on her work record," Mrs. Graves said.

"Even though her husband may be working at a full-time job, her children are still eligible for benefits on her work record," Mrs. Graves noted.

On her own work record, the working woman can retire at 62 with reduced monthly cash payments. Or she can wait until she's 65 and get full monthly cash benefits, Mrs. Graves said. But, if she could collect higher benefits as a wife on her husband's record, she can choose to collect the higher payment.

## More cattle feeding ahead

LAS CRUCES -- Cattle feeders continue to place more cattle on feed than last year, according to Robert Coppersmith, extension livestock marketing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Placements during July in the six leading cattle feeding states were up eight per cent over July, 1971, he said. The total number of cattle and calves on feed Aug. 1, 1972 were up 18 per cent over a year ago.

Increased placements on feed during August are not expected to be more than five per cent more than last year. July placements on feed the last few weeks will discourage rapid placement in August, but placements during the September-November quarter will be increased, Coppersmith says.

"Look for livestock slaughter to be up this winter and next spring by as much as five to seven percent," he said. "The domestic market for beef is good enough to absorb this amount without drastic decreases in cattle prices next spring."





#### DESCRIPTION OF EXCEPTIONALITIES

1. **BLIND:** Children whose vision is so restricted that they cannot see as determined by an eye specialist.
2. **VISUALLY IMPAIRED:** Children who have vision problems to such a degree that they require specially-made glasses and must use large print reading materials. EXAMPLE: Unusually thick glasses, runs into objects, etc.
3. **DEAF:** Children who cannot benefit from hearing or audio aids as determined by a qualified audiologist.
4. **HARD OF HEARING:** Children who require the use of hearing or audio aids.
5. **EMOTIONALLY HANDICAPPED:** Children of normal or above normal learning ability whose emotional condition is such that they are unable to function in normal everyday situations. EXAMPLE: The child may have behavioral problems for no apparent reasons; extreme nervousness; excitable; emotional; withdrawn; easily discouraged with tasks; frustrated; etc.
6. **HOMEBOUND:** Children with severe temporary disabilities which make them unable to attend public school. EXAMPLE: Accident, surgery, serious illness, etc.
7. **INTELLECTUALLY GIFTED:** Children with superior learning ability and emotional adjustment as determined by school and social history, language evaluation, and standard tests which measure mental ability.
8. **LEARNING DISABLED:** Children of average or above average mental ability who indicate certain problems with the learning process which are not related to vision, hearing, physical handicaps, mental retardation, emotional disturbance, or lack of opportunity to learn. EXAMPLE: Unable to read, reversal of letters, unable to do arithmetic, unintelligible handwriting, etc.
9. **MULTIPLE HANDICAPPED:** Children who have two or more equally disabling handicaps. EXAMPLE: Blind, crippled, deaf, mentally retarded, etc.
10. **PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED:** Children with physical defects. EXAMPLE: Crippled, cerebral palsy, polio, heart condition, etc.
11. **SPEECH IMPAIRED:** Children with definite speech organ defects. EXAMPLE: Cleft palate; unable to talk like others his age, not a language problem due to bilingualism, etc.
12. **EDUCABLE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED:** Children who are mildly retarded. EXAMPLE: slow learners, limited mental ability, low achievement, poor development, etc.
13. **TRAINABLE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED:** Children who are severely retarded. EXAMPLE: Mongoloids, severe mental disability and development, needs constant care and help, etc.
14. **SEVERELY AND PROFOUNDLY HANDICAPPED:** Children who may require highly specialized supervision and institutional care. These children do not fit other descriptions given above.

Actually, the baby my dad is holding is not me, but my brother, Rex.


I'd still love to have it though since both my parents are deceased now.


Their four sons who also own property in Lovington use the home off and on.







**MIAMI BEACH**—The 28-member New Mexico national Republican convention returned home in high spirits after renominating heavily favored President Richard M. Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew.

The conservative New Mexico delegation also teamed with other Western states to adopt a delegation reapportionment plan, effective in 1976; that would increase New Mexico GOP delegates up to more than 50 per cent.

New Mexico's delegates could jump from 14 this year to a maximum of 22. Conservatives kept control of the national party in Western states, including New Mexico. Liberal, populous states lost a key battle 2-1.

