Charlotte Rowin changed the subject at public hearing on mobile home location

The Town of Carrizozo has held two public hearings on the new Planning and Zoning Ordinance. A good crowd at the first hearing expressed no opposition to the ordinance, the crowd at Tuesday night hears—maybe as many but no more than at first hearing—were vocal in opposition to parts of ordinance dealing with mobile homes, other types of homes, animals in town, etc.

The Town caused to be published a legal notice in the Lincoln County News on May 2, 1974, notifying the public that a hearing would be held, when, where, and purpose. Possibility does exist that some readers pass over the legal notices. In its issue of May 16, 1974, the day before the hearing, the News had story on front page telling about the meeting to be held the next day.

Top news story in the May 23 issue was headed "No opposition to zoning and planning". This news story told details of the hearing on May 17. In the June 13 issue the News reported on meeting of the Town Council where the Planning and Zoning Ordinance was adopted, again on the front page.

Some people at the Tuesday night hearing were fussing about not knowing of the first hearing or the ordinance details. However, a group fully as large, or bigger, did know about the first hearing and were present. The full details of the ordinance were never published, or even fully understood by council members or other people until study of ordinance was made after questions began to arise.

It is very likely true that only a handful of Carrizozo residents will know exactly where mobile homes may or may not be located, and under what restrictions until a map is printed showing this detailed information. At the Tuesday night meeting, Town Planner Ken Larsen said "Yes" and Atty. Witham said "No" about one part of the mobile home business. Witham was right.

So much for the background on the planning and zoning ordinance. It did have fair, if not adequate publicity.

People at the Tuesday night meeting were largely concerned about their own personal problems, which is reasonable, and the over-all problem of town planning was shoved in background except for remarks by Mayor Bill Payne and Planning Commission member Mary Rich.

Roley Ward said he could not understand the ordinance (one of many). Roley has no mobile home problem.

Joe West said — why zone at all. Mary Rich presented several reasons why the town needs zoning. First, she thought most everyone wanted a healthy and beautiful town. Second, lending agencies such as FHA, Vets, Farm, will not loan money to finance new home in area where mobile homes are permitted. Third, the Town has got to have rules before the situation gets out-of-hand.

West asked, how about \$20,000 and \$30,000 mobile homes. From the conversation that followed, there must be several in town.

Mrs. Ed Jones defined a mobile home as any moveable home over 10 feet wide.

Buckley Zumwalt asked if existing mobile homes could be replaced. Answer from Mayor Bill Payne, probably not in the area where Buckley lives.

Archie Witham said that the purpose of the ordinance was to eliminate mobile homes from residential areas.

Mrs. Ed Jones commented, you better start with bad eyesores where people are living, and they aren't mobile homes.

Thelma Appgar asked about zoning in her area. Answer was that her area was restricted only as to number of mobile homes.

O. S. Simmons asked, what does it take to change the ordinance. No answer at that point.

Charlotte Rowin asked about replacing mobile home that burned out. No answer then.

Mrs. Buckley Zumwalt said that teachers need homes and could not afford to build them.

Mayor Payne commented that he did not think this ordinance would keep anyone from locating here. Also, there were more at the first public hearing where no opposition was expressed, than are here tonight.

Simmons said he objected to not being allowed to replace his mobile home.

Arnold Boyce said that people need to know areas and restrictions. Manny Hernandez said they're prohibited in your area (not so).

Ed Jones said that there ought to be a town meeting where people could get together and vote.

Comment and discussion prior to council action had to do with parking hazard the closing could create.

Mayor Bill Payne said the reason given by school for requesting the closing was safety of children.

Supt. Jim Steinepreis said the street on each side of a center barricade, would be used for teacher and student parking.

Arnold Boyce commented that there was continuous crossing of this street during school hours, more than just morning, noon and night.

Joe Orsak said that no child would have to walk further than one-half block to get to classroom from car or bus.

Ed Lawson said that recent graduates use this street for playground, and everything else from assault to racing.

The only real objection was to unloading of children, and the parking hazard that might exist were the street closed.

Witham said that everyone is concerned about their own problem. He would try to answer questions.

Boyce, property should be protected. Jim Steinepreis thought that in case of fire, a request for special handling could go through fast.

Mayor Payne, there is no assurance of that. Any request for special handling or permission has first to clear the Planning and Zoning Commission, then go through the Town Council, would take some time. We need a mobile home park.

Councilman Roy Harman commented, he would permit mobile homes in R1 and R2 areas except for "Silk Stocking Row" as defined by one person at the meeting. This row was located in the vicinity of Albert Roberts residence.

