Carrizozo Precinct 3 is solid

Only one real Democratic precinct in the county

It's sort of interesting to pour over the electing '72 results and the News made them easier to read this year so you can quickly see who did what to whom.

There are three precincts in the county that lean Democratic, but only one where it looks like a lot of people pulled the lever and voted the Democratic ticket right down the line.

That precinct is No. 3 in Carrizozo which is the south part of town generally starting at the street between Piggly Wiggly and the courthouse. Precinct 3 gave McGovern 101 votes and went for Runnels, Ferguson, Martinez, Montoya and Sutin, all losers in the county except for Runnels.

On top of that Precinct 3 gave good majorities to Ortiz 180-112, Hart 168-108, Morales 170-127 and Wooten 205-81. Ortiz lost 1319 to 1672 for Payne and Morales lost 1079 to 2088 for Vega, in the county.

That adds up to nine Democrats carrying Precinct 3. The closest to that was Precinct 1 in Capitan which gave majorities to 7 Democrats, two of them state or national, Runnels and Ferguson, three less than won in Carrizozo. Capitan was also a little picky about county candidates, giving majorities to Republicans Pacheco, Payne and Vega plus 299 votes for Nixon to 97 for McGovern.

Forget the Runnels race, and Republicans carried right down the line on the top of the ballot, the state and national races, that is except for Capitan 1 and Carrizozo 3.

Bill Hart, the one Democrat winner for commissioner carried 9 precincts. Huey, Democrat for clerk, carried three precincts, Jenkins, Democrat for treasurer, carried two precincts, Beck, Democrat for assessor, carried two and drew one. Wooten, Democrat for probate judge, lost at Corona, San Patricio, Hondo and Angus. His majority even with these losses was 1704 to 1366 for Kuhn.

Democrats have particularly hard going in the Valley, San Patricio, Hondo don't elect any Democrats: Runnels did carry Hondo but lost San Patricio. Carrizozo Precinct 4 does about as well as the Valley. This year only Runnels and Wooten won over Republicans in Zozo 4.

State Rep. Maurice Hobson, Republican, was a big winner in Lincoln and carried Otero even more for his victory over Page Carter. John Bigbee had more precincts and got more votes than Hobson in Lincoln but he also carried Torrance nicely for his win.

Lincoln County with its 78 per cent turnout at the polls went way stronger than the national average which speaks well for the interest of people in this area in the welfare of their county, state and nation.

Lincoln Forest prepares for Tree rush

As early snows bring thoughts of Christmas, Forest Supervisor Kenneth Evans today announced plans for the Lincoln National Forest's annual Christmas tree program.

Starting November 13, permits for personal use Christmas trees will be available on weekdays at all five of the Lincoln National Forest's Ranger Stations. Sales hours will be 8:00 - 12:00 a.m. and 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. Evans noted sales are limited to one tree per person and individuals must purchase a red permit before any tree is cut. Maps showing permitted cutting areas will be furnished at each Ranger Station.

Urban replaces Andy Benavidez

State Policeman Andy Benavidez had been stationed in Carrizozo for nearly eight years and was almost figured as a permanent resident here. On the first of this month the Benavidez family moved to Socorro where Andy will be stationed.

His replacement is Jerry Urban, who worked two years in the Chavez County sheriff's department then went to state police academy, graduating September 26. He came to Carrizozo October 1, worked a month with Andy and now has the territory to himself.

Jerry said he was fixin' to go hunting next week if he can get back in time from a probable trip to Oklahoma to testify about a stolen car.

The Urban family includes Jerry's wife Lillie, David age 9 and Robin age 3.

Policeman Urban was born and raised in Hagerman, and lived in Dexter for ten years.

New Attorney Expected

The former H. Elfred Jones law building has been sold to Archie Witham whose mother lives in Nogal. Witham is now on active duty attending an Army Intelligence School at Fort Huachuca, near Phoenix, Arizona. He has a law degree plus degree in accounting and business administration and plans to take the New Mexico bar exam in March. He will set up law practice in Carrizozo in June of 1973.

Witham was recently married. His new property includes two lots, the law building with apartment in rear plus carport. In addition he gets all the law books, furniture, in fact the entire setup formerly used by Elfred Jones.

The sale was handled by Pete Jones, executor of the H. Elfred Jones estate.

