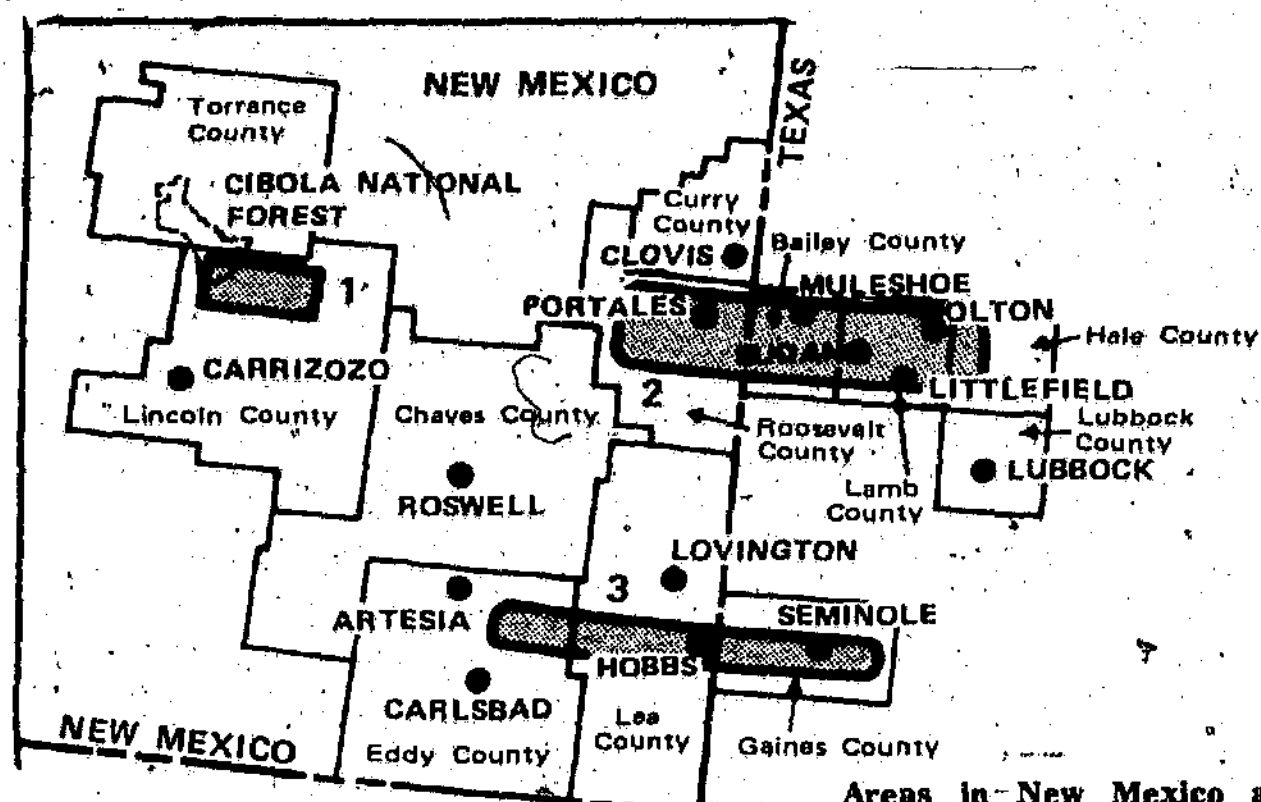

Vega Tops High Scoring Masters

Fred Vega averaged 222 in qualifying and 215 in the finals to the West Texas-New Mexico Masters Bowling Assn. tournament at Carrizozo. It was the second WT-NMBA victory for Vega, who has not bowled too much on the association's tour of the southwest. His efforts earned a \$250 check for first place.

He had only three games under 200 in 16 total games. His first two sub-200s came in the opening series of qualifying. He opened the eight game set with a 191 and a 188, but came back with games of 225, 216, 247, 208, 258 and 244 for a 1777 qualifying mark.

Joe Light, of Carrizozo, was right behind the leader in qualifying with a 1773. Thirteen Masters' bowlers averaged over 200 in an attempt to get into the finals.

Vega just nudged Light, 193-191, in the first game of the match play finals. He pulled out a 205-202 squeaker over Phil Prdiato, lost his only game of the finals to Jack Kannady 259-225, Henry Espinoza 227-204, bombed Rocky Bradley 248-181, beat Lalo Ortiz 215-195, edged Pat Brennan 204-203 and downed Light once more 203-198.

Brennan just nosed out Light for second place on the last game of the finals. While Light was losing to Vega, Brennan outlasted Kannady 233-215. Brennan had a 6-2 match game record while Light was 4-4.

