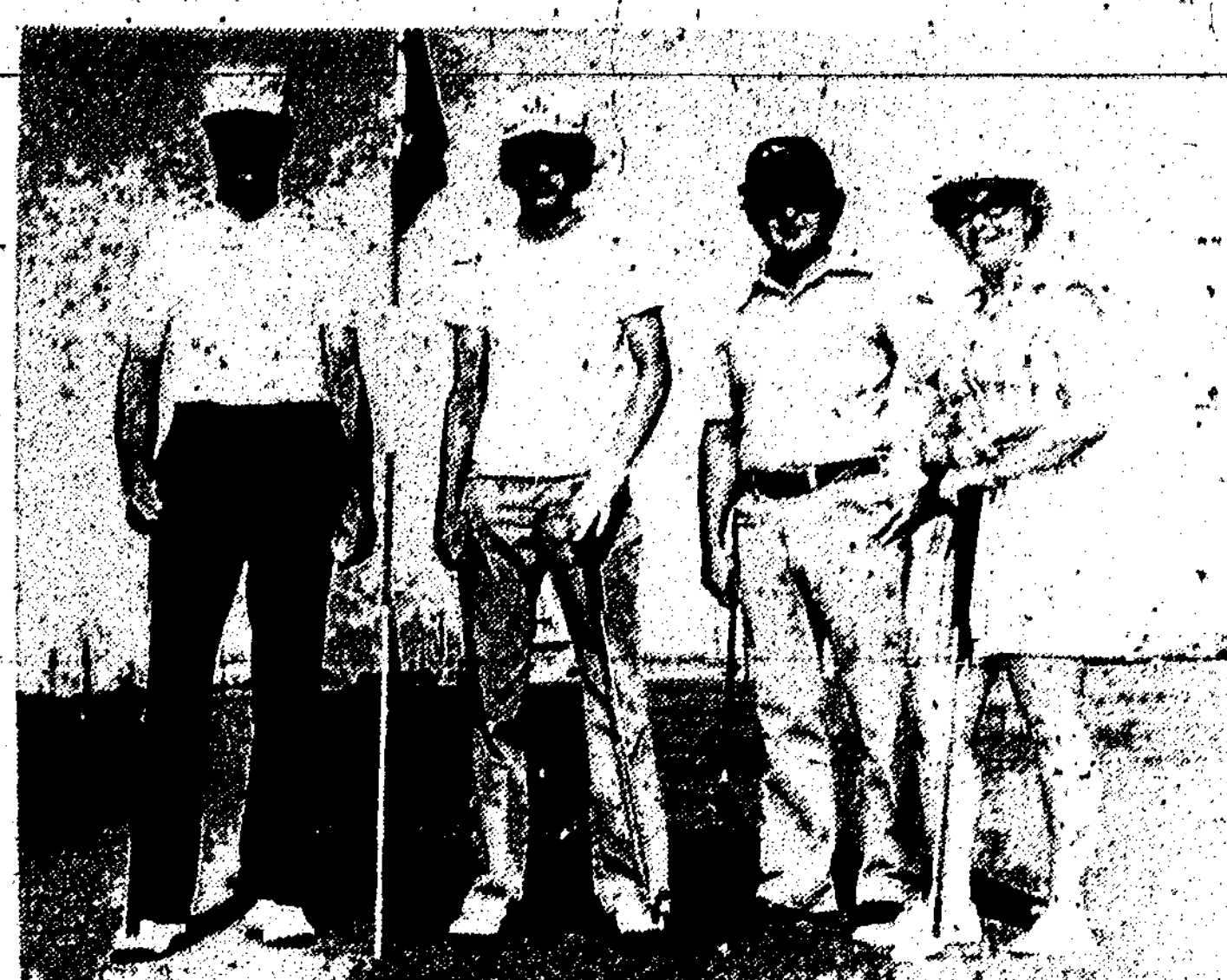

Dr. Ernest A. Steinhoff says -- Area not using available water

The News editor listened to Dr. Ernest A. Steinhoff, president of New Mexico research Institute, talk about water resources in the Tularosa Basin and learned that 20,000 acre feet of water could be taken out of the basin annually without harming the supply -- and that only a fraction of this amount is being used each year. The Tularosa Basin starts up north of Carrizozo maybe as far as Corona and runs south between two mountain ranges to the lower end of the state. Hondo Valley water is not included however, water used by Ruidoso will be included in the study to be made.

