The death of two aliens in wreck west of Carrizozo should add two and maybe three to Socorro County fatality list, 7 in 1971 and 8 in 1972 prior to this wreck. Lincoln County had 6 fatalities in 71, 3 so far this year. Highway deaths in most counties are up in 1972. Chaves 5 and 11, Guadalupe 1 and 5, Bernalillo 32 and 47, San Miguel 6 and 13, Lea 5 and 12, etc.

More to horse than just manure

At least that is the thinking of Santa Fe where the Property Appraisal Department scanned the long list of horses vaccinated in Lincoln County, then compared that list with the number of horses on the tax roll and the manure literally hit the fan.

A directive was sent to the Assessor's office in Carrizozo that all of the horses on the vaccine list be put on the tax rolls and the people listed on the vaccine list be billed for taxes.

Right there the trouble started. Horse owners are friendly people, they frequently keep horses for other people, one person might take a dozen horses for vaccination and none of them be his

Emergency at Carrizozo Hospital

Billy means called the Lincoln County Sheriff office at 11:25 a.m. December 1 saying that a traveler had stopped to say there had been a bad accident involving aliens on US380 west of Carrizozo.

The Sheriff's office called the State Police, the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo was notified at 11:25 a.m. of a possible emergency.

The wreck was a bad one, the emergency was severe. Before it was all over a couple of dozen people were involved in aiding accident victims who could not speak a word of English.

According to Deputy Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr. the route for aliens, seeking to come into the United States, used to come right up US54 but authorities started cracking down in Alamogordo area so the route shifted to road up through Hatch, San Antonio and over US380 to Carrizozo. The big job draw used to be in Colorado but in more recent years this has also shifted to the larger metropolitan centers.

Whatever the reason, a half-ton pickup with light shell camper loaded with 16 people including the driver started on a trip that was to take them to Chicago according to testimony given the officers by one of the victims.

It was reported that each passenger paid the driver \$100 to be paid on reaching Chicago.

The truck was driving east on US380 about 16 miles west of Carrizozo, the speed must have been rapid because the truck swerved, the load shifted and resulted was the truck turned over wheels up and skidded 300 feet down the highway scattering bodies as it went, some alive, some met instant death. The camper shell was found 75 feet from where the truck stopped.

State Police Officer Bill Mascaranes sped to the scene along with Leroy Montes from Sheriff's office. Wesley Lindsey and Deputy Leandro Vega took the ambulance and brought back five of the worst injured.

Two passengers were obviously dead at the scene. The victims were Antonio Macedo 35 of Ayutajal, Mexico and Consuelo Medina 34 of Carrio Puerto, Mexico. It seemed strange to local officers that none of the 16 knew each other, they seemed to come from different parts of Mexico.

By the time the ambulance got back for a second load Johnny Johnson had brought three more victims to the hospital. Lindsey and Vega brought the two dead victims to the Chapel of Roses Mortuary.

The normal staff at the hospital, around noon included Rn Marjorie Whitaker, LPN Ria Lee Sidwell and Mary Flores, Nurse Aides Mary

Sheriff's Report

November 24, 1972

Carlos Otero, age 32, P. O. Box 272 Moriarty, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. on a warrant charging him with allegedly issuing a worthless check to the Piggly Wiggly Store in Carrizozo on November 21, 1971. Otero was arraigned before Judge Bill Payne, defendant entered a plea of guilty and was bound over to District Court for arraignment on December 18. Defendant posted a \$1,000.00 bond and was released.

Lenard Reagan, age 45, of Brownfield, Texas was arrested by Deputy Jerry Foster at Ruidoso on a felony warrant from Lynn County, Texas charging him with felony theft. Reagan was taken before District Judge Paul Snead at Carrizozo wherein he waived extradition and was transported to Tahoka, Texas by Deputies Wood and Miller.

Douglas G. Straub, age 29, of Las Vegas, Nevada was arrested in Ruidoso by Deputies Leandro Vega, Jr. and Jerry Foster on a felony warrant from Nevada charging him with first degree kidnapping. Straub was taken before District Judge Paul Snead in Carrizozo, wherein he waived extradition back to the State of Nevada and was transported Saturday by Detective Joe Rodriguez to Las Vegas, Nevada.

On December 1, 1972 at 1:45 p.m., the Sheriff's Office received a message about a shooting victim near Arabela. Investigation by the Sheriff's Office by Deputies Leandro Vega, Jr. and LeRoy Montes revealed the victim as Loransy R. Morgan, age 71 of Capitan, cause of death was ruled as an apparent suicide.

