Settlement of (wild) burro case put off 30 days

ALBUQUERQUE - Attorneys for the government and New Mexico Livestock Board Monday were given 20 days to submit briefs, and the case challenging the constitutionality of the Interior Dept's Wild Horse and Burro Act was taken under advisement by a three-judge federal panel.

The Wild Horse and Burro Act officially protects all unbranded, unclaimed horses and burros as an endangered wild species, as such the animals are wards of the government.

The Federal court action stems from the state's impoundment of 19 unbranded, unclaimed burros which were rounded up and sold at public auction in Roswell after Carrizozo area rancher Kelley Stephenson requested the board capture and corral the animals.

Bad accident at Nogal turn

A one-car accident Sunday night eight miles east of Carrizozo on U.S. 380 killed an 18-year-old Hobbs woman and left a 24-year-old Lovington man in critical condition in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital.

Pronounced dead at the scene was Tina Marie Foltz, 18, a University of New Mexico student.

In critical condition with internal injuries was Michael L. McKowan, also a student at UNM. McKowan was the driver of the vehicle, police said.

A third occupant of the automobile, Mary Whitley, also a UNM student and Hobbs resident, was treated at the hospital, and released.

State Police Sgt. Jack Johnson, Capitan, and Officer Dale Housley, Carrizozo, who investigated the accident, said the mishap occurred shortly before 8 p.m. at NM 37 and U.S. 380.

The automobile was heading north on NM37 and apparently failed to negotiate a stop at the intersection, police said. The car skidded about 500 feet, crossing U.S. 380 and rolled over at least once before coming to a stop upside down and 67 feet from the highway, the officers said.

McKowan and Miss Foltz were thrown from the automobile. Miss Foltz's body was found more than 40 feet from the wreckage.

Miss Foltz was pronounced dead by Lincoln County Deputy Medical Examiner Ray Clarke of Ruidoso. The injured were taken to the Ruidoso hospital by Carrizozo Volunteer Ambulance.

McKowan has been transferred to El Paso hospital, apparently will recover.

His wife and children are living in Junction City, Kansas.

The Lincoln County Historical Society met at the Wortley Hotel October 25. In the absence of Bob Scribner, Pres. and Walter Henn, Vice Pres. Cille Dockary, Sec. presided over the meeting. After the business meeting she introduced Ruth and Edward Penfield who gave interesting talks about the early days in Lincoln, then known as Las Placitas del Rio Bonito and going back to the earliest days. Long before the era of the Lincoln County War.

It was most interesting to hear some of the early history of the Tunstall-McSween Store and related early trade in Lincoln.

The beginning trade routes for the first commercial ventures in the area followed the footsteps of early Spanish adventurers who came north from Mexico in ox-carts with wheels fashioned from the cross section of cottonwood trees; carrying merchandise from Europe, Asia and China by way of Manilla and the West Coast. They returned to Mexico by way of the turquoise trail loaded with wool, copper, turquoise and gold. Years later the oxen completed the trails from ocean to ocean. The first wagon came from Missouri in 1821 and made it to Lincoln County as early as 1840.

By the way the beams and other lumber in the Tunstall-McSween store came from Missouri in wagons.

This is only a small excerpt from the talks and it's hard to stop, for to me it's intriguing.

