

With eleven school districts from Hondo to Moriarty that have a great divergence of needs and resources, it is sometimes very difficult tofind a distribution formula that is best for all eleven districts. I have decided that I cannot

Fewer bills introduced at legislature this year

The last day for introduction of legislation in both the House and the Senate has passed. There were 127 bills introduced in House and 123 in the Senate, As I recall, John Conway, R-Lincoln-Otero, said, last year we had in the neighborhood of 1,000 bills introduced, so you can see the effect of the short financial session.

There has been a question since the 1972 reapportionment whether eight senators, including myself, will have to run for reelection in 1974. The Secretary of State has requested an Attorney General's opinion which at this writing has not been received. One Senator has introduced a bill to extend our terms for an additional two year. It's difficult for me to understand this reasoning. We were elected for four years; that time is up, and it's time for the voters to determine if they want us back in Santa Fe. I have introduced a bill that requires that we stand for election in 1974. I feel confident that my -bill will pass, Conway said. -

The session continues at a slow pace. Practically of the financial bills are being held until the last days of the session, so when they hit the floot, we'll be working long hours, Conway continued.

School legislation is by far the major topic, he added. The new school formula has been introduced in the House and has passed the House Education Committee. The formula is an improvement, but until we know how much money will be appropriated, we don't know how it will affect each individual school district.

Since six of the seven school districts. I represent will be directly affected by the new formula for the sparsity factor, I will be watching this aspect of the bill very carefully. Most school districts are having to struggle to get by now, and any kind of a cut in state funds would be

I am happy to report that House Bill 56, The International Space Hall of Fame, passed the House Appropriations and Finance Committee and should be on the calendar for the House

give additional weighting to districts with less than 4,000 ADM and a weighting factor that does not penalize districts for having younger, less experienced teachers. With these two amendments the schools in my distirct would be funded at a higher level with twenty-six million new dollars (statewide total) than they would under the School Study Committee's formula with thirty million new dollars. The main reservation I have about the new formula is that I fear that it further dilutes the authority of the local boards in that it takes away a great deal of local initiative from local funds. This type of législation, however, is more or less mandated by federal court decisions relating to equalization of educational opportunities.

I was pleased this morning to help with the passage of a proposed constitutional amendment that would allow the state to contract with medical school scholarship recipients to practice for a period of time in remote areas.

I was disappointed to see the House of Representatives adopt legislation that effectively elimates the possibility of write-in candidates in the primaries. This is because the law, as passed by the House, would require a write-in candidate to declare his candidacy. seven days before filing date."

Plan your Garden Now: Now is the time to plan your garden, even if you live in the cooler parts of Lincoln County. Plan your garden on paper taking into consideration the particular tastes of your family, the space available, whether produce will be canned or frozen as well as selecting the proper vegetable to grow to insure a succession of crops to fully utilize the space available.

After you have planned your garden on paper, proceed to the area. You should prepare the soil beforehand. You may add organic malter such as manure, compost, sludge, etc. and incorporate to a depth of six inches. If the ground is frozen, you may add the manure as a layer and work it in later.

In some of New Mexico, time to plant is almost on us. Other areas will be ready in March and the cooler areas by April: At this time you may plant cool season crops.

Recommended varieties of these cool season crops are: Beets - Detroit Dark Red, Sweetheart, Ruby

compactors are safe if used right. And they can be locked when not in use. A trash compactor is about 35 inches wide and 25 inches deep. It-ean be built in or left free standing.

The machine will crush almost any combiantion of trash including aerosol cans into a compact mass contained in a plastic lined bag. In one test, 42 pounds didn't fill the bag. A full bag weighs from 30-to 50 pounds depending on the type of trash it. The weight could make the

bag hard to remove from the compactor. After you push the start switch, a motor drives a ram down to mash the contents. Then the ram returns to the up position and the motor shuts off. When you close the drawer, an aerosol

deodorant sprays the top layer. You must use some deodorant to keep down odors. The action of a trash compactor can be stopped by flipping a switch or turning the key off or opening the drawer. If the ram is interrupted in its downward thrust, it will go to the up position first when restarted.

Never let children operate a compactor. They might open the access panel just enough to reach a small hand inside.

The unit uses 6 to 11 amperes during its cycle so a 15 ampere 3-prong grounded outlet on a separate circuit with time delay fuse is suggested. Using a compactor may slow down the natural destruction of waste. If the compactor uses two bags a week, the bags and deodorant alone would cost \$35 a year.





State regulations similar to fed

Editor's Note: This is second in a series of articles dealing with the various aspects of filing income tax reports. H & R Block, a tax service, has written the series.

The New Mexico income tax laws and regulations follow the Federal laws and regulations in many ways. Filing requirements status, exemptions, deductions, etc., are identical. In addition some other requirements are treated the same with minor exceptions.

Capital gains losses are generally treated the same except New Mexico does not require the additional minimum-tax to be paid on capital gains over certain amounts.

Capital losses are the same as Federal with carryover of unused losses to future tax years. Limitations are the same as Federal returns. Net operating losses from business are treated the same as Federal with carryback carryover

of unused losses. The administrative, requirements for decedents income tax returns are basically the same as for Federal returns. A copy of federal. form 1310, "statement of claimant to refund due deceased taxpayer" with supporting documents, must be attached to the New Mexico return when

a refund is due. Persons who are self-employed in a business or profession report their income to New Mexico the same as Federal. A copy of their Federal Form(s), Schedule C "Profit (or loss) from business or profession" must be attached to their New Mexico return.