Will Silva said we need to look the ordinance over good, there seems to be some faults.

C. D. May said that no one here intends to hurt anyone.

Rachel West asked if the town has law against animals in town. Mayor Payne said "You're changing the subject", then that the town does have law but it is real loose in interpretation.

Thus ended most of the discussion of planning and zoning ordinance. Chances are real good that further public hearings will be set, and the ordinance is due for changes of some kind.

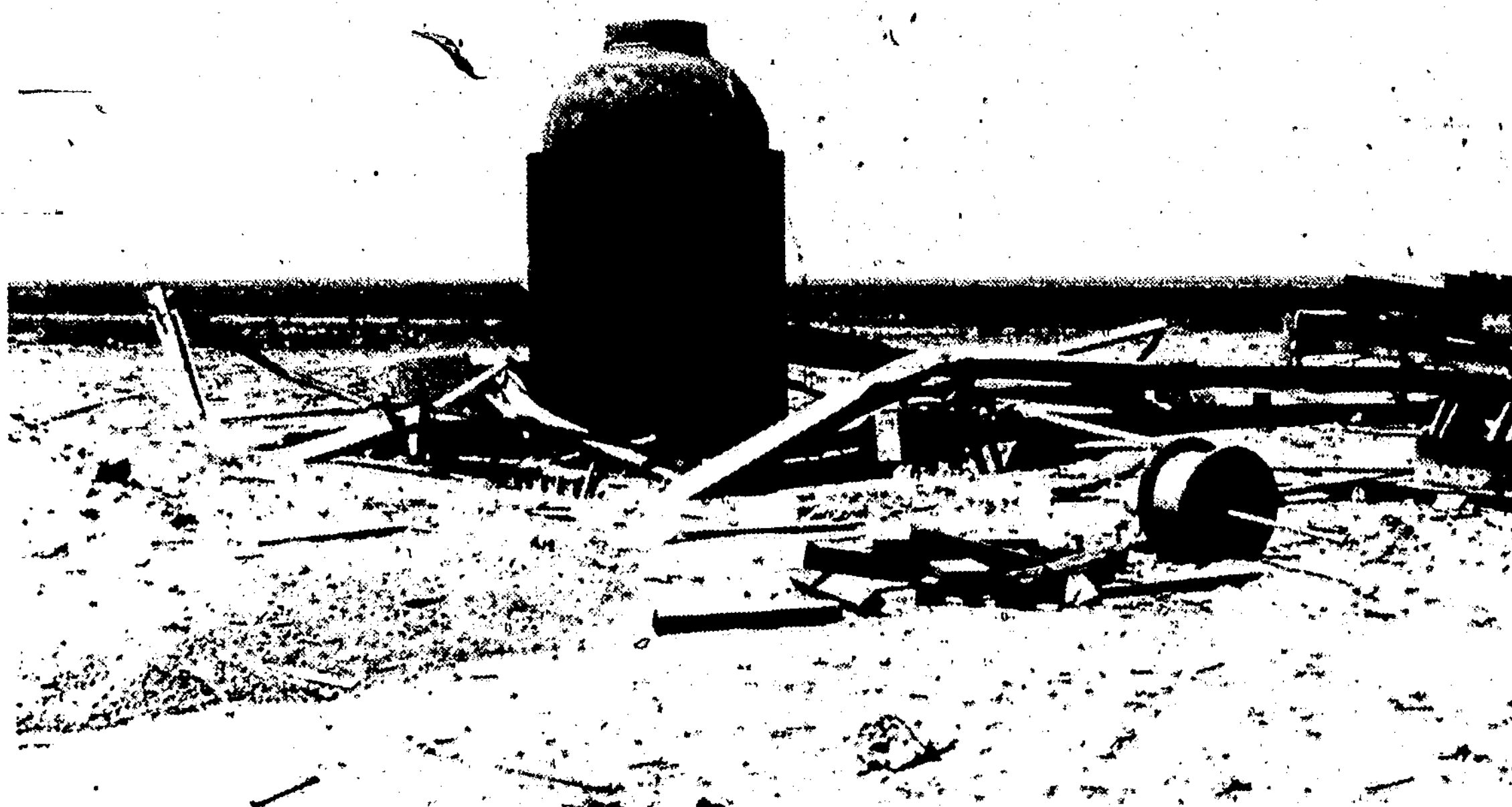

Man charged with burglary

Trinity Site tour October 6

Once a year White Sands Missile Range opens the gates so people may go see the site of explosion of the first atomic bomb. Military escort is required and will be at the three entrances.