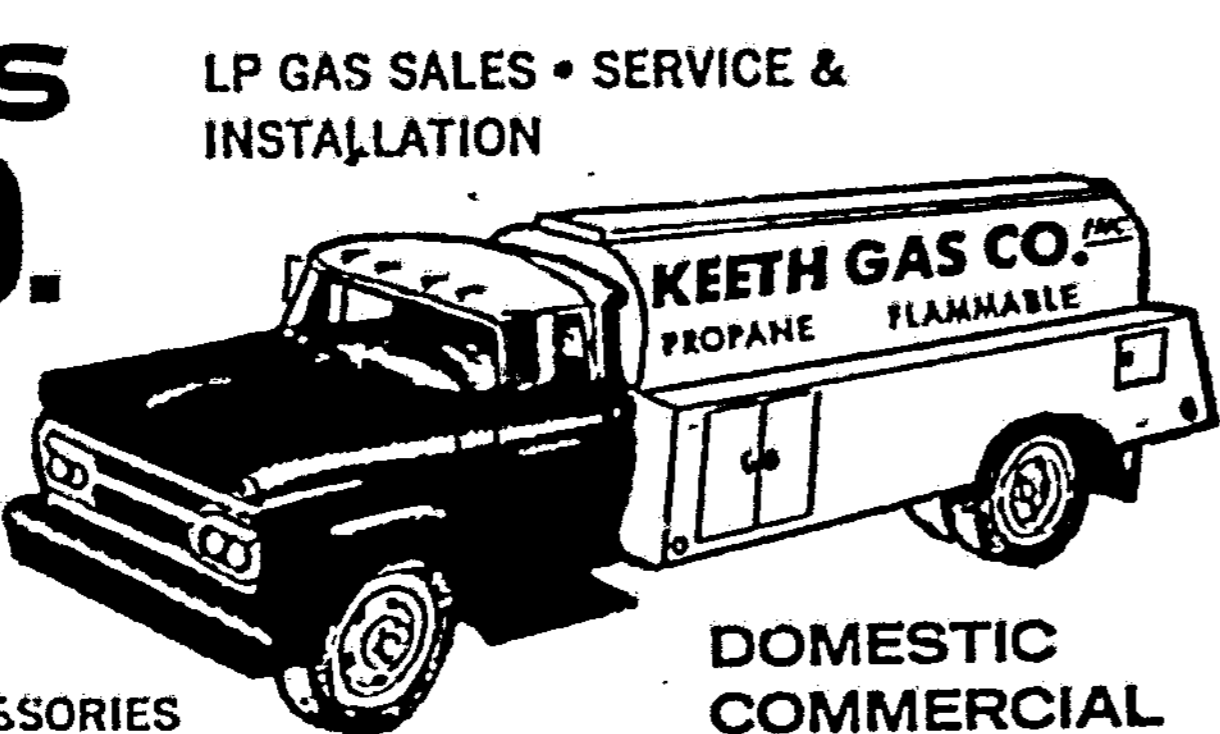

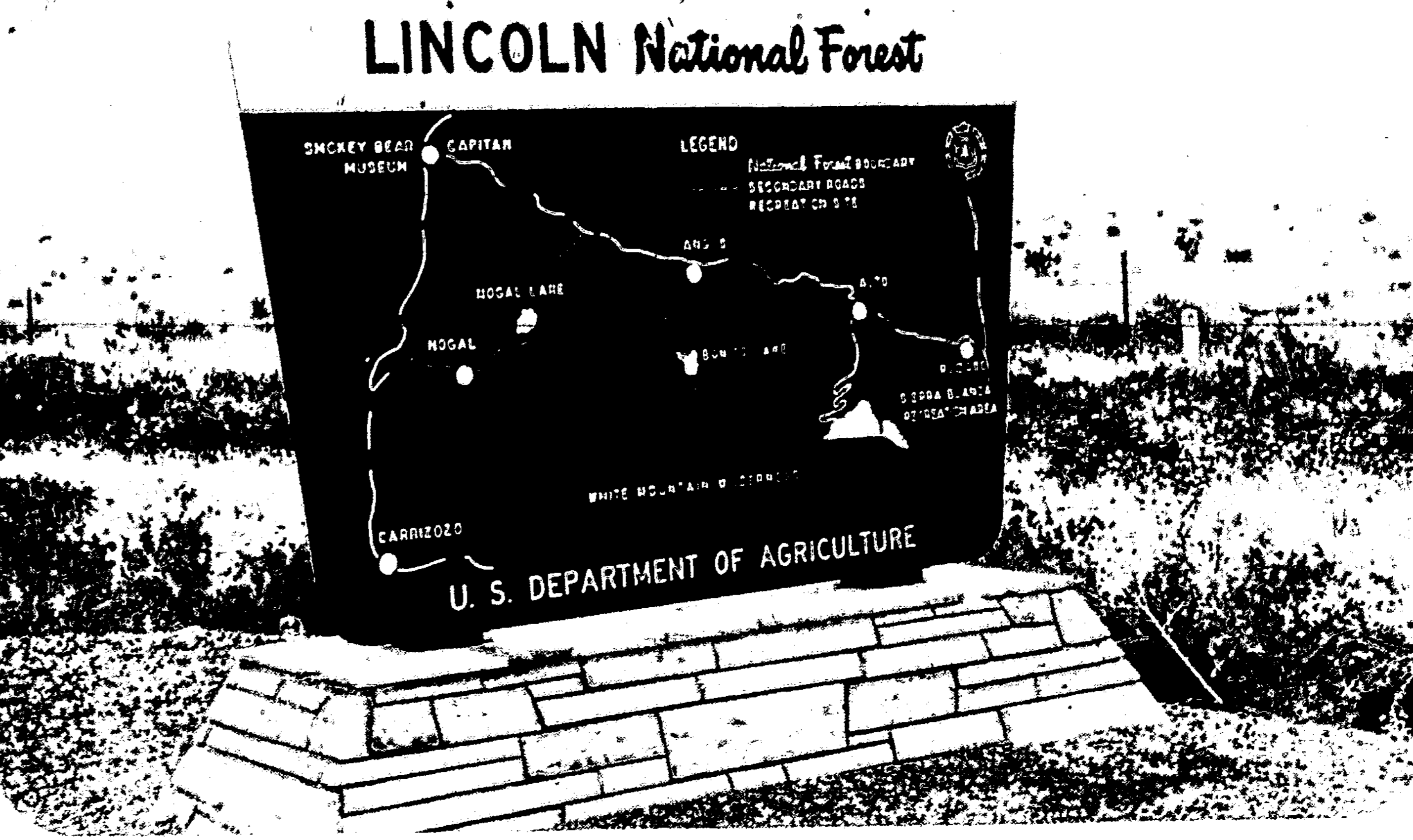

A few bad breaks, lots of penalties, a couple of mental lapses, a whole lot of Jose Castanon, and very little, if any at all, offensive-line blocking, all helped make last Friday night's game score as it reads in picture below: Zozo 16 and Cloudercroft 48.

The Grizzly team came out at the start of the game looking like it was ready to put in a good night's work, but after gaining two first-downs by Michael Vega and Raymond Beltran on first two plays after opening game kick-off, things started to happen, or stopped happening depending on how you look at it!

Zozo lineman jumps off-sides for 5 yard penalty and forces Grizzlies to attempt pass on 3rd down, instead of having 3rd and short yardage. Result, pass interception by Castanon of Cloudercroft at own 35 yard line.

On ensuing series of plays Cloudercroft moved for couple of first-downs, and after seemingly being slowed down by Grizzly defense, tried quick-opener on 3rd and 17 and fumbled, but alert C-croft player picked up ball and went 35 yards to 3 yard line of Zozo. Two plays later Castanon went over for first TD, and two-point Pat good. First quarter 8-0.

