## Two positions wide open Write in votes important in Carrizozo town election

Voters going to the polls in the March 5 election next Tuesday in Carrizozo will need to make use of a pencil in two places to vote for candidates in all four positions.

There will be only the problem of selecting the candidate of your choice in the mayor race where Bill Payne and Ed Jones will be shown in positions 1 and 2. You simply turn a voting pointer down over the candidate's name.

Willie Silva's name was in position 3 but has been scratched because he failed to register to vote and thereby became ineligible except as a "write-in" candidate.

Both Positions 3 and 4 are open to "write in" voting. To "write in" a candidate for office or trustee, (or any other office), make sure the voting pointers, in this instance 3 and 4, are up. Then near the top of the machine, push up the

slide, numbered 3 and 4, and write in the name of your choice for that office. You can write in two trustee names, one in position 3 and one in 4.

Some care should be given to writing in the name of candidate. For instance, there are two Leandro Vegas in town and one is sheriff and not up for election. The other is Leandro Vega Sr. and you should be sure to add the Sr. to his name. James Willie Silva is also an announced write in candidate, and being the only Willie Silva in town, just two words: Willie Silva, should convey your intent to the election judges in such an instance.

S. M. Ortiz is the one candidate for municipal judge and you turn down the voting pointer same as for you mayor candidate. Should you wish to write in a candidate for either mayor or judge you follow instructions as for councilman.

## Lincoln County grass isn't all that bad Actions of BLM add new dimension to difference between jackass and donkey

The 19 burros claimed by the New Mexico Livestock Board from range land south of Carrizozo last week are likely to become a celebrated case at law for the purpose of determining whether the Livestock Board operating under New Mexico brand law which pre-dates a federal law about wild, free-roaming horses and burros, has control of such animals or are they under control of the federal government through one of its many long arms, the Bureau of Land Management.

Lee Garner, director of the New Mexico Livestock Board, said the burros were claimed as strays and disposed of—in this case, sold at public auction in Roswell. The News has been informed that the Livestock Board would seek a court settlement if possible as a means of deciding who does have control of stray, unbranded animals in New Mexico.

Meanwhile, some AP writer refers to the free-roamers as "16 skinny New Mexico burros, and said (in print) that they are starved, at least 100 pounds underweight. If the government decides they go back over there they're going to die.

Lincoln County grass and feed put out by most ranchers is not all that bad. If those burros had been in the Carrizozo area very long they surely would not have been in the reported condition. It

was the conclusion of ranch people near Carrizozo that some person had made a drop of burros on the ranch here.

Wild burros are no way as friendly as this herd was. People could go right up to them, pet them, mount and ride, which seems to prove that they were not exactly wild animals. Also, the news got first hand information that the burros were eating supplemental feed needed on the ranch, after running cows away from the feed area. That sure does not sound like a starvation diet.

## City hall bid goes to Cox

Three members of Carrizozo town council met in special session Tuesday afternoon to open bids on a 40 X 70 metal prefab building to be used as town hall located on the east triangle of land across from Malpais Grocery.

Only one bid was submitted—the amount was \$34,795.72, the bidder was R. A. Cox dba Central Welding & Supply. The new building will have 2800 square feet of floor space with rooms for clerk, town manager, judge-police meeting room and vault, probably one other small room not mentioned in the discussion.

Before the bid was awarded to Cox there was considerable discussion concerning amount of time needed for construction. Both availability of materials and March weather are important factors. Cox thought 150 days from signing of contract should be sufficient, council agreed. Should Cox not be able to get all needed materials, after sincere effort, the council may extend the time limit.

Smokey has grown old, down with arthritis, and does not have long to last at his transplanted home at the National Park Service Zoo in Washington, D. C.