Second place was worth \$150 to Brennan. Light finished third and received \$125. Ortiz was fourth and won \$119; Kannady, fifth, \$100; Bradley, sixth, \$80; Espinoza, seventh, \$70; Prieto, eighth, \$60 and Chuy Castaneda, ninth, \$30.

Kannady and Castaneda tied for the eighth and last spot for the finals and had to rolloff, which marked the first time in the three-year history of the association that one was needed. Kannady won 243-235.

The next WT-NMBA tournament will be held Jan. 11-12 at Midway Lanes in Las Cruces.

After the caroling, the girls had a Christmas party at Mrs. Spencer's home. We played games, ate all kinds of goodies and had a good time.

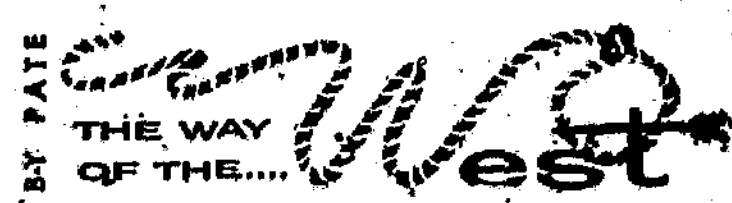

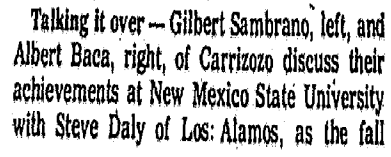

Homemaker highlights

World Sugar
There are a number of kinds of sugar — sucrose,
dextrose, levulose, and lactose to name the most
important. Of these, sucrose, which is the only
one we commonly call sugar, is obtained com-
mercially from sugarcane or sugarbeets. Sugarcane
is grown in warm climates and sugarbeets in
temperate climates. To assure themselves of at least
minimal supplies of sugar, most countries produce
one or the other and several, including the United
States, produce both.

Sucrose supplies about 85 percent of the
market in this country. Dextrose, principally in
the form of corn syrup, accounts for almost all
the remainder.

The Common Market, normally an exporter of
sugar, is expected to buy at least 2,000,000 tons in
1975 because of crops in Europe early this year
were damaged by cold weather and were further
damaged by drought later this summer — Arab
nations started buying sugar heavily in the world
market early in 1974 and by mid-year had pur-
chased over 3,000,000 tons. Since that time, fur-
ther large orders have been placed.

Per capita consumption of sugar in the U.S.
was 102 pounds in 1973 and is expected to hold at
this level despite price increases.

Basic reasons for this year's high sugar prices
(the "World" price passed the previous record 42
cents per pound in October, on its way up) are
tight domestic and world supplies, low stocks in
Canada and Japan for the first half of 1974,
buying by Middle-East nations, and uncertainty
raised by the expiration of the U. S. Sugar Act at
the end of this year.

On the supply side, although hurricane Fifi had
little effect on Central American sugarcane, best
harvests in the United Kingdom, France, and the
USSR may not be as large as originally planned.

Because of short plantings in the United States
and the adverse impact of Hurricane Carmen on
sugarcane, projected 1974 U.S. sugar output may
fall 60,000 tons short of the domestic quota
established on basis of past uses and growing
conditions. As we did last year, we would
reallocate this short-fall among foreign sources.

Of the projected deficit, some 250,000 tons is for
the Mainland area, while 200,000 tons come from
the 18 sugarbeet producing States. The remain-
der is split between Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

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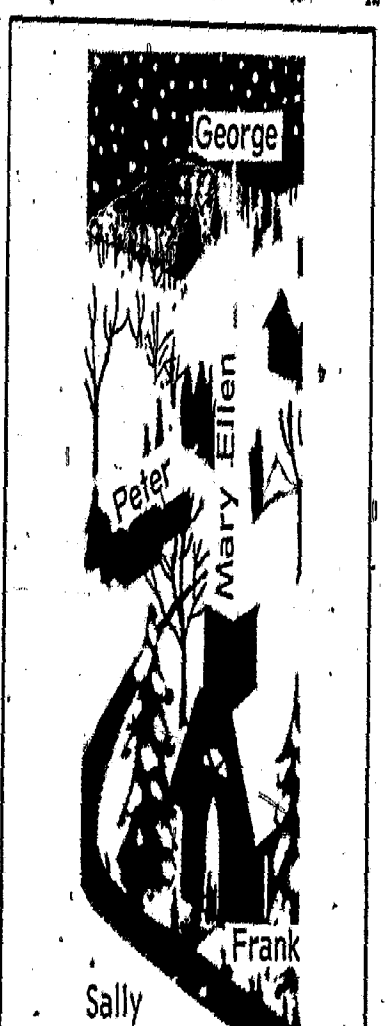

Care of plants

With so many poinsettias around town this year from the Woman's Club sale I have gotten many questions about plant care.