Zozo was forced to punt on 4th down on next series of plays, with their backs not having anywhere to run, or getting enough time to pass (in other words, no blocking).

After sending his backs on a few quick pops into the line Castanon fakes and rolls-out for 40 yard run and his second touchdown. Two-point Pat again good. 16-0 (11:34) 2nd quarter.

Grizzlies take over on own 23 after kick-off. Five yard penalty moves them back to 17. No gain on 1st, two incomplete passes on 2nd and 3rd downs. Punt on 4th, Castanon returns to Zozo 45, gains 20 yards on two running plays to 25 yard line, plus 15 yard penalty on Zozo for piling one. On fourth down at the Zozo one yard line Cloudercroft scores again at (7:23) of second quarter, Pat no good, 24-0, favor of Cloudercroft. Score stays same for remaining of 1st half, with Ernie Beltran getting off a 50 yard punt to keep Zozo out of trouble, and Ray Hernandez intercepting a Cloudercroft pass right before the half.

Zozo starts 2nd half and forces Bears to fumble, on good hit by Raymond Beltran, and Grizzlies recover on C-croft 23. After getting down to 15 and 1 to go on 3rd down, Zozo player gets kicked out of game for unsportsmanlike conduct (15 yard penalty) and drive fizzles out at the 30 yard line.