The open date is Sunday, October 6. People may enter at Tularosa gate, time 10:15 a.m. Stallion Range Center entrance, 53 miles west of Carrizozo open time is 11:15 a.m. Grant parking lot north of Alamogordo time is 9:45 a.m.

All cars must be at the gates on times above, no one will be permitted to enter after the caravan has departed. The trip takes approximately seven hours. No weapons permitted photography only at the site, no digging, visitors stay on marked roads.

First atomic bomb 30 miles from Carrizozo.

The first atomic test operation, known as Project Trinity, took place on the morning of Monday, July 16, 1945, in the north central portion of the Alamogordo Bombing & Gunnery Range. Headquarters of the Bombing & Gunnery Range was located at Alamogordo Army Air Field, known since 1948 as Holloman Air Force Base, but the explosion site was actually nearer the town of Carrizozo, about thirty miles away, than to Alamogordo, New Mexico, which was sixty miles distance.

This particular site was chosen for reasons of both safety and secrecy. It was in a region of public grazing land that had always been sparsely populated and was now less populated than ever since being withdrawn by the War Department for use as a bombing range. Preparations for the test explosion began in earnest four days prior to July 16, with an old ranch house situated on the range serving as base operations. The bomb (code name "Fat Man") was placed on top of a steel detonation tower on Saturday, July 14, and installation of the detonation mechanism was then started. Meanwhile, other technicians went about in-

stalling seismograph equipment at varying distances from the tower. Located, which was designated Zero. Other instrumentation was set up for recording temperature, air pressure, and similar data wanted by the project scientist.

Three observation points were established at 5.7 miles each Zero. These were wooden shelters protected by cement and earthen barricades. The observation point lying south of the bomb tower served as a control center, where Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, head of Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, was to take his position. A fourth post was at the base camp, ten miles from Zero, and a fifth on a mountainside twenty miles distant. Most of the scientists and "visiting firemen" present at the test were stationed at this last post. Among them was Dr. Knox Millsaps, who was then chief scientist for the Air Force Missile Development Center, which has since conducted tens of thousands of research and development missions on the same sprawling test range.

The test was originally set for 0400 hours, July 16, but rain and lightning early that morning caused it to be postponed until 0530. The bomb could not be exploded under any conditions because rain would increase the danger from radio-active fallout, as well as interfering with observations of the test. However, the rain stopped about 0400 and at 0530 the bomb was exploded successfully. In the view of most observers, the brilliance of the light from the explosion arrived some seconds later. But the shock still knocked over two men at one of the inner observation posts.

Immediately after the test, two lead-lined tanks went forth to explore the site with measuring instruments and to scoop up samples of material from the ground. The bomb tower had virtually disappeared, and in its place was a crater about 400 yards in diameter and fifteen feet deep. Sands in the crater were fused to a "glass-like solid the color of green jade." This substance has sometimes been referred to as

trinitite, after the code name "Project Trinity", which has also given the name Trinity Site to the actual explosion point.

Although no information on the test was released until after the Atomic Bomb was used as a weapon against Japan, people in surrounding areas were quite aware that something special had happened in the early morning of July 16. The light flash and thunder clap made a vivid impression over a radius of roughly 160 miles. Glass was shattered 120 miles away in Silver City, New Mexico. And Chicago newspapers carried an item on the explosion of a munitions dump somewhere in New Mexico.

There was considerable excitement in New Mexico later in the year over the discovery of cattle with curiously spotted hide and hair, apparently as a result of fallout from the Atom test. But the site itself was kept off limits to the public until September 1953, when a throng estimated at between 600 and 700 persons came for a "first public showing" of Trinity Site. By this time the danger of radiation at the site had subsided; and similar visits have been arranged at various intervals since then. However, the site is still restricted, if only because it still lies within a military test range. In effect, the Alamogordo Bombing & Gunnery Range was transformed after the war into an Air Force guided missile test range, which in turn was combined in September 1962 with adjacent Army ranges to form the interservice White Sands Missile Range.

Something for Apple lovers

For apple lovers September is an important month. It marks the beginning of the fall apple harvest in Lincoln County and counties all over the U.S. The bins are beginning to fill with this beautiful and delicious fruit. Cook books and magazine articles abound in suggestions for using the ever popular apple in everything from appetizer to dessert.

Apples should be stored in the refrigerator, but not below 32 degree F. Keep apples in a plastic bag or in the hydrator to proper humidity and prevent absorption of the food flavors.

