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Superintendent contract renewed

School hair straightens out, building program is delayed

After opening formalities of the Carrizo Municipal School Board Tuesday night President Ziggy Lessau asked Walt Wilson for report from his dress code committee.

Walt asked that Carolyn Cantrell, secretary, read the minutes of their several meetings, the proposed student dress code was presented. The code does not contain any major changes. Two main items as it relates to boys were: 1-B Hair must be neat, clean and well-groomed. Hair may extend to the bottom edge of a standard shirt collar, and even with the bottom of the ear lobes. It must not hang below the eyebrows; the hair must be well trimmed. This item passed the committee by of 17 for, 6 abstained.

Item 2-B Boys must be clean shaven. Mustaches may not extend further than the corner of the mouth. Curls at the ends will not be permitted. Sideburns may not extend further than the corner of the mouth, and should not be wider than the average hair line. Percentage needed to pass was obtained by chairman casting his vote.

The code as it relates to girls suggested few changes. Hair must be neat, shoes worn at all times, students may not wear shorts or hot pants

with the exception of phys. ed classes, skirt hemline should cover two-thirds of thigh or below, blouses buttoned at all times, no hats or caps in any building.

Two students on the dress code committee, Ricky Siegrist and Pat Sandoval, were asked for comment, they had none. Supt. Jim Steinepreis asked them if all students participated in forming the dress code, answer was yes. Steinepreis commented that the code would not make job any easier on administrator, but the understanding achieved was sure worth the effort.

President Lessau commended the committee, parents and students. Code was adopted. Wilson suggested that it be reviewed each year.

Building program was next on agenda. The district recently voted bonds for construction of vocational facility, gym, repair and administration quarters in amount of \$325,000.00. After reappraisal, not as high as estimated at time of bond sale, the district found it could sell only \$250,000 in bonds this year. Discussion at the meeting centered around several options, none really good, like building in pieces, maybe do

shell of gym and come back later to finish, or wait until next year.

Final decision was to delay the project until present session of legislature is over at which time the board can seek capital outlay funds of \$50,000 or \$60,000 and, if granted, then have sufficient money to do the vocational and gym jobs at one time.

Discussion of funding formula was short because legislature has not completed its work and no certainty about amount of money school will have for next year.

Nine Teachers have indicated desire for annuity program. Mrs. Preston Stone was present to speak for the teachers. Supt. Steinepreis pointed out that as of now there are eight items of deduction on teacher checks. Recommendation of the teachers group was accepted.

State-wide testing results were presented. Results will be published later.

Next item on agenda was personnel, superintendent's employment. Ray Wells said he thought Jim had done a good job. Board voted unanimous to extend contract for one year to superintendent. Jim said he would use the

normal amount of time in returning his contract to the board.

Flora Vega, working under Title I, will work 18 full days.

Calendar for next school year reviewed. School start August 20, last day May 23. Vacations much as in past years.

Lots owned by school district in White Oaks and leased to Preacher Dobbs were again leased to some party for \$10.00.

The South Central Mountain Resource Area will help in getting joint student counselor for all schools in the county.

Supt. Steinepreis will attend budget workshop in Las Cruces March 5-6. Budget hearing in Carrizo on May 20. Board members plan trip to Santa Fe about capital outlay money soon as legislative session is over.

Board OK'd purchase of check protector.

Discussion turned to discussion of sportsmanship shown by both fans and students at basketball games with particular reference to the Capitan game. This game was rough and board members felt the game officials let it get out of hand. They want a show of good sportsmanship, particularly with our neighbors.

Council adopts cleanup resolution

Carrizo town council meeting in regular session Tuesday night, adopted a resolution asking the Chamber of Commerce to form a committee to inspect every lot and building in town making note of conditions that should be corrected such as weedy lots, fire hazards, health hazards, abandoned vehicles, dangerous buildings etc.

This report will be returned to the town council which will then ask property owners to voluntarily correct the bad conditions. Following that course, the next step would be for the town to do the cleanup or correction work and bill the property owner.

Dutch Cox, president of Carrizo Chamber of Commerce, made the presentation to the council.

The Carrizo Volunteer Fire Department received permission from the council to purchase a mini pumper to be used on out-of-town fire calls. The Department estimated that around fifty percent of its calls were out of town, some for distances up to thirty miles, which was hard on the big-pumpers. The mini pumper can handle such fire work better.