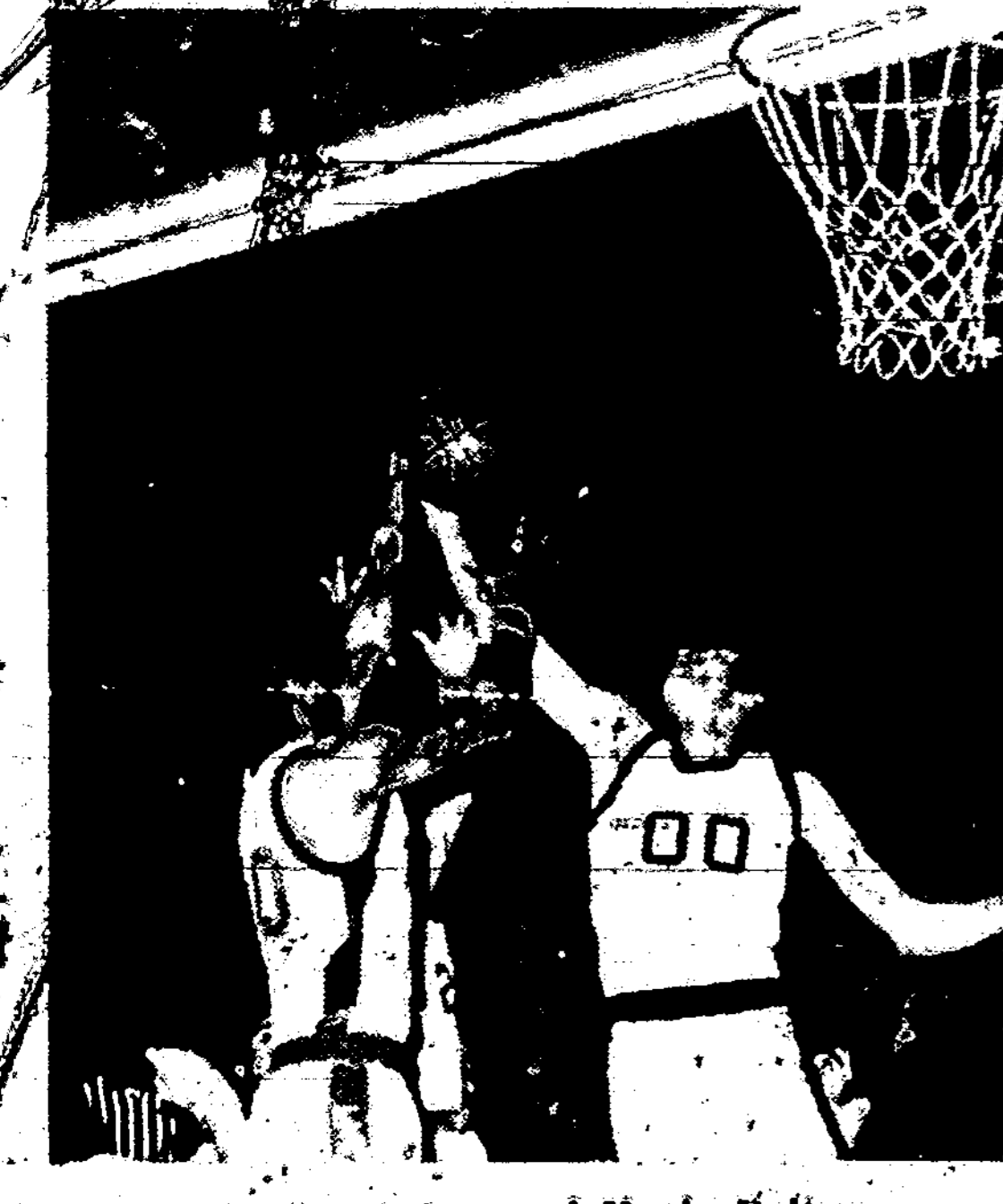

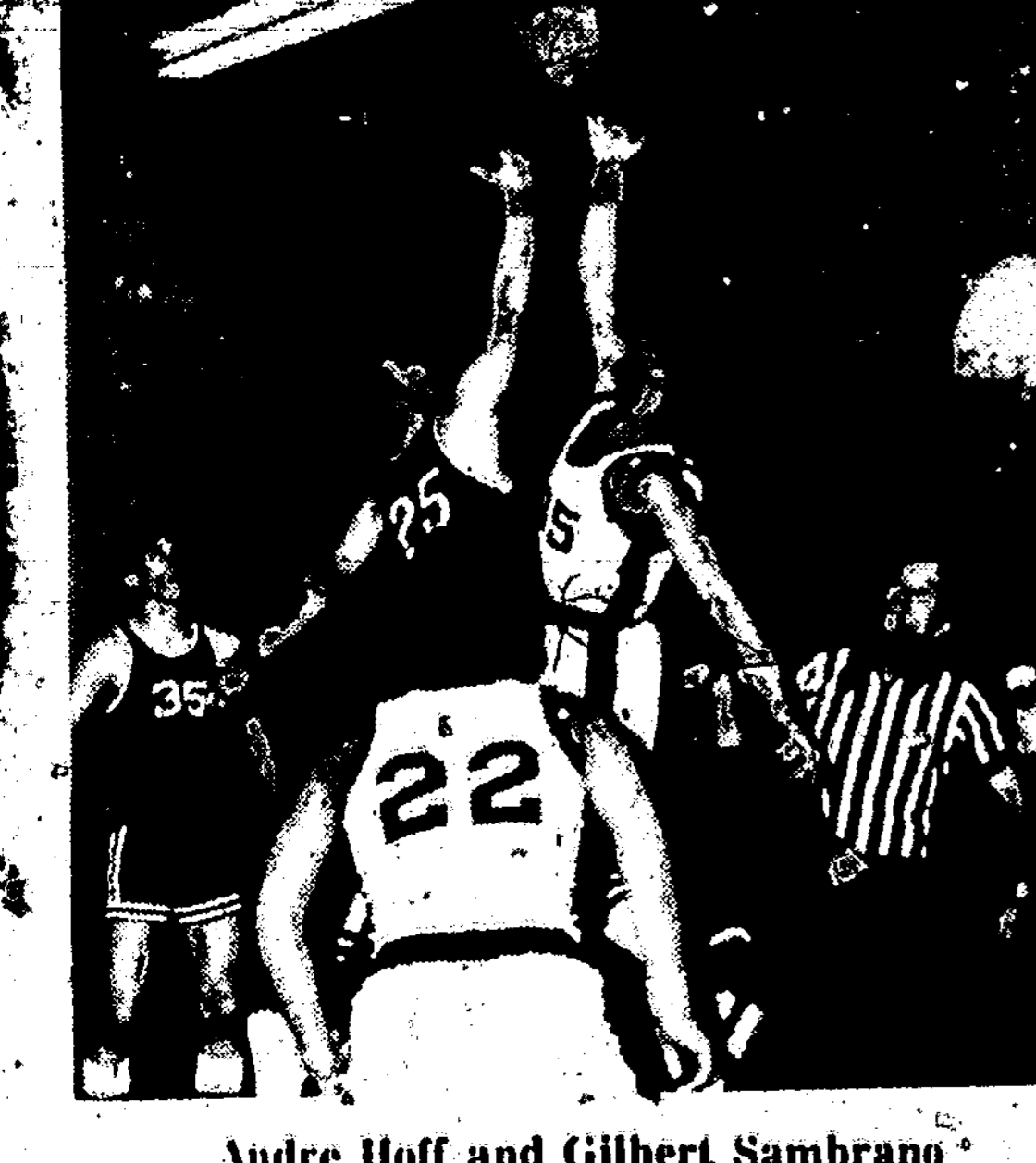

SANTA FE, N.M.—The state Game and Fish Department says six northern New Mexico lakes will be opened to fishermen on March 1.

Department spokesmen said the opening date was being moved up a month to give fishermen more angling time and to relieve opening day pressures experienced last year.

The lakes are McAlister, Clayton, Charette, Jackson, Springer and Lake 13 on the Las Vegas National Wildlife Refuge.

Lakes scheduled to open April 1 include Bonito Lake, Bitter Lake, Lake Alice and Santa Cruz Lake.

I was born on a ranch near Carrizozo and completed High School there. Carrizozo is very close to me including all the people who live there, even though the ones I knew at that time, or at least most of them, have gone. The people who live there now are also close to me even though most of them never heard of George Cooper. They are close to me because they live there. My first steady employment, after graduating from High School was with the U. S. Govt. in 1931, whom I worked for until this past June 1973, at which time I retired. I worked for four different Govt. Agencies, all in New Mexico, and retired with 41 years and six months under Civil Service.

It was during the year of 1951 when my first wife, Vera Richard, and I were persuaded to start Square Dancing. Neither of us thought a thing about it until some of our friends talked us into coming down to the Square Dance Club, in Tucuman. After the first night we never missed a single Square Dance night for more than a year. Vera passed on in 1956. Before that time Square Dancing was our favorite recreation, because we could enjoy it together, equally.

DIRECTIONS FOR VOTING

1. Move the Red Handle completely to the Right. The Ballot Paper will rise and the Red Handle will lock the machine for voting.
2. Turn down a voting pointer over each candidate's name you wish to vote.
3. Turn the "Write In" dial to the left. If you wish to vote for a candidate not listed, write the name in the space provided.
4. Move the Red Handle completely to the Left. The Ballot Paper will fall and the Red Handle will unlock the machine. You may now remove the Ballot Paper.