Tax notices went out from the treasurer's office on October 30-31 with billings for total of \$1,263,025.76. Treasurer Mabel Vigil estimated that \$250,000 of this amount will have been received by the end of this week. Tax payers have all of November to pay without penalty, after December 1 one-half percent per month will be added.

Can't make 1973 renditions now

Right now the assessor's office is receiving requests from people who want to make their renditions for 1973 at the time they pay their 1972 taxes. It is not possible now and probably won't be until after the first of the year because the reappraisal people have got to finish their work and turn the new appraisal figures to the assessor, then the entire list of assessments in that office will have to be gone over.

Lincoln liquor license denied

The Lincoln County commissioners met in special session on October 27 at request of William Ward of Lincoln who wanted a liquor license issued. Mrs. Robert Knapp of Capitan stated that Ward did not have application posted and she noted that there were four licenses with locations closer than 10 miles from the Lincoln site and believe it would be illegal.

Haskell Graham of San Patricio appeared to protest issuance of the new licenses, as did Angelino Trujillo who had a license for sale, and L.V. McDonald of Hondo.

The license was denied.

Ancho rancher meeting called

Considerable interest is being shown in State Road 14, known as the Gran Quivira Road by both people in Lincoln and Torrance counties. The commissioners have set a meeting for November 27 at 1:00 p.m. in the commission room and are inviting ranchers from a wide area around Ancho to attend and discuss this road.

Ruidoso hospital leased out

At commission meeting November 1 a lease agreement with Presbyterian Hospital Center in Albuquerque was signed whereby this agency will take over operation of all lands, buildings, improvements and equipment of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital at Ruidoso. The Presbyterian people expect to add six rooms, enough to handle 12 more patients in the immediate future.

Kathy Dean and Garlene Daniel explained the work done on various pieces on display.


The members and guests were taken on a tour of the kiln room to learn how the pieces are finished.

Sanchez presents computer paper

Mr. Ernest J. Sanchez recently gave a slide presentation and presented a paper at Lancaster, California at the 39th Meeting of the Data Reduction and Computing Group, Range Commanders Council. There were 10 member ranges present, such as the Air Force Eastern Test Range at Cape Kennedy, Atlantic Fleet Weapons Range run by the Navy, Kwajalein Missile Range at Point Mugu, California to name a few.

The slide presentation and paper presented the development and progress made in Radar Cross-Section Data Reduction at White Sands Missile Range.

News & Notes.

Are you getting your moneys worth when you buy fruit drinks? Fruit drinks are a big part of snacking for children and some fruit beverages offer more nutrition for the money than others. Spend a few extra minutes in the store reading labels of fruit drinks and know what the labels mean.

If you notice the labels on several dry fruit drink mixes, such as instant breakfast drink, imitation lemonade mix, and instant soft drink mix, you'll find that sugar is the ingredient present in the greatest quantity, followed by citric acid, several chemicals, vitamins, artificial flavors and color, but no real fruit juice. The same is true for two frozen concentrates which are imitation orange juice. Sugar syrup, water and corn syrup are the leading ingredients, but no orange juice is present. In contrast, another frozen concentrate imitating orange juice lists concentrated orange juice first, with a statement that the product contains not less than 50 per cent orange juice.

One popular canned orange drink lists water, sugar, concentrated orange juice, and vitamin C among its ingredients. The label also states that there is not less than 10 per cent orange juice present. Drinks that are made with a substantial amount of real fruit juice deserve priority over those that are entirely synthetic, because they are likely to provide more food value. For example, although we drink orange juice primarily because it is rich in vitamin C, it also contributes vitamin A and thiamine and the minerals calcium and iron. Some synthetic drinks may be less expensive source of vitamin C but they may not contain all of the other important nutrients. And most synthetic drinks to which vitamin C has been added are two or three times more expensive than real fresh, frozen, or canned orange juice.

When it comes to deciding which beverage item to buy, consider use as well as cost. If the beverage is to provide the major source of vitamin C for the day, then orange juice will probably offer the most food value for the money.

If the beverage is to quench thirst during the day, then lemonade at about three cents a glass is one of the least expensive choices you can make and it is made with real fruit.—Mary Ellen Payne, Lincoln County Home Agent.

4 - 6 weeks for SS card

"Don't wait until the last minute to apply for a social security number," Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative, advised today. "It now takes from four to six weeks to get an original social security card issued," Mrs. Graves cautioned.