A delicious way to serve apples as a salad is in "Harvest Home Salad."

HARVEST HOME SALAD

4 red apples 1 jar sharp cheddar cheese spread
Salad greens 2 packages (3oz. each) cream cheese
2 cups halved, seeded grapes 1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 cup salted cashew nuts 1/2 cup whipping cream
or any salted nutmeats

Salt and pepper to taste
Core apples, do not peel; slice thin; dip in acidulated water (water to which lemon juice, ascorbic acid, or special commercial preparation has been added) to prevent discoloration. Arrange crisp salad greens on individual plates. Add apple slices, grapes and nuts. Form cheddar spread into balls about 1/2 inch in diameter; add to salad. Mash cream cheese; add mayonnaise and cream; whip to spoonable consistency; adding more cream if desired; season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve with salad. Makes 8 servings.

Kayse discusses conservation development

The steering committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met in Carrizozo at 1:00 pm, August 6, 1974. Chairman Bill Gage presided.

Reverend Dan Wright gave the invocation. Mayor Bill Payne gave the welcoming address. Chairman Gage responded.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and mailed to members. Mr. Bell so moved and Mr. Merritt seconded, and it carried.

The guest speaker was Mr. Tom Kayse, executive secretary of the New Mexico State Natural Resource Conservation Commission. The commission's duties were enumerated regarding conservation development. They assist local units in matters such as land use planning, water quality control, etc. He discussed federal regulations regarding land use planning and local conservation district's involvement.

Mr. Marion Strong, State Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, gave a short dissertation on RC&D's nationwide and budgets. There are 148 approved RC&D projects in the nation; 97 counties and 50 states are covered by these (3 are in New Mexico).

Mr. Stan Green was presented with a plaque from the SCMR for his distinguished service of time and effort to the organization.

Progress on projects were reported on as follows:

PM-98 Pinon Pipeline: Bob Bell reported that the ASCS will cost share 70 per cent on domestic use and a meeting was set up to see if FHA will

provide a loan.

PM-120 Indian Divide Rest Area: Tom McCalmont reported that a special use permit is needed from the Forest Service but there is no reason for hold up on this.

PM-90 Capitan Park: This needs to be completed as soon as possible. 100 trees have been planted.

PM-113 Land Use Planning: In three phases - in Otero - two have been completed.

PM-128 Sierra Blanca Airport: The report is almost completed.

PM-122 Aid in horizontal drilling: Approved by ACP and a contractor has been located. A list of potential users is being obtained.

Bringing Smokey Bear Home: This has been approved by Congressional sub-committee.

PM-134 Water Resource Study: Carrizozo and Lincoln County allotted some funds and matched by 4-Corners

PM-138 Establishment of brass caps: There will be a check to see who needs caps. Letters have been written and a meeting has been asked for.