A touch down on this possession could have turned ball game around for the Grizzlies, because after stopping Bears, Grizzlies with help of two 15 yard penalties on C-croft team hit paydirt. Ernie Beltran going over from 7 yards out. Also scores 2 point Pat, 24-8 (could have been 24-16).

Grizzlies hold Bears scoreless during 3rd quarter, with Bobby Beltran, Rich Edwards, Leo Samora and Ernie Beltran doing some good hard hitting on defense.

Cloudercroft mounts drive beginning 4th quarter, thanks to 25 yards of penalties on Zozo, and scores at 11:43 making score 30-8. Bears kick-off and recover ball on Grizzly 1 yard line, when Grizzly players let ball roll, (mental lapse) ball is live on kick-off if it travels 10 or more yards. On next play C-croft scores again, score now reads 36-8.

Bears go on to score two more TD's in fourth quarter, one of them after recovering Zozo fumble on Grizzly 11 yard line, making score 48-8.

With Cloudercroft kicking off following their last TD, Ernie Beltran picked up ball at his own three yard line, and with not one block being thrown for him by his team-mates worked himself to the right side-line, where he shed off a couple of tacklers and then proceeded to outrun the rest of pursuing Bears for a 97 yard TD, his 2nd of the night, and added his 2nd 2 point Pat.