Clara Snow and Hazel Hays, representing the Cemetery Association, asked the council for clarification of the position of the Association since the town is assuming management of the cemetery. It was decided that the Association should continue to function as beautification and maintenance body since the town has a long way to go in preparing plans for management of the cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Mel Clark were present to discuss gasoline situation airport with the council. Clark said he could advise the town on how to obtain aviation gas. They also asked what the hospital should do about building for the ambulance.

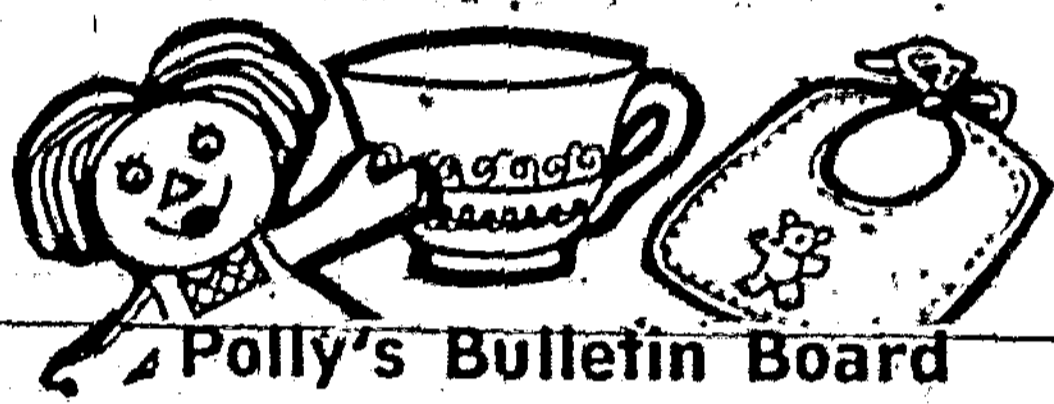

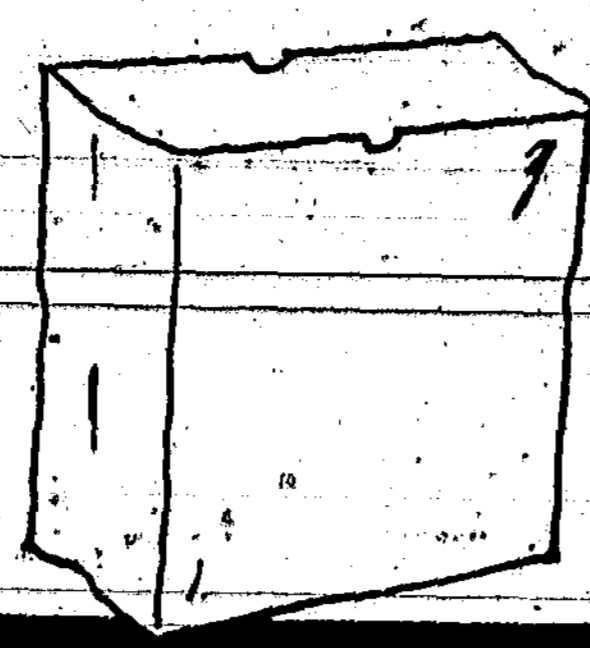

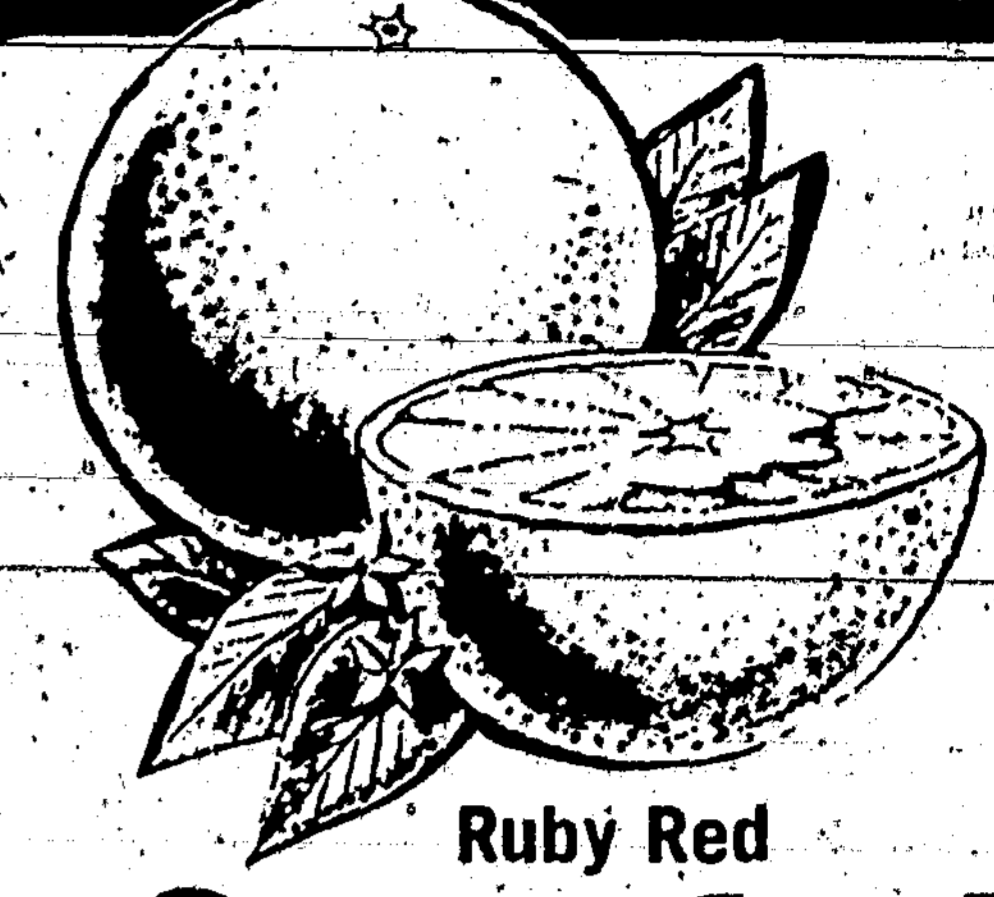

Beef recipe contest at fair grounds

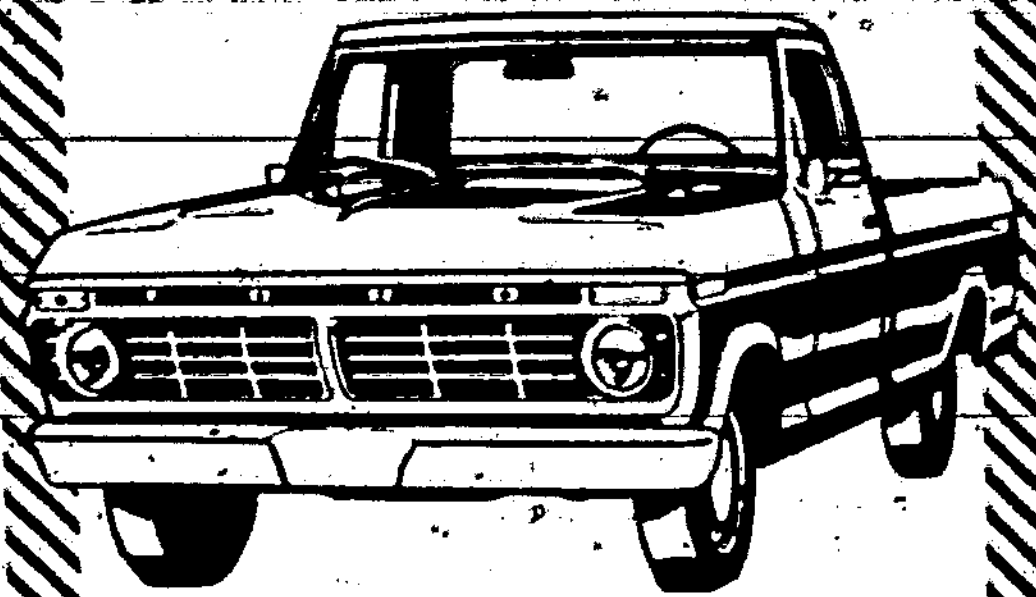

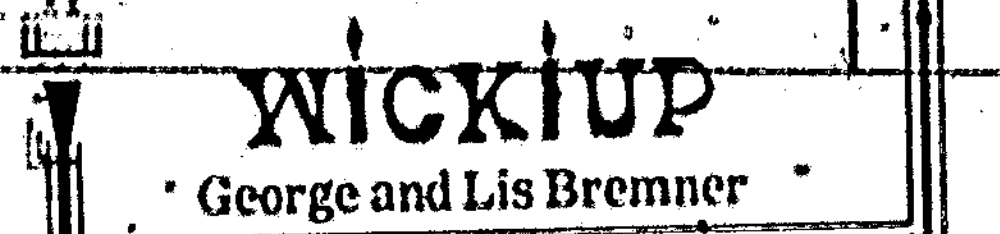

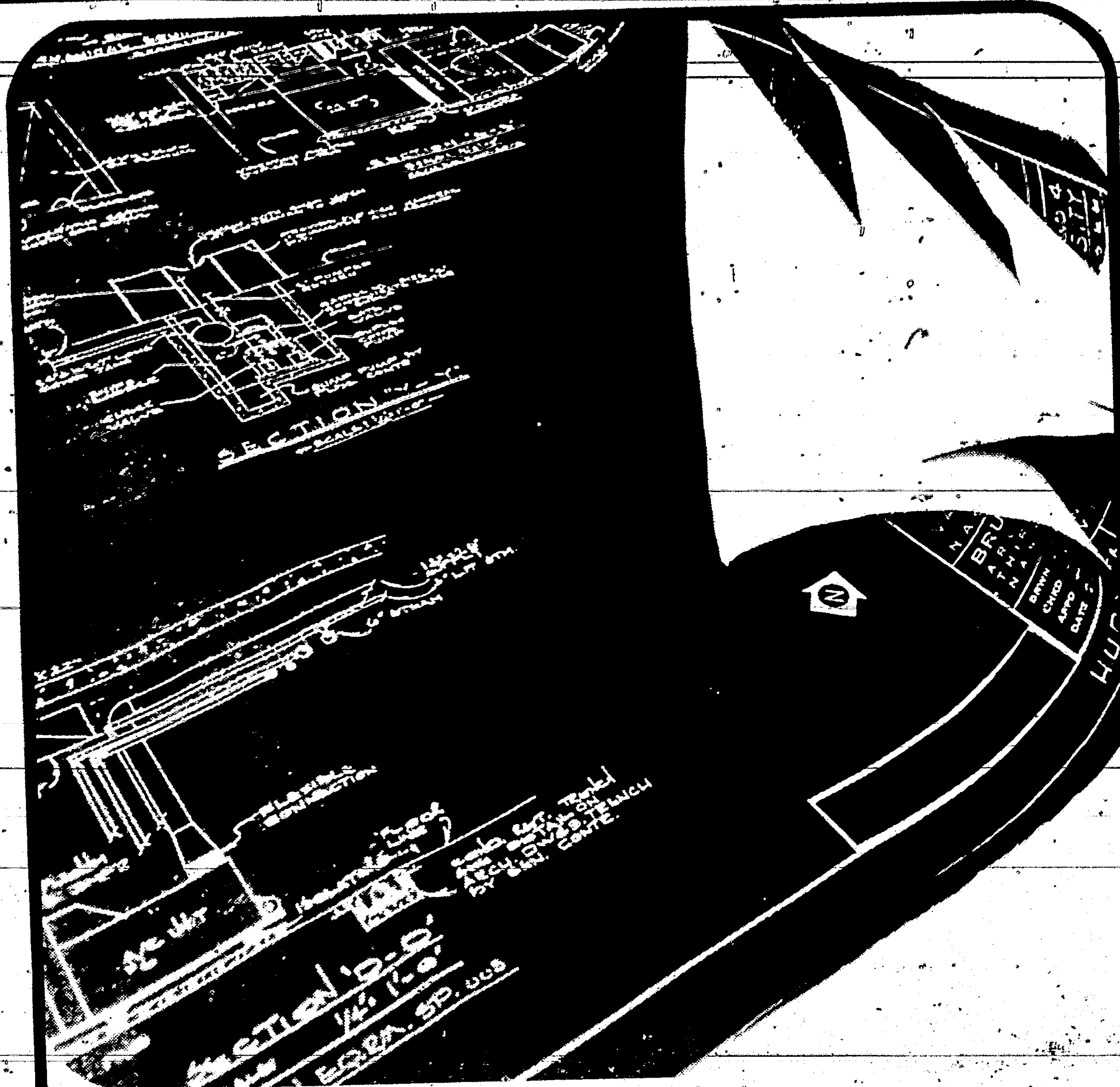
ICE BOX ROLLS:

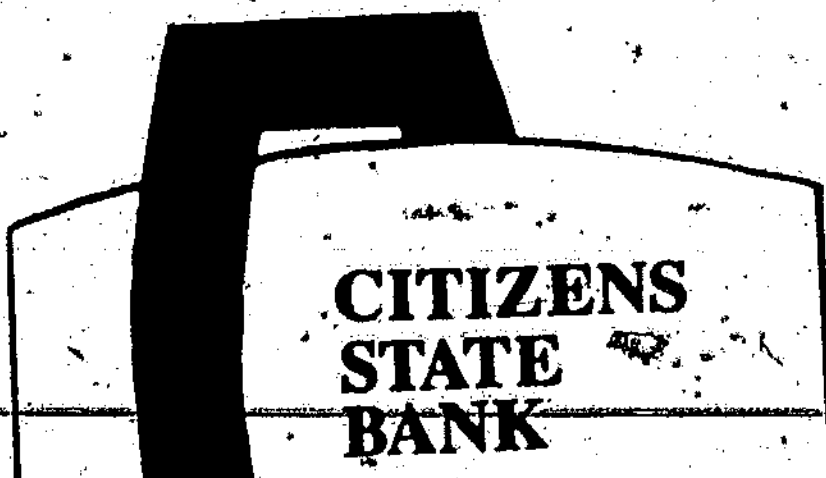
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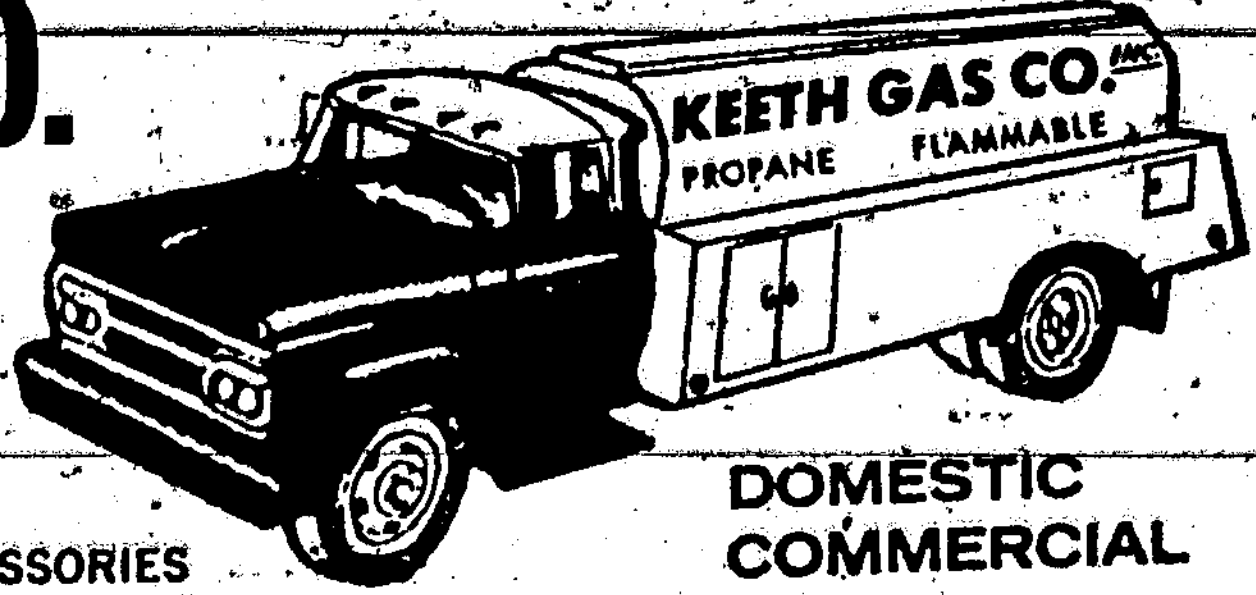
