Thar's gold in them law suits --

Goodman collected \$1 damages, now being sued for \$4,671,200

What may well be the largest damage suit in the history of Lincoln County was filed in the 12th Judicial District Court in Carrizozo, New Mexico on September 9, 1974. Plaintiff is John J. Keel, former vice-president and director of New Mexico Copper Corporation. The defendant is I. Reuben Goodman, a director of the New Mexico Copper Corporation.

Prior to this suit, I. Reuben Goodman as plaintiff had filed suit against C. E. Degner as defendant alleging that the defendant (Degner) had maliciously, falsely, unjustly, and unlawfully represented and pretended that he was the owner and had some valid claim on the lands hereinbefore described. Goodman asked for compensatory damages of \$100,000.00, punitive damages of \$250,000.00 and an order of this court enjoining and prohibiting the defendant from doing any and all acts complained of, and from asserting any claim of interest in the said lands.

The lands involved include: 12 acres along US 380, renowned O.K. Lode Mining claims in Bonito Mining District, Copper Glance Lode Mining claim in Nogal Mining District, Copper Matte Lode Mining Claim in Nogal, Summit Lode Mining Claim in Red Cloud Mining District, Surprise Group of unpatented claims in Nogal, Little Hecla Group in Nogal, Copper Lode Group in Nogal, Conqueror-Rio Tinto Group in Red Cloud, Goodman Group in Bonito, Origh Lode Mining Claim in Nogal, Custom Lode Mining Claim in Red Cloud, and others probably.

Following several legal maneuvers including claims and counter claims, reply to counter claim, the case was set for trial before Hon. George L. Zimmerman the 30th day of July, 1974.

Zimmerman's judgement and final decree reads, in part, that the plaintiff (Goodman) is entitled to damages from the defendant in the sum of \$1.00. That the plaintiff is entitled to the injunction as prayed for in the complaint. The court ordered: that the defendant, his agents, servants, employees and associates, should be,

and hereby is, enjoined and prohibited from (b) making any claim to any of the property, (d) filing or initiating any suit or litigation in any court, federal or state, against the plaintiff or his successors, that would affect the title, ownership of any interest in any of the property described. And other items of instruction to the defendant. So much for the case of Goodman vs. Degner, where Goodman got his dollar and plenty of edicts.

Now to the million dollar suit, Keel vs. Goodman.

Keel the plaintiff filed on behalf of 1000 stockholders of the mining corporation, asking \$1,000,000.00 in punitive damages to the former directors of the N.-M. Mining Corp., Keel and Degner; also \$3,500,000.00 damages due to losses to the stockholders, \$82,500.00 damages to the mining property and \$88,700.00 damages to the milling and processing plant.

The long list of complaints against I. Reuben Goodman, about six legal pages, charges that: Goodman was introduced, as a man who has excess funds to invest. During the public offering of the N.M. Copper Corp. securities, for no apparent reason, Goodman started to make threats for the return of his money invested, the threats continued to become so great it became necessary to discontinue the offering of the securities.

It's a known fact that the mill never operated, the plaintiffs blaming Goodman. Ownership of the several mining claims involved is a point of contention with the plaintiffs.

Page 4 of the charges reads: "Mr. Goodman filing legal action received a judgment against the corporation. The judgment was given by Atty. Alfred Jones of Carrizozo, without our consent and without my (Keel) consent, automatically made the rights to these properties void, because of a provision contained in the deed to the properties stating that the properties cannot be encumbered by anyone. The mill on US 380 west of Carrizozo was

constructed in 1955-56, Goodman came into the company about that time, litigation has been almost a constant situation since the founding of New Mexico Copper Corporation.

Rash of break ins recently

Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. reported a call Sunday evening to the Bill Payne law office where a window on north side had been broken and entry made into the building. Articles taken were dictaphone valued at \$450, calculator worth \$79 and about \$35 in cash.

Finger prints were taken Monday and after some checking around all of the stolen goods were recovered. One and possibly two juveniles are involved in the case according to Vega, no charges filed yet.

On Monday night some person or persons broke into the coke machine at LaMay 66 service with loss of three or four dollars. That same night the cigarette machine at Monte Vista Service was broken into.

Report to News was that the town has no officer on duty after 1:00 p.m.

