



## ORDINANCE NO. 72-100 AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CERTAIN RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES TO THE MOUNTAIN STATES TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, State of New Mexico: SECTION 1. Grant of Authority. There is hereby granted by the Town of Carrizozo, hereinafter called the "Town," to The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, hereinafter called the "Company," the non-exclusive right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain, in upon, along, across, above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways and public places now in use or dedicated, and all extensions thereof, and additions thereto, in said Town, poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other communications fixtures necessary or proper for the maintenance and operation in said Town of the Company's communications business; provided, however, that no poles or other fixtures shall be placed where the same will interfere with any electric light, water hydrant, or water main, and shall be placed in such a manner as to cause a minimum interference with the rights or reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of said streets, alleys or public ways and places, and all such poles or other fixtures placed in any street shall be placed at the outer edge of the sidewalk and inside the curb lines; and those placed in alleys shall be placed close to the line of the lots abutting on said alley and then in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets, alleys and public ways.

SECTION 2. Use of System by Municipality. The Town shall have the privilege, during the life of this franchise, of maintaining upon the poles of the Company within the Town limits wire and pole fixtures necessary for a police and fire alarm system, such wires and fixtures to be placed and maintained under the supervision of the Company. The Town in its use and maintenance of such wires and fixtures shall at all times comply with the rules and regulations of the Company, and the provisions of the latest edition of the National Electrical Safety Code, so that there may be minimum danger of contact or conflict between the wires and fixtures of the Company and the wires and fixtures of the Town. It is further agreed, in order to avoid danger to life and property, that the above privilege is granted on condition that no such police or fire alarm wires or fixtures of the Town shall be placed on poles carrying electric light or power wires nor shall said police or fire alarm wires or other fixtures be exposed, without the consent of the Company, to the danger of contact with any conductor carrying a voltage greater than the normal telephone voltage. The Town shall be solely responsible for all injury to persons or damage to property arising out of the construction or maintenance of said police and fire alarm fixtures, or arising out of the attachment, maintenance or removal of said wires and fixtures to the poles of the Company. In cases of rearrangement of the Company's plant, or removal of poles or fixtures, the Town shall care for or remove its own fixtures, and shall save the Company harmless from any damage or injury to persons or property, including property of the Town, arising out of the removal or construction of its wires or other fixtures.

SECTION 3. Company Liability. The said Company shall, at all times during the life of this franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the Town and to such reasonable regulation as the Town may, by resolution or ordinance, hereafter provide. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the said Company and the Town that said Company shall save the Town harmless from all loss sustained by the Town on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever, resulting from negligence on the part of said Company in the construction or maintenance of its telephone system in the Town. The Town shall notify the Company's representative within five days after the presentation of any claim or demand either by suit or otherwise made against the Town on account of any negligence as aforesaid on the part of the Company.

SECTION 4. Repair of Streets, Etc. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, the Company shall, at its own cost and expense, and in a manner entirely satisfactory to the Town, and subject to the jurisdiction of said Town respecting the subject, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway or surface of any streets or alleys disturbed, in as good a condition as before said work was commenced.

SECTION 5. Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along, or to make any unusual use of, the streets, alleys and public ways of the Town which shall interfere with the poles, wires or fixtures of the Company a sum sufficient to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering and moving of the wires or other fixtures of said Company and before a permit is given by the Town therefore, the applicant shall present a receipt from the Company showing the said payment. Thereupon the Company, upon presentation of said permit, shall within a reasonable time thereafter provide for and do such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the streets, alleys and public ways of the Town.

SECTION 6. As a further consideration for this franchise, the Company shall provide for the Town, without charge, five (5) one party flat rate business telephones to be located in the Town offices and to be used for Town business only. It is understood that the Company's obligation is to furnish local exchange service only, and the Town will pay for all long distance charges and any incidental charges that may be incurred by the Town in connection with the telephones furnished hereunder.

SECTION 7. The Town shall have the right, at all reasonable times to inspect the books and records of the Company pertaining to the Company's gross revenue for local exchange service received from telephone subscribers located within the limits of the Town.

SECTION 8. The Town agrees to pay to the Company in accordance with standard tariff schedules the rates and charges for all telephone service of any description whatsoever rendered by the Company to the Town, except as provided in Section 6 hereof, and except the cost, value or rental of attachments, made by the Town to the poles of the Company as provided in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 9. In consideration of the services provided for in Section 6 above, it is expressly understood and agreed by the Company and the Town that the services above specified shall be in lieu of any and all franchise, license, occupation, or any other form of excise or revenue tax (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements), based upon or measured by the revenue, employees, payroll, property, poles, wires; instruments, conduits, pipes, fixtures or other appurtenances of the Company, and all other property or equipment of the Company or any part thereof; provided that said services shall continue only so long as the Company is not prohibited from furnishing the same without charge by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises, and so long as the Town does not charge, levy or collect, or attempt to charge, levy or collect any of the forms of taxes specified above in this paragraph; and if any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises shall hereafter prohibit provision of such services without charge, or if the Town does levy, charge or collect or attempt to levy, charge or collect any of the forms of taxes specified in this paragraph, the obligation to provide such services without charge as hereinabove provided shall forthwith cease.

