

Three Rivers Ranch to be "Homesteaded"

Jim Polk and Alan Kain, who will participate in the development. Winston said that the change would be done slowly as it would be at least a year before any sale were opened.

On a bright golden October afternoon, framed on one side by the mountains pushing upward 12,000 feet to the top of Old Baldy, and on the other side, the faint glitter of the White Sands, Thomas Fortune Ryan III spoke to a gathering of ranchers, farmers, bankers, town folk and a few strangers and ended a peculiar series of undeclared wars that had lasted one year shy of a century.

"Twenty miles north of Tularosa there is a magic valley. It goes by the name of Tres Ritos - Three Rivers - from the mountain streams draining the western flank of the Sierra Blanca which join forces at the foot and meander downward through fertile acres, turning into crops and cash on the way. If you like ranch country you would fall in love with Three Rivers, as Pat Coughlan did in 1873 - as Albert Fall did sixteen years later - as Thomas Fortune Ryan did in 1939." (C. L. Sonnichsen "Tularosa, Last of the Frontier West")

Sunday, October 15, Tom Ryan told the folks gathered from Lincoln and Otero Counties (the ranch is in two counties) he had sold the Three Rivers Ranch to an El Paso based company that would, in the future, subdivide the 22,000 acres into "Homesteads" for people who want to "get away from the cities."

Quite a number of the guests assembled for barbecue, beer, music and the announcement had not so distant ties to the history of Three Rivers ranch. This country of mountains, grassy plains, canyons and a three lined river bed had been a part of the Apache history, the Lincoln County Wars, the Fountain-Falls feud and the often bloody battles between the corporate ranches and the independent stockmen.

Tom Ryan reminded his friends of a part of

that history. He spoke of the very early people who used the land with no claim of property. Part of their record remains in the petroglyphs on the ranch, now a historic monument. He remembered the early homesteaders whose fertile orchards and farms disappeared in the years of drought. Not so many years ago Tom deeded the small church and cemetery that had been the community center, back to those people who now mostly live in Tularosa, Carrizozo, Alamogordo and other neighboring communities.

Sitting on the stage with Tom, along with the new owners, the Leavell Company officials, was Pete Crawford. Tom said Pete had been the last of the old time homesteaders to leave. Three years ago Pete decided to move into Tularosa and he sold his land to Tom. When the two men looked for a deed, they found the papers in a trunk and the name on the deed was that of President Grover Cleveland. Pete and Tom decided that kind of deed did not need the usual attentions of lawyers and with a shaking of hands made the deal.

Tom promised the old settler to take good care of the property. Since he felt he was past the homesteading time of life, Tom says they are the first of a new group of homesteaders for Three Rivers. He told the folks the Leavell Company was one of the biggest contractors in the United States and in this case was committed to make a place for city people to live without changing the intrinsic nature of the land.

"We won't have a 'Sun City,'" he said, "The people want to get away from the city." He does like words such as castle acreas, estates, manors. Tom said he, instead, likes to think of a homestead, a place with a house and a few acres where a fellow can sit back on his porch and "let the wind draw the water and the cattle chop the wood."

There is a lot more to the story of Three Rivers that was not told that warm-afternoon. It would be hard to say just which of the many sides of the many wars that involved that beautiful ranch were the historical victors.

In 1873 Pat Coughlan, "a big strong, red-faced and hearty" Irishman began acquiring land that was to become the Three Rivers Ranch. He also bought considerable property in Tularosa, and, for a time, was known as the "king of Tularosa."

Pat bought out the Joe Wingfield ranch, the Bar KL, Juan Chavez and others. He failed to acquire the property of Susan McSween Barber, known as the "Cattle Queen of New Mexico" who was the survivor and widow of one of the main figures in the Lincoln County Wars.

Coughlan did quite well and built his ranch into a thing of beauty until he made the mistake of forming a partnership with one William Bonney, alias Billy the Kid.

