Lincoln lawsuit that never died

A fragment of the Lincoln County War of the 1880s still exists in a kind of legal limbo in the literally dusty and figuratively blood-spattered archives of the county.

It exists because a tough-minded widow—Pennsylvania-born, Kansas-bred and New Mexico Territory hardened in resolve—and a bibulous US Army officer from Massachusetts did their best, on the record, to keep the war alive, even after guns ceased blazing in the narrow plaza of Old Lincoln Town on the Rio Bonito.

The evidence of the try is in the form of a lawsuit filed by the lady against the officer, a lawsuit that was never tried and thus left the lady's allegations unanswered, to this day, at least in the legal sense.

Principals of the suit were Mrs. Susan Homer McSween (later Barber) and Colonel Nathan Augustus Monroe Dudley—the widow of A. A. McSween, a Lincoln County War victim, he the commanding officer at Fort Stanton during the Fracas (and, according to Mrs. McSween, partisan to her husband's enemies).

On July 19, 1879—one year to the day after her husband's death—Mrs. McSween filed suit in Lincoln County District Court against the Colonel, alleging defamation of her character by Dudley and seeking a trial by jury and a judgment for \$25,000.

The case never came to trial and, technically, still is on the docket.

This was the background of the doomed-to-limbo case:

There was bad blood between the McSweens and Colonel Dudley all during the period.

In the autumn of 1879, according to the petition filed in the case for Mrs. McSween by Attorney Ira Leonard, she asked the Territorial Governor, General Lew Wallace, for a military escort to take her from Santa Fe back to her home in Old Lincoln.

The request was forwarded through channels to Dudley at Fort Stanton.

And the Colonel, according to the petition, became—in today's parlance—unglued.

The McSween petition said that Dudley, far from helping a widowed lady, "procured and forwarded to the Department of Military District Headquarters at Santa Fe and from there transmitted to" Governor Wallace sworn statement attacking her.

Among other nefarious things, alleged the petition, Dudley persuaded others—among them Saturnino Baca (for whom Lincoln County almost got named) and Sheriff George W. Peppin (later a Fort Stanton butcher)—to malign her in affidavits.

First Quarter (6-0 Carrizozo)

Gaby Chavez received the opening kick off and on a criss-cross maneuver handed off to David Roper who scooted up the sidelines for an 80 yd. touchdown. This was made possible by exceptional blocking by the Carrizozo return specialists. The kick for the PAT went wide.

From then on fumbles hampered both teams. In addition to fumbles, the Grizzlies had to put up with a rash of penalties, which nullified nearly every good gain by Carrizozo.

2nd Quarter (6-6)

Carrizozo was still fighting penalties and fumbles but one of them turned out to be costly. On a fourth down situation, David Roper bobbled the snap from center and was tackled on his own 45 yard line. From there Ruidoso moved the ball on the ground and through the air as Kent Skarda scored from 2 yards out. Blaine Miller's kick for the point after also was wide.

3rd Quarter (6-6)

Both teams still fought hard defensively. On offense Steve Ortiz continued to keep the Grizzlies in contention with his constant gainers and Gaby Chavez held the Warriors in check. Though no scoring occurred, both teams had opportunities but could not capitalize.

4th Quarter (6-12) Ruidoso

Early in the quarter Kent Skarda again found the end zone. This time from 3 yards out. The try for 2 points via a pass was no good as the pass was knocked down in the end zone.

The Grizzlies did fight back however marching all the way to the 15 yard line with a 2nd down and 2 yards to go only to have a penalty and fumble the ball away 2 plays later.

Steve Ortiz gained 102 yards in 12 carries. Other outstanding performances were by Gaby Chavez, Michael Barela, Robert Schlarb, and Christy Monrreal.

Caster tells of education changes

Supt. Ira Caster of Capitan was guest speaker at Rotary Club in Carrizozo last week with an interesting message about new developments in education.

One of the newest developments is in surplus of teachers. A few years back there would be only a few applicants for job openings in Capitan, now Supt. Caster has his pick from a tall stack of

applications. The same situation is true of college degree students seeking work in other fields. There are not enough jobs to go around.

All of which indicates to school people that education needs to move in new directions. One of them is called "career education" which means in simple language, making the student aware of where the work is, what it is like, and supplying the student with skills in vocations, crafts, etc. that seem to suit the student best.

Congressman Harold Runnels, speaking in Carrizozo, stated that the cost of education from grade one through twelve amounted to more than \$4,000 from state money, and a college education added on to the first twelve grades increased the cost to \$9,000 per student. "We can not afford the luxury of losing that investment by many of our young people going out of state for employment."


Supt. Caster was talking along the same line when he said that schools are stressing "accountability," or what the tax dollar produces in education.

Now we have special education classes for all children, more parents involved in education, more students involvement in school actions, more committees than ever before working on school problems. Individual instruction is more important, drug education is a new requirement.

Caster was asked to comment on teacher tenure and he replied that he thought tenure would become less of a problem as schools had a wider choice of teacher applicants, so that better qualified teachers would be filling the jobs. He thought there was a minimum of teachers who relied on tenure to hold their jobs.





Peppin's affidavit apparently drew the bitterest of Mrs. McSween's ire. Her petition said the affidavit said Peppin was certain "Mrs. McSween was an unprincipled, untruthful woman; one that would not hesitate to use any means in her power to accomplish her ends, even to the sacrifice of life."
 Peppin swore also, according to the McSween petition, that he had heard the widow say, in June, 1878, "that she would be damned if she would not clean the county of Lincoln out of the parties who opposed her husband's actions if she had to spend \$25,000 to do it."
 Peppin alleged, Mrs. McSween charged, that her "daily companions...during the last six to eight months have been well known and recognized outlaws, many of whom were positively known by her to be under indictment by the grand jury for murder and other felonies...at no time...had it been considered safe or prudent for any civil posse that could be called on to aid the legally constituted authority of the county to attempt to serve warrants on the outlaws whom she has definitely harbored and protected..."

All the statements made against her were lies, charged Mrs. McSween -- and she asked that a judge and jury be set down to hear her pleas.
 This never happened -- but it is apparent she had a lasting last word. Dudley, who apparently often looked upon the wine when it was not merely red but crimson, had a peck of later troubles with his superiors and was twice tried before military courts martial.

Peppin, after an undistinguished career as sheriff, became Post Butcher at Fort Stanton, dying in September of 1904.
 Mrs. McSween (as Mrs. Barber, she having remarried) went on to become one of the area's most-respected cattle raisers and a social lioness of the frontier.
 She lived until 1931.

One wonders, inevitably, if she and Peppin ever crossed paths or swords or anything -- in the years between the filing of the lawsuit that has yet officially to die -- 1879 -- and Peppin's death, four years after the turn of the century.
