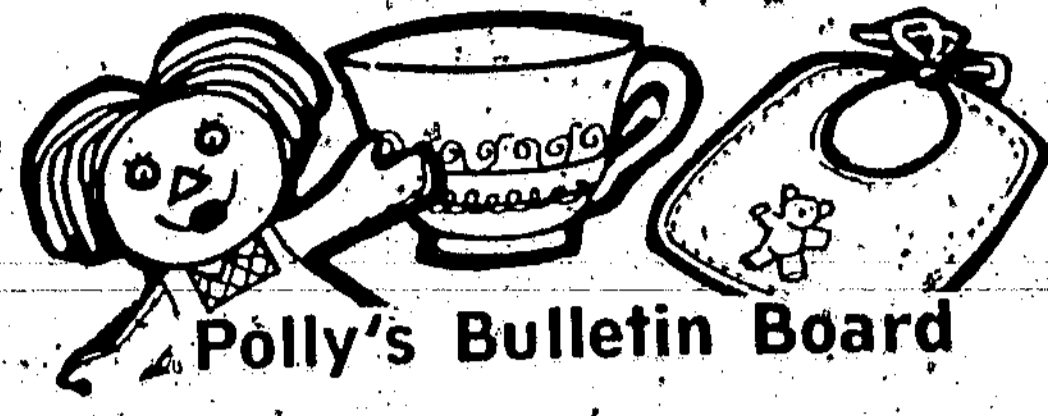

Here is a recipe for Navajo Fry Bread that is a hit in this household. With 'beans deluxe' (that is beans cooked with ham pieces or bacon) this Indian bread is great. Of course don't forget the chili. (Red or green chili, pickled chili or raw jalapeno chili. Take your choice.)

- 4 cups flour,
 - 1 cup dried milk,
 - 8 tsps. baking powder,
 - 2 tsps. salt,
 - 2 cups warm water.
- Mix dry ingredients well. Add warm water gradually. Mix and knead until dough is soft, but not sticky.
- Shape into balls 2 inches in diameter; flatten by hand into 1 1/2 inch thick circles. Use a little flour to keep dough from sticking to hands.
- Navajo tradition says you should poke a small hole in the center of each circle to release the "evil spirits" before frying (It will also fry better).

Fry in deep fat; turn when brown.

Also great with honey or jam, if there is any left when the beans and chili run out.

