No opposition to planning - zoning

The public hearing called by Carrizozo town council last Friday to discuss future planning and zoning in Carrizozo, drew a fairly good crowd of people who, for the most part, were satisfied with the zoning of the town after their questions had been answered.

One of the problems the planning commission has been working with is truck traffic coming into town from the south too fast. As a possible means of slowing up such traffic signals and signs would be moved back the US 54 a piece, and one block of 13th Street, fronting White Auto on the south, would be vacated and the property returned to the owners on each side. This means that White Auto would have a sizable parking lot available, and approach to the store from "E" Avenue (US54) now exists.

This proposal brought strenuous objections from Councilman Roy Harman until he decided that the auto store might be helped instead of hurt by such a move.

Ed Jones was present to check on zoning in his particular area, "E" Avenue as it comes into US 380, and he was satisfied with situation. Same is true for Ed Lawson who had questions about zoning.

Kenneth Larsen, planning consultant, did most of the talking and emphasized that what the commission was proposing were simply plans, and were subject to change. The three documents up for discussion were Parts I and II

of comprehensive plan and the zoning ordinance. The Carrizozo Planning Commission has recommended adoption of these documents by the Town.

A quorum of councilmen was not present or the documents would have likely been adopted last Friday, now they wait on the next meeting of the Council.

The suggestion has been made that the Town annex the new golf course area, for one good reason; Town police would have jurisdiction there after annexation. Sewerage plant is not in town limits, probably the town should also annex the airport and sewer disposal areas.

One of the reasons cited by Larsen for adoption of documents in writing is that the town council has continuous turnover of office holders and future planning of the town is almost impossible without approved policies in writing that can be followed by succeeding councils.

Page 45 of the land Use Plan, Paragraph 3, reads: Existing re-idences including mobile homes should be allowed to continue for the life of the structures regardless of locations. The construction of future residences should be controlled by proper zoning. New Mobile homes should only be allowed in residential areas where they are not objectionable to present neighbors.

Page 47: Either bring existing deteriorating structures up to the current building and fire codes of the Town of Carrizozo or else tear down

the buildings and level the site to a safe surface. Clean up vacant lots, cut down dead trees, remove fire hazards, remove broken, rough and unsafe sidewalks and replace them with new paving.

Larsen talked several times about the commercial area of town being blocks around the courthouse. Other commercial area of town being blocks around the courthouse. Other commercial areas include location of new town hall, and sections fronting US 380.

The Planning commission has recommended that US 54 be kept in its present location and widened and a median added as necessary during the future, that something be done with the bizarre traffic islands located on this route at its intersection with "E" Avenue.

Proposed improvements include: 1) US 54 and 380 road surface improved, 2) Direct access to proposed industrial Park from US 380, 3) Close Aspen Street, 4) Realign "E" Avenue as it approaches the railroad as traffic safety factor, 5) Improve 14th Street "E" Avenue Loop, 6) Construction of sidewalks in improved areas, 7) Provide off-street parking in shopping area, 8) Future extension of two existing runways at airport, 9) All unpaved streets in essentially developed areas should be paved by establishing a paving district.

Mayor Bill Payne presided, councilmen present were Duff May and Roy Harman.

Baritone vocalist on concert schedule

The Carrizozo Community Association for the Performing Arts will present Kenneth Ballenger, baritone vocalist with Inez Ward Ballenger as piano accompanist in a recital May 25, 1974 at 8:00 p.m. in the Carrizozo Recreation Center. Selections by Brahms, Chopin, Mozart, and Gershwin will be featured. The Ballengers are native New Mexicans and are well known throughout the State.

Kenneth Ballenger, son of the late Dr. and Mrs. H. L. Ballenger, of Las Vegas, New Mexico, was educated at Highlands University, Hardin Simmons, and Eastman College of Music in New York. He is Professor of Voice and Director of the internationally famous Uarkettes at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. He developed an outstanding Opera Workshop program at the University after his arrival in 1953 through 1964. For the past ten years he has directed his Uarkettes through 26 appearances each year, two tours of Europe, seven concerts Mexico City, and a concert in New York City's Town Hall. In addition to this heavy schedule, he has continued actively singing in concert, recital, oratorio performances throughout the 26 years as a college professor. In this past year he expanded his talented efforts into the field of writing and composition, collaborating with the late Bertita Harding and the composer Julia Smith in writing the Opera "Daisy", premiered last November by the Miami Family Opera

Guild. His Uarkettes have been booked for seven concerts in Europe this summer, including Cologne, Bremen, Berlin, and Rotenburg in

Germany; Andermatt in Switzerland; and Salzburg and Vienna in Austria. They have also been notified by Community Concerts, Inc. of New York to appear on the Vernon, Texas Series in the Spring of 1975. They will also take part in the 1400 year Anniversary of the discovery of Iceland appearing in their Festival in Reykjavik in August. The Carrizozo Community Association for the Performing Arts is including the Uarkettes in their 1974-1975 program calendar.