A calculator was stolen from Pug Ecklund's Conoco plant at Capitan, also on Monday night. There were other objects in this office that could have been taken, but were not.

Hearing set for September 24 on mobile homes and "D" Ave.

Quite a group of visitors came for the meeting of Carrizozo town council Tuesday night, all with questions about location of mobile homes on their minds. Mayor Pro-tem Earl Fenter told the group that since zoning and planning rules were complicated and Mayor Bill Payne not present, they would defer any discussion of mobile homes and that a special meeting would be held for that purpose.

People started asking questions such as, can mobile homes be replaced, what if mobile home burns, what if a person wants to trade for new model.

Atty. Archie Witham explained some sections of the code relating to mobile homes, and why the zoning ordinance is complicated. He told the visitors they could obtain an application for special exception under the zoning ordinance, fill this out and present it to the planning commission which would act as board of adjustment, with the council having the final say. In effect, this could allow mobile homes to locate anywhere in town, for any duration of time.

Truman Spencer, and others present, were asking "When was the zoning ordinance passed", implying that they knew nothing about it. Spencer asked if there was map showing zones, two maps were provided and all the

Ferguson appointed to Zozo board

In its meeting Tuesday night the Carrizozo board of education appointed Wally Ferguson to fill out the unexpired term of Ziggy Lessau who has moved to Deming. Wally's term runs to February 1975.

Other action of the board included appointment of two teachers aides, Jerry Light and Josie Vega, report of progress on new gym - ground is leveled and foundation work should start next week. Discussion of vocational complex and administration - supply structure and land trade with hospital discussed, as well as closing of "D" avenue block.

The board took action to get \$151,000.00 of capital outlay money received from state into

the Carrizozo school budget.

Bids were opened on two 16 passenger busses, the board accepted bid of Southwest Dodge for \$11,806.00 on the two.

Carrizozo plans to bid on one parcel of property to be auctioned by Town of Carrizozo this Saturday. The lot is across from school grounds to the north, Lot 12, Block 33 on corner of 8th and "C" Avenue will be sought by the school.

Bus routes were approved. Juanita Johnson driving the Ferguson Route, Lois Roper the Ancho Route, Everett Greer the Nogal Route, Patsy Dobbs the Oscura Route, and Weylin Johnson the Eastside Route.

Emergency service at Carrizozo hospital

Lincoln County hospital board met Monday in the Annex to discuss business of hospital and annex. The outcome of this meeting was opening of emergency facilities in the hospital on a when-needed basis.

Dr. Amy Barton will take care of as many emergency cases as possible in her office, but if stretcher case come in needing hospital emergency facilities they will be taken there. Call notifying of need for emergency service should be directed to Dr. Barton or the sheriff's office.

The matter of securing another doctor for Carrizozo, and possible reopening of the hospital

is going ahead on schedule. A representative from National Health Service Corps will be in Carrizozo next week to look over the situation.

Carrizozo has been declared a "critical medical shortage medical area" with cooperation from regional office in Dallas and from Washington. The project of incorporation Med-we-care as a go-between group for county, Carrizozo people and the new doctor and program to be set up under the National Health Service Corps, is progressing on schedule.

The Emergency Health Personnel Act of 1970 states: "Any person who receives a service provided under this section shall be charged for

such service at a rate established by the secretary, pursuant to regulations, to recover the reasonable cost of providing such service".

The goal of the National Health Service Corps is to improve or provide health service to persons in areas of critical need and further to assist communities in developing an economically viable health services program which will retain or attract private practitioners.

The initial directors of the new corporation are Barbara Ward, agent, Nancy Knight, Joan Means and Archie Whitham. On receiving incorporation papers these four will appoint a permanent board for Med-we-care, Inc.

visitors went out of the meeting room to study the maps, ending discussion of mobile homes.

Later in the meeting the council took up question of closing one block of "D" Avenue between school buildings. Atty. Witham explained to the council that when he first advised them on this closing, he thought state laws would require a public hearing and had advised the council they could vote on the closing subject to public hearing. He later found that a hearing was not mandatory but could be held, and his advice now was for the council to recind its first vote, call for a public hearing, and then make up its mind about closing.

Fenter stated that he had heard several objections, having to do with parking in the block after closing, fire truck access, delivering children in bad weather.