Spencer-Frost wedding in St. Clement's Chapel

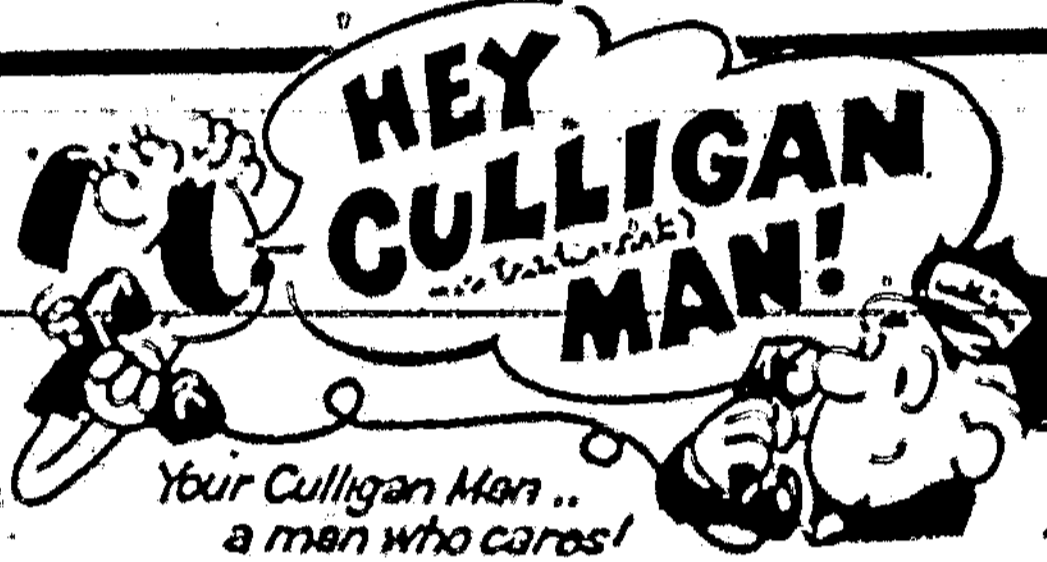

Carl Stauder showed slides with emphasis

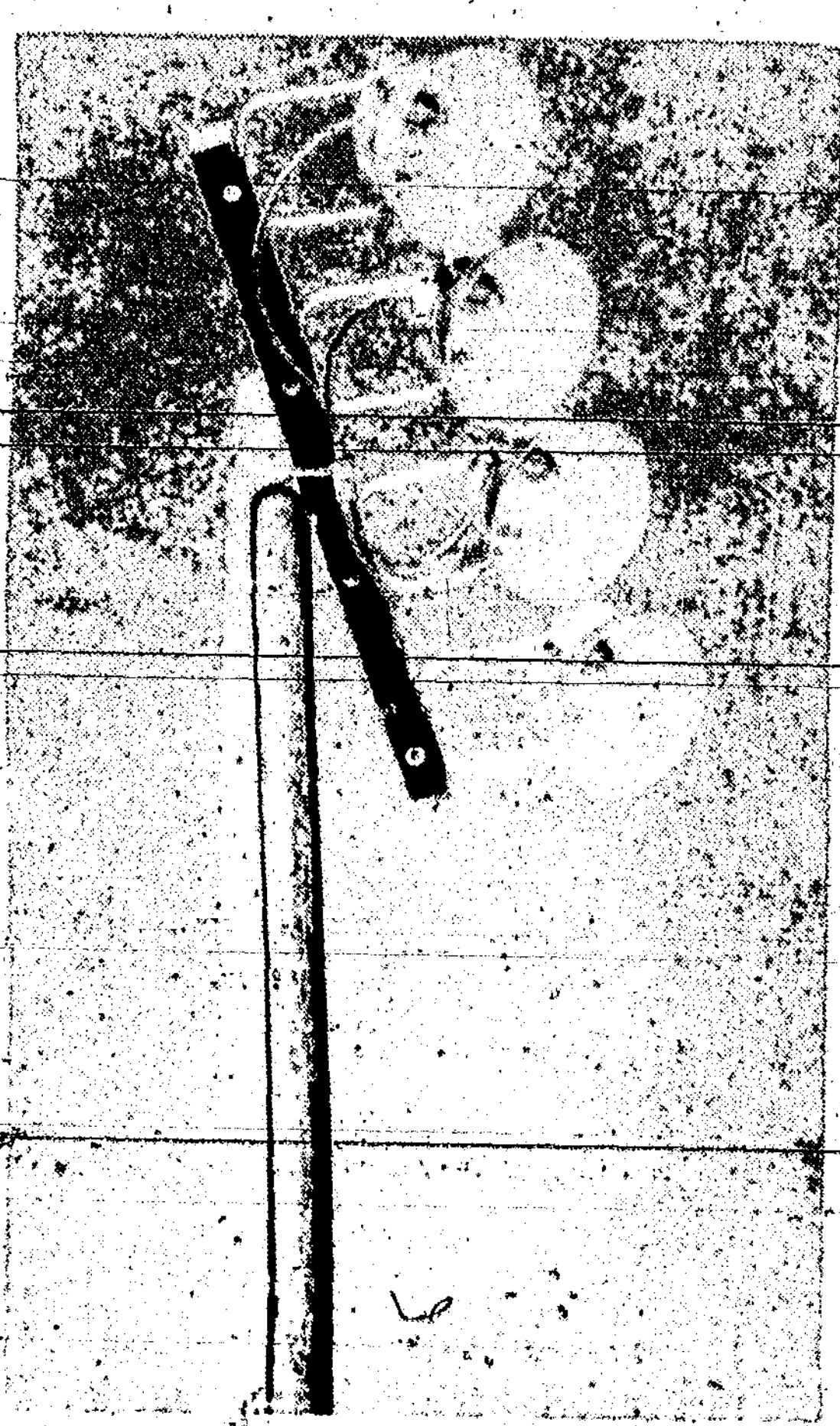
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Work continues at Carrizozo's new recreation facility, the most recently work being installation of lights for baseball diamond and tennis courts.