IMPORTANT: You must check to see that the Ballot Paper has fallen to the right. If it has not, the machine will not count your vote. If you have voted more than the proper number of voting pointers for each office, your vote will be discarded. YOU MUST NOT LOITER. The Voting Machine is the property of the State of New Mexico and must be returned to the County Clerk's Office after the election. Failure to do so will result in a fine.

**Bread may go to \$1.00**

The big food news of 2 weeks ago was the startling announcement by Bill O. Mead, chairman of the American Bakers Association, that a loaf of bread would cost ONE dollar by May of this year.

Secretary of Agriculture, Earl L. Butz said in Washington on Jan. 11 in a news conference that Mr. Mead "Perpetrated a hoax on Consumers" with his scare tactics. For bread to his one dollar a loaf by May, wheat prices would have to move up to \$33.00 a bushel.

Secretary Butz called on Mr. Mead to "tell consumers the truth about bread". He said the average retail price of a 1 1/2 pound loaf of bread is about 47 cents and that the farm value of wheat in that size loaf is just over 7 cents. Other costs and profits account for the remaining 40 cents; he said.

Mr. Butz said further, "maybe these 40 cents of 'other' non-wheat costs and profits are going to go up by May, if so, say so." Don't lay all the blame on wheat for your increased costs -- that is unrealistic."

It will be interesting to see what happens to this latest "crisis" for the American consumer.

**Carrizozo teachers to hold workshop**

# Vega proud of Sheriff's department

In making his formal announcement that he will seek re-election, subject to the Republican Party Primary election, June 4, Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr., of Carrizozo, this week told the Lincoln County News, "At least a major part of my reason for seeking re-election is that I am very proud of the Lincoln County Sheriff's department and have many valid reasons for feeling as I do."

Sheriff Vega continued, "During my current term of office I have been successful in putting together a law enforcement team that is, as far as I am aware, unequalled in law enforcement experience and professionalism in the history of Lincoln County or in any of the surrounding counties."

"At the present time," Vega stated, "Our law enforcement team includes two former Lincoln County sheriffs who have a total of 20 years experience in law enforcement, a former chief of police veteran of 14 years in law enforcement and a former chief marshal."

The sheriff added, "Our entire team has a combined total of nearly 54 years law enforcement experience, all in Lincoln County, which includes my two previous terms as Lincoln County Sheriff and my current elective term."

"The figure," Vega commented, "Represents an average of nine years law enforcement experience per man in the department and I seriously doubt that any other law enforcement agency in the state can equal it."

Vega, 42, a native of Nogal as are his parents and grandparents, is a life long resident of Lincoln County, with the exception of his time in the military, and has nearly fifteen years experience in law enforcement. Reportedly, many of his assignments during these years has been in conjunction with and in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

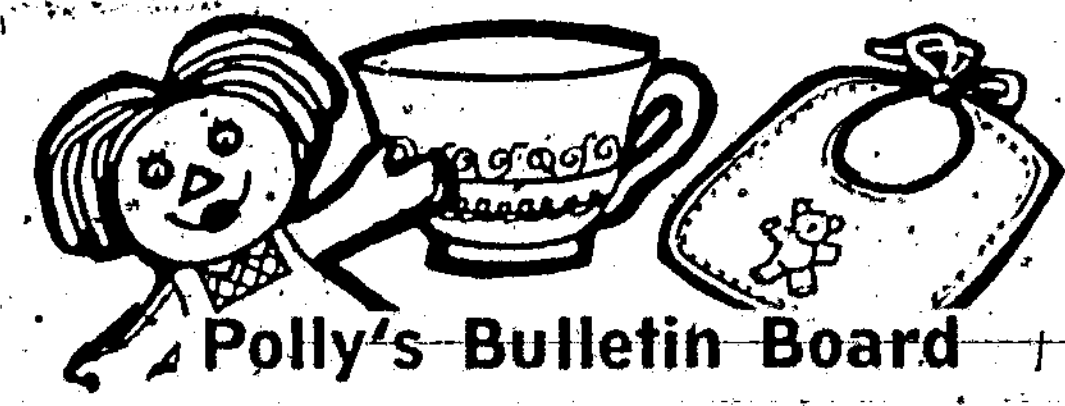
Recipient of nearly 12 NM state recognized diplomas earned following attending special law enforcement seminars and technical schools, Vega has attended an average of two specialized enforcement seminars and or criminal technological schools per year during his law enforcement career.

