

Pacheco, Payne, Hart are new commissioners

78 Percent of Lincoln County voters went to the polls

In the last presidential election year of 1968, Richard M. Nixon carried all precincts in Lincoln County, New Mexico, getting 2003 votes to 803 for Hubert Humphrey and 287 for George Wallace.

In the November 7 election of 1972 President Nixon did it again only this time his majority was much greater. Nixon received 2528 total votes, 706 for George McGovern and 29 for John Schmitz.

An unusual year for the Democrats, endorsed by the News last week, was the only Democratic winner in the state ticket where there was a choice. Pete Domenici came close to doubling the vote on Jack Daniels in the U. S. Senate race. Harold Runnels got 1960 to 1152 for Ed Presson in the U. S. Rep. race. Hess beat Ferguson for State Corp. Comm., Tansey won over Martinez for supreme court position-1, Jones beat Montoya for position 2, and Stockley won over Sutin in the court of appeals race.

The Canvass of returns sheet looks just as funny as the way Lincoln County is split up for election of state representatives. There is John Bigbee with 1500 votes in 10 precincts over A. F. Padilla with 740, this in District 50. Maurice Hobson, the Republican shows 351 votes for win over Page Carler with 216, in their 3 precincts in District 52. Then there is a loner, Lonesome John J. Mershon with 40 votes, 36 of them in Angus, his one precinct, plus the absentee at Angus of 4 votes, this in District 51.

Commissioner races start close Midway through election night it became apparent that the three commissioner races could be close, and they were half way through the evening. The first ballot box in Carrizozo 3 and then 4, put Paul Pacheco nicely out in front, but no more than Sally Ortiz. W. A. Hart had a lead but not big. Several boxes of votes came in before the winning trend was definite enough for people packing the clerk's office to figure that eventual winners would be Paul Pacheco and Bud Payne, Republicans, and Bill Hart, Democrat.

In the District 1 commissioner race, Walt Jones carried only two precincts, one of them Nogal 36-15, the other was Angus absentee precinct which gave Walt 3 votes to one for Paul. Jones got 190 in Capitan, Pacheco 207.

S. M. Ortiz ran a better race than Jones and campaigned harder than his opponent Bud Payne, but he could not offset the Republican swing in Lincoln County. Ortiz carried Nogal and Carrizozo Precinct 3 for his 1319 total. Payne's vote total was 1672.

Bill Hart of Ruidoso got off to a good start in the heavily Democratic Precinct 3 in Carrizozo getting 168 to 108 for Republican Leland Stone and Stone never made up the difference. Hart's total was 1672, Stone 1423.

Austin Wooten, running for probate judge on the Democratic ticket, got a handfull of votes more than Bill Hart to become the second Democrat to win in the county. Wooten 1704 to 1366 for John Kuhn.

Vega second only to Nixon

Leandro Vega, Jr. was second only to President Nixon in the total vote count. Vega tallied 2088 votes, his opponent Choncho Morales 1079. The offices of clerk, treasurer and assessor were won handily by the Republicans, Barbara Lovelace, Mabel Vigil and Julia Samora coming out ahead by good margins.

Amendment No. 3, a six-man jury, was unpopular in Lincoln County as elsewhere in the state. Amendments 1 and 2 carried nicely, 3 failed bad and the library bond issue failed in Lincoln County. The municipal hospital levy failed in only two precincts, Corona and Ruidoso Downs, final was 835 for and 521 against.

It was a much shorter night for officials in the county clerk's office, most of the boxes were in by 9:30 with only Hondo remaining and it got to the clerk's office before 10:00 p.m.

Clerk Alice King said she thought Lincoln County was fortunate in having the same person servicing county voting machines from the time they were put into use. No breakdowns were reported and voting went off smooth in the county. A total of 3386 votes were cast in Lincoln County.