I don't know if I ever thanked you properly for all the help you gave me at that time. I feel that all that I learned in 4-H really helps me now that I am a wife and mother. Although my husband, Albert, teases me about having had to bake cookies to make it to Chicago, I know that deep down he really enjoys all the sweets I bake. He likes to think it was my cookies!

I especially remember having to thin out my record book and what a relief it was to have finished it. I also remember that Carol was asked if we were sisters. I guess we did spend a majority of our time together. And remember the "Grandma" episode in Alamogordo. We had gone to a 4-H meeting there and we stopped to check in at a motel. P.S. We live in Ruidoso now and we really enjoy it here. If you are ever this way, or if Carol or Grace come by, please ask them to call us. Say hello to Mr. (Johnnie) Bowman and thank him also. After all, he had to put up with one more most of the time.

Plan your Garden Now: Now is the time to plan your garden, even if you live in the cooler parts of Lincoln County. Plan your garden on paper taking into consideration the particular tastes of your family, the space available, whether produce will be canned or frozen as well as selecting the proper vegetable to grow to insure a succession of crops to fully utilize the space available.

After you have planned your garden on paper, proceed to the area. You should prepare the soil beforehand. You may add organic matter such as manure, compost, sludge, etc. and incorporate to a depth of six inches. If the ground is frozen, you may add the manure as a layer and work it in later.

In some of New Mexico, time to plant is almost on us. Other areas will be ready in March and the cooler areas by April. At this time you may plant cool season crops.

Recommended varieties of these cool season crops are:

Cauliflower - Snowball Strains, Mount Blanc Swiss Chard - Lucullus, Fordhook Giant
Kohlrabi - Early White Vienna, Purple

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Vienna Mustard - Tendergreen, Sothern Curled, Fordhook Fancy
Onions - White Sweet Spanish, Yellow Sweet Spanish, Pronto S, Early Harvest
Parsnips - Hollow Crown, All American

Trash Compactor Forms Solid Mass: Trash compactors are safe if used right. And they can be locked when not in use. A trash compactor is about 35 inches wide and 25 inches deep. It can be built in or left free standing.

The machine will crush almost any combination of trash including aerosol cans into a compact mass contained in a plastic lined bag. In one test, 42 pounds didn't fill the bag. A full bag weighs from 30 to 50 pounds depending on the type of trash in it. The weight could make the bag hard to remove from the compactor.

After you push the start switch, a motor drives a ram down to mash the contents. Then the ram returns to the up position and the motor shuts off.

When you close the drawer, an aerosol deodorant sprays the top layer. You must use some deodorant to keep down odors. The action of a trash compactor can be stopped by flipping a switch or turning the key off or opening the drawer. If the ram is interrupted in its downward thrust, it will go to the up position first when restarted.

Never let children operate a compactor. They might open the access panel just enough to reach a small hand inside.

The unit uses 6 to 11 amperes during its cycle so a 15 ampere 3-prong grounded outlet on a separate circuit with time delay fuse is suggested. Using a compactor may slow down the natural destruction of waste. If the compactor uses two bags a week, the bags and deodorant alone would cost \$35 a year.