Governor King presented Aide-de-Camp certificates to Howard Abercrombie, Bill Gallacher, Bill Gage, Bob Bell, Lewis Merritt, and Doc Dean through Tom McCalmont. 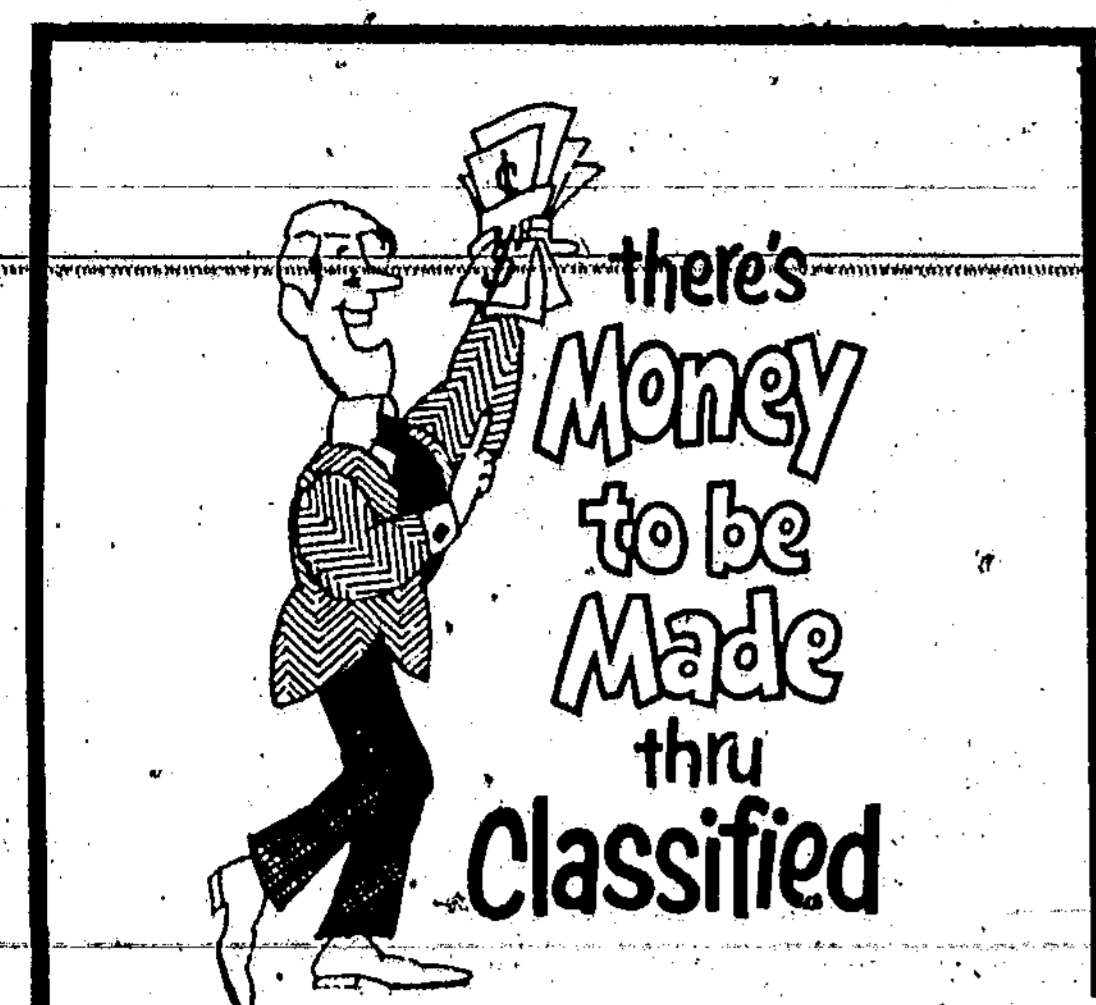

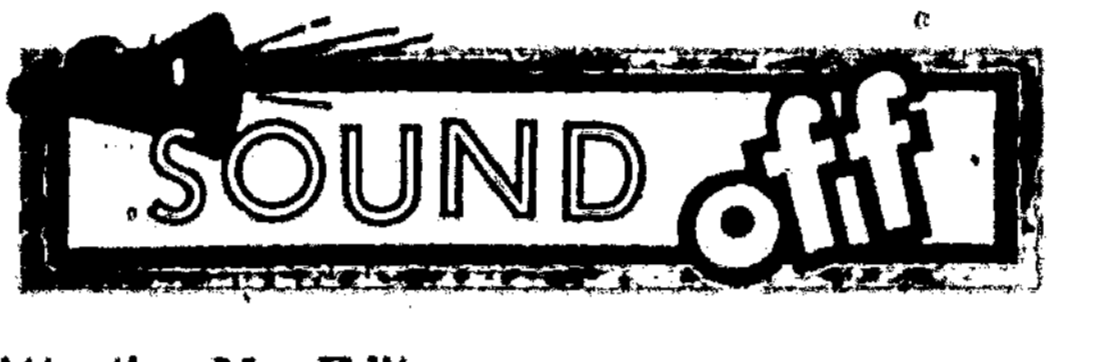

 Thought was that the plane had been sitting idle too long, probably water in the gasoline. Morgan expects to fix the plane and try to fly home it.