Defense does it again Grizzlies win tough one from Navajo Mission at Farmington

The Carrizozo Grizzly defense continued to shine and keep the opposition out of the end zone. It was the Grizzlies 5th shut out of the season not including Reserve's forfeit. Gaby Chavez and David Roper led the offense but the headlines have to go to the defensive unit who turned back all Navajo Mission threats. The game was hard fought and the hitting was ferocious. Navajo Mission was ready to play and never let up, but Carrizozo was determined to win.

Gaby Chavez crossed the goal stripe 4 times but two of them were called back because of clipping penalties. David Roper playing his 3rd game at half back continued to chew up the yardage. David lugged the ball 15 times for 102 yards.

Carrizozo moved the ball well the first time it had possession but an illegal procedure penalty on a fourth down play halted the drive in Navajo Mission territory. Then later in the waning minutes of the second quarter Gaby Chavez raced around his left end to the end zone but a clipping penalty nullified the score. The game remained scoreless through the first two quarters.

Navajo Mission put together its best drive of the day after receiving the 2nd half kick off. The Eagles drove to the Grizzly 5 yard line where the Grizzlies recovered a fumble in the end zone. Taking over the ball on the 20 yd line, Carrizozo drove 80 yards capped by Chavez' 18 yard jaunt into the end zone. It took the Grizzlies 12 plays to go the 80 yards as Roper carried 7 times for 40 yards in the drive. David Roper kicked the first of his two extra points.

In the fourth quarter, the Eagles needed to get on the score board and gambled on a fourth down play and failed from the Eagles 36 yard line. It took Carrizozo two plays to find the end zone with Chavez again doing the honors from the 25 yard line, with David Roper kicking his second extra point to make the score 14-0.

The win enabled Carrizozo to meet Melrose at Melrose Friday night at 7:30. Melrose defeated last year's runners-up Hagerman 14-6.

Carrizozo Goes After 4th Straight State Title

Three-time defending state champion Carrizozo and determined Melrose advanced to the Class A finals; and Hobbs, Los Alamos, Gadsden, Kirtland Central, Clayton, Ruidoso and Jal nailed down district championships over the weekend.

P1 a yoff-tested Carrizozo moved into the Class A championship for the fourth year in a row with a 14-0 win over Navajo Mission; and Melrose upset previously unbeaten Hagerman, 14-6.

HOBBS WAS HANDED the 4AAA title courtesy of Clovis, which knocked off Roswell, 28-15. Roswell was the only team with a chance of derailling Hobbs. A Coyote victory over Hobbs this coming weekend might have given the crown to Roswell or it might have created a three-way tie involving Carlsbad, but Clovis took care of that eventually. Los Alamos had an even easier time of it, getting its

ninth win this season when Academy forfeited. Chargers head coach John O'Connor booted eight Academy players off the team for breaking training, and didn't feel he had enough left to play. The Hilltoppers will play Santa Fe in their finale next week, but the game is of no importance in the district standings.

Gadsden emerged from the maze of the 3AAA race after beating Silver City, 26-15. That win, along with Socorro's 29-14 win over Deming, left Gadsden and Tularosa alone at the top. Gadsden will advance to the state playoffs by virtue of a narrow 8-6 win over Tularosa.

HAD DEMING beaten Socorro, a three-way tie would have resulted, making a vote of the coaches necessary to determine the league representative. And Tularosa might have gotten the nod, due to its 9-1 record during the season.

But Deming didn't beat Socorro. Roses for Gadsden,

aspirin for Tularosa. Everything's settled in the Class AA districts, and it's a good thing, because they're starting the playoffs this weekend.

Kirtland Central polished off Cuba, 20-0, to win in Dist. 1AA; Clayton downed Santa Rosa, 24-12, to take the 2AA title; Ruidoso dumped T or C, 44-12, to win 3AA honors; and Jal shut out Eunice, 14-0, to win the 4AA crown.

In case you don't remember, these are the same four teams that met in the playoffs last year, with unheralded Jal coming out on top.