Out of the water study just now getting under way and expect to take two and a half years; should come a detailed report containing recommendations where to develop water, how

to go about the development, what the economic payoff could be, and how to manage use of the water.

The information and knowledge will be gained by use of test wells, seismic work, gravimetric surveys, data on present pumped wells, water quality at location of wells, and including a historic background.

Dr. Steinhoff is a great believer in communities working together for their common good. In the Tularosa Basin the towns of Corona, Carrizozo, Tularosa and Alamogordo have common problems in varying degrees. Air Force is also interested. He said the project had been receiving good support from the towns, and that Lincoln County is aiding the research project.

Based on knowledge available at present time Dr. Steinhoff said that the area has large water resource that are not being utilized.

Working for the Institute in the Tularosa Basin study will be Harbert Holcomb, deputy, civil engineer at Holloman for many years, former mayor of Alamogordo and a research associate of the Institute. He will be the principal investigator.

Roy Hakbert, now working with Sperry Company at Holloman, is spending about three hours a day on the Basin water study and will be doing more water work in time to come. He has masters degree from University of California at San Diego, in natural sciences, and teaching credentials in geology. In addition, the Institute will make use of student help and try to keep the best ones on the job.

The Basin study is being financed by towns, county and federal money from Four Corners Regional Commission.

Lujan berates deficit spending

WASHINGTON -- Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr. said the citizens of this country must send men and women to Washington with monetary discipline if we are to escape bankruptcy.

