It was a painful week for lots of people in the football world. Zozo played its best game of the season by far without the services of Mike and Chris - which should leave them wondering. The N.Y. Jets, Dallas Cowboys, No. 3 Colorado, Highly favored Arizona State all were losers.

A long - time friend and Kansas cattle buyer who covers the west tending to business then writes regularly for his home - town newspaper, put these words in print: I was visiting with a third generation sheep rancher in Wyoming last week and he told us "the ecologists in their crazy binge are putting us out of business! On this outfit we are supporting 2,500 antelope, about 20,000 coyotes and a half million eagles, not to mention plenty of bobcats, bears and mountain lions that are taking tribute on our grass and on our sheep. I can't afford herders any more, just have three good men to take care of 500 cows and 6,000 ewes, having high school boys come out on Saturday for branding, shearing, and working lambs. It's good experience for the boys, and they are learning, too. But these ecologists, they won't let me poison the coyotes, or do anything about them rather than shooting and occasional one. If they keep multiplying at the present rate, they will surge in hordes to the eastern cities, and steal little pigs from the farmers, and make all the farm and city cats come up missing. I know one thing, they are putting me out of the sheep business. I will go to cows, and the coyotes may get all of the calves. Maybe that's what the ecologists want, so I will leave, and they come, dirty and unkempt as about 90 percent of them are."

So all is not rosy in Wyoming. (Here on this flat land, the pickup brigade of Kirk Brothers, Henry Fromme and running dogs, and sundry citizens wanting a thrill in near collisions, get about 100 coyotes every year, so we don't have quite the problem yet). Let the ecology boys ban the wolf hounds too, and we'll be in trouble here.

"What's all this?" Lee Trevino asked as he read a letter by area officials of the NAACP and League of United Latin American Citizens. "I ain't no minority group. Besides, I didn't come all the way up here (Bettendorf, Iowa) to this cold country just to withdraw (from \$100,000 golf tournament). Let's go play."

Larry Vierthaler, Kansas publisher, saved this clipping written by the best story teller we know and former editor at Johnson, Kansas - Jay Baugh.

As for friends, we enjoy and appreciate them enough that we have kept this yellowed clipping for years and have forgotten where we found it: "When good friends walk beside us... On the trails that we must keep... Our burdens seem less heavy... and the hills are not so steep. The weary miles pass swiftly... taken in joyous stride... and all the world seems brighter... when friends walk by our side."

Andy Hendrix of Alamogordo, the man who chartered Carrizozo Rotary Club March 17, 1959, was an invited guest for special recognition of his good doings at Rotary last week. Albert Roberts told some of the details of that first meeting, also presented Andy with a beautiful tie and card of appreciation. Andy was district governor 1958-59 and helped organize seven clubs at that time. Ford Abbey, also at the charter meeting was another special guest last week.

A couple of good stories came out during Andy's visit. A fellow was walking along in front of Joe Sargent's bar at just the time a customer was thrown out through the big window glass. Joe was standing on the street and the fellow asked him what was going on. Said Joe, "Someone threw one of my customers out the window and I just came out to throw him back in. Credit Johnson Stearns for this tale."

Andy remembers Col. Helmick, commander at Holloman 1948-49 telling about time he was in the little bar at Oscuro run by Heavy Drake. A Lincoln County rancher was there negotiating with Helmick on land deal. Couple of cowboys were playing the jukebox so loud the rancher and Helmick couldn't hear each other talk. After couple times asking them to tone it down - the rancher pulled out his pistol and shot down the jukebox - which cleared the air and the bar so they could continue their talk. Question Andy can't answer, "Who was the rancher?"

SANTA FE - Voter apathy was widespread as the general election, campaign chugged along toward the showdown Nov. 7.

Ed Hartman, New Mexico chairman of the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, reported apathy among Democrats and Republicans, Hartman said: "Apathy on the Democratic side is disenchantment with the nominee. On the Republican side it's a feeling Nixon is a shoo-in."

Young McGovernites began pushing one-on-one voter canvassing statewide after the registration deadline Sept. 26. The McGovern campaign accented house-to-house appeals with explanations of South Dakota Sen. George McGovern's positions.

A national poll showed McGovern closing the big gap on Nixon. But McGovern started more than 30 points behind the President and some tightening of the race was expected. Nixon was still clearly ahead in New Mexico.

Chris Brown, campaign director for Santa Fe lawyer Gene Gallegos, the Democratic U. S. House nominee in District 1, said a professional poll showed Gallegos gained 20 points after Aug. 18.