HERE'S THE WAY it's going to be: Clayton, 6-4, will be at Jal, 5-4, Friday night at 7:30; and Kirtland Central, 8-2, will be at Ruidoso, 8-1-1, Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. to determine the AA finalist.

The KC-Ruidoso clash has to be billed as the "glamor" game. Kirtland Central is ranked first in New Mexico in



one wire service poll; Ruidoso has the top spot in the other. Neither team has lost in its class. Central fell 8-5 to Aztec, and lost 40-12 to Durango, Colo., both AAA schools.

Ruidoso was defeated 26-21 by Tularosa and tied 14-14 by Socorro, two more AAAs. The two teams have no common opponents.

Off-beaten Clayton and Jal are likewise unbeaten in AA competition. Clayton lost its first two games of the season to Raton, 6-0, and Tucumcari, 16-0, both AAA schools, and absorbed 35-7 and 28-8 defeats at the hands of Trinidad, Colo., and Hooker, Okla.

JAL WAS BEATEN 28-0 by Lovington of 4AAA and 22-15 by Tularosa, and also lost to a pair of Texas schools: Rankin, 33-8, and Fabens, 15-0.

Okay, that wraps up what we know. What we don't know is who will win the championships in Districts 2AAA, 3AAA, 2AAA, and 4AAA.

It has come out just as everyone predicted in the Albuquerque district. Highland and West Mesa will play for the 2AAA crown.

Highland advanced to the showdown with a nondescript 14-6 victory over Valley that boosted the Hornet record to 8-1. West Mesa, 7-1-1, knocked

over Manzano, 20-0, but suffered a severe blow in the process.

Quarterback Scott Grady dislocated his shoulder and is out of the Highland game and any other that the Mustangs might be involved in. Grady went out in a blaze of glory, though, scampering 48 yards to the Manzano's on the play that did him in.

BACKUP SIGNAL-caller Mike Otero is said to be a better runner than Grady, but not as good in the passing department. West Mesa has two of the top rushers in the city in Ray Barrs and Bob White, and it might be wished that Otero's talents were switched around.

But the Mustangs will be there when Highland time comes, and they might do well to remember that the Hornets have been winning right along, and passing about as often as Coach Bill Gentry smiles.

So this one will probably turn into a rushing duel between Barrs, White and Otero on the one hand and

Highland's John Rich, Brad Carens and Mike Powdrell on the other.

It's as simple as this in 3AAA. If Mayfield, 8-1, beats Las Cruces, 7-2, the Trojans are in for the second year in a row. If Las Cruces wins, the Bulldogs will cop the championship. Unless Alamogordo, 6-3-1, beats Artesia, in which case it's a three-way tie between the Las Cruces schools and Alamo, and the coaches will have to decide the playoff representative by voting.

WEST LAS VEGAS, 5-4-1, hosts St. Michael's, 6-3, Friday, with the winner getting the 2AAA playoff berth.

St. Michael's has walloped everybody in the district, winning four games by 40-6, 50-0, 42-6 and 36-0. The Dons have not been nearly so impressive, but in this situation you don't have to be impressive but once when you think about it.

Lovington, 7-3, hosts Tucumcari, 5-4-1, for the 4AAA championship. The Wildcats

have blanked both their district foes, shutting out St. Pius, 21-0, and Portales, 16-0. The Rattlers had an early-season 27-7 tie with St. Pius and shut out Portales over the weekend, 22-0.

Grants, which won the 1AAA playoff spot a week ago, stepped up to some AAAA competition and showed 'em how, battering Santa Fe, 35-14.

THE POTENT Pirates, 9-1 have lost only once, this season — to undefeated RAAA Los Alamos, 34-8; the third week of the season. Only St. Michael's and Bloomfield were able to give them any competition after that. The Pirates held off a late touchdown flurry by St. Mike's to hang onto a 26-21 victory, and edged Bloomfield, 18-12.

