## Jones announces for mayor

Elijah "Ed" Jones of Carrizozo has announced he will be a candidate for mayor in the upcoming city election. Jones said, "I've seen this town when it was thriving and I don't see any reason why it can't be a thriving town again." The candidate said he hopes to bring more industry into the community. Jones also wants to talk with people individually about cleaning up the town. "Not that I was at any secret meetings," he added "Anytime there is a city council meeting I want it open to the public." In talking about politics, Jones said, "I've got my living made, and it is a business that will not be a conflict of interest." Jones owns Valley of Fires Mobile Homes. "I'm not a politician, but I don't think we need politicians to run our city government," he continued. Jones said he has no discrimination against any of the people. "I want to represent everyone," he said. "And that is what we need in city government—representation for all the

people." The candidate is a member of the local Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce. He also belongs to the International Federation of Independent Businesses. Jones served in the Navy in World War II and was on overseas duty. He attended Quay County schools and moved to Carrizozo in 1928.

## 'Sal' Ortiz seeks re-election as judge

S.M. "Sal" Ortiz has filed with the Carrizozo Town Clerk as a candidate for municipal judge. Ortiz, who is also a probation officer for the twelfth judicial district, has been municipal judge since his appointment about 16 months ago. The candidate has had several years experience in law enforcement. He served in the judicial and legislative branch of government and was a state representative.

Ortiz said his policies would be based on sound judgement which develops with experience and education. The candidate said he would be a good judge because of his experience, ability, physical alertness and fitness, emotional stability and maturity, and compassion for and understanding of his fellow men. Ortiz is past president of the Lions Club, past vice president of the Chamber of Commerce, past board of director of the Ruidoso Elks Lodge 2089, and is secretary treasurer of the Carrizozo-Capitan Natural Gas Association. Constituents have until Feb. 4 to register to vote in the city election.

## We lost a good neighbor Prominent businessman died Monday

Austin Wooten, a Lincoln County resident since 1919, died Monday in Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo after a period of illness going back quite some time.

Funeral services for Austin will be held Thursday (today) at 2:00 p.m. in United Trinity Methodist Church. Rev. Frank Crown and Bro. Dan Wright will officiate. Morticians of New Mexico will be active pall bearers. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery in Carrizozo.

Austin probably had one of the greenest thumbs of any person in Carrizozo; he could sure make things grow. The row of trees planted by Austin next to Clarke's Chapel of Roses turned out to be in the lots used by Otis, Waldo and Coco after this property was surveyed. Which really made it good for the dogs because Austin would talk to them a lot while he was watering the trees.

We sure counted him a good neighbor and friend as did most of the people in Carrizozo and Lincoln County.

Austin Wooten was a veteran of WWI, and a 50-year member of the American Legion. He must have arrived in Lincoln County shortly after WWI was over. Since his arrival in this area Austin has been most active in civic affairs and a leader of many organizations. He is past grandmaster of the Masonic Lodge, and past Noble Grand of the IOOF Lodge in Carrizozo, and also as past Worthy Patron of O.E.S. Austin served as president of both civic clubs in town, the Lions and Rotary Club. He was a member of the Shrine order, New Mexico Mounted Patrol, and member of the Presbyterian Church.

Austin was a highly successful politician which speaks well of what people in Lincoln County thought of him. He lost very few campaigns and was serving as Probate Judge of Lincoln County at the time of his death.

Austin was born January 28, 1896 in Carthage, Texas. He has two brothers, Ben A. Wooten and Add Dorman who still reside in Carthage. Survivors include his wife Faye; son Jimmy of Rochester, Minn.; daughter Elsie Faye Lannom of Roswell; six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

He had been a mortician for 53 years and owned and operated the Chapel of Roses Mortuary in Carrizozo for a number of years. The Wootens have homes in Carrizozo and Nogal. The Wooten family suggests that in lieu of flowers people may want to make a gift to the Memorial Fund of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo.

## Miller was Ancho pioneer

Price Martin Miller was born September 14, 1893 to Joseph C. and Agnes Tyler Miller. He passed away January 23, 1974 in Carrizozo. Mr. Miller was educated in the Joplin, Missouri schools.

