

Corona seniors first to receive diplomas

The Yucca Gift Gallery is brand new, operated by Joanne Washburn in front part of former Roberts Mercantile building. Joanne opened for

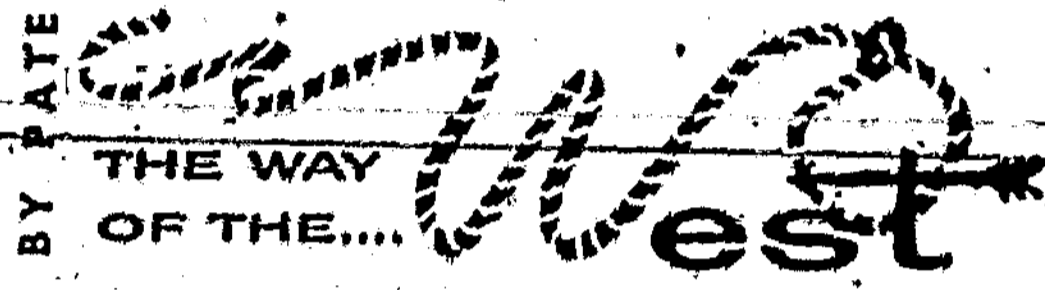

Council would like to know what's in the money bag

Carrizozo town council met Tuesday night and one of the problems they got into came when a couple of men representing the Burroughs company discussed bookkeeping methods and systems with the council. Council members commented that they had no way of knowing

what amount of money might be in the various funds, and this situation made it hard to plan any spending for the town.

Burroughs would like to sell the Town a \$13,000 machine to go with some systems which the town dads decided they don't need, but they thought they should use one or more of Burroughs' systems of accounts which might cost anywhere from \$600 up to \$3,000 plus. Presumably such systems would give an accurate day-to-day accounting of money spent and funds available.

Mike Swickard, swimming pool manager last year and employed again for coming summer, talked to council about new laws governing pools. Carrizozo pool has three problems 1. Chlorene gas is in same room with heater, considered real dangerous. Some changes will be made here. 2. Three meter diving boards require 12 feet of water, Zojo pool has only 10. Not much to do here except remove the diving board. Such a condition invalidates insurance, said Mike. 3. Slope of concrete in shower area is too steep, running three to five inches per foot when it should be only 3/4 to 1 inch per foot. No solution found immediately but probably this condition will be remedied.

Swickard said most of their accidents last summer were in the showers, three to ten per day. Pumps need mechanical repair, can be done. Pool needs good cleaning, will call county sanitarian about pool conditions.

Question was asked, could Mike supervise small children in showers. Would be full-time job, Mike could not do that and supervise the pool. He said the pool should be open for public swimming by June 1.