At 12:30 p.m., December 2, 1972, the Sheriff's Office received a call in regard to an accidental shooting on the north side of the Capitan Mountains. Investigation by Deputy LeRoy Montes revealed the victim as E. J. Milton of Clovis, details were that victim shot himself accidentally in the shoulder with a Japanese rifle, victim was taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, where he was listed in fair condition and then later transferred to St. Mary's Hospital in Roswell.

property. Many horses are kept part of the year in this county while the owner lives in Roswell, Hobbs or other distant parts.
Separate tax statements were sent out for horses, which really did not change a thing. Horse owners have the burden of proving they did not keep their horses in this county long enough to be taxed. People on the vaccine list have the burden of proving the horses were not their property.

Right now the thinking on part of several horse owners is that the Property Appraisal people need to sweep the dung out of their offices, and in the meantime it leaves County Assessor Marian Schlarb with a smelly problem.

These people got busy immediately in the emergency room cleaning up the victims, getting them undressed and ready for Dr. A. N. Spencer who was diagnosing cases as fast as he could. One victim whose head must have scraped a lot of highway, was sent immediately to El Paso. Lots of stitches were applied to other victims. X-rays for broken bones were taken.

Bertha LaFave was doing barber work, shaving injured areas so they could be stitched up.

June Straley came early for her check, it was payday, and immediately got to work. Delia Beltran and Sandy Baca from the kitchen helped. Edward Vega was driving down the street and stopped to help unload the ambulance, he stayed to help. Clarence Milligan and Alton Whitaker were both there and did their part.

Dr. Spencer commented that this was the most people in need of hospital help and surgery at one time in his long experience in Carrizozo. Two of the victims were kept in the hospital because if they didn't get medical attention after being turned loose it would be too bad for them. Others will need to have stitches taken out.

The Border Patrol arrived in Carrizozo to take over custody of the aliens in due time. According to Deputy Vega any of the aliens who had been previously caught in the United States might be sent to La Tuna, others would probably be taken to the border and turned loose.

There were 10 of the victims in the emergency room at one time, all needing some kind of aid. Two were referred to El Paso hospital for plastic surgery. Both sheriff and hospital people think it a miracle that more were not killed in this bad accident.

Testimony was heard and near time for the jury to retire a settlement was reached in the courtroom and Judge Snead dismissed the jury.

A civil matter was also heard that day by Judge Dee Blythe of Clovis.

A group of magazine sales people were working the Capitan area the last week of November. One of these people, Donna Jo Beard, 18 of Cambridge, Ohio, allegedly stole a blank check from Virgil Hall Jr., forged it and cashed the check at the Ruidoso State Bank in Capitan.

Miss Beard was arrested in Capitan by Deputies Leandro Vega, Jr. and Jerry Foster and charged with forgery. Defendant was arraigned before Magistrate Bill Payne in Carrizozo, preliminary hearing is today. Bond was set at \$2,500.

The sheriff deputies were alerted by Tommy Allen, cashier in Capitan who called Virgil and asked if he had written a check for magazines, he had not and Tommy got in action. The Sheriff's Department is real appreciative of her help.

Occupation tax being tested

A case in district court in Carrizozo will decide whether or not the Village of Ruidoso can collect occupation tax in the amount of \$597.00 from Bennett's Big 8 Supermarket in Ruidoso.

The Village of Ruidoso enacted an ordinance providing for the licensing of various occupations and providing for collection of occupation taxes and license fees, Ordinance 153, with tax set in the amount of \$1.00 per annum for each \$1,000 gross volume of business done by retail merchants.

The Village by resolution adopted October 12 fixed the defendant's (Bennett) gross volume of business for year 1971 at \$597,485.00. Notice of assessment and protest hearing was mailed and delivered to the defendant. The protest hearing was held November 9. The Village ruled on the protest filed by the defendant and set the amount of occupation tax due the Village at \$597.00.

No payment has been made by the defendant. The plaintiff, Village of Ruidoso, prays for judgment plus court costs. The case has not been set for hearing.

The New Mexico Law Enforcement Planning Commission, Region II (which has coordinating and planning responsibility for Hidalgo, Grant, Catron, Socorro, Sierra, Dona Ana, Luna, Otero, Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy, and Lea Counties, as well as the municipalities therein) is pleased to announce that the Governors Council on Criminal Justice Planning, upon recommendation of this commission, approved during their meetings of 9, 10 and 17 November, 1972, the below listed expenditures of 1973 Federal, Law Enforcement Assistance Administration Funds, within Region II.

Otero County, \$230,400.00, to construct a new correctional facility for the County that will have proper accommodations for females and juveniles an eliminate over crowding.