SECTION 10. It is understood and agreed that the acceptance of this franchise by the Company does not constitute a waiver or relinquishment of any rights or privileges the Company may have with respect to the streets and highways within the Town by virtue of the Constitution and statutes of the State of New Mexico.

SECTION 11. Term of Franchise. The franchise and rights herein granted shall continue in force and effect for a term of twenty-five (25) years after the effective date of this franchise.

SECTION 12. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its passage and approval; provided the Company, within said thirty (30) days, shall have filed with the Town Clerk of the Town of Carrizozo an unconditional acceptance thereof. Within ten (10) days after the filing of said acceptance the Town Clerk shall acknowledge in writing the receipt of said acceptance. Upon acceptance of the franchise granted herein, all prior agreements between the Town and the Company relating to the subject matter hereof shall be terminated.

**SANTA FE**—Democratic presidential candidate George McGovern boosted his New Mexico political stock in two days of campaigning in Albuquerque and Espanola but still seemed to trail far behind Republican President Richard M. Nixon in this state.

McGovern talked on the problems of Spanish-Americans and other minorities at a major Espanola barbecue rally. U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, McGovern's state campaign chairman, had predicted earlier up to 30,000 would attend the major event.

More than a dozen steers were contributed from New Mexico's East Side for beef for the barbecue. Democrats tried to make the rally the largest ever held in New Mexico.

South Dakota Sen. McGovern, 50, had often visited Taos, Santa Fe and other Northern New Mexico areas earlier. He spent much of his time in New Mexico relaxing in Albuquerque after a 10-state campaign swing.

McGovern talked briefly to 300 who attended a \$50-a-couple fund-raising reception honoring him at Albuquerque. He said: "I want to restore the government to the people. The country cannot afford Richard Nixon for another four years."

McGovern also met in Albuquerque with potential major campaign contributors. Harvey Mudd, Taos environmentalist, was in the group. Dennis Hopper, Taos movie producer and actor also was reportedly in the meeting.

Some 150 greeted McGovern when he arrived Friday by plane in Albuquerque. Democratic U. S. Senate candidate Jack Daniels, Hobbs, and Santa Fe lawyer Gene Gallegos, U. S. House District 1 Democratic nominee, attended major McGovern campaign events in New Mexico.

U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat seeking re-election, stayed in Washington to finish a special House Armed Service Committee report due early this week.

The Eunice rate includes \$4.61 for New Mexico Junior College.

**Large rodeo payoff at fair**

**ALBUQUERQUE** — The nation's best-known rodeo hands and cowgirls are expected to compete for what officials believe will be largest prize-money payoff ever at the New Mexico State Fair Rodeo, this year scheduled for Sept. 15-24 in Tingley Coliseum.

Last year 283 of them — including contestants destined for seven world championships in 1971 — were listed for a shot at \$40,885 in five cowboy contests and the girls' barrel race. 1972's additional money will result from the addition of daily team roping, one of the sport's most populous contests.

High money winner at the 1971 State Fair was former world champion bull rider Doug Brown, Silverton, Ore., with \$1895 won in bull riding and saddle bronc riding.

Just behind with \$1819 was Phil Lyne, George West, Tex., who finished the year at the top of the heap both in calf roping and all around standings. Lyne again is in the lead in both contests with more than \$45,000 won to date.

1971 world champion bareback bronc rider Joe Alexander, Cora, Wyoming, was blanked in the final average. Gary Tucker, Carlsbad, won third.

World bull riding titlist Bill Nelson, San Francisco, Calif., also failed to place. That contest was won by John Quintana, Eugene, Ore., currently in the lead for 1972.

Bill Smith, Cody, Wyo., 1971's saddle bronc champ finished second at last year's State Fair. Oklahoma cowboy Billy Hale, of Checotah, placed fourth in Albuquerque on the way to the world championship in steer wrestling.

State Fair livestock will be provided for the 29th year by Beutler Bros. and Cervi, Sterling, Colo., whose inventories include 27 brones and bulls featured at the 1971 National Finals Rodeo. Among them is "Descent", the Palomino saddle bronc selected a record fifth time as "Bucking Horse of the Year".

Tops among the bulls are "Double Ought", ridden only three times in more than 225 attempts; "J116", ridden once in 38 attempts; and "R" voted third best at the 1971 National Finals Rodeo.

The New Mexico State Fair — "The Biggest Show In New Mexico" — opens Sept. 13, with rodeo sessions nightly beginning Sept. 15.