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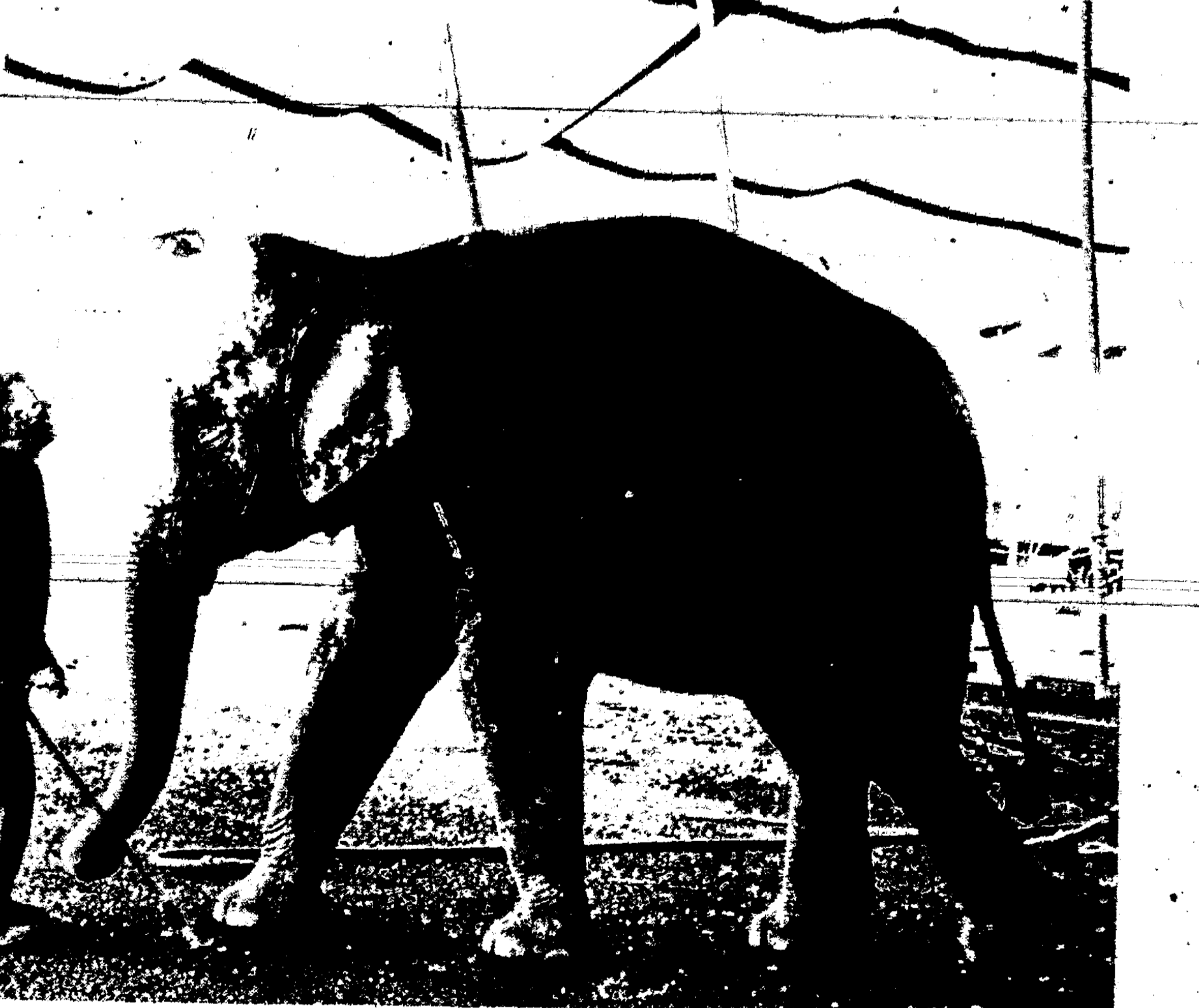
Zoning-planning hearing Friday

A public hearing before a joint meeting of the town trustees and the City Zoning and Planning Commission will be Friday at 7:30 p.m. at the Recreation Center.

The Commission has approved and recommended to the Trustees a comprehensive plan for the future of Carrizozo and has recommended the adoption of a town zoning ordinance which includes restrictions on animals in certain areas of the town; restrictions on mobile homes in certain sections of the town; restrictions on business areas and industrial areas.

The comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance is intended as a twenty year growth projection for the town and all interested citizens should be present at the hearing to voice their opinions.

Sprinkler systems in four areas expected to certify medicare

A year ago the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo installed a fire detection system as the needed correction, at that time, to qualify for medicare. The hospital closed for lack of doctor, meantime presumable the regulations were changed so that when the hospital reopened it did not qualify.

The hospital reopened December 17, 1973 without medicare. Near six months later hospital officials find they need sprinkler system in four areas to conform with life safety code and hopefully to qualify again for medicare.

A recent letter from medicare people encouraged the local hospital to continue effort to be certified. They want a plan of correction of faults, meaning a sprinkling system in hazardous areas, kitchen, food storage, locker, and furnace room.

Bids are being called this week by legal notice for sprinklers, opening date is May 31. After that day the hospital will have figures on cost and can send plan of correction to medicare.