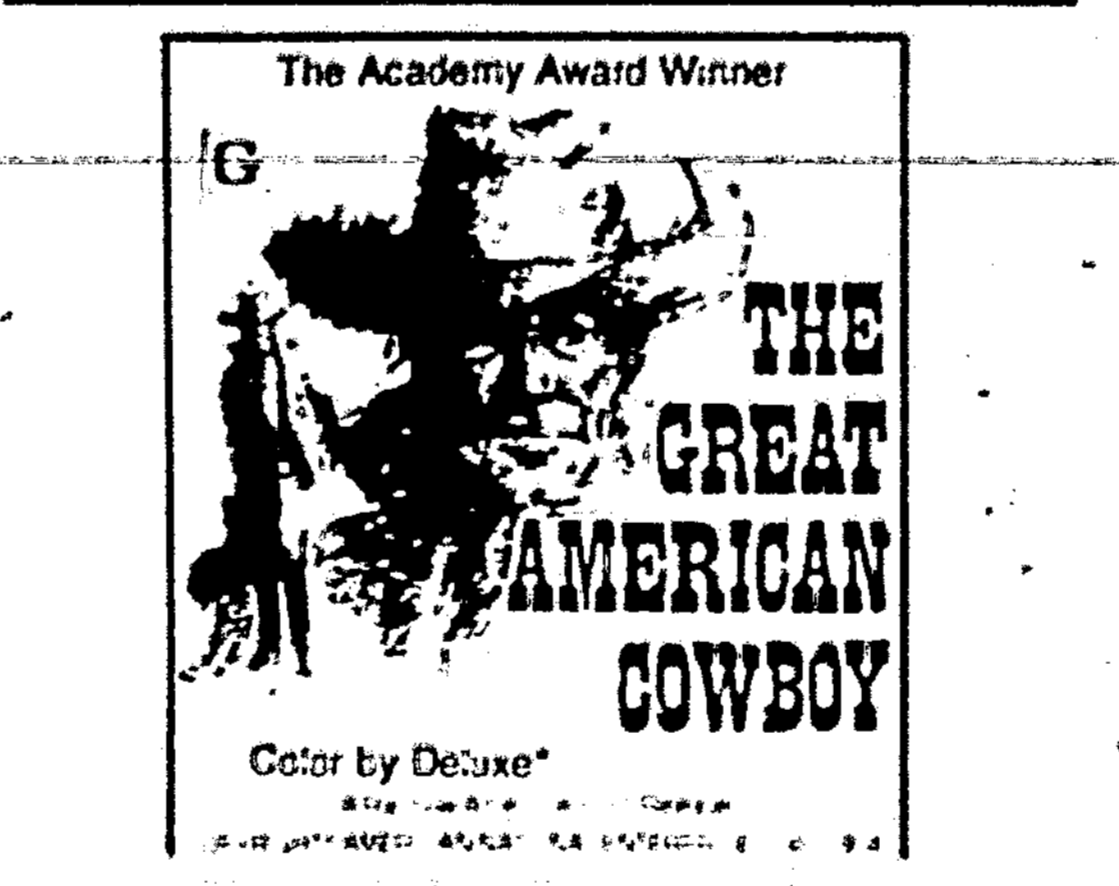

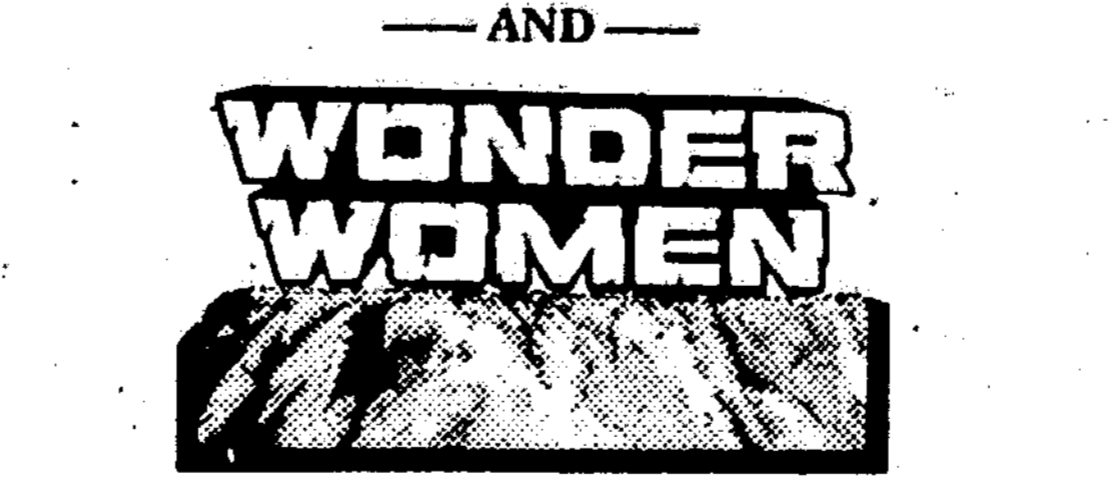
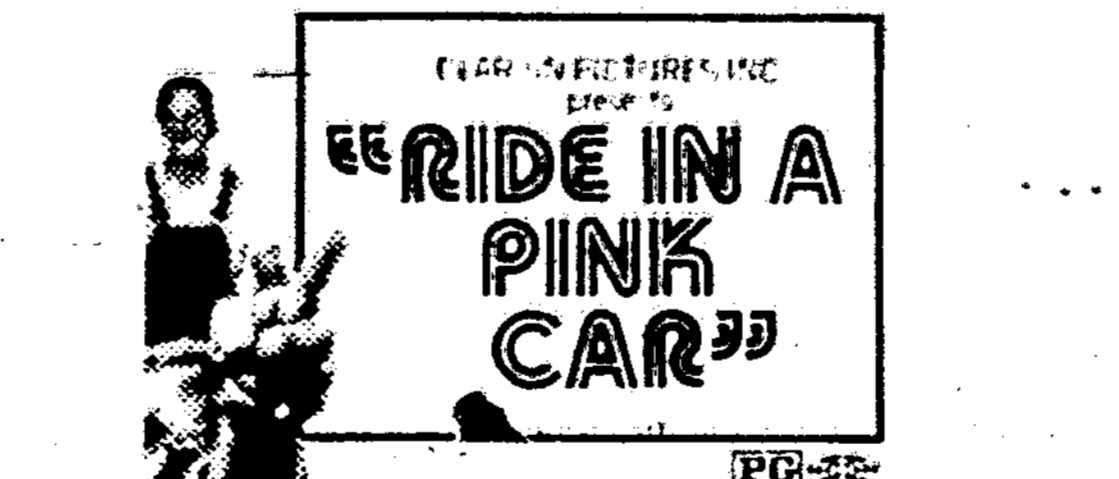