It appears that Billy wasn't too careful about what brands the cattle wore that he sold to Pat. Pat was sending Billy's stock down the trail into Mexico and some of the big Texas ranches such as LX outfit decided they were the losers in the deal. Coughlan wound up under arrest and while he did not serve time, the court battles and the time away from ranching put him in debt.

A number of people held paper on the ranch, but in the end, the ranch belonged to Albert Falls who, many years before, according to Sonnichsen, had told his wife, "Emma, Pat Coughlan's place is the prettiest spot I ever saw... some day I'm going to have that ranch." He did.

Fall became one of the most important men in New Mexico. He was an outstanding lawyer and superb politician. He kept the ranch and developed it as a base, but Albert Fall went to Washington. During this period he brought the Bar W ranch and the Hatch brand to bring the ranch up to over a million acres.

For Fall, it wasn't proposed that rather than take their land, Fall might make a park out of

Three Rivers Ranch. Until October nothing came of either suggestion.

Fall, of course, met his downfall as President Harding's secretary of interior. Historians now say that he was a victim of circumstances and that his role in the Teapot Dome scandals has been misunderstood. Indeed, there are authorities who say he was penalized for his foresight in attempting to accumulate and protect the nation's oil reserves. He had predicted trouble with Japan and thought "that Pearl Harbor was the place where supplies would be needed."

But Albert Fall went to prison and the mortgage holder on the ranch foreclosed. The new owners, Petroleum Securities, sold it to Palomas Cattle Company who in turn sold it to Will Ed Harris, A. D. Brownfield, Truman Spencer and Jesse York. Other parcels were sold to other ranchers and in 1941 Tom Ryan bought Three Rivers itself.

Tom had had quite a career himself but like others before him, Three Rivers became home. He built a beautiful ranch house (the old Fall adobe was in ruin).

This week it appears that the story has just about ended. In the battle between the white man and the Indians - well, the reservations grows, develops and is still there. The giant ranch will disappear but more people are invading.

Ironically, much of the Tularosa battle was between the small independent ranchers and the giant corporate ranches. And this week, one of the independent ranches is acquired by a giant Texas corporation that plans to turn it back to small "homesteaders."

There were a number of old timers at Three Rivers, this week, who regretted the passing of the ranch, a piece of New Mexico history. But there were folks who mentioned that if people needed to leave the cities, they couldn't find a better place to come.

As Dr. Sonnichsen said in closing, "As the years go by, the spell of the magic valley lies more and more in its memories."

Grizzlies ruin Burns' return

The Carrizozo Grizzlies ruined Dexters coach Gerald Burns' return to Grizzly Country by defeating the Demons 40-0. Carrizozo once again displayed an awesome offense and a stubborn defense.

David Roper, Gaby Chavez, and Steve Ortiz all rushed for a hundred yards or more to lead the Grizzly rampage. The Carrizozo defense once again turned another outstanding performance. The defense made up of Steve Ortiz, Gaby Chavez, David Roper, Ernie Beltran, Eddie Herrera, Rito Samora, Christy Montreal, Jody Ventura, Ray Pacheco, Robert Schlarb, Mike Barela have yielded only 18 points and have intercepted 10 enemy aeriels. The rest of the opposing points have been scored on the 2nd defensive unit.

Steve Ortiz wasted no time getting in the end zone as he galloped 41 yards to pay dirt on the 4th play of the game to cap a 71 yard drive. David Roper's kick was good and the score stood 7-0 with 10:24 remaining in the first quarter.

Carrizozo got another opportunity-one minute later when Andre Hoff picked-up a Demon fumble ran it 3 yards to the Dexter Two yard line. On the first play Grizzly Quarterback Chavez faked to Ortiz then kept the ball and scooted in the end zone but one of the officials thought Ortiz had the ball and whistled the play dead nullifying the Touchdown. On the next play Carrizozo fumbled and Dexter recovered ending the threat.