Inez Ward Ballenger, daughter of Florence Ward of Alamogordo, was born in White Oaks, New Mexico. After graduating from Roswell High School, she continued her education at Eastern New Mexico University, Hardin Simmons, and Eastman College of Music in New York. Mrs. Ballenger has been a teacher and performer in Piano for the past twenty six years with students from preparatory age through college. Her studio limits students to 40 each year, with help from her advanced students who receive valuable practice teaching training while at the same time developing their own class of students.

The Carrizozo Community Association for the Performing Arts extends a cordial invitation to friends and former classmates of the Ballengers, and the City of Carrizozo to attend their next outstanding program - Ken and Inez Ballenger in concert.

Death on Highway 54

Two young ladies from Albuquerque were driving on US 54 about 33 miles north of Carrizozo when the driver, Lorna R. Parnell, lost control of the 1965 VW going down hill and around curve. The vehicle turned over on the roadway, then rolled twice after leaving the road. Both driver and occupant were thrown from the vehicle. The driver was killed, probably from massive head injuries. Katherine M. Box, occupant, was incapacitated and taken to Carrizozo hospital, then to Bernalillo Medical Center.

The accident happened May 21 around 6:30 a.m. Officer Roland Vigil made the investigation. Bud Payne and Bill Miller in "old" ambulance brought in Miss Box, and after her condition was stabilized at Carrizozo hospital, took her on to Albuquerque. Larry Geier and Wesley Lindsay, driving the "new" ambulance, brought in the body of Miss Parnell.

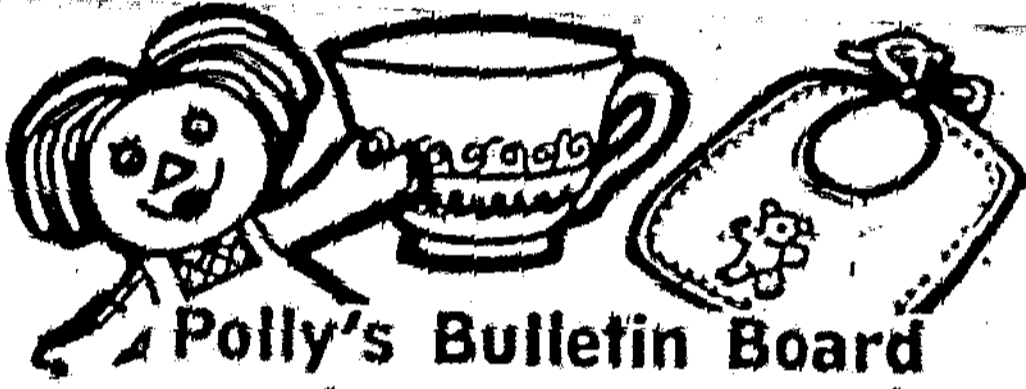
Poppy Day May 25 in Carrizozo

The poppy as a memorial flower for American
war dead is a tradition which began in the years
following the First World War. Veterans
returning to their homes in this country
remembered the wild poppies which lined the
devastated battlefields of France and Flanders
Field, and the soldiers of all nations came to
look upon this flower as a living symbol of their
dead comrades' sacrifice.

It was Col. John McCrae, a Canadian officer,
killed in WW I who immortalized the flower in his
famous poem "In Flanders Fields the poppies
blow . . ."

Today — over 50 years later, that little sym-
bolic flower continues to pay tribute to those who
made the supreme sacrifice in World Wars I and
II, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict.

However, it is more than a symbol . . . it is a
source of hope and aid for many in our nation. It

veterans as a part of their therapy and to aid
their rehabilitation, they receive financial

and don'ts of breastfeeding he can protect his
from discouraging influence of well-intentioned
but misinformed advisors.

Breastfeeding is a natural and unique system of
supply and demand which best serves mother
and baby. Breastfeeding has not become com-
plicated, only our attitudes toward it have

and a sister, Mrs. Rowena Kemp of Carlsbad.