With good care on your part, the blooming period of holiday season plants can be extended and the plant more completely enjoyed.

When the plant arrives, check it over. If foil covers the pot, be sure a hole is punched in the bottom to allow excess water to drain.

Watering—Remember, do not overwater. Most plants are killed this way. Never water plants by rule of thumb, such as every other day, or twice a week. Plants would be checked daily and watered only when they need it.

Watering is best done by taking plants to the sink, removing pot decorations, and applying water until it drains from the bottom of the pot. Do not use softened water. It will kill your plants!

Light—All foliage and flower plants need light to keep them in good condition. Plants placed in poor light will become yellow, with spindly shoots.

Temperature—Temperatures in the home are

different than in the greenhouse. The hot dry atmosphere of most homes can shorten the life of flowering plants. To maintain holiday plants longer, select the spot where plants are cooler—65 to 68 degrees.

When you receive a poinsettia, the main thing to remember is not to chill it, especially if you bring it home yourself. Any temperature of 50 degrees or below may cause leaves to wilt and bracts to drop.

Poinsettias are easily overwatered. This is especially true if the pot is covered with decorative metal foil. Once a poinsettia is past the flowering stage, you may gradually withhold giving it water. The leaves will fall and you will have only a dormant stem left. Water it just enough to keep the stem from shriveling. Transplant it in a larger pot and increase the water in April and it will produce new shoots.

Poison control center handles variety of calls

A 15 month-old girl near Taos last year accidentally drank four ounces of wine—a toxic amount for a child that young. Downstate, outside of Silver City, a two-year-old ate seeds from the highly toxic Bird of Paradise bush. and in the Sandia foothills, a 23-year-old Albuquerque man hunting rattlesnakes found one. It bit him.

The three cases were different in terms of the victims' ages and locations. But the victims were New Mexicans and in each case their friends or relatives immediately telephoned the New Mexico Regional-Poison Control and Drug Information Center, located in the Bernalillo County Center.

The center can be reached at any hour toll-free from anywhere in the state by dialing 1-800-432-6866. Bernalillo County residents should dial 266-5503.

In its book and file-filled office in the hospital's pharmacy, the center's specially trained pharmacists were able to recommend—within minutes—emergency treatment procedures for the poisoned persons and to refer them for further treatment through private physicians and hospitals.

Now the workers at the Poison Control Center have even faster access to the most complete body of knowledge on toxic substances, and their treatments, available in the United States.

A brand new computer terminal console connecting the center with the National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Center, a part of the Federal Food and Drug Administration, in Washington, D.C. has been installed in BCMC.

With the flick of a few keys, information from around the world on more than 8000 toxic substances can be relayed instantly—day or night—

back to the Poison Control Center.

The New Mexico computer terminal and the data bank that backs it up is part of a network of 12 such centers being created across the country by the National Clearinghouse.

"This is really a huge step forward for us," said Dr. Diana Calvert, director of the Poison Control and Drug Information Center and chief of BCMC's pharmaceutical services.

"What this does essentially is enable us to have instantaneous access to information gathered from around the country on poisons and their treatments," she added.

Dr. Calvert points out that the computer terminal and its information backup system is a "great assist" to the BCMC pharmacists and medical house staff members and other, outside consultants upon whom "the program depends for its around-the-clock staffing".

"They are constantly on call and constantly of invaluable assistance," Dr. Calvert said. "Without them we couldn't even begin to operate."

In 1972, the center has an average of 10 calls a month for assistance. This past October, there were 638 such calls, half of which involved toxic substances and over 100 of which involved children under five years of age.

Dr. Calvert noted that as the Poison Control Center has become more widely known around New Mexico, more and more physicians and other professionals appear to be calling for general, non-emergency information on poisons and drugs.

The center is supported jointly by BCMC, the New Mexico Regional Medical Program and the University of New Mexico's College of Pharmacy.

Happy day here is a cranberry recipe for cranberry bread.

4C. flour 1 tsp. salt
2C. sugar 1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. baking powder

Sift together in a bowl these 5 ingredients. Put into a small bowl, juice of 2 oranges and grated rind, or (one small can of frozen orange juice, concentrated without adding water). 4 T. mazola oil and warm water to make 1 1/2 cup liquid.