Gallegos' walking tours of the Pecos Wilderness, the Albuquerque Valley and part of Rio Arriba County attracted much attention. But he moved into October still trailing U. S. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque Republican, by several lengths.

Little known Ed Presson, Silver City Republican, complained he could use help from Pete Domenici's U. S. Senate campaign. Presson, 30, is pitted against U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat.

Heavily favored Runnels campaigned in big District 2 during the weekend after a flying trip from Washington. Dr. E. E. Hubble, Truth or Consequences physician, said he will become Presson's Sierra County coordinator. Dr. Hubble said Presson needed exposure to voters.

The race between Republican Domenici and Hobbbs Democrat Jack Daniels for U. S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson's seat continued to heat up. Some Domenici-Daniels exchanges were marred by personal attacks.

The Domenici-Daniels battle was still regarded as close. Domenici was accorded a slight edge because of Nixon coattailing. When Nixon carried New Mexico by 39,611 votes in 1968 GOP candidates for president, governor and the U. S. House won in 13 of the state's 32 counties.

The State Board of Finance authorized \$550,000 in bonds for the State Game and Fish Department to fund improvements in Cimarron Canyon. Three overnight camping areas and 12 picnic sites are planned between Ute Park and Eagle Nest.

State Game Director Ladd Gordon met early this week with Highway Department officials over a long-planned highway on US-64 through Cimarron Canyon. Gordon said the Game Department opposes highway construction through the bottom of the picturesque canyon.

Gordon said the Game Department wants assurance the recreational facilities are not in the path of future highway construction. The Game Department owns 33,000 acres along 10 miles of the Cimarron River, a popular area. The Game Department's bond fund will finance improvements.

The State Racing Commission tentatively approved 64 days of racing for the 1973 Ruidoso Downs meet, up one day from the card this year. The commission also approved in principle a new-triple futurity at LaMesa Park, Raton.

The Triple Crown Quarter Horse Futurity at LaMesa Park is tentatively set for dates in July and August and Sept. 2. The Racing Commission approved a stakes race schedule that included the \$1 million-plus All-American Futurity for quarter horses at Ruidoso Downs, the world's richest horse race. The famed Ruidoso Downs race will be run Labor Day, Sept. 3.

State agencies reported gas production is up and oil output is down in New Mexico. The average price of gas per 1,000 cubic feet increased in the state from 16 cents in February to 19 cents in June. Much of the increase was pegged to boosts subject to Federal Power Commission approval.

The number of operating rigs was up 25 percent over 1971, mostly because of higher gas production. A FPC examiner's report on the Permian Basin case was still awaited. New Mexico seeks a sharp price hike on Permian Basin gas in this state.

The oil and gas industry paid \$36.3 million in six taxes to the Oil and Gas Accounting Commission last fiscal year, virtually unchanged from fiscal 1971. State oil and gas royalty revenue dropped \$84,612 last fiscal year. Royalty revenue was down for the January-September span this year.

The State Park and Recreation Commission proposes \$1.3 million in capital improvements at state parks in the fiscal year starting next July 1.

The request will be screened by the State Finance Department and Gov. Bruce King's office before it is sent to the legislature in January. Half of costs would be paid by the U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

The commission's proposal includes: Ute Lake, Quay County, \$72,620; Valley of Fires, Lincoln County, \$40,000; Elephant Butte, Sierra County, \$65,500; Kit Carson, Taos, \$42,000; Rancho Villa, Luna County, \$8,000; Percha Dam, Sierra County, \$6,500; Rio Grande Gorge, mostly Taos County, \$29,500; Rock Hound, Luna County, \$27,000; Alamogordo Lake, DeBaca County, \$51,680; Caballo Lake, Sierra County, \$61,950; City of Rocks, Grant County, \$9,300; Clayton Lake, Union County, \$4,500; Conechas Lake, San Miguel County, \$418,932; and Navajo Lake, San Juan-Rio Arriba Counties, \$57,600.

The Highway Commission will open bids Oct. 20 on stockpiling of material near Clayton on US-87-64-56 in Union County.



Score 22-0 Halftime





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

Anyone may join a homemakers club. Membership is open to all, regardless of race, color, creed or national origin. For more information on joining a club or organizing one in your community, contact your county extension home agent.







Old beam finally found

Sometimes archeology and the reconstruction of the past is meticulous scientific investigation - and sometimes it is dumb luck! We've had our share of both here at Gran Quivira National Monument.