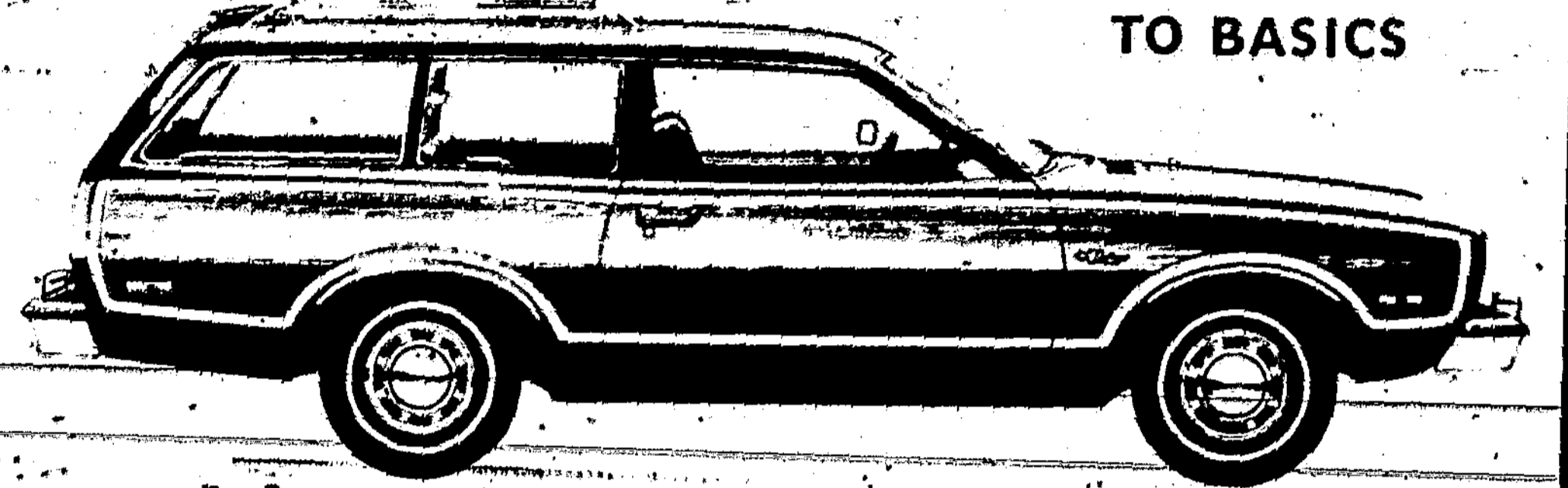

Important: Any name written in, other than the name of a declared write-in candidate will be held invalid and shall not be counted.

Important: Do not make any changes as you desire while the red lever is to the right. The machine is arranged so you cannot turn down more than the proper number of voting pointers for each office, so you cannot spoil your ballot by voting for too many candidates. BUT YOU MUST NOT LOITER. The Voting Machine Act of New Mexico allows each elector a maximum of three and one-half (3½) minutes in which to vote. Vote promptly and leave the machine so the elector following you may have his turn.