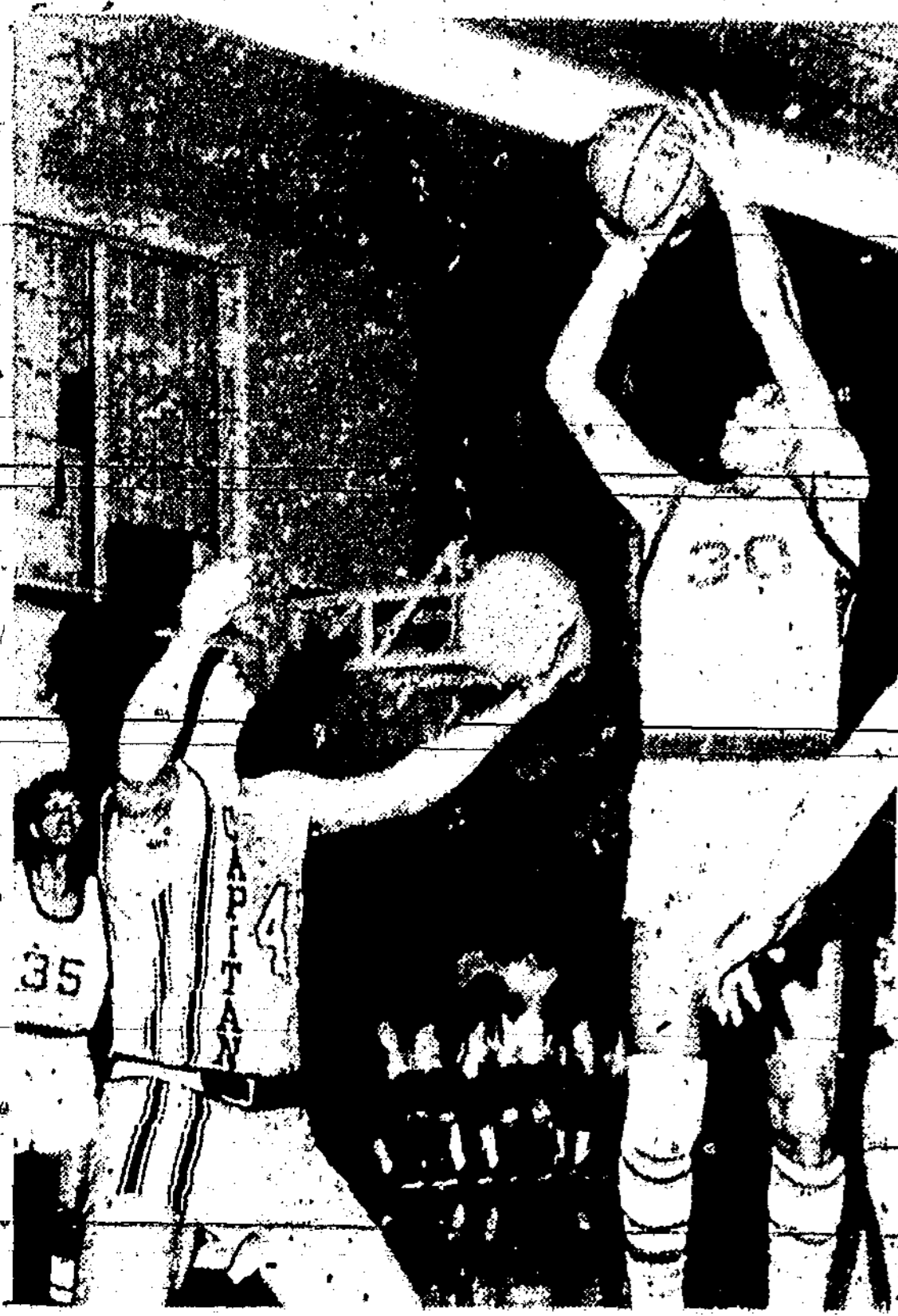

State regulations similar to fed

Editor's Note: This is second in a series of articles dealing with the various aspects of filing income tax reports. H & R Block, a tax service, has written the series.

The New Mexico income tax laws and regulations follow the Federal laws and regulations in many ways. Filing requirements, status, exemptions, deductions, etc., are identical. In addition some other requirements are treated the same with minor exceptions.