In 1853 an army detachment camped here, and they reported that many beams of the great church of San Buenaventura were still in place. But by 1909 when we became a national monument, all the beams were gone, not a one left. In 1924 the custodian, "Doc" Smith, heard that a beam "that might be from San Buenaventura" was part of an abandoned dugout two miles north of here. Doc, his son and his 5-year old grandson hauled the beam back and put it along the church wall like a bench, wondering if it really was from here. For years it sat there, while the 5-year old grandson grew up

and had his own family. Then in 1961 some old photographs of Gran Quivira showed up, taken in 1890. One showed several beams still in place, and one of the beams was quite clear. Using a good lens the archeologist matched the knots on the visible beam in the photograph to the beam lying along the wall - they were identical! Amazingly, the beam that Doc Smith recovered was the only beam that could have been definitely identified; it just took us 39 years to put the evidence together!
What of that 5-year old grandson? His name is Travis Eldridge, he lives in Alamogordo and he was here the other day with his grandson, looking at the old beam. You can see it today. It is back where it was first placed three centuries ago, above the main entrance of the church. And it is soaked in wood preservative, so hopefully it will be there for a whole series of grandsons to come.

Endurance ride ends at Quemado

After the ride the Quemado Roping Club will host all riders to a western dance and awards banquet. Limited motel accommodations are available in Quemado, but contestants are urged to camp out if possible.





Rodeo winners from all around

ALBUQUERQUE - Ageless Freckles Brown emerged the winner in bull riding at the New Mexico State Fair Rodeo in spite of a world record 95 points scored Saturday night by Jack Himes, Big Spring, Texas, on Beutler Bros. and Cervi's notorious "Couple Oucht".
 Brown, a graying 51-year-old from Soper, Okla., edged Himes in final average on two bulls by three points, 162 to 159, and won \$2,127.
 Himes' successful ride was the fourth in more than 230 attempts in three years at the 1700-pound Charolais. The new world record holder is 20 years old.
 Biggest winner at the State Fair was S. D. Callahan, Joplin, Mo., who collected the most money in steer wrestling. A total of 12 seconds flat on two steers earned the cowboy \$2,157.
 Edsal Rhodes, Pueblo, Colo., roped and tied two calves in 23.2 seconds, more than a full second faster than his nearest competitor, to win \$1117.
 Two cowgirls tied for final honors in the barrel race. Gail Pelska, Norma, Okla., and Allene Gayler, Colorado Springs, Colo., each took home \$947 for two run total of 32.9 seconds.

Tops in team roping with 14.8 on two steers were Bucky Bradford, Tucson, Ariz., and Camarillo, Donald, Ore. Each roper was given a check for \$1982. Camarillo currently leads for the world championship.
 Jack Ward, Odessa, Tex., claimed the State Fair title in bareback bronc riding. Ward's total of 281 points on four horses was but one point better than that of Jimmie Dix, North Collie, West Australia. Ward won \$1115.
 Olney Springs, Colorado cowboy Gerald Eichelberger had the highest total in saddle bronc riding, 217 points on three mounts. Eichelberger's take-home pay was \$1205.

There's more than harvests and Halloween in New Mexico in October, for usually it's the pleasantest of months, weatherwise, according to the National Weather Service.
 Temperatures average 9 to 11 degrees cooler than in September. Days with 90-degree temperatures are rare in the north and average only one or two in the south. Correspondingly, only one or two nights will bring freezing temperatures to the south, but about half the October nights will be frosty in mountain areas.
 Average maximum temperatures range from 81 at Jal and Lordsburg in the southern corners to 61 at Wolf Canyon in the Jemez Mountains. Average minimums range from 53 at Carlsbad Caverns to 23 at Eagle Nest. Extremes are 101 at Carlsbad in 1934 and 15 below zero at Red River in 1945.
 Too, an occasional early snow will fall in mountain areas, though precipitation continues to decrease from summer, ranging from a half inch in the Middle Rio Grande Valley to 1.9 inches over the Eastern Plains. Highest mountains usually receive as much as 3 to 4 inches of precipitation in October.

In the past, records show that 1957 and 1960 were exceedingly wet years. One year, 1952, October was totally dry Statewide.
 The greatest precipitation in October was 11.95 inches at Porter in 1930. (Porter is 25 miles east of Tucumcari.) Almost 10 inches of that total fell in 24 hours.
 Hunters and hikers, skiers and sno-goers, bikers and sand buggy enthusiasts all look to October skies for their own peculiar recreational signs of joy - and, like a benevolent mother, Nature in October in New Mexico seldom lets them down.