Among New Mexico delegation members backing the new structure were Dr. Thomas Prescott, 52, Tucumcari physician; his son, Mike Prescott, 20, and Paul Alan Feil, 21; Deming, all alternates; Mrs. Juanita Marcus Michaels, 36, a delegate and Taos Pueblo member, and delegate Wesley Little, 63, of Silver City, Luna and Grant Counties convenience store owners.

Dr. Prescott said after the convention: "The only thing that can defeat Nixon is overconfidence." He is Quay County GOP chairman and head of the New Mexico Physicians Committee. Quay County is about 5-1 Democratic. But Dr. Prescott says Quay County GOP registration topped 1,200 for the first time. Dr. Prescott will modify his new motor home 27 feet long for two purposes; For use as an emergency medical catastrophe unit and as a Nixon re-election campaign headquarters. He will travel the state, contacting doctors.

Nixon and his elaborate campaign apparatus pitched hard at the national convention for support from the 25 million new voters. Dr. Prescott says Nixon's approach to youth is rational. He says: "Young people are better informed. They will make independent decisions on their own convictions and support the President."

Dr. Prescott predicted ex-Tucumcari Mayor Kenneth Schlientz, a Republican, will defeat McAlister Democrat D. F. McCasland in the general election Nov. 7 in a new State Senate District 26 of all of Quay County and part of Curry County. State Rep. Clifton Moreland, D-Tucumcari, is unopposed for reelection in new House District 67 of all of Quay and part of Union County.

Dr. Prescott referred to Missouri Sen. Tom Eagleton who quit as the Democratic vice presidential candidate. He said: "Mental illness of the type Tom Eagleton had is one that is amenable to treatment. It is usually common to a person who is hard-driving and ambitious. 'It's unfortunate many people don't make a distinction between a person who has lost contact with reality and a person who has pushed himself to the point of nervous exhaustion trying to do a job well.'"

Dr. Prescott's son, Mike, also a New Mexico alternate at the convention, took many photos at his first national convention. Mike, youngest New Mexico delegation member, attended a gala post-convention victory party for Youths for Nixon with Sandle Neff, 24, Albuquerque. Sandle is the daughter of New Mexico National Committeewoman Francine Neff, Albuquerque. Four thousand Youths for Nixon danced to hard rock band music.

Big, sturdy Mike represented New Mexico well at the quadrennial Powwow with his easy, pleasant manner. He is a junior journalism major at New Mexico State University. Dr. Prescott and Mike were the only father-son combination in the New Mexico delegation.

Alternate Paul Alan Feil of Deming said the New Mexico delegation was not well-organized at the convention. Feil and Dr. Prescott said the delegation was not fully informed on the key delegate reapportionment fight.

New Mexico was on the winning side with other conservative states. But young Paul said: "I would like to have seen a little more liberalization."

He said of the convention's major scrap: "It was an effort by the few party liberals to break the stranglehold the conservatives have on the party." The liberal Ripon Society promised a court suit against the new plan.

Feil says Nixon "is very much a moderate. He takes rational positions. Conservatives nominated him but liberals can accept him." Other Feil-convention impressions: "The Republican Party is not one big monolithic group. There is room for differences. Some Youths for Nixon disagree with the headline party platform plank on amnesty. Some disagree with Nixon's China trip 'because they felt it was selling out to the Communists.'"

Feil says: "It was very difficult to make waves at the convention. If you want to make waves, you have to spend time, energy and money well in advance of the convention." Delegate Juanita Marcus Michaels of Taos Pueblo is small (5 feet, 1 inch) but she made a big impression at the convention. She wore a series of colorful Indian dresses she made herself.

Mrs. Michaels, a Santa Fean 13 years, wore a stunning full-length dress to a convention session. She said the blue "represented New Mexico's blue sky and blue water." At a New Mexico delegation reception Mrs. Michaels wore a full-length turquoise-colored dress. Her black hair was in braids bound by leather ties beaded in white, red, yellow and blue. She wore white buckskin boots.

Unassuming and soft-spoken, she voted with the New Mexico delegation majority on all convention issues. She counseled with leaders of Taos Pueblo and other Indian groups on major GOP issues before she left New Mexico. Formerly Wesley Little of Silver City, who formerly lived 10 years in Deming, and His wife weekend in the Bahamas before they returned to New Mexico for Miami Beach.