With less than a minute to go in the first quarter, Carrizozo took over the ball again, this time at their own 19 yard line. Eight plays later David Roper burst through the middle of the Dexter defense and rambled 45 yards for a score at the 10:39 point of the 2nd stanza. Roper's kick split the uprights for another point to make the score 14-0 at the half.

In the 3rd quarter, Gaby Chavez found daylight and outran the Demon defense up the sidelines for a 55 yard scoring jaunt. Ernie Beltran's try for 2 points was good according to some officials but one said, "no" and his decision stood as "no good", making the score 20-0.

With Dexter unable to move the ball, Carrizozo and Chavez took over. Chavez ran 31 yards with the first carry and David Roper covered the final 19 yards on 2 carries for his second Touchdown of the night. Ernie Beltran made his run good for the extra point making the score 28-0.

Four plays later Carrizozo had the ball again. It took the Grizzlies only 2 plays to find pay dirt and Roper again doing the honors on a 30 yard scoring play. The try for the point after was short of the goal line. Score 34-0.

G. L. Straley took over the Grizzlies for the final quarter and found the end zone himself on a 10 yard keeper. G. L.'s try for the extra point was short. Score 40-0.

Roper led the rushers with 133 yards in 13 carries. Chavez had 108 yards in 5 tries, while Ortiz accounted for 100 yards in 7 attempts.



PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8, SECTION 3 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR TAXATION OF COMMERCIAL CHURCH PROPERTY; AND TO ALLOW THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE EXEMPTIONS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY FROM TAXATION.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 8, Section 3 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The property of the United States, the state and all counties, towns, cities and school districts, and other municipal corporations, public libraries, community ditches and all laterals thereof, all church property not used for commercial purposes, all property used for educational or charitable purposes, all cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit, and all bonds of the state of New Mexico, and of the counties, municipalities and districts thereof shall be exempt from taxation.

Provided, however, that any property acquired by public libraries, community ditches and all laterals thereof, property acquired by churches, property acquired and used for educational or charitable purposes, and property acquired by cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit, and property acquired by the United States government or by the state of New Mexico by outright purchase or trade, where such property was, prior to such transfer, subject to the lien of any tax or assessment for the principal or interest of any bonded indebtedness shall not be exempt from such lien, nor from the payment of such taxes or assessments.
Exemptions of personal property from ad valorem taxation may be provided by law if approved by a three-fourths majority vote of all the members elected to each house of the legislature."

CHAPTER 13
AN ACT
AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF AND SALE OF STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION LIBRARY BONDS - SERIES 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 AND 1977, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CAPITAL EXPENDITURES OF LIBRARIES AT STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, THE JUNIOR COLLEGE AND BRANCH COMMUNITY COLLEGES; PROVIDING A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF THE BONDS; AND PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THIS ACT TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. This act may be cited as the "State Educational Institution Library Bond Act".
Section 2. For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures of the libraries at state educational institutions as named in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico, branch community colleges thereof and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County, successive indebtedness of the state is hereby authorized for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000, or any lesser amount as may be legally issued under constitutional limitations existing at the time of issuance of bonds evidencing the indebtedness, or any lesser amount as may be recommended by the board of educational finance and approved by the state board of finance.
House Bill 59
Approved February 17, 1972

Section 3. The state treasurer shall prepare successively negotiable serial bonds of the state of New Mexico, to be known as "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1974," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1975," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1976," and "State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1977," as the case may be, in denominations as the governor shall determine, to be numbered consecutively, and to be dated January 1, or July 1, of the year in which they are issued. The bonds shall bear interest payable semi-annually on July 1 and January 1 of each year. Payment on the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance and the bonds shall mature thereafter in substantially equal annual installments in such manner that all of the bonds shall mature not later than five years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the state treasurer in the city of Santa Fe, New Mexico, or at such alternate paying agent at a bank or banks within or without the state of New Mexico as the state board of finance may authorize. The bonds shall be signed by the governor, attested by the secretary of state under the seal of the state, and countersigned by the state treasurer. The full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the prompt payment of all the maturity of the principal and interest of all the bonds which may be issued and sold as provided in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act.

