Economic development profile full of facts

The New Mexico Department of Development and Bureau of Business Research of UNM has just released a "Economic development profile of Carrizozo" based on information taken here during the past year. The volume runs 42 pages and is full of facts and figures on the town and county.

The profile is presented in 17 parts including: population and housing, labor, government, taxes, education, electric power, gas, water and sewer, transportation, industry, retailers, communications, climate, community facilities, medical and professional, civic organizations and churches, recreation and tourism.

Population: 1950 was 1,389, 1960 was 1,546, 1970 reported as 1,123. County population for same period 7,409, 7,744 and 7,560. Population is also given by age groups, the under 14 being by far the largest group, both male and female.

Home construction in last five years, four in 1970, one in 1972. Three houses reported for sale, one for rent. Utility hookups: electricity 357, water 364, gas 357, sewer 340. Housing developments, none; housing planned for future, none, retirement housing, none.

Carrizozo has experienced quite a gain in employment since this study was completed. With both hospital and Scott Industries going strong, around 50 new jobs were created. Loss of the 4 Winds cut out maybe 20 jobs. The town has a labor survey, and the school is now engaged in vocational training by industry.

Both town and county are without zoning codes, plenty of zoning studies on hand but not in force.

On the crime side -- only two assaults, one burglary and one larceny-theft reported. Ten fires reported in 1971.

Much school information is contained in the

profile. Nearest vocational training center is 15 miles, average teacher salary \$7,975, estimated cost of education per pupil per year \$1,300.

Gas, electric, water and sewer charges are listed.

Carrizozo is in good shape for transportation, six freight trains a day, 6,000 foot federally certified airport, two truck carriers, six busses a day, but no taxi service. According to the profile 65 percent of Zozo streets are paved.

New industry could get a lot of help here, such as industrial sites with all utilities available. Community is able to aid in financing industry, industrial development corp. is going concern. The climatological summary is supplied by the U. S. Weather Bureau and is detailed and complete for period of 30 years.

Carrizozo has total of 80 hotel and motel rooms available. Doctors, hospital, lawyers, ambulance, nursing home, clinic, civic clubs, churches, recreational facilities, are covered in detail.

Bus changing Schedules

Major changes in New Mexico Transportation Company bus schedules in New Mexico and West Texas were announced today by D. M. Parsons, President, to become effective January 15. The changes are in conjunction with other nationwide inter-city bus companies to conform to the requested National 55 mile per hour speed limit.

To set the scene for the old fashioned wedding, the groom and his friends arrived at the schoolhouse-horseback dressed in full cowboy gear, from the crowns of their Tom Mix hats to the spurs on the heels of their tall-topped boots. The auditorium was also lighted with window decorations of candles and wall-candles.

Extensive Training Sessions Set For Extension Agents: County Extension Agents, home economists and 4-H agents from all counties in the state will be on campus at New Mexico State University this week (Week of Jan. 14) for a series of subject matter training sessions. Participating in the training from Lincoln County will be Ralph R. Dunlap, County Extension Agent and Mary Ellen Payne, County Extension Home Economist. The intensive training is designed to inform Extension agents of the latest information in the areas of agriculture, home economics, 4-H and youth development, and community resource development. Extension Subject-matter specialists will make up a majority of the teaching faculty. County Extension faculty members will select classes from 48 course offerings.