He was baptized in the Presbyterian Church of Coroha on February 18, 1951. He served his country in the U.S. Navy from 1918 to 1922 aboard the U.S. Oregon.

Price started his ranch work in the Ancho area in 1917, pioneering a raw and beautiful land.

He was a kind and generous man, always willing to reach out helping hand to a neighbor in need, or just a grasp of friendship.

He was truly a man of God, trusting in the Lord with all his heart and all his understanding, and acknowledging Him every hour of his life, living each day as God would have him. He prayed constantly for all his friends and loved one. He took from each day whatever it had to give, making the most of every human relationship.

Price and Lavona Drake Miller were united in marriage on June 15, 1929. Of this marriage two sons were born, Jimmie Junior and Billie Lee who in 1950 preceded his father in death.

Survivors include his wife; son Jim; Brother Edwin T. Miller of Roseburg, Oregon; eight grandchildren, and a host of friends and relatives.

### Kline accepts T or C pastorate

Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Alfred S. Kline of Capitan has accepted a position as pastor of the First Christian Church in Truth of Consequences and preached his first sermon there January 27.

### Tax tips to ease filing procedures

Editor's Note: As the income tax season arrives and continues to give headaches to some, the Lincoln Co. News will present a series of articles containing hints from H. & R. Block, an income tax service.

Filing requirements for an individual state income tax return are the same as for a Federal return for both residents and non-residents. The filing status used on the New Mexico return must be the same as the Federal return.

For example you could not file a Federal return using married joint status and use married separate on the New Mexico return.

If you itemize your deductions on your Federal return your New Mexico return must be prepared the same way. If the standard deduction is used on the Federal return, then the standard deduction, including the low income allowance, must be used on the New Mexico return. The amounts are the same as allowed for the Federal return.

The amount for personal exemptions are the same as Federal return, i.e., regular, 65 years of age or older and blind is \$750 each, for 1973. Exemptions for dependents \$750 each for tax year 1973.

Residency requirements for New Mexico returns are based on the domicile of the individual as of the end-of-the-tax-year. Anyone residing in New Mexico at the tax year with the intent of New Mexico being his permanent residence must file his return using a resident status.

Any person who moved out of New Mexico prior to the end of the tax year with the intention of residing permanently outside New Mexico must file his New Mexico return as a non-resident individual.

Residency status often times determines taxability of certain income and availability of credits against taxes for certain income. Thus, it is important to New Mexico taxpayers to use the proper resident-non-resident filing status.

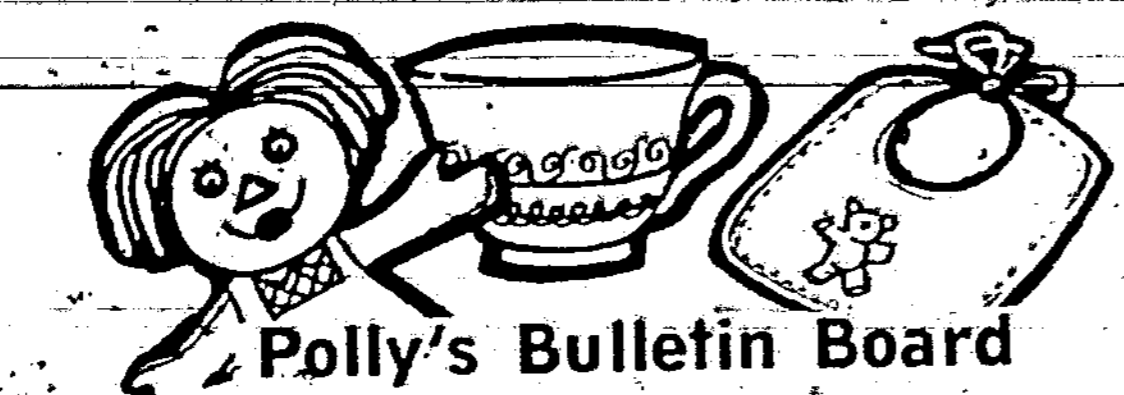
### Reception honors Merritts on 50th Wedding Anniversary

Good, good, good served warm! (Even if 50 minutes baking time is not quick.)