Section 4. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for capital expenditures to permit the libraries of the state educational institutions of higher education and libraries of their branch community colleges and the library of the New Mexico junior college of Lea County to fulfill the purposes for which they were created. The amounts for each such

institution and college are to be established by the board of educational finance, hereinafter called "the board".
For the purpose of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, library materials shall be defined as books, periodicals, documents, magnetic tapes, phonograph records, audiovisual materials, cataloging materials, and other printed and published materials which are suitable for inclusion in the library resources of institutions of higher education and which with the exception of periodicals and newspapers with reasonable care and use may be expected to last for more than one year. Such term also includes necessary first binding of such printed and published materials, but shall not include supplies.
Prior to the allocation of any funds deriving from bonds authorized by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, the board, with the cooperation of the higher education institutions, branch community colleges and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County, shall conduct a long-range planning study and project a coordinated, detailed development plan for the libraries of these institutions. Based upon such study, the board shall establish the percentage of the proceeds of each bond issue to be allocated to the individual institutions and colleges, according to the formula to be established as hereinafter provided, for the acquisitions of academic library collections.
For the purpose of allocating a portion of the proceeds of each issue to individual institutions and colleges for the acquisition of academic library collections, the board shall, based upon the long-range study and prior to the allocation of any funds, establish a quantitative formula for such allocations to the higher education institutions and colleges. Such formula shall take into consideration the full-time equivalent faculty members, the full-time equivalent graduate enrollment, the full-time equivalent undergraduate enrollment, the undergraduates in honors or independent study programs, the fields of undergraduate concentration, the fields of graduate concentration in master's work or equivalent, the fields of graduate concentration in doctoral work or equivalent, and the existing collections of each institution and college. The board shall submit the formula to the board of finance for concurrence. The formula shall be subject to change only as a result of a major change in the anticipated program or enrollment of an institution or upon appeal and justification of a change by the institution or college or when the board determines that a change is needed as a result of its monitoring of actual expenditures made from allocated funds, as hereinafter provided. The change, if made by the board, must have the concurrence of the board of finance.
Based upon such formula and the percentage of each issue to be allocated on this basis, the board shall establish for each higher education institution and college a projected approximate allocation of such institution's share of the total funds to be allocated on this basis from the bond issues authorized by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act. On the basis of this projection, each institution and college shall develop a five-year plan for acquisition of academic library collections. The plan and any subsequent modifications shall be reported to the board.
As a part of its long-range planning study, the board shall project, for the institutional and college libraries individually and collectively, those capital outlay requirements other than acquisition of academic library collections and construction of buildings, necessary for the implementation of modern techniques for utilization of modern technology and other recent developments in the performance of the academic library function. The board shall reexamine and adjust such projections periodically. Using the projections as a framework, that portion of the proceeds from each issue not allocated for acquisition of academic library collections shall be allocated by the board to the individual institutions and colleges and/or consortia of the institutions and colleges for such capital outlay requirements. All such allocations shall be for the funding of specific, detailed projects submitted by the institutions or consortia of the institutions and colleges.
Each institution shall submit such reports as the board may prescribe on the actual expenditures made from allocated funds. The board shall, using such reports, monitor the progress made by the institutions individually and collectively in implementing the development plan projected by the board and the institutions' and colleges' five-year plans for acquisition of academic library collections. Based on such monitoring, the board may change the formula for the allocations for acquisition of academic library collections.
Section 5. The principal of the bonds shall be payable to bearer, or if registered as provided in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, to the registered holder, as the same becomes due. Interest coupons payable to bearer shall be attached to each of the bonds and shall be consecutively numbered specifying the number of the bond to which they are attached. The coupons shall bear the engraved lithographed facsimile of the signature of the state treasurer in office at the time the bonds and coupons are prepared and ordered to be engraved or lithographed. The bonds, when duly signed, attested, counter-signed, issued and sold as provided in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, shall be valid obligations of the state. The bonds may be executed in accordance with the Uniform Facsimile Signature of public Officials Act.
Section 6. The bonds authorized under the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect, to the highest bidder for cash not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery. The state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and also in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The publication shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale; the last publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day and hour at which sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the highest price therefor. No bid shall be accepted which is less

