## Petunias and dogs discussed C of C gets vote of confidence

Forty-two people responded to a letter of invitation from Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce to attend a meeting Monday night for discussion on how to improve "your town".

First paragraph of the letter read: "Do you have pride in your town? Are you satisfied with the way Carrizozo looks? Living in Carrizozo, do you feel you are in a "rut" and seemingly cannot get out? Would you like to improve anything in your town?"

These questions were pretty well answered by comments of the largest crowd to attend a Chamber of Commerce meeting in Carrizozo in the past ten or more years.

Letters were read, one from A. N. Spencer, "I certainly agree that the town could be improved and will support the Chamber in doing so". Another from Mayor Johnson Stearns, which reads in part, "I'm for it one-hundred percent, this is my town and these are my people."

Discussion that followed was a question and answer session. Mel Clark asked, how long can cars set on streets or on a lot. No definite answer given.

Dan Wright, no question but that some prodding has to be done.

Mary Jones, Does anyone object to the Chamber going to the council and asking for enforcement of existing ordinances? No objections.

Jim Gibson, most tourists come through the main streets down town, should start renovation in that area.

Bob Stearns, I asked to bring up subject of flowers planted at intersections, preferable petunias.

Mary, the town could put on a real petunia project, use green barrels for planters, take them up when the season was over.

Dutch Cox, directed question to Howard Harkey, would the SCS help. Howard said they might with shrubs and some might be available.

Dan commented, the town gives a first impression of being a discarded place.

Wesley Lindsay, we'd better work on some of these old buildings before we plant flowers.

Johnny Johnson, there are 22 buildings on 12th and 13th that are vacant and need to be condemned.

Mrs. Marvin Roy, at one time a many was interested in tourist development of buildings on Railroad Ave. The owners said they didn't want anything done to them.

Clara Snow, we had a good cleanup drive several years ago when load after load of trash was hauled off. I've worked ten years on

cleanup, we still have lots of problems.

Jim Gibson, how about starting at one end of town and doing a block at a time.

Bill Smith, do you want a motion, Jim has the right idea. I believe in putting it in the Chamber Committee's hands and get started.

Alton Whittaker, two individuals own most of the "image" coming into town. What Mrs. Snow is trying to tell you is true.

Clara, there are dogs loose all over town, can't walk down this street without getting bit.

Dan, Bill Payne will check on legality, to see how far we can go.

Bill Payne, procedure is to send a letter to property owner, suggesting the town will tear building down at no cost to owner, if consent is not given, the town could go ahead with tear-down job and charge property owner.

Mary, the hospital has asked the Chamber to help in getting additional funds from county. The 3/4 mill levy is lost this year and hospital is asking for additional revenue sharing money. Motion made and carried that C of C does assist hospital.

Bill, commission will reinstate 3/4 mill in next budget. The town has given \$5,000 to the hospital without being asked.

Mary, Dan Wright and I went out to visit with Kelly Stephenson about road to Water Canyon. He said he would see that 25-40 acres were made available for campground - park and will give right-of-way for road to the park at Water Canyon. The I Bar X ranch would be satisfied with 3-4 strand barbed wire fence, and cost of road and fence work should run around \$6,000.00. There will be some negotiating with the Forest Service. Now all we need to do is talk with the county commissioners about the fencing and road work.

Dan, the Stephenson's want people to have the park and the right to drive to it, but it looks like they will get present road closed. The prettiest place up there is on Stephenson property.

Howard, the courthouse yard needs work real bad, will the C of C work with us. Answer, yes. Some discussion of fact that aviation gas is not available at airport for lack of allocation. Not much can be done now about this situation.

Mrs. James Freeman, is there a leash law in town, answer yes. Is there a law against open septic tanks, answer yes. Who is health officer, answer Brown Edwards at Ruidoso.

The group present at this meeting voted unanimously to back up the Chamber of Commerce in its effort to start a town cleanup and renovation.

## Payne announces candidacy for mayor

Bill Payne, Carrizozo lawyer, announced Tuesday that he will be a candidate for mayor in the upcoming city election. He will also re-seek his position as county magistrate.

"I think I can do a good job as mayor," stated Payne. "I will offer continuity to the programs now in existence because I'm familiar with them."