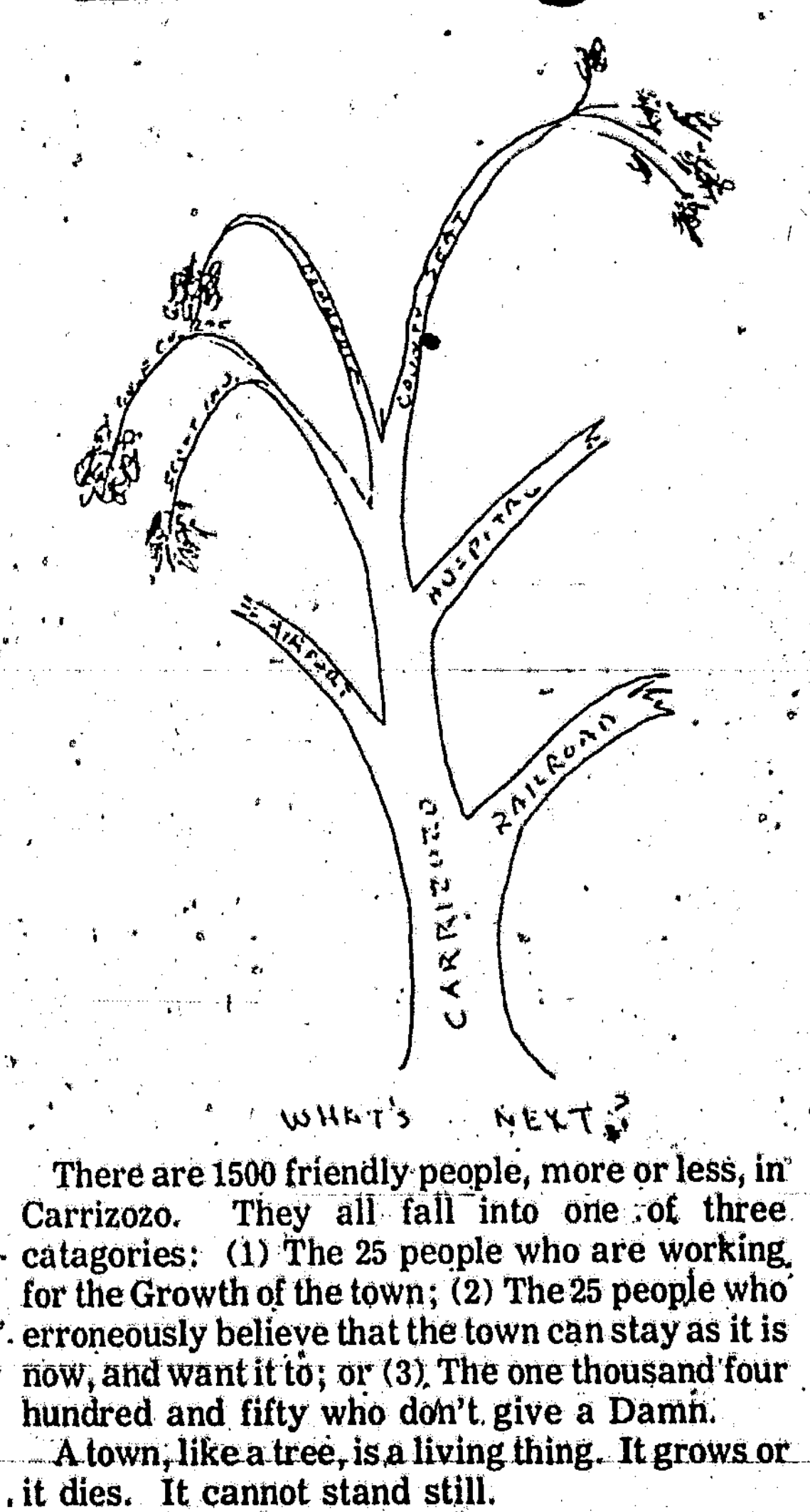
Lujan, a strong fiscal conservative in Congress, said a balanced budget and liquidation of the national debt must be a fact of life for financial survival.

"There is absolutely no way we can continue deficit spending through give-a-ways and waste and not go broke," Lujan said.

Lujan said very few in government are showing any discipline to hold down spending to the point that it would affect this inflation.

Lujan said our deficit spending policies are among the top causes of the inflation.

"When you consider that we are spending about \$1 million a minute just for the interest on this debt the seriousness of the problem comes into focus," he said.

TO THE PARENTS OF LINCOLN COUNTY:

If you have a child that is starting school this fall please check to see that his or her immunizations are up to date.

The State Regulations governing immunizations required for school attendance are as follows:

"All pupils in public, private or parochial elementary and secondary schools, as well as all those pupils in Early Childhood Education facilities under the New Mexico Department of Education and all children in licensed pre-school or Day Care Centers, must produce evidence not later than one month after initial school entrance that they have completed, initiated or have been legally exempted from the following immunizations:

DIPHTHERIA, PERTUSSIS, TETANUS, POLIOMYELITIS, MEASLES AND RUBELLA.

The following is the recommended schedule for active immunization and tuberculin testing of normal infants and children in New Mexico as developed by the American Academy of Pediatrics:

2 months	DTP	Oral Polio
4 months	DTP	Oral Polio
6 months	DTP	Oral Polio
1 year	Measles Rubella	Tuberculin Test
1 1/2 years	DTP	Oral Polio
4-6 years	DTP	Oral Polio
14-16 years	Td	and thereafter every 10 years

The Academy also recommends that everybody should get a routine booster every 10 years and an emergency shot only if a dirty

wound is incurred and 5 years have elapsed since the last inoculation.

The above immunizations can be obtained from your private physician or your local Public Health Office.