Capital gains losses are generally treated the same except New Mexico does not require the additional minimum tax to be paid on capital gains over certain amounts.

Capital losses are the same as Federal with carryover of unused losses to future tax years. Limitations are the same as Federal returns. Net operating losses from business are treated the same as Federal with carryback carryover of unused losses.

The administrative requirements for decedents income tax returns are basically the same as for Federal returns. A copy of federal Form 7310, "statement of claiming refund due deceased taxpayer" with supporting documents, must be attached to the New Mexico return when a refund is due.

Persons who are self-employed in a business or profession report their income to New Mexico the same as Federal. A copy of their Federal Form(s), Schedule C "Profit (or loss) from business or profession" must be attached to their New Mexico return.

Stretching water to be discussed

S-T-R-E-T-C-H-ing water will be one of the subjects at the meeting at the Hondo School Agriculture Building on February 19, 1974 starting at 7:30 p.m. Although you can't stretch water but can make it go farther with proper use.

Charles Hohn, Extension Agriculture Engineer at New Mexico State University will discuss Drip Irrigation and how it can be used to make the best use of a limited amount of water. At the same time he will point out some of the limitations of Drip Irrigation. Effective water use on irrigated pastures will also be discussed by Charles Hohn at this meeting.

Getting the most from irrigated pastures will be discussed by Gordon Hoff, Extension Agronomist. We will talk about fertilizing and managing irrigated pastures.