CHAPTER 13
AN ACT
AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF AND SALE OF STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION LIBRARY BONDS - SERIES 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 AND 1977, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CAPITAL EXPENDITURES OF LIBRARIES AT STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, THE JUNIOR COLLEGE AND BRANCH COMMUNITY COLLEGES; PROVIDING A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF THE BONDS; AND PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THIS ACT TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "State Educational Institution Library Bond Act".

Section 2. For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures of the libraries at state educational institutions as named in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico, branch community colleges thereof and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County, successive indebtedness of the state is hereby authorized for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), or any lesser amount as may be legally issued under constitutional limitations existing at the time of issuance of bonds evidencing the indebtedness, or any lesser amount as may be recommended by the board of educational finance and approved by the state board of finance.

House Bill 59
Approved February 17, 1972

Section 3. The state treasurer shall prepare successively negotiable serial bonds of the state of New Mexico, to be known as "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1974," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1975," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1976," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1977," as the case may be, in denominations as the governor shall determine, to be numbered consecutively, and to be dated January 1, or July 1, of the year in which they are issued. The bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on July 1 and January 1 of each year. Payment on the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance and the bonds shall mature thereafter in substantially equal annual installments in such manner that all of the bonds shall mature not later than five years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the state treasurer in the city of Santa Fe, New Mexico, or at such alternate paying agent at a bank or banks within or without the state of New Mexico as the state board of finance may authorize. The bonds shall be signed by the governor, attested by the secretary of state under the seal of the state, and countersigned by the state treasurer. The full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the prompt payment at maturity of the principal and interest of all the bonds which may be issued and sold as provided in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act.

Section 4. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for capital expenditures to permit the libraries of the state educational institutions of higher education and libraries of their branch community colleges and the library of the New Mexico junior college of Lea County to fulfill the purposes for which they were created. The amounts for each such

institution and college are to be established by the board of educational finance, hereinafter called "the board".

For the purpose of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, library materials shall be defined as books, periodicals, documents, magnetic tapes, phonograph records, audiovisual materials, cataloging materials, and other printed and published materials which are suitable for inclusion in the library resources of institutions of higher education and which with the exception of periodicals and newspapers with reasonable care and use may be expected to last for more than one year. Such term also includes necessary first binding of such printed and published materials, but shall not include supplies.

Prior to the allocation of any funds deriving from bonds authorized by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, the board, with the cooperation of the higher education institutions, branch community colleges and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County, shall conduct a long-range planning study and project a coordinated, detailed development plan for the libraries of these institutions. Based upon such study, the board shall establish the percentage of the proceeds of each bond issue to be allocated to the individual institutions and colleges, according to the formula to be established as hereinafter provided, for the acquisitions of academic library collections.

For the purpose of allocating a portion of the proceeds of each issue to individual institutions and colleges for the acquisition of academic library collections, the board shall, based upon the long-range study and prior to the allocation of any funds, establish a quantitative formula for such allocations to the higher education institutions and colleges. Such formula shall take into consideration the full-time equivalent of faculty members, the full-time equivalent graduate enrollment, the full-time equivalent undergraduate enrollment, the undergraduates in honors or independent study programs, the fields of undergraduate concentration, the fields of graduate concentration in master's work or equivalent, the fields of graduate concentration in doctoral work or equivalent, and the existing collections of each institution and college. The board shall submit the formula to the board of finance for concurrence. The formula shall be subject to change only as a result of a major change in the anticipated program or enrollment of an institution or upon appeal and justification of a change by the institution or college or when the board determines that a change is needed as a result of its monitoring of actual expenditures made from allocated funds, as hereinafter provided. The change, if made by the board, must have the concurrence of the board of finance.

Based upon such formula and the percentage of each issue to be allocated on this basis, the board shall establish for each higher education institution and college a projected approximate allocation of such institution's share of the total funds to be allocated on this basis from the bond issues authorized by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act. On the basis of this projection, each institution and college shall develop a five-year plan for acquisition of academic library collections. The plan and any subsequent modifications shall be reported to the board.

As a part of its long-range planning study, the board shall project, for the institutional and college libraries individually and collectively, those capital outlay requirements other than acquisition of academic library collections and construction of buildings, necessary for the implementation of proven techniques for utilization of modern technology and other recent developments in the performance of the academic library function. The board shall reexamine and adjust such projections periodically. Using the projections as a framework, that portion of the proceeds from each issue not allocated for acquisition of academic library collections shall be allocated by the board to the individual institutions and colleges and/or consortia of the institutions and colleges for such capital outlay requirements. All such allocations shall be for the funding of specific, detailed projects submitted by the institutions or consortia of the institutions and colleges.