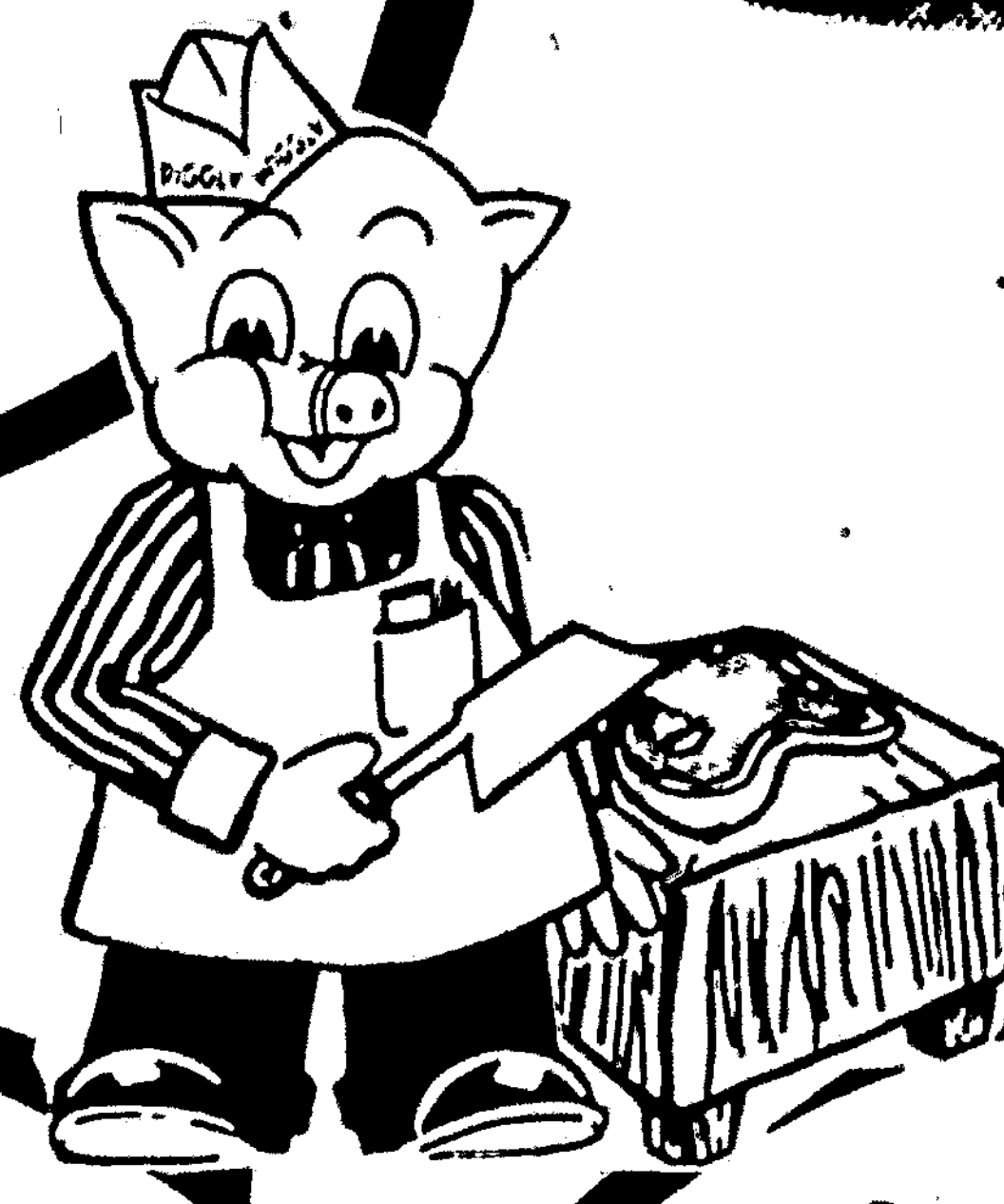

Questions to be voted on at the General Election to be held November 5, 1974

AJOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 AND ADOPTING A NEW ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10, PERTAINING TO COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO: Section 1. It is proposed to amend the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Article 4, Section 10 and adopting a new Article 4, Section 10 to read:
"A. A permanent commission to consist of nine members is created, which shall be known as the "legislative compensation commission". Three members shall be appointed by the governor, two members appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, two members appointed by the president pro tempore of the senate and two members appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
B. No one shall be appointed to the commission who is a legislator, officer or employee of the state or any department, agency or political subdivision thereof, or who is an officer or employee of any agency or institution to which any state funds are appropriated. Commission members shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing officials.
C. Members of the legislature shall receive compensation, expenses and allowances as fixed by law which compensation, expenses and allowances shall not exceed that established by a majority vote of the legislative compensation commission.
D. The commission, before June 30 immediately following the ratification of this amendment and every fourth year thereafter, shall review and fix the maximum rates of compensation, expenses and allowances paid members of the legislature. In setting maximum compensation, expenses and allowances for members of the legislature, the commission may establish different rates applicable to sessions, and to interim periods between sessions, and may establish a maximum rate for members of the legislature who are officers different from that established for other members. Maximum rates established by the commission shall be filed with the secretary of state and become effective on the first day of July following their establishment.
E. The commission shall elect one of its members chairman and a majority of the members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Commission members shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred while performing the duties imposed by this section as provided by law."
Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.
AJOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BARRING THE LEVYING OF ANY TAX OR ASSESSMENT BY ANY POLITICAL SUBDIVISION WHOSE ENABLING LEGISLATION DOES NOT PROVIDE FOR AN ELECTED GOVERNING AUTHORITY.

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:
"Neither the state, nor any county, school district, or municipality, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, shall directly or indirectly lend or pledge its credit, or make any donation to or in aid of any person, association or public or private corporation, or in aid of any private enterprise for the construction of any railroad; provided, nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the state or any county or municipality from making provision for the care and maintenance of sick and indigent persons, nor shall it prohibit the state from establishing a veterans' scholarship program for Vietnam conflict veterans who are post-secondary students at educational institutions under the exclusive control of the state by exempting such veterans from the payment of tuition. For the purposes of this section a "Vietnam conflict veteran" is any person who has been honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, who was a resident of New Mexico at the original time of entry into the armed forces from New Mexico and who has been awarded a Vietnam campaign medal for service in the armed forces of this country in Vietnam during the period from August 5, 1964 to the official termination date of the Vietnam conflict as designated by executive order of the president of the United States. The state may also establish by law a program of loans to students of the healing arts, as defined by law, for residents of the state who, in return for the payment of educational expenses, contract with the state to practice their profession for a period of years after graduation within areas of the state designated by law."
Section. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

On Capitan's first possession after the Vaughn TD, Tiger quarterback Kenny Cummins threw an interception that was run back to the Tiger 29 yard line. An off sides penalty, then a running play and it was 2nd down and 14 yards. Vaughn attempted two passes, both incomplete. On 4th down, John Taylor and John Lucero managed to sack the Vaughn passer for a loss. The defense won that battle and the Capitan offense took over.