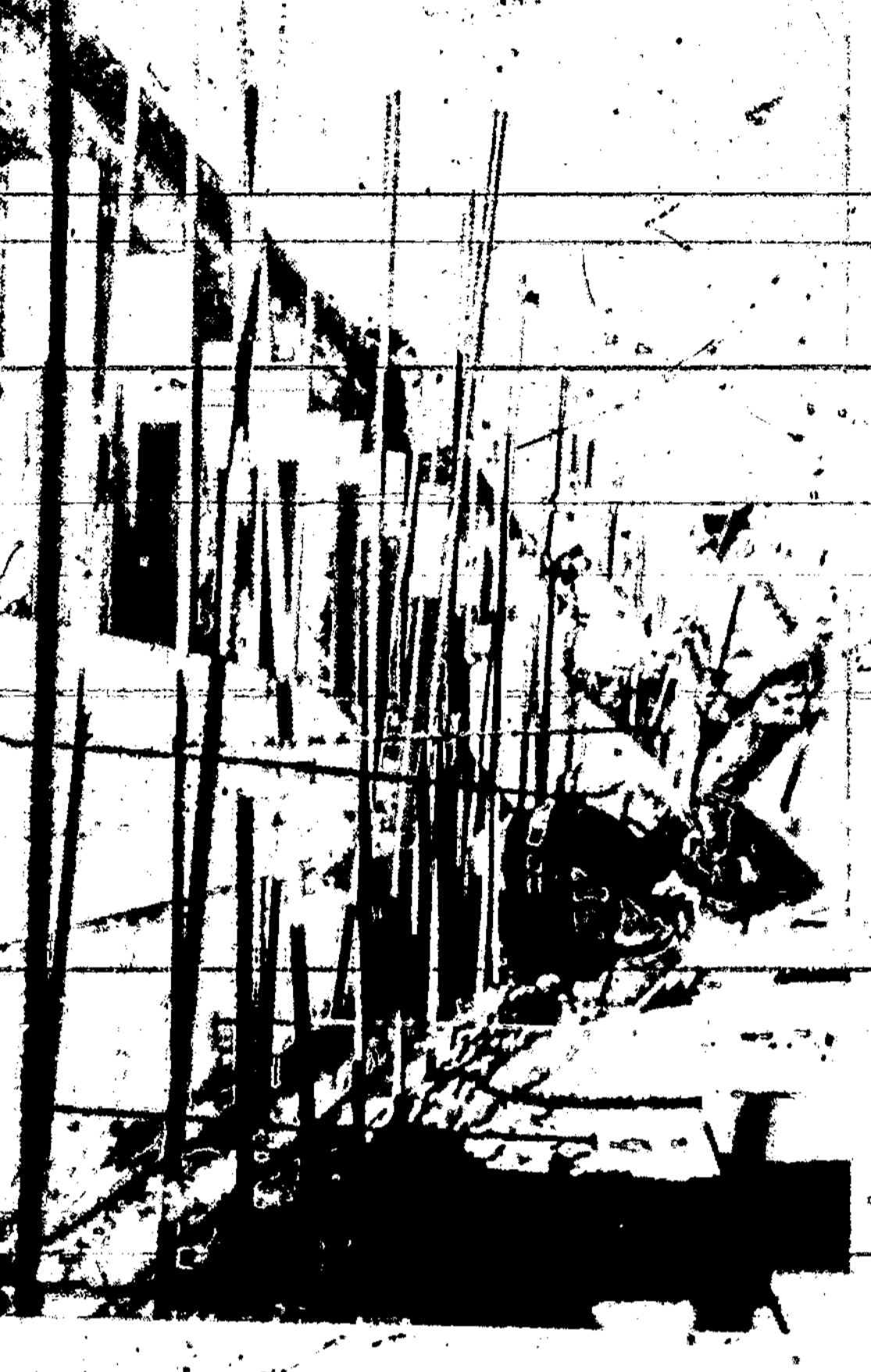

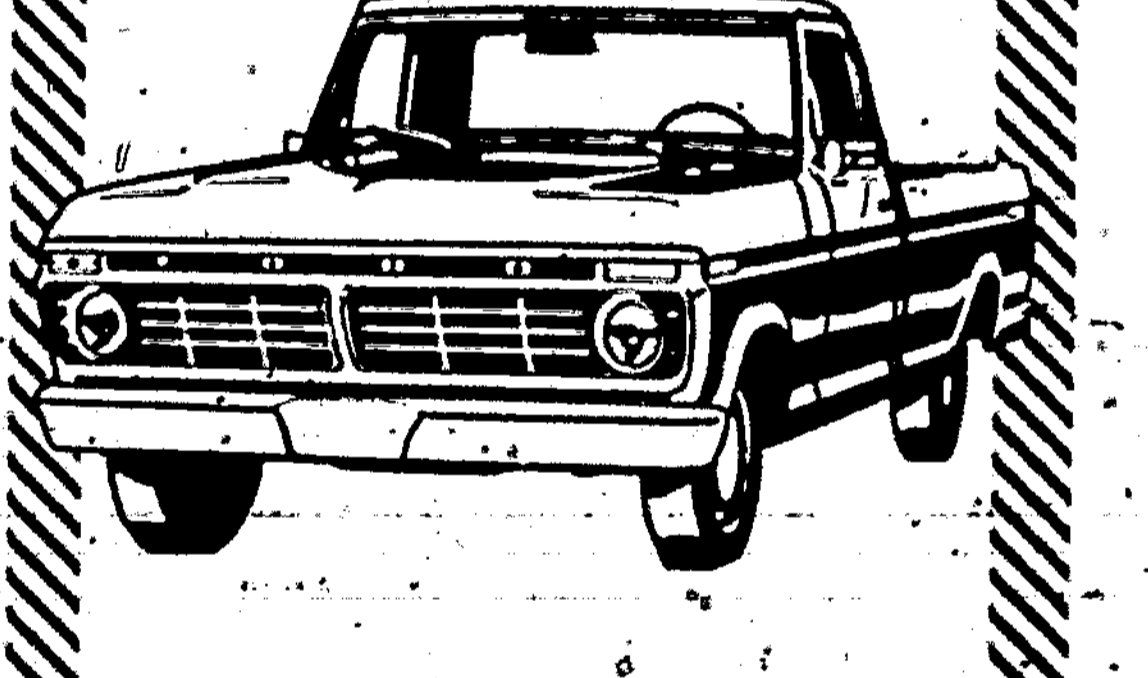