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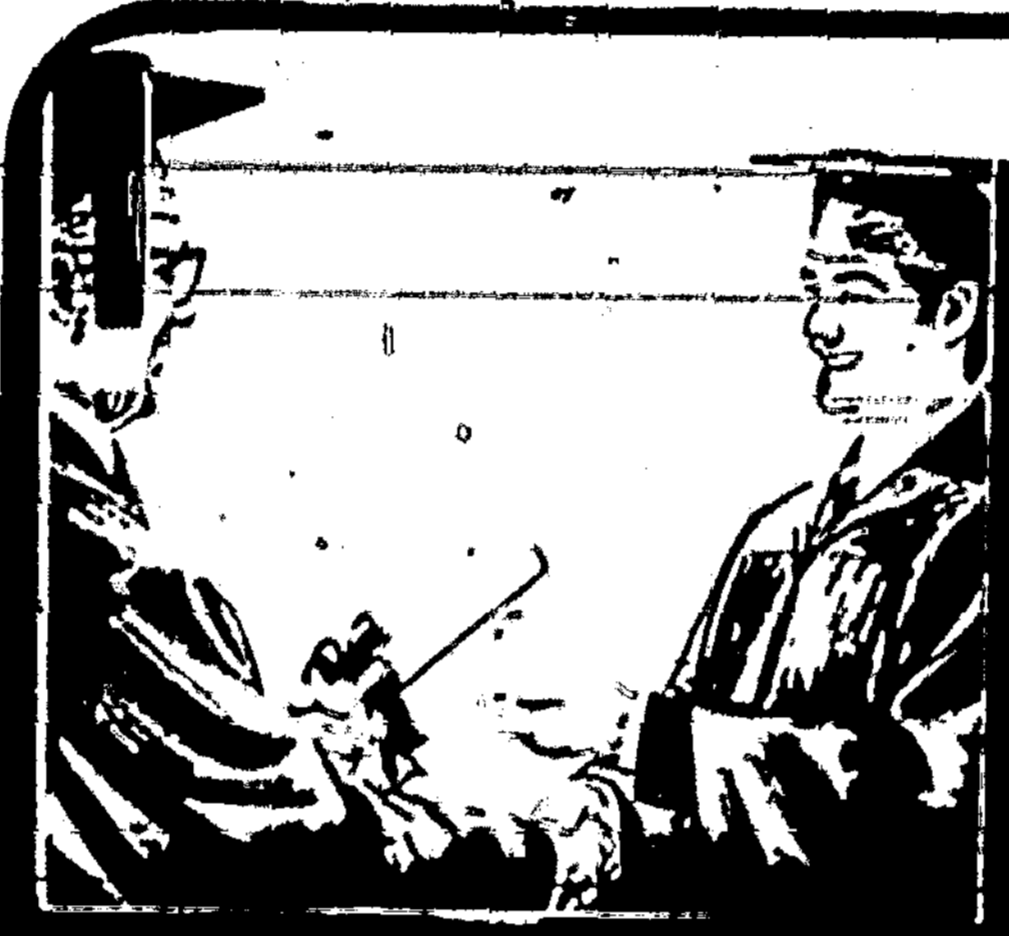
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Canyon Cowbellees take stand on BLM lawsuit

Because the plaintiffs in this law suit are many in number, it is essential that the farmer and rancher make the facts of their situations known. The Cowbellees stress that if livestock producers do not make a concerted and effective stand, the outcome of this law suit could have a disastrous effect on the ranchers of this country.

Tibo cites State needs

"When the going gets tough, the tough get going," quoted State Senator Tibo Chavez, democratic candidate for governor, when he and his wife, formerly Betty Caperto of Portales met briefly, last Thursday morning at the Four Winds with a friendly group of supporters.

Times are rough, he stated, for many small communities in New Mexico. Young people, unable to find jobs, are leaving the state. "What we need," he said, is more individual development. He pointed out that the average annual

income is \$3,400 (lower than the national average) and New Mexico rates as the 47th state below the highest per capita average. Also as natural resources are being shipped out of the state, he suggested that to build refineries might be one way to get around this situation. This, he said has already been successful in Lea County. The problems of the small community are new to Sen. Chavez. His own town of Belen, grew up with and shared the growth and decline of the railroad.

The senator went on to speak of his concern for our Senior Citizens. "I do not want to see them in institutions but in their own homes." Nurses and hot meals should be provided when needed and hospital care made available.

Touching briefly on minorities he said: "I do not believe in minorities; every individual is a minority. I will be fair to all. I want a good cross section of society behind me."

As the first Eagle Scout in Belen, the senator said: "The most serious moment in my life was when I took the scout oath. Honesty integrity, truth and morality—these, he stated, are the most important standards to live by—"morality, more than ever is involved."

Mrs. Chavez, when asked how it felt to be the wife of a campaigner, spoke of the many small towns they had recently visited, and the wonderful people they had met. "The nicest part of it all," she said, "are the socials," and to find that "friends of long-standing have long memories. She also spoke of their four sons, where they were, and what they were doing.

Before the group settled down to more serious issues, a lively discussion went on over what the early Spanish settlers used for cures among our native plants, how they were used, and where they may still be found. This was triggered by the senator's latest book: "New Mexican Folklore of the Rio Abajo."

Sen. and Mrs. Chavez continued on to Lincoln, Tinnie and Glencoe. They wound up the day with dinner at the Cree Manor Inn in Ruidoso.

LAS CRUCES-RIO RANCHO — The Democratic governor primary race appeared to boil down to a state senators' hassle with Odis Echols, Clovis, gaining on Tibo Chavez, Belen, and Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces.

Sen. Echols, 43, a businessman, drew 500 to a Hobbs rally and more than 400 to an Albuquerque reception. His wife, Pat, reportedly had knocked on 16,000 Albuquerque Heights doors to May 11, campaigning for Odis. The Echols drive was concentrated on not-heavy Albuquerque.