He told the Lincoln County News, "As I have stated in the past, from the very beginning when I decided upon a career in law enforcement I made a pledge to myself to attend every possible law enforcement training school and seminar so that I would be both aware and qualified to put into effect every possible modern and current method of law enforcement and keep abreast of changing criminal laws."

Vega continued, "I want to do my very best to enforce the laws of our land, adequately protect our people and their property and solve crime and this can be done only through proper training and a sincere desire to insist upon good and impartial law enforcement." "Sincerely", he said, "It is a matter of having the right attitude towards all people and adequate training for today's needs."

During his current term as sheriff Vega has been successful in establishing and putting into operation the Lincoln County Sheriff department's sub-station. Located in Ruidoso, the sub-station is the first of its kind in the history of Lincoln County and provides facilities for three Ruidoso stationed sheriff deputies and maintains complete radio communications with the sheriff's office in Carrizozo and with all county officers. In addition the radio has indirect communications with the NM state law enforcement network.

Within recent months Vega has also established the Civil Division of the sheriff's

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department, another first for Lincoln County. The new effort of the sheriff's department is designed to release sheriff deputies from time consuming processing of civil matters and permits the deputies to concentrate full time on criminal and other related county needs.

In reference to federal matching grants, the sheriff reported that within the last two years his department has received sufficient monies to purchase a new patrol unit for the Capitan area, modern equipment for fingerprinting and photographing crime scenes and also much needed emergency search and rescue equipment.

Referring to the emergency equipment, Vega said, "We have been able to secure two walkie-talkie radios, both on state police channels, that are really a tremendous asset for search and rescue operations in our rugged mountainous areas of the county." The sheriff added, "The two-way radios are also of vital use in surveillance of possible crime scenes as has been proven in recent months in the Ruidoso area."

Recent specialized schools attended by Vega included a Police Management School and an Advanced Latent Fingerprint School, both under the guidance and sponsorship of the FBI.

Vega also attended a Prison Jail Administration Seminar conducted by the U.S. Bureau of Prisons of the U.S. Department of Justice. He is reportedly the only jail administrator in a wide area of the state to be officially certified. In addition all Lincoln County jail personnel have been required by Sheriff Vega to pass current U.S. Department of Justice approved prison jail operational sources and each have received certification.

The Lincoln County Jail in Carrizozo, of which Vega is chief administrator, was constructed in 1963 and according to a report this month from the Region VI Criminal Justice Planning Commission, "is currently the most modern in the Region VI area." Region VI includes the counties of Lincoln, Lea, Otero and Chavez counties.

There are approximately 1,744 bookings per year in the county jail, which is reportedly one of three detention facilities in New Mexico that qualify for federal prisoners. The county jail also serves as a facility for NM State Police prisoners and for county prisoners from area municipalities.

In addition the sheriff's office in Carrizozo maintains a 24 hour radio communications center that serves the Sheriff's department, the NM State Police and the Village of Carrizozo and provides 24 hour communication with the NM State Law Enforcement Network.

Working closely with the New Mexico State Police Narcotics Division, The Lincoln County Sheriff's department, last year, convasecated the largest amount of marijuana ever recovered in the history of Lincoln County. In past year the sheriff's department has reportedly participated

in five major drug arrest and seizures. Vega has attended and earned diplomas from the New Mexico Sheriff and Police Association sponsored special training schools including Command and Supervision, Burglary and Armed Robbery Police Training, Law Enforcement Homicide Seminar and a special Narcotics Seminar.

A long time member of the U.S. National Sheriff's Association, the New Mexico Sheriff's Association, Vega is also a member of the American Legion having served in the Army including a tour of duty in Europe.

Vega and his wife, Delfina, own their home in Carrizozo and have two sons, Lee, Jr., 14 years of age, and Gary, 13, both attend Carrizozo schools.

## Good time to stop the cracks

News'n Notes-Mary Ellen Payne  
A few flusty days in Lincoln County and you will know if the caulking in your home is doing its job, or not.

I would like to remind homeowners that moisture and cold pass through caulking that has shrunk, cracked or fallen out. Heat loss and expensive repairs can result.

Window and door sills are particular problem areas. Other likely spots for caulking problems are joints between masonry and wooden siding.