Everybody else wished they'd have stayed home. The Pirates trounced Gallup, 36-7; St. Pius, 26-0; Aztec, 26-6; Shiprock, 48-0; Los Lunas, 34-plays Farmington this weekend before entering the playoffs.

Dave Rudabaugh

Dave Rudabaugh was probably the most desperate, and dangerous of all of New Mexico's outlaws. He was born in Missouri, but shortly before the Civil War the Rudabaughs moved to Texas. In the war Dave's father fought with Sibley's Brigade, but was wounded and returned home to die.

Most people stood upwind of Dave, because he never learned the advantage of using soap. He rarely shaved and probably only changed his clothes when they wore out.

Soon after the death of his father, he became a trail-driver, and got to see New Mexico, Colorado, and Kansas. But since he liked spending money better than working for it, he soon fell in with a gang of rustlers.

He drifted into Wichita where he heard of a ten-thousand dollar reward offered for the death of Marshall Wyatt Earp. At first Dave thought about doing away with Earp, but soon decided that if he did he'd have to face every gun-happy person interested in shooting the man who shot the marshal.

When gold was discovered in the Black Hills, Rudabaugh headed for the Dakotas, but gold digging wasn't to his liking, so he took up with a man named Mike Roake in Deadwood. He and Roake pulled a few robberies and rustled some

horses from Fort Griffin, but nothing spectacular. During this time however, Dave became famous for escaping jail. He escaped from jails in New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, and Texas. There didn't seem to be a jail to hold him. He'd been chained to walls, handcuffed, and shackled, but he always managed to escape. Some jailers believed he could disappear at will.

Since Earp was a marshal in the vicinity, he was assigned to bring in Rudabaugh, and was offered ten dollars a day and expenses for the job.

Our friend Dave led the marshal a merry chase. They went from state to state and back again but Dave was always one jump ahead.

Dave's most famous escapade was a train robbery near Kinsley, Kansas. Just in sight of town, Dave and his men, including Rattlesnake Sam, stopped the Santa Fe. They boarded the train, and forced everyone aboard, even the engineer and the conductor, to surrender all their valuables. Dave was polite to the ladies, but they were still asked to contribute.

The Santa Fe officials were furious. They wanted Rudabaugh dead or alive. So they asked the sheriff, who just happened to be Bat Masterson, for this help. They invented a plan to get Dave into Ford county where Bat arrested him. Nothing came of it though, because there was no conclusive evidence.

Shortly afterward Dave went to Las Vegas, New Mexico, where he robbed the Wells Fargo Office so many times they considered closing it.

His various escapades eventually led him to the town of Parral, Mexico, in the state of Chihuahua. Here on the evening of February 18, 1886, he entered his favorite cantina, and sat down to a game of cards. Dave's Spanish wasn't very good, and he treated the people he met with contempt, but on this evening he noticed that something was different.

During the card game that evening, he shot two men for cheating. Then he decided to leave, but as he walked up the street, he saw that it was deserted. He turned back toward the cantina. Watching the shadows, he slunk quietly through the dark.

From somewhere a rifle cracked. Then another. Dave Rudabaugh was dead.

The town came back to life. The people surrounded the body. They cut off his head, stuck it on a pole, and paraded it up and down the street.

They went to the graveyard, dug a hole, and threw the body and head in. It was over.





Shrubs and small trees may be planted in late
fall if care is exercised in planting. Planting
shrubs in late fall lets the roots get a foothold for

a fast start in the spring, while spring-planted
shrubs often have tough going, especially in hot,
windy weather.
In lower elevations, almost any sort of tree can
be planted in the fall, but at higher elevations
spring planting will be better for broad-leaved
evergreens and some trees. In setting out a
shrub, make the hole roomy enough for the roots
to spread out. If the soil is not a good, medium
loam, add peat moss or well-rooted hardwood
sawdust.
Do not mound the soil around the plant.
Instead, leave it dished slightly so as to hold
water. A good mulch for new trees and shrubs
heading into winter is peat moss, straw, lawn
clippings, leaves, peat humus, well decomposed
hardwood sawdust.
A good safety measure is to prune back about
one-third of the foliage at planting time. Roots
can make a better start when the tops have been
reduced.