The increased processing time for assignment of new numbers and delivery of cards is tied to new policies and controls. Most of the social security cards are now being mailed out from the Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland headquarters. There a data processing system records identifying information for computer screening and searching against future applications. This procedure is designed to prevent issuing more than one number to an individual, and to help prevent fraudulent use of the social security card.

Individuals aged 55 and over, who have never had a number should take some form of identification with them when they go to the social security office to apply for a card.

Prompt service is available in replacing lost social security cards, especially if the social security number is known.

We remember that to this very day the Church of Our Lord Jesus has the very same destiny. Its greatness does not stem from any worldly power; but rather from the Faith, Hope and Charity of its children, of its Communities scattered throughout the world, very often with tremendous opposition. Yet this, coupled with an OPENNESS to all — a true catholicity — is its safeguard against the temptation to form a sect or a ghetto.



Downs track still in court

A trial in Lincoln County may be necessary to determine if Eric Culver will get help in paying a \$365,000 judgment to former Ruidoso Downs race track owner Eugene Hensley.

The N. M. Court of Appeals affirmed Friday the judgment against Culver, involving the 1969 sale of the track by Hensley, but reversed Lincoln County court judgments that had ruled out of the case the successive owners and Culver's partners.

The case involved a 1969 employment contract under which Culver guaranteed that, upon assuming control of the Ruidoso Downs track, the track would pay \$1250 a month to a corporation owned by Hensley and his wife at that time. The appeals Court said evidence showed Culver made no attempt to have the Hensley contract terms carried out.

The track has since been sold to Fortuna Corp and more recently to a San Diego group which bought both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs tracks.

Teachers vote to hire lobbyist

Albuquerque - The executive board of the New Mexico Association of Classroom Teachers agreed Saturday to hire a professional lobbyist for the January legislative session.

The recommendation was made by Gabe Anaya, legislative chairman, and was unanimously.

Specific goals of the lobbyist will be passage of a professional negotiations bill, retention of tenure for teachers, educational appropriations, and other legislation affecting teachers' welfare.

The board approved a legislative program including retention of the tenure law and these other points:

-Appropriation of enough money to insure a 5.5 per cent increase for every school district next year.

-Establishment of a law giving teachers' associations the right to negotiate with boards of education.

'ROUND THE CAPITOL
by FRED BUCKLES

SANTA FE - Crushing defeat of Democrats
George McGovern and Jack Daniels in New
Mexico in the general election may touch off a
power struggle in the state's majority party.

Gov. Bruce King, titular head of the New
Mexico Democratic Party, said he will move to
attract moderates back into the party.
Democrats voted for President Richard M.
Nixon in droves. Nixon smashed McGovern in
New Mexico.

Republicans won the vital U. S. Senate seat,
too. Albuquerquean Pete Domenici easily
defeated Hobbs Democrat Daniels. With only 13
of 1,132 precincts unreported the tally was
Domenici, 202,207; Daniels, 171,568.

State Senate President Pro Tem I. M. (Ike)
Smalley, D-Deming, said: "The vote turned
down McGovern and his liberal ideas and it
turned them down flatly."

"Democrats didn't vote against the ticket.
They voted against McGovern. A lot of
Democrats have quit going to Democratic Party
meetings in the last couple of years."

"If moderate Democrats turn out in large
numbers at the next round of Democratic
conventions, you will likely see some major
changes."

Sen. Smalley represents Luna, Hidalgo and
Sierra Counties. He expects bills in the 1973
Legislature to return to the convention system of
nominating candidates. New Mexico uses the
direct primary now. Sen. Smalley also says a bill
will be introduced providing for a runoff
primary.

Chances are dim for adoption of a runoff
primary in New Mexico. Sen. Smalley says the
legislature has slowly taken away the governor's
political patronage. He cited the State Personnel
Act and the Highway Department, managed by
commissioners appointed for six-year terms.

In the final week of the general election
campaign, Sen. Smalley says, many Democrats
did not want to vote for Sen. McGovern. He says
they were reluctant to cross party lines to vote
for Nixon but finally decided to support Nixon
because of their strong opposition to McGovern.

In the U. S. Senate race Domenici carried
Democratic Luna County over Daniels, 2,641 to
1,954. Daniels' squeaked past Domenici in
Guadalupe County. Domenici carried Colfax,
Curry, DeBaca, Lincoln, Quay, Sierra, Taos,
Union and Valencia.