than the par value of the bonds plus the interest accrued from the last preceding interest date to the date of delivery. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise. The state board of finance may, at any time, sell the bonds, or any part thereof, to the state treasurer at private sale at not more than four percent interest. The state treasurer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds with the permanent funds in his hands for investment at any time. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposits of public money.
Section 7. The department of finance and administration shall make a record in a book kept for that purpose in which shall be entered the date, number and amount of each bond sold and the amount for which the same was sold. Any of the bonds sold may be registered by the state treasurer upon presentation of the bonds and may be at the request and in the name of the holder thereof in a book kept for that purpose, registered as to principal only, or as to both principal and interest, in which latter case all coupons attached to such registration with the date thereof shall be endorsed by the state treasurer on each bond so registered.
Section 8. The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds before any proceeds are distributed to the state educational institutions and colleges specified in the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act.
Section 9. To provide for the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds shall be outstanding, an ad valorem tax on all property in the state of New Mexico subject to taxation for state purposes sufficient to produce an amount equal to one year's interest on all bonds then outstanding, together with an amount sufficient to pay the principal of all bonds as they mature. The taxes hereby authorized, imposed and levied shall be levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other taxes for state purposes are levied, assessed and collected, and it shall be the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be levied, assessed and collected.
Section 10. The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected under the taxes hereby imposed and levied, and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the interest and principal of the bonds as they become due.
Section 11. Any holder of any of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, or any person or officer being a party in interest, may either at law or in equity, by suit, action, or by mandamus enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act of any officer or person herein mentioned. The provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act constitute an irrevocable contract with the holders of any of the bonds and the coupons thereof issued pursuant to the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act, for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature of the state, the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds hereby authorized, and the bonds and coupons attached thereto shall have all the qualities of negotiable paper under the law merchant and shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issue and sale thereof and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act are exempt from taxation.
Section 12. The State Educational Institution Library Bond Act shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state at the general election to be held in November, 1972, and if it shall receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, it shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of such election; provided, that no bonds shall be issued or sold under the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act until the qualified electors of this state shall have voted upon and ratified that act at the general election in 1972, as herein provided.
All ballots at the 1972 general election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977" and in the same square under these words, the following, in briefer type: "The State Educational Institution Library Bond Act provides for the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to provide funds for capital expenditures of libraries at state educational institutions, and provides for a tax levy for payments of interest and principal of the bonds."

In the square immediately below the square containing the foregoing words, there shall be printed on the ballot the words: "Against the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977," and in the same square, immediately below these words, in briefer type, shall be printed: "This 1972 act provides for the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1973-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1974-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1975-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), 1976-two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and 1977-two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to provide funds for capital expenditures of libraries at state educational institutions, and provides for a tax levy for payments of interest and principal of the bonds."

Opposite the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977" there shall be left a space in which the voters may place a cross in the manner required by law to indicate whether for or against said act, and those voting for said

act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words "For the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977" and those voting against the act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words "Against the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act authorizing the successive issuance and sale of State Educational Institution Library Bonds - Series 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976 and 1977."

The secretary of state shall include the submission of the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act to the people as aforesaid and it shall be included in the general election proclamation of each of the county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the State Educational Institution Library Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein; once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the election, as required by the state constitution.