Commissioner Bud Payne is to set up a meeting May 20 of representative of Presbyterian Hospital organization, Carrizozo Hospital officials and county commissioners to see if something could be worked out so the Presbyterians would take over operation of the hospital.

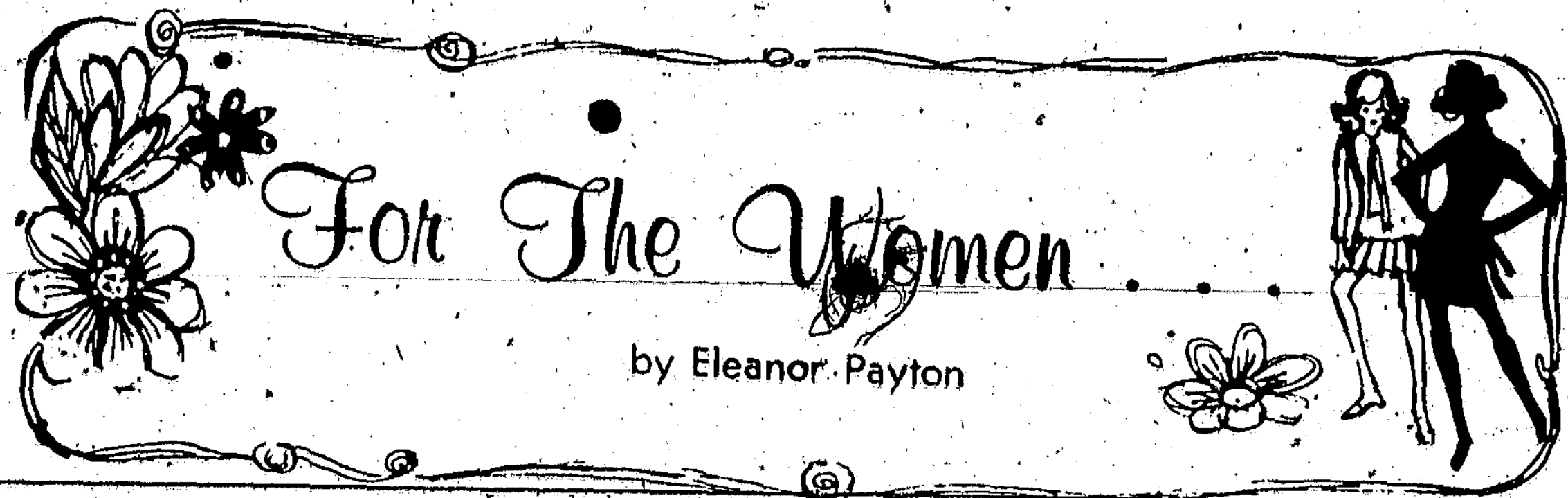

Council suggested Hill write another letter about the \$10,000 model.

Fire department secretary-janitor will get salary increase from 15 per month to \$35 or \$40.

A real question exists about exact amount of money the fire department might have on deposit or in its name. Difference from several sources runs as much as 7,000. Willos said they would have to go almost back to the beginning to sort things out.

School bid opening in July

Revised plans for the new school gym were approved at the meeting last night, of the Carrizozo Municipal School Board. Architect Noel Stout stated that bids should open by early mid-July. Principal Larry Wilkinson asked if more light would be needed with synthetic flooring. Stout said he felt that if a light color is used it should not be needed, citing the gym floor at Hondo.

Ray Wells had some question as to whether two showers were needed for the coaches. After some discussion it was agreed that more revision would take time, and time was of more importance than the \$600 involved. The new plans include \$10,000 worth of bleachers to seat 560 people.

Supt. Jim Steinepreis said he was anxious that work start first on the remodeling plans. Bids on the new ceiling should open by June 1. According to Steinepreis, \$14,095 is available for building

construction out of an estimated current cash balance of \$36,898. Approximately \$9,000 of this can be used to take care of locker, basketball goals, score boards and clocks.