Daniels won his home Lea County nearly 2-1
over Domenici. Jack carried Hidalgo County -
913 to 691. In all, Domenici carried 25 counties
and Daniels won 7.

The intraparty struggle for control may pit U.
S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya against other
Democratic Party segments. Sen. Montoya was
New Mexico McGovern campaign chairman.

Sen. Montoya doubtless suffered loss of
political prestige in McGovern's overwhelming
defeat by President Nixon in New Mexico. But
Montoya, who was not on the ticket this year,
campaigning loyally for Democratic candidates
throughout New Mexico.

Gov. King says he will talk with party leaders
for weeks before calling a meeting in January to
chart plans for the 1974 campaign. King will
confer with Sen. Montoya and U. S. Rep. Harold
Runnels of Lovington among others.

Rep. Runnels swamped his general election
opponent, Silver City Republican Ed Presson, 73
to 27 per cent. U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr.,
Albuquerque Republican, easily won a third
term over Santa Fe Democrat Eugene Gallegos.

Lujan ran far ahead of Gallegos in
Albuquerque which polls 60 per cent of the
District 1 vote. Democrats gained slightly in both
branches of the legislature. The new partisan
division: Senate--30 Democrats and 12
Republicans, a gain of two Democrats; House--
51 Democrats and 19 Republicans, an increase of
three Democrats.

State Rep. David Salman, D-Buena Vista, will
seek re-election as House majority leader in a
House Democrats' caucus in December. But
Salman will be opposed by Rep. Fred Chavez,
Albuquerque. Chavez says Albuquerque is
under-represented in party leadership posts in
the legislature.

Two Republicans won seats on the Luna
County Commission - Walter Greeman and Mrs.
John (Punkie) Edwards. Greeman beat P. D.
Torres by 186 votes - 2,347 to 2,161. Democrat
Torres was an incumbent.

Mrs. Edwards beat Antonio Viramontes, Luna
County Democrat chairman, by 78 votes - 2,346
to 2,268. Viramontes ran for the commission seat
held by his brother, P. O. Viramontes.

Columbus Ferguson, Taos Democrat, easily
won re-election to the State Corporation
Commission for another six years. Incumbent
Ferguson beat Roswell Republican Larry Ness
by 32,260 votes - 186,474 to 154,214 - with only 13
precincts unreported.

Mrs. Tillie Simion of Red River, Taos County is
a Republican presidential elector. Presidential
electors will meet in Santa Fe Dec. 18 to cast
New Mexico's four electoral votes for Nixon.

The Herald Publishing Co. at Truth or
Consequences occupied a new building Nov. 1.
The new plant spans 4,000 square feet of floor
space. The Herald has been owned by the Tooley
family since 1948.

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

I passed through your county recently doing
research for a book on James Curry (Currie)
who once lived there. Due to car trouble and
limited time, I was not able to obtain all the
information that I need. Could you please pass
this letter on to a local historian or print it?

James Curry moved to San Antonio, Socorro
County, in the 1890's and ran the Mountain Queen
Saloon there for many years. He later was the
engineer at the Homestead Mill in White Oaks.

On February 21, 1888, he stabbed a friend, John
W. Foley, in a fight. The man died two days later
and Curry was taken to Lincoln where he was
later found guilty of murder in the third degree
and sentenced to six years in prison.

Many residents of this area took part in the
trial and later asked the governor for a pardon.
James Curry was pardoned in March, 1891, and
left the state for good.

I would like to know if there is anyone who
knows where Foley is buried in the cemetery in
White Oaks. Also do the descendants of Jefferson
D. Grumbles, Edwinn R. Bonnell, J. P. C.
Langston, George Curry, Nathan Jaffa, John W.
Riley, Dr. Alexander G. Lane, Dr. B. F. Wilson,
Dr. Ivey, or others remember anything of this
man or incident?

I would also like to know if you have any
historical editions or centennial editions of White
Oaks that would give me background material.

**Tips given for
 gun safety**

Deer hunting season is here again, and with many hunters in the field, it's a good time to remember the rules of gun safety. Every fall sees needless tragedies in the hunting field. There's no reason for deaths and injuries from gun accidents. If everyone followed the common sense rules of safety and courtesy, gun accidents could easily be avoided.