According to Payne, who is presently Carrizozo's city attorney, "I wouldn't be seeking this office if the present mayor (Johnson Stearns) was seeking re-election."

Increases in population and in industry are the basic goals Payne has set if elected. "I want to prevent the town from declining in population any further. I want to get more industry and people into this town so that we already here will have the basic services we need," pointed out Payne.

## County commission reinstates 3/4 mill levy for hospital

Roads, fuel, and the hospital dominated the business of the Jan. 8 meeting of the County Commissioners.

The commission decided to reinstate a 3/4 mill levy as of November, 1974. This money will be divided between Lincoln County Municipal Hospital and Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Lincoln County Hospital asked the commission for permission to buy a house and a lot near the hospital to be used for hospital staff. Because of the time factor, the commission decided to clear the matter first with the Local Government Division.

Money derived from Revenue Sharing to help finance the county's ambulance will be diverted into the Lincoln County Hospital. The hospital asked and received permission to take over the ambulance service from the county. Thus, the \$500 the County received from Revenue Sharing will now be placed in the hospital's budget.

Bob Naylor and Charlie Jones, both of Rancher Radio, met with the commission concerning the road leading to the radio tower. They claimed haulers refused to haul diesel fuel to the tower until the road was fixed. According to members of the commission, the county must first have

permission from the Forest Service before the county could work on the road. It was decided the Forest Service should be contacted before any action was taken.

Other business before the commission included:

The approval of a maintenance contract with Johnson Service Company.

The appointment of Jackie Spencer as a board member of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital.

The approval of James C. Sanchez, Paul L. Baca, and Ruby Sanchez as deputies for the County Treasurer.

The passage of an emergency fuel purchase resolution. This resolution will allow the county to purchase fuel from LaMay Distributing Co. until Jan. 1, 1976.

Bill Seelback, realtor, submitted a preliminary plat and a \$100 fee to the commission in connection with the Basin Valley Sub-Division. He noted a disclosure statement would be submitted Jan. 17 to the Planning and Zoning meeting.

The commission gave notice to bidders that bids would be accepted Feb. 5, 10 a.m., for insurance covering the county's vehicles.

Municipalities were given permission to use the county's voting machines. But, the commissioners insisted the municipalities were to use and pay the county voting machine custodian.

The next meeting of the county commissioners was set for 10 a.m. Feb. 5.

## USDA to regulate mining - prospecting

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - With more prospectors looking for new gold, copper, lead and other mineral deposits to develop, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed regulations to protect the environment when exploration or mining takes place on Department lands.

The regulation would apply to the 140 million acres of National Forest land, including wilderness; that are subject to location and entry under the U.S. mining laws of 1972.

"The search for new resources has intensified, with more pressure to dig mines deeper and to strip-mine lowgrade deposits near the surface," Assistant Secretary Robert W. Long said.

"To meet our environmental responsibilities, to clearly define the obligations and rights of mineral operators, and to insure the future productivity of renewable National Forest resources, we are proposing these regulations," Mr. Long added.

He emphasized that the proposed regulations have no effect on development of oil, gas and coal deposits, which are already regulated under the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920.

The proposed regulations would require miners and prospectors to spell out in advance how they plan to search for or develop deposits. They would have to submit a plan for restoring the surface of explored or mined areas to a natural looking state within a year or less, provided a longer period is not allowed by the government.

Miners and prospectors also would be required to post a minimum bond of \$2,000 to insure the restoration work.

At present, prospectors and miners may bulldoze an area to explore for near-surface mineral deposits or leave mine spoils, or tailings, in piles where they could runoff into streams or lakes. The Department has control over access roads to prospecting and mining sites, but can only try to persuade miners to take steps to protect the environment. The proposed regulations would require miners and prospectors to clear these operations in advance with the Department's Forest Service, and to restore areas when they have finished.

After submission of a proposed plan of operations, the Forest Service will have 30 days to approve the plan, require its modification or extend the review period for an additional 60 days. If the operation will significantly affect the quality of the environment, the operator also will be required to submit an environmental assessment to the Forest Service.

For mining and prospecting operations already in progress, a plan of operations would have to be filed within 120 days if the proposed regulations are adopted.

Miners or prospectors who objected to the decision of a forest supervisor could appeal to the regional forester, whose decision would be final.