Forms, filled out by Supt. Steinepreis were given to each member of the board to study prior to the meeting, Monday, May 20, with Harry Wulgater, Chief of the State of New Mexico Public School Administration. They cover a wide range of legislative subjects. This meeting will be held in the County Commissioner's office at the courthouse at 1:30 p.m. It was stressed, by Supt. Steinepreis, that this budget meeting is open to the public, and anyone interested should plan to attend.

Steinepreis then brought up the question of closing the road running between the two buildings, making it a dead end. Also should that section of the street north of the school be closed for the safety of the students crossing to the athletic field? He said that another route is in the planning stage, extending off Route 380 to the airport. The motion was made by Wes Lindsay and seconded by Bob Stearns that letter to this effect be directed to the city.

A letter by Mary Ellen Payne to the Board was then read concerning the possible advantage of more participation in the State Science Fair. Steinepreis questioned the validity of extra assignments. He said: "I do not think a teacher should say 'you and you' fix up something for the Fair." He felt that a project should be something that would include all of the students. It was agreed that a letter of acknowledgement be sent.

Letters of resignation were read from Daniel Ortiz, custodian and English teacher, Jessie G. Moore. Mr. and Mrs. Moore are moving to Alabama. It was moved by Bob Stearns and seconded by Wes Lindsay that these be accepted. The motion was carried. Steinepreis stated that all teachers had been rehired with two exceptions: Mrs. Simpson declined reemployment due to retirement, and Jake Trujillo to continue his education. Gilbert Archuleta was then appointed as custodian.

Other appointments included Levon Webb as head football coach, and William J. MacVeigh as head basketball coach, with the position of Asst. Coach left temporarily open. Larry Wilkinson said: "My last and final concern is that we have three coaches who are compatible." Mrs. MacVeigh will continue to coach the girls' sports program.

The Board approved a request by Mrs. Fred English for an expansion of the Health Education Program and use of more Health Education films.

Ray Wells brought up the question as to whether enough guidance is given to students concerning vocational opportunities on graduation-are Trade Schools being pushed?-are enough students included in the shop classes? It appeared to be the feeling, among most members of the Board that the school program is doing a good job.

Present at the meeting were: Ray Wells, acting chairman in the absence of Siegfried Lessau; Bob Stearns, Wes Lindsay; Nat Palomarez, Supt. James Steinepreis, and Principal Larry Wilkinson.

Not more than 20 nor less than 10 days before a primary of general election, the county clerk shall send an alphabetical index, by precinct, of all voters, their party affiliation and their addresses to the Secretary of State and to county chairman of each of the major political parties.

May, absent voter register sheets to be mailed to Secretary of State and party chairmen.

May 21, ballots in hands of county clerks.

May 22, last day for county clerks to notify precinct boards by mail of date for election schools.

Soil Stewardship week May 19-26

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water, and other natural resources, will be May 19-26 this year. A. W. Gnalkowski, Chairman of the Carrizozo Natural Resource Conservation District, announced today.

This year's theme, "A Different Place," emphasized how the many changes now occurring in the nation affect our continuing responsibility to be good stewards of the land.

The District is providing local churches with programs, bulletin inserts, and copies of this year's observance booklet. The material was prepared by the National Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of the National Association of Conservation Districts. The advisory committee is composed of churchmen of different faiths.

Among the churches in the District that are scheduling special Soil Stewardship services are the Church of Christ, the Ancho and Nogal Presbyterian churches, the Baptist, Methodist, and Assembly of God churches.

Mr. Gnalkowski cited the energy shortage, environmental pollution, and the growing concern over land use as examples of changes developments affecting the use of America's natural resources.

Nineteen-seventy four will be the 19th consecutive year that the Carrizozo Natural Resource Conservation District, along with almost 3,000 similar districts throughout the nation, has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week. The custom of setting aside special "Rogation Days" for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in France, when French peasants prayed for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

The District hopes that during Soil Stewardship Week millions of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibilities for the protection and use of the Lord's earth.