Councilman Harman made the motion to recind, stating that he thought there would be a public hearing when the first vote was taken. Motion to recind the "D" Avenue closing vote passed unanimously.

The council set Tuesday, September 24 for public hearing in the council room at which time all questions, complaints, etc., will be heard on two subjects, closing of one block of "D" Avenue, and status of mobile homes in the various zoned areas of town.

Town planner Ken Larsen was present to discuss part III of comprehensive plan for the town. Tom Ward, chairman of the planning and zoning commission, told the council his commission recommended that Part III proceed for these reasons: the town needs map of utility locations, much of which information is in people's minds but not on paper, that the town needs to know where water pressure is good or

bad so corrections can be made, and plans need to be made on flooding, water runoff, future sewer and water needs, and industrial park plan.

The Part III comprehensive plan will cost the town \$750, rest of cost born by federal government. Council voted to go ahead.

Clara Snow, representing the Carrizozo Cemetery Association, asked the council if it would help with purchase of small power mower. Cemetery has small riding mower but there are many places it will not operate. Cemetery fund has about \$250, part of which will be spent for mower so cleaning of cemetery can be carried on. Clara also asked that a new map of the cemetery be made, one large enough so that names could be put on the plots.

S. M. Ortiz asked the council if it would write Southern Pacific requesting repair on railroad crossing, now it is so bumpy you jump over. Floyd Siegrist will be contacted and repairs requested.

Bob Means asked about possible future extension of town limits. Following discussion got into LP and gasoline tanks above ground, state laws governing these not known. Means said he would object to his property being taken into the town. There appears to be no immediate or even future plans for expansion of town limits.

Two occupation licenses approved, one for Pietz tree trimming service, another for Abe's (Gallegos) Exxon.

Bids opened for carpeting new town hall. General Lumber & Supply was low at \$10.10 per square yard or total cost of \$1,898.88 for the 188 yards to be covered. Low bid accepted with understanding the bidder would meet material and fixture requirements.