Each institution shall submit such reports as the board may prescribe on the actual expenditures made from allocated funds. The board shall, using such reports, monitor the progress made by the institutions individually and collectively in implementing the development plan projected by the board and the institutions' and colleges' five-year plans for acquisition of academic library collections. Based on such monitoring, the board may change the formula for the allocations for acquisition of academic library collections.

Section 5. The principal of the bonds shall be payable to bearer, or if registered as provided in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, to the registered holder, as the same becomes due. Interest coupons payable to bearer shall be attached to each of the bonds and shall be consecutively numbered specifying the number of the bond to which they are attached. The bonds shall bear the engraved lithographed facsimile of the signature of the state treasurer in office at the time the bonds and coupons are prepared and ordered to be engraved or lithographed. The bonds, when duly signed, attested, counter-signed, issued and sold as provided in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, shall be valid obligations of the state. The bonds may be executed in accordance with the Uniform Facsimile Signature of public Officials Act.

Section 6. The bonds authorized under the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect, to the highest bidder for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery. The state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and also in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The publication shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day and hour at which sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the highest price therefor. No bid shall be accepted which is less

than the par value of the bonds plus the interest accrued from the last preceding interest date to the date of delivery. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise. The state board of finance may, at any time, sell the bonds, or any part thereof, to the state treasurer at private sale at not more than four percent interest. The state treasurer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds with the permanent funds in his hands for investment at any time. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposits of public money.

Section 7. The department of finance and administration shall make a record in a book kept for that purpose in which shall be entered the date, number and amount of each bond sold and the amount for which the same was sold. Any of the bonds sold may be registered by the state treasurer upon presentation of the bonds and may be at the request and in the name of the holder thereof in a book kept for that purpose, registered as to principal only, or as to both principal and interest, in which latter case all coupons attached to such registration with the date thereof shall be endorsed by the state treasurer on each bond so registered.

Section 8. The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds before any proceeds are distributed to the state educational institutions and colleges specified in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act.

Section 9. To provide for the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds shall be outstanding, an ad valorem tax on all property in the state of New Mexico subject to taxation for state purposes sufficient to produce an amount equal to one year's interest on all bonds then outstanding, together with an amount sufficient to pay the principal of all bonds as they mature. The taxes hereby authorized, imposed and levied shall be levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other taxes for state purposes are levied, assessed and collected, and it shall be the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be levied, assessed and collected.

Section 10. The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected under the taxes hereby imposed and levied, and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the interest and principal of the bonds as they become due.

Section 11. Any holder of any of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act or any person or officer being a party in interest, may either at law or in equity, by suit, action, or by mandamus enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act of any officer or person herein mentioned. The provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act constitute an irrevocable contract with the holders of any of the bonds and the coupons thereof issued pursuant to the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature of the state, the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds hereby authorized, and the bonds and coupons attached thereto shall have all the qualities of negotiable paper under the law merchant and shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issue and sale thereof and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act are exempt from taxation.

Section 12. The State Educational Institution Library Bond Act shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state at the general election to be held in November, 1972, and if it shall receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, it shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of such election; provided, that no bonds shall be issued or sold under the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act until the qualified electors of this state shall have voted upon and ratified that act at the general election in 1972, as herein provided.

All ballots at the 1972 general election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977," and in the same square under these words, the following, in briefer type: "The State Educational Institution Library Bond Act provides for the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to provide funds for capital expenditures of libraries at state educational institutions, and provides for a tax levy for payments of interest and principal of the bonds."

In the square immediately below the square containing the foregoing words, there shall be printed on the ballot the words: "Against the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977," and in the same square, immediately below these words, in briefer type, shall be printed: "This 1972 act provides for the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to provide funds for capital expenditures of libraries at state educational institutions, and provides for a tax levy for payments of interest and principal of the bonds."

Opposite the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977" there shall be left a space in which the voters may place a cross in the manner required by law to indicate whether for or against said act, and those voting for said

act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977" and those voting against the act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words "Against the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977."

The secretary of state shall include the submission of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act to the people as aforesaid and it shall be included in the general election proclamation of each of the county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the election, as required by the state constitution.

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