FFA selling thank-you packs

Deer season draws near

Santa Fe - New Mexico's general deer season opened Nov. 4 in the northern half of the state. The Department of Game and Fish expected over 50,000 hunters to participate with the majority out during the opening weekend of the 16-day season.

Deer hunters are cautioned to go well prepared. Cold, snowy weather is predicted for the opening weekend and the above-average moisture over the past month has made hunting conditions ideal, however, access into the hunt areas is expected to present some problems for those not equipped for back road travel.

Best hunting and the heaviest pressure will be in the Carson National Forest and adjacent areas around Gobernador, Taos, Tres Piedras, Vallecitos and Lindrieth. Most of the north will be limited to fork-antlered bucks with a few exceptions on private and Indian lands. Certain areas are open for bear and turkey during the season that closes on Nov. 19.

General deer hunting in the southern part of the state opens on Nov. 18. The season in the southwestern quarter of the state extends through Nov. 26 and the southeastern season will last through Dec. 3.

Tulie wins and loses

Tularosa beat Bayard Cobre 32-17, but Socorro also beat Deming 29-14 and that put Gadsden, winner of Tularosa, in the district champions seat. Tularosa had a 9-1 season but that one game was real costly.

Ruidoso wins their district.

A big game in Lincoln County was set up when Ruidoso captured the 3AA district by beating T or C 44-12. The district champions now go against Kirtland Central, located between Farmington and Shiprock, the game to be played Saturday at Ruidoso, very-likely 2:00 p.m.

SCMRA adopts new projects

At the October meeting of the South Central Mountain Resource Area committee in Ruidoso several new projects were adopted.

Bud Payne requested assistance in obtaining electricity for four families, approximately one and a quarter miles of line need to be installed by Rural Electric in the White Oaks area. The request was approved.

Mrs. Crouse asked for assistance in getting an access bridge across Nogal's Emerson Canyon repaired, where it had washed out during heavy rains. This request was accepted.

Proposal submitted by director of Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan for assistance in updating the building was thought to be more of a local level project and tabled until next meeting.

John Rivera of the Natural Resources division of the State Planning Office was the guest speaker. He reviewed pending legislation of regulated land use planning.

It was reported that the new state maps now include Road 349 and White Oaks on them.

A progress report was presented by Howard Avercrombie as follows:

DOMESTIC WATER:The Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District has given a \$69,000 grant. The local people will have to borrow 16,000 -18,000 dollars. The loan was disapproved by the local Farmers Home Administration, but the people are meeting with the state office to try to obtain the loan.

OPENING OF ROAD - TULAROSA TO ENGLE: A meeting was held with government officials and it appears impossible to get the road opened at present for various reasons. This project has been tabled.

NOGAL TRAFFIC SAFETY:Two pedestrian signs have been installed. A meeting will be arranged with the Safety Commission to discuss a central location for school loading.

VALLEY OF FIRES WILDLIFE ENCLOSURE:A cost estimate is being made for the fence. Carlos Tipps of the State Parks office in Las Cruces reported that the water line has water running through it but a few more things need to be done before it is completed.

CARRIZOZO CEMETERY. Mrs. Snow made \$316 on the quilt she raffled off which will cover the cost of underground water irrigation for the cemetery.

WATER SUPPLY FOR PINON: Two designs have been presented. The local people of Pinon will have to approve one.

CAPITAN WATER SUPPLY: Ruidoso, Capitan, and Eagle Creek people had a meeting to consider the water supply. A \$2500 feasibility study and design is needed.

LAVA AND SANDSTONE SALES:One load of pinon wood (50 cords) was taken out by Kimbell Food Trucks for a trial sale. An Albuquerque concern is using the Java from the area.