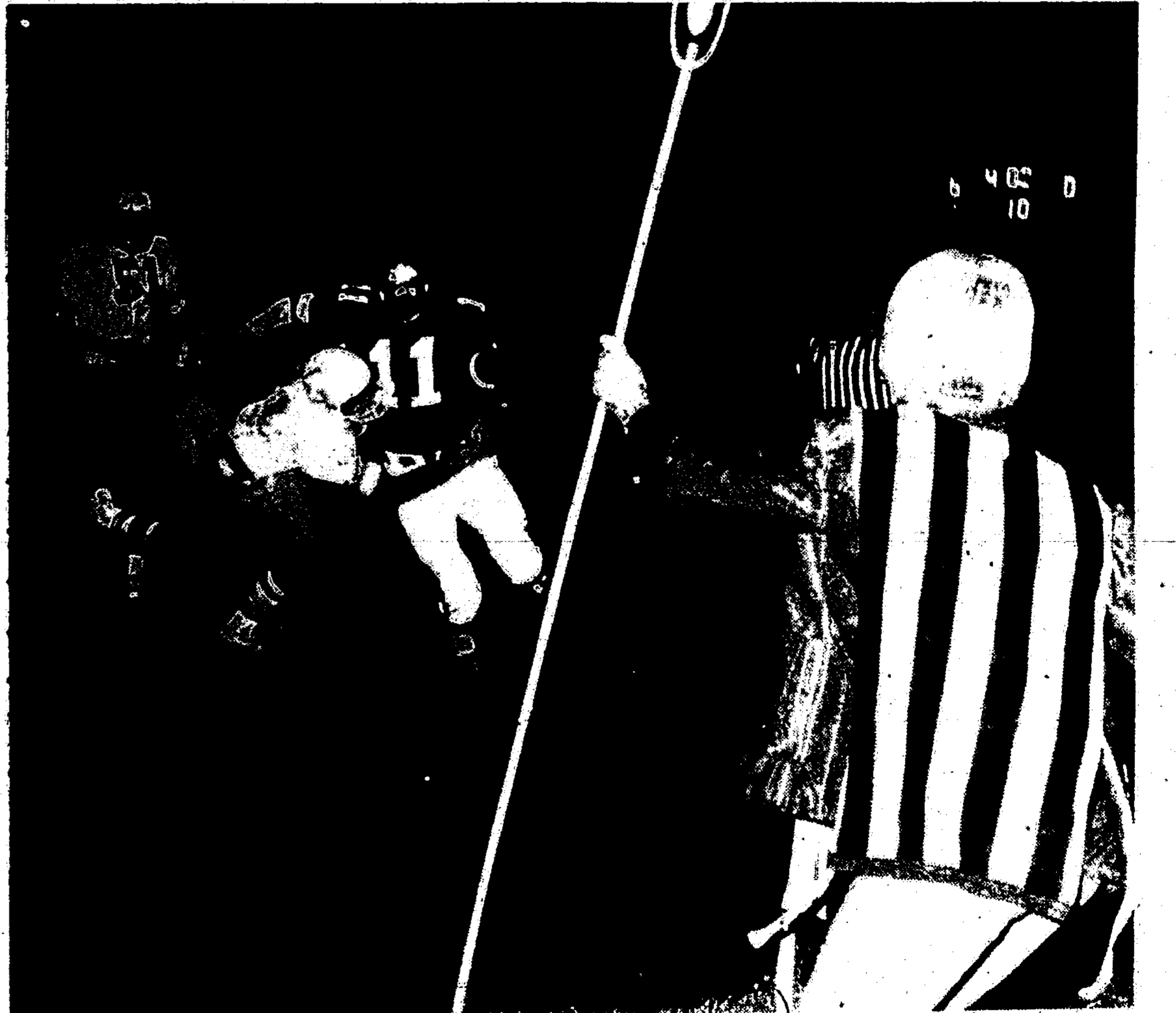

ployees will have time to do the job this winter.

The council has been pursuing the possibility of putting all Carrizozo recreation facilities, including golf course, swimming pool and recreation center under one corporate body. A request had been made to Internal Revenue Service for determination as to tax status of such a corporation. Atty. Witham read answer from IRS which stated that the corporation could receive "tax free" donations. He will pursue the project by meeting with the existing recreation committee.

Without read draft letter he had prepared to be sent out to property owners where cleaning needs to be done, a list will be made and letters sent. Natural vegetation will be left intact. The procedure of notifying property owners where buildings need to be restored or demolished was

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discussed. The planning and zoning commission will make an independent determination of what buildings are to be included, positive action will be taken along this line.

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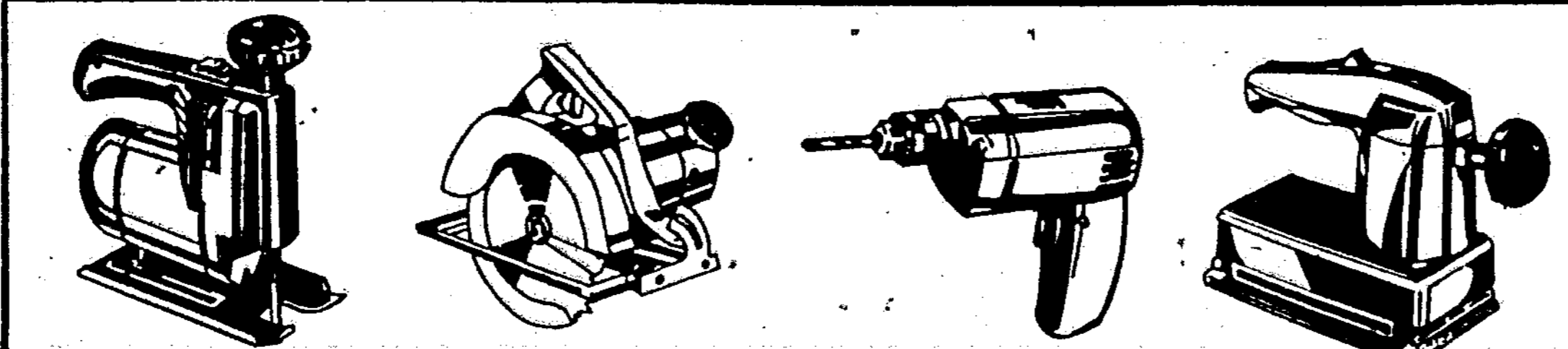
