Road men tender resignations --

Re-appraisal contract accepted by county

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace met December 7 in their last official session. The new commissioners, Paul Pacheco, Bill Hart and Bud Payne will be sworn in by Judge George Zimmerman at 1:30 p.m. on January 2, 1973 in the courthouse.

Mrs. Elvis Worden of Ruidoso Downs was in to object to improvements on tax schedule. An error had been made, will be corrected.

Payment vouchers in amount of \$1088.62 to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital were approved.

J. W. McMorris Sr., project supervisor for American Appraisal, and Paul Kaiser, with state property appraisal department, presented to the commission the completed re-appraisal contract which had been negotiated in April 1971. Kaiser noted that his department had examined all maps and all work, everything was complete as per specifications set by the state.

The re-appraisal contract was accepted. Balance due of \$14,085.10 paid.

Michael Richardson, environmentalist for Lincoln County, Bill Kelly and Tommy Hall met with the commission about condition of the sanitary land fill site, reported in deplorable shape and many complaints have been received. Hall stated that fence has been put up to keep trash from blowing on nearby ranch land. Richardson said that the first few months the site had been run efficiently, the breakdown of equipment was the main reason for present condition. Kelly said he would be willing to contract and give proper bond to take care of the site. Jones moved that the decision be tabled until the new commissioners take over in January.

Moore Agency was low bidder on public official and honesty bonds, two years pre-paid at \$701.00. Bid accepted.

John Harrelson, civil defense director, discussed the possibility of new equipment for the road department from government surplus. A representative from Burroughs company discussed the new electronic bookkeeping machine in treasurer's office and its uses in

other offices. The machine will be purchased from federal revenue sharing monies.

The commission agreed to purchase a combination electronic public address and siren system from federal revenue sharing monies, the system to be used by the Law Enforcement Agency.

The resignations of Montie Coe and Leroy McKnight, road superintendent, were accepted.

Approval was given to trust report on general obligation bonds, the sheriff's jail and fee report, and financial statement from county treasurer, as of October 1972.

All three commissioners elect were present. Alice King clerked the meeting.



Court clerk appointed

George L. Zimmerman, judge, of the 12th Judicial District Court in Carrizozo has appointed Mrs. Wesley Lindsay as court clerk. The new appointee will succeed Edward Penfield, clerk since 1937 at various times.

Mrs. Lindsay is a Carrizozo native, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Duncan. She is a graduate of Carrizozo High School, and Durham Business College of El Paso.

The main function of the district court clerk is custodian of all judicial court records.

School elections set for Feb. 6

All schools in Lincoln County will hold elections on Tuesday, February 6, 1973, for the purpose of electing school board members. Candidates must file a declaration of candidacy in the office of school superintendent of the district in which the election is to be held. They may do so any time after the date of the published resolution but before 5:00 p.m. January 2, 1973.

Registration books for voters in these elections will be closed by the county clerk at 5:00 p.m. December 26, 1972. Absentee voting will be permitted in these elections. Ballots may be secured by writing the superintendent of each district.

At Corona two positions are open, Position 1 now held by Myron Yancey for 6-year term and Position 2 now held by Ernest Sultemeier for 4-year term. Voting will take place in the Village Hall at Corona. This district takes in parts of Lincoln, Torrance and Socorro counties.

At Carrizozo Position 1 now held by Veda Lou Stephenson for 6-year term and Position 2 held by Paul Ortiz are expected to be open. The Carrizozo call for election will be published next week.

At Capitan the positions now held by Henry Lacey, 6-year term, and Richard Phillips, appointed for 2-year term, will be open.

Congratulations Gaby ...

Carrizozo QB leads Class A All-State Team

This headline was over the United Press story released Tuesday and printed in the Albuquerque Journal.

Quarterback Gaby Chavez, who led Carrizozo to three straight state championships, was named the United Press International Class A back of the year Monday.

Chavez headed the balloting which saw two quarterbacks end up on the first team offensive unit. Four of Chavez' teammates also landed first team berths.

Joining Chavez in the all-state backfield were Reserve quarterback David Baker, Attlee Benally of Navajo Mission and Ted Sisneros of Capitan.

Melrose's Joe Reed, a two-way all-state selection, was named the Class A Lineman of the Year by the coaches voting in the UPI poll. Reed was named to the first team as an offensive guard and as a linebacker on the defensive unit.

Melrose coach Dan Ward, who led the Buffaloes from obscurity to the state finals, was voted the Class A Coach of the Year by his peers.

Under Ward's direction, Melrose bounced back from a season-opening defeat at the hands of Ft. Sumner to score six straight wins and a tie.

The Buffaloes made it into the playoffs and upset powerful Hagerman 14-6 in bi-district competition to make it into the championship game against Carrizozo. Carrizozo, however

prevailed 19-14.

Reserve reeled off seven straight victories without a loss under the guidance of Baker. Reserve's season was cut short when 11 Mountaineer players were suspended from the squad for disciplinary reasons.

Baker, who was not among those involved in the incident, racked up 890 yards rushing, passed for 560 more and completed a sparkling 63 per cent of his passes.

Other Melrose players making the squad were defensive end Rex Rush and defensive back Kippie Black.

Joining Chavez on the first unit from Carrizozo were offensive end David Roper, tackle Christy Monreal and defensive end Steve Ortiz. Roper was also voted the kicker on the all-state team.

Navajo Mission landed three players on the first unit, including Benally, offensive tackle, Phillip Tree and tackle David Johnson. Dulce also had three on the all-state team, including offensive tackle Ed Gomez, defensive tackle Kirk Potter and linebacker Albert Maestas.

Other teams with representatives on the squad included Hagerman, Capitan and Mountainair. Here is this year's Class A All-State team:



station. He is survived by his wife, Connie, daughter and son, two brothers, Pete and Samuel both of Emory, two sisters, Mrs. Edith Burns of Emory and Mrs. Nora Mae Henderson of Dallas. Dan Wright, former pastor of Carrizozo Church of Christ, and Ronald Davis, present pastor, presided at the funeral service.