Echols said: "It is time to put a stop to the age-old practice of distributing election day money. It is demeaning to voters to even imply that their vote is for sale in a year of such political turmoil."

Sen. Chavez, 59, a lawyer, and Sen. Apodaca, 39, a businessman, were still the apparent leaders. A poll for Jerry showed him running far ahead of Tibo but various polls should widely differing results. Some politicos regarded Sen. Echols as a "sleeper" in the primary June 4.

In Dona Ana County, Apodaca's home, Jerry predicted he would win 60 per cent of the vote in the crowded, 6-man field. In Dona Ana in the Republican governor primary Lincoln County rancher Joe Skeen, Picocho, held a strong lead over Albuquerque lawyer Jack Eastham and three other opponents.

Sen. Bob Ferguson, Artesia, was the apparent Dona Ana County leader in the Democratic lieutenant governor race, followed by ex-Silver City Mayor Kenneth Wallin.

In Sandoval County Democratic governor race leaders were Sens. Chavez and Apodaca. Ex-Atty. Gen. Boston Witt, 42, Santa Fe, and Sen. Echols appeared to follow Jerry and Tibo in fast growing Sandoval.

In Sandoval in the GOP governor race Eastham of neighboring Bernalillo County seemed to hold a lead over Skeen for the small but growing primary vote.

Skeen proposed a State Bureau of Investigation, mostly to center efforts to arrest and convict large-scale narcotics sellers. Skeen also proposed to upgrade the attorney general's office to assure quality handling of convictions appeals. He also recommended steps to keep well-trained State Police Academy graduates in New Mexico.

Sen. Apodaca called for a small communities division in the State Development Department to aid communities to improve their economies.

Albuquerque Democrat Drew Cloud in the governor primary pushed for a welfare rolls review.

Campaigning in Las Cruces, Witt said he can win the Democratic governor nomination with 40,000 votes—40 in each of New Mexico's 1,039 voting divisions. Boston said he can win by placing second or third in the 13 most populous counties.

Witt predicted he will place second in Lea and Curry Counties and a strong third in Valencia and Otero Counties. Witt said he will finish second or third in Chavez County and Dona Ana, second largest.

Witt said: "The way a gringo wins this race is by running even with the other gringo candidates south of Interstate 40 and ahead of them in Northern counties." Witt predicted Sens. Chavez and Apodaca will split Northern New Mexico votes.

Eastham gained on Skeen in the GOP governor primary race in Bernalillo County. But Skeen seemed to hold his lead over Eastham in Curry, Sierra, Lincoln, Harding, Catron, San Juan, Chaves and Dona Ana Counties.

The Skeen camp said 30,000 votes would win the GOP governor nomination in a total primary Republican turnout of 55,000 to 60,000.

The race seemed close for the GOP lieutenant governor nomination between two Albuquerqueans — Rep. Virgil Rhodes, 49, a contractor, and Juan Raigoza, 55, a teacher and retired Army Colonel.

We will follow the primary campaign this week in Hidalgo, Lea and other counties.

Skeen drew 150 to a Santa Fe dinner, financed by Roswell businessman Robert O. Anderson, that netted \$3,000 for Joe's campaign. A \$15-a-couple buffet is set Friday (May 24) in Albuquerque for Skeen.

Albuquerque lawyer Bob Mayfield's camp in the Democratic governor race reported a statewide poll of 604 voters by an Eastern firm showed Apodaca, 17 per cent; Mayfield, 16.5, and Chavez, 14.5. The same poll reportedly placed Odis Echols, 8 per cent; Drew Cloud, 5, and Boston Witt, 3.5. A big 35.5 percent was undecided. Mayfield staffers said the poll was finished April 30.

Campaign records showed contributions totaled \$50,733 for Sen. Chavez, \$54,207 for Cloud and \$41,193 for Witt. Sen. Apodaca, first candidate to release a contributors' report, has listed more than 80,000.

The first annual New Mexico Mayor's Cup boat races will be held Sunday (May 26) at Alamogordo Lake State Park near Fort Sumner and Santa Rosa.

At Socorro regents of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology accepted the resignation of Dr. Stirling Colgate as president, Dr. Colgate said it is time for a new NMIMT president. He will leave the post Jan. 1 or sooner if a new president is appointed. NMIMT enrollment gained from 291 to 866 up almost 300 per cent, in his 10 years as president.