Here are some tips for gun safety:
 Treat every gun with respect due a loaded gun. Getting into a sloppy habits with unloaded firearms carries over into the field. Assume every gun is loaded--even after you have opened the action and checked the magazine.

Watch that muzzle! Always be conscious of where the muzzle of your gun is pointing. Good hunters get extremely nervous looking down the barrel of a companions gun--usually nervous enough to find someone else to hunt with. Carry your gun safely and keep the safety on until ready to fire.

Always unload guns when not in use, and keep the action open. Guns should be transported in cases. Be sure the barrel is clear of obstructions. Dirt, mud, snow--or shells of a smaller gauge--can cause a gun to blow up when fired. Never point a gun at anything you don't want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay with guns. Never climb a tree, cross a fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun. Never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water. Ricochets are unpredictable and extremely dangerous. When shooting a target be sure your backstop is adequate. Store guns and ammunition separately and beyond the reach of children. Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during hunting. Drinking while carrying a gun is no more sensible than drinking while driving. Alcohol and gun powder can be fatal mixture as well as alcohol and gasoline.

The rules of gun safety are nothing more than common sense. Observing them closely can only increase the pleasure of a hunting trip.

**Satellite offers
 career and
 child education**

SANTA FE--Jose Benito Chavez has been named State Coordinator for the Federation of Rocky Mountain States satellite television project, which will bring two complete series of instructional programs to New Mexico in 1974. Chavez, a former state legislator, was appointed to the post by Supt. of Public Instruction Leonard J. De Layo and Gov. Bruce King. Gov. King is chairman of the eight-state regional development federation. Director of the federation is former New Mexico governor Jack M. Campbell. Half of the FRMS funding comes from state funds in the region, and the remainder from private investments, Chavez explained. The New Mexico Legislature last year appropriated \$10,000 for the non-profit federation.

The satellite will be launched in April 1974, he said, and will hover above the Rocky Mountains for 11 months. During that time, it will beam special video programs for Career Development and Early Childhood Education to some 25 sites in New Mexico, and a comparable number of pick-up points in other mountain states. Eight of the sites, Chavez said, will also be equipped to originate programs and send them to the satellite for relay to project headquarters in Denver, where they will be sent to the entire network.

Technicians, the coordinator explained, are now selecting the sites for the installations. Each will have a roof-mounted dish antenna, somewhat like a small radar unit, aimed at the satellite. The space-orbiting unit will remain in a single spot in the sky, turning with the earth below in what the engineers call a synchronous orbit.

"Because of the low power of the solar-battery satellite," Chavez said, "and the technical need to use special frequencies higher than the regular TV bands, only the dish antennas will be able to receive the signals."

"But they will be relayed to viewers through cable television systems and special in-school systems," he said.
 While the technical planning is under way, the FRMS is starting to develop program ideas for

the instructional telecasts. Currently, Chavez is surveying the educational needs in Early Childhood Development and Career Development in New Mexico.

"When we know what we need, then we will begin building lessons and programs," Chavez explained. He is currently on leave of absence as principal of John F. Kennedy Junior High School in Espanola to coordinate state work with the satellite program.

"The instructional television project will not replace classroom teachers, but will supplement the material available to them," he said. "During the 11 months that the satellite will be up there serving this area, we hope to develop programs that can then be reused even after the satellite has moved on."

After March, 1975, the NASA-launched satellite will be moved to a similar synchronous orbit above India, to serve as an educational television relay for that nation.

"This experimental program will create several jobs in New Mexico, with a site coordinator to be named, and two content liaison specialists in Early Childhood Education and Career Development," Chavez said. "The site coordinator will be our engineering specialist, and the content liaison people, of course, will develop the educational programs which we'll transmit."

"They will prepare and present programs on vocational career development, beam them up to the satellite and bounce them to Denver. From there, they will be typed and sent out on a schedule to all parts of the Rockies. Adults and youngsters in night school and other classes will then watch the programs as part of their career development training. They will also see teachers from other parts of the area, each contributing their specialty."

Similar programs aimed at pre-school youngsters will be part of the Early Childhood project, he went on.

Not all the sites have been chosen and checked by the FRMS engineering staff, he said, but he is looking at locations in which all the cultural groups in the state are represented.

This Educational Technology Demonstration Program, Chavez explained, is part of the federation's telecommunications activity, one of six basic divisions of FRMS work. The others include development in transportation, natural resources, human resources, market development, and the arts and humanities.

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