Of the 5 steps (types) of caulking available oil-based products are least expensive. However, these tend to dry out and become brittle sooner than most others. Oil-based caulking compounds require priming if used on unpainted wood, and must be covered with oil-based rather than latex paints.

Latex caulking is less likely to shrink, and can be applied over dried-out oil base caulk. The older material, of course, must not be loose. The latex products need not be primed, but should be painted for longer life.

The rubber compounds—silicone and butyl—are best where maximum flexibility is desired. Butyl is a good choice for seams in gutters, or around metal windows. It will retain its

flexibility through extremes of heat and cold. Waiting a week to ten days before painting over butyl caulking.

Silicone rubber is the most expensive caulking. It can be used for cementing and bonding as well as for sealing, and stays flexible almost indefinitely. Black, white, gray, and clear silicone rubber compounds are available.

The clear silicone caulking is best for forming a tight seal around picture windows. However, silicone will not take a coat of paint.

Another expensive sealing substance is polyvinyl acetate. Effective both indoors and out, it is especially suitable for bathtub, shower, and sink installation.

This synthetic compound is highly adhesive, mildew resistant, and requires no priming. After selecting the product best suited for the job, read the instructions carefully. All caulking require a clean, dry surface in order to perform properly. And, be sure the temperature is above 50 percent when you're doing any outdoor sealing work.

## It's pruning time

For most pruning jobs, you'll need a sturdy pair of lopping shears and a pruning saw. To begin the pruning operation, look the trees over carefully. Remove all dead or dying wood. Cut away any water-sprouts (suckers) growing from the trunk and large limbs.

New look for limbs that grow inward, crisscrossing through the tree. Remove a branch that lies directly over or on another. After eliminating suckers and interfering branches, thin the remaining terminal growth.

January, February, and early March are usually best month for pruning fruit plants. Don't prune during extremely cold weather as trees may be injured.

Treat all wounds over one inch in diameter with a suitable tree wound dressing.

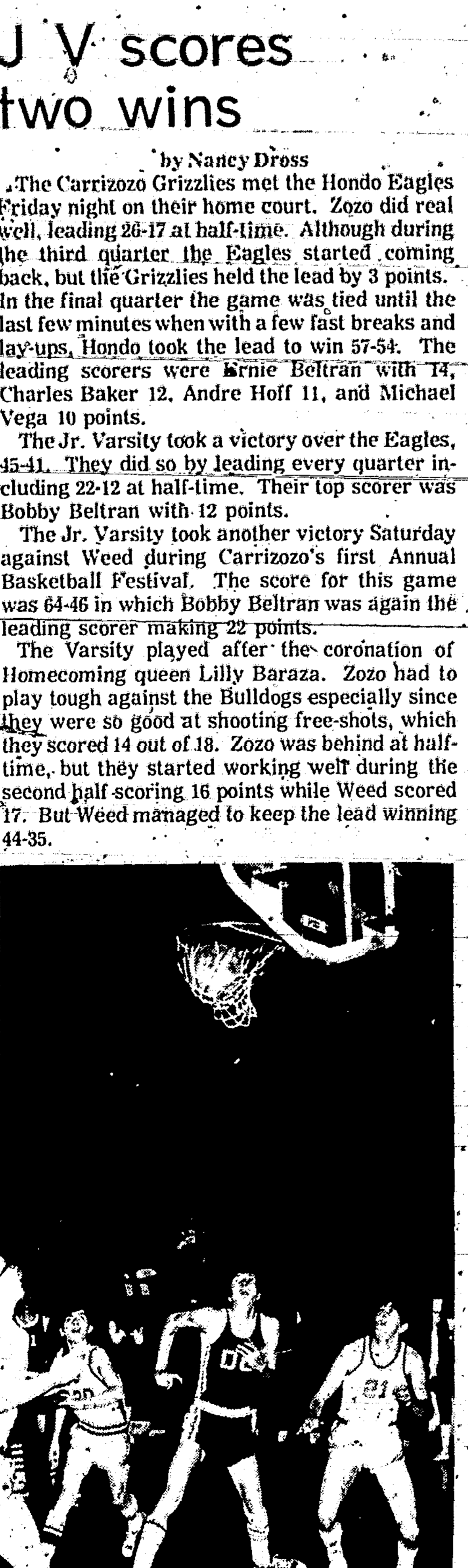