Attention Mr. Editor:

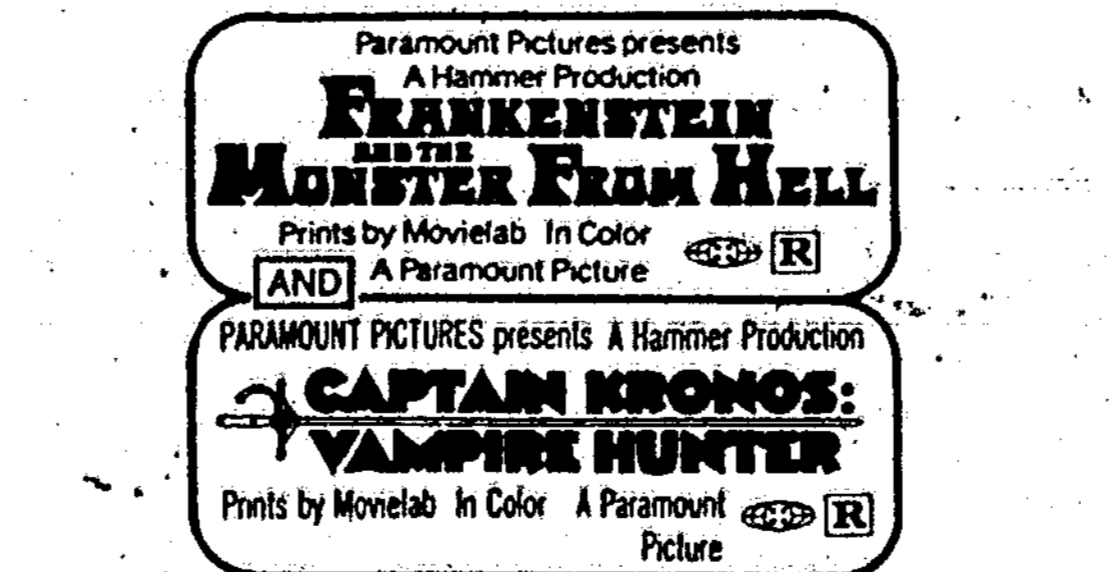

Filing fee return favored

Inside the Capital - By Fred Buckles
SANTA FE—Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, favors a return to filing fees for public office candidates with the petition method of getting on the ballot as an alternative.
 Rep. Berry is on a special interim election law legislative committee that met in Santa Fe. Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, is chairman.
 The panel voted to recommend to the 1975 Legislature a switch to all printer pack voting machines in New Mexico. Only part of voting machines are printer type now. Rep. Berry said this type is almost error-proof.
 Automatic voting machines are subject to errors by election judges in reading totals. Rep. Luna said 806 automatic machines would be replaced by printout machines. Seventy-six new machines would be bought. The balance would be converted from automatic to printout machines.

Rep. Luna said the cost would be \$844,000 plus freight charges. Included in the total are 306 Bernalillo County units.
 Reps. Berry and Luna said the committee will also recommend a method of clearing 13 minor parties from secretary of state records. The parties have registered over the years with the secretary of state but they seldom offer candidates.