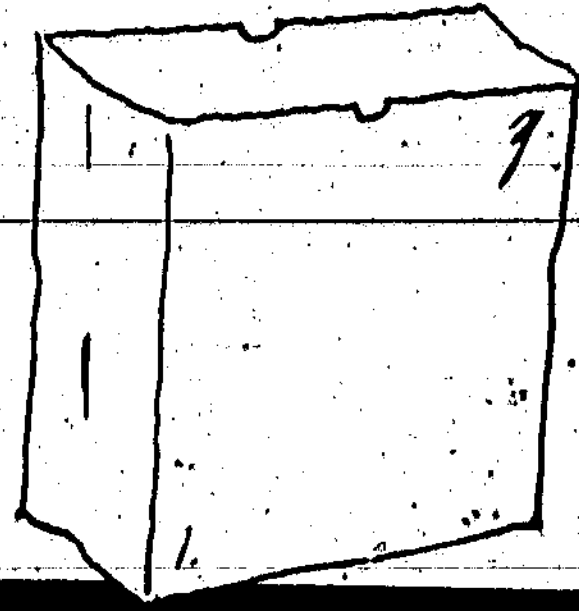

## Tax tips to ease filing procedures

Editor's Note: As the income tax season arrives and continues to give headaches to some, the Lincoln Co. News will present a series of articles containing hints from H. & R. Block, an income tax service.

Filing requirements for an individual state income tax return are the same as for a Federal return for both residents and non-residents. The filing status used on the New Mexico return must be the same as the Federal return.

For example you could not file a Federal return using married joint status and use married separate on the New Mexico return.

If you itemize your deductions on your Federal return your New Mexico return must be prepared the same way. If the standard deduction is used on the Federal return, then the standard deduction, including the low income allowance, must be used on the New Mexico return. The amounts are the same as allowed for the Federal return.

The amount for personal exemptions are the same as Federal return, i.e., regular, 65 years of age or older and blind is \$750 each, for 1973. Exemptions for dependents \$750 each for tax year 1973.

Residency requirements for New Mexico returns are based on the domicile of the individual as of the end of the tax year. Anyone residing in New Mexico at the tax year with the intent of New Mexico being his permanent residence must file his return using a resident status.

Any person who moved out of New Mexico prior to the end of the tax year with the intention of residing permanently outside New Mexico must file his New Mexico return as a non-resident individual.

Residency status often times determines taxability of certain income and availability of credits against taxes for certain income. Thus, it is important to New Mexico taxpayers to use the proper resident-non-resident filing status.

Good, good, good served warm! (Even if 50 minutes baking time is not quick.)

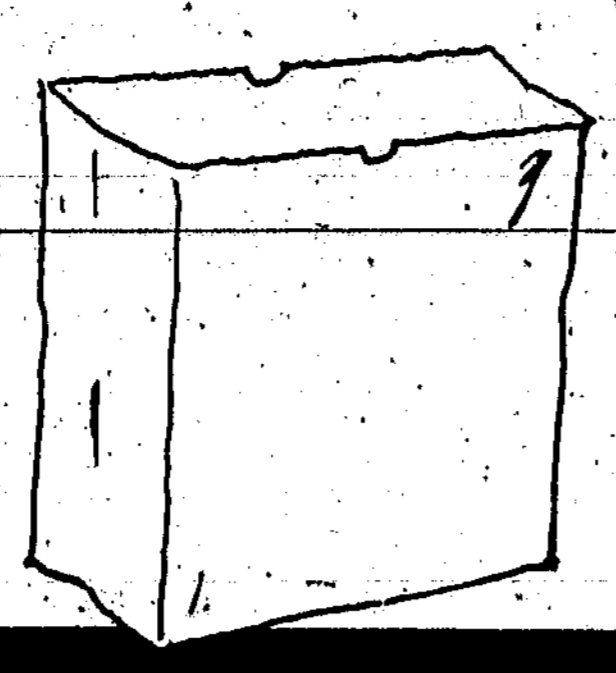