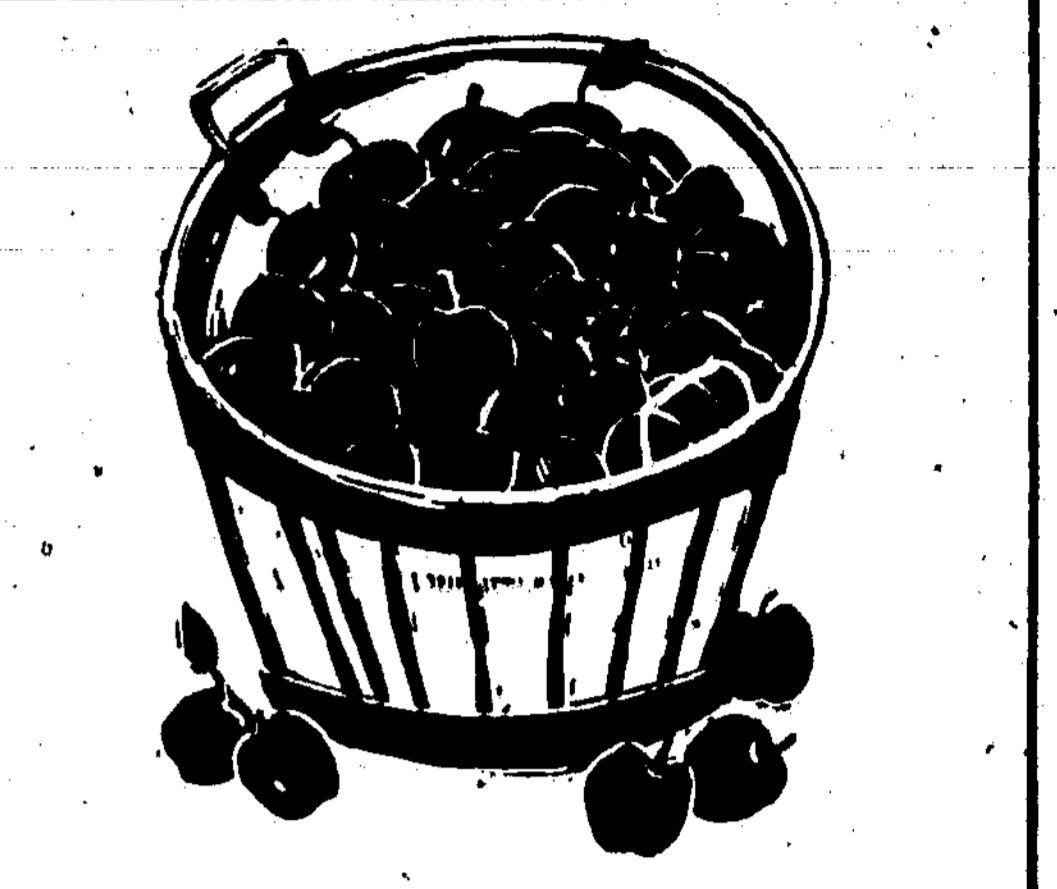
The committee will propose elimination of a minor party that does not propose candidates for two successive elections. The special lawmaker committee will also shape election reform proposals later.
 A Guadalupe County native, Richard Sims, 44, of Albuquerque announced he is a candidate for the U. S. Senate Democratic nomination in 1976. An insurance agent, Sims is a strong backer of Alabama Gov. George Wallace for president and Las Cruces Democrat Jerry Apodaca for governor.

Sims soundly whacked the record of U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, Santa Fe Democrat, in his formal announcement in Santa Fe. Sen. Montoya is already campaigning actively for reelection in two years.
 Our soundings showed Republican governor candidate Joe Skeen, a Lincoln County rancher,

Lincoln County News, Sept. 26, 1974, Page 10 still holds a substantial lead over Sen. Apodaca in Lea County. Former Sen. Skeen is attracting heavy Democratic support in conservative Lea County.
 But new State Democratic Chairman Ben Alexander of Hobbs is countering Skeen's support in Southeastern New Mexico. Aggressive, outspoken Ben is successfully pulling the State Democratic Party together.

A Farmington tour showed Skeen enjoys a big San Juan County lead over Sen. Apodaca. Growing San Juan County is conservative, too. Alexander said the problem for the last two years has been lack of involvement of people in the democratic process. He called for unified New Mexico contrasted with present regionalism.

Sen. Apodaca reported \$82,000 in contributions between June 30 and Sept. 15. Among donations were \$7,700 raised at an Apodaca rally July 20 in Los Angeles. Apodaca limits individual contributions to \$3,000. Hobbs businessman Jack Daniels was the only \$3,000 contributor.
