

Nice words said about Carrizozo



"Monkey Bars" are lot of fun for climbing, one of the new pieces of play equipment at the

In June of 1973 eleven members of the Church of the Brethren in Ohio fixed up an old school bus for a trip to their annual conference at Fresno, California. They named the bus "Dunker Wagon" commemorating their Brethren ancestors - the Dunkers.

Their trip was made without mishap until the engine started knocking bad on a Monday morning and finally stalled two miles from a small town - Carrizozo.

The rest of this story is from Messenger written by Mary Sue Rosenberger.

A state highway truck appeared, added Roy and Bruce to its load, and took them to the little town where they found a telephone and called a wrecker. It was a depressing and humbling sight to see the big Dunker Wagon strung up behind a wrecker being towed toward help at Carrizozo, New Mexico. The rest of the day was a blur of heat, blown bearing, reground connecting rods and crankshaft, unavailable parts, and mechanics who were "too busy" to work on us. Finally, though, about 5 p.m. two polite young men towed us into town and carefully parked us behind the Ford garage. They had accepted the challenge of repairing the "Hippie Bus".

So, nestled between two trees, our group began to assume a pleasant daily routine in and out of the crippled Dunker Wagon, while we waited for

parts to come from Albuquerque.

The first day's exploring and getting acquainted revealed, in order of importance: a swimming pool with showers (only 50c a day), a bowling alley (only 30c a game), the handsome managers of both of these establishments, pool tables, a variety of other interesting people, a Western Union office (into which money could be wired!), city park across the street, a grocery, hardware, department, and curio (us) store, Mexican restaurant, drug store with fee cream parlor, laundromat, post office, a 9:30 p.m. curfew, and a congenial policeman.

Our routine in Carrizozo was pleasantly varied for us by the friends we made there. Our stalwart mechanics, feeling badly, I think, about the delay in return of our parts, twice took us on outings in their own vehicles. The first was a daytime picnic at the Valley of Fires State Park in the midst of an ancient lava bed, the Mal Pais (Spanish for badlands). Among its variety of cactus and wildflowers we hiked, explored, sunned, ate lunch, sat on cactus (accidentally of course), skinned our knees on the jagged black lava rock, and generally had a marvelous day! The second was an evening wienie roast on the shore of a lovely little lake outside of town. The manager of the swimming pool took most of the group out one evening, too, to his ranch where he

entertained them by singing and playing his guitar.

Day after day, the people we met on the streets and in the shops became friendlier and more concerned about our delay, often stopping us to inquire about the progress of repairs. As one after another young man began appearing regularly at the bus to visit with our girls we began to wonder about the possibility of sabotage of our delayed parts. When questioned, our mechanics replied with a twinkle in their eyes, "Well, we have had offers!"

Sunday, we traded our sloppy blue jeans for dress clothes and paraded down Main Street to the First Baptist Church at the invitation of a woman we had met at the pool the day before.

We must have cut quite a figure filling up a row and a half in the little church in our various stages of sunburn and vacation fatigue but the people were more than kind to us. Our singing prompted the song leader to comment after one hymn, "That sounds so good this morning I think I'll go out every week and try to bring in a broken down busload of people!" That afternoon a couple from the church stopped by and offered us the use of their shower and the next day the preacher came to call. It was rumored, too, that some of the Methodists in town stopped some of our group on the street and invited them to services because they had heard that the Baptists enjoyed so much having us with them. We couldn't help but wonder if we would have been so kind and helpful to a motley crew of strangers in our midst if we had been in church services back home.

Monday some parts came in and the job of reconstructing the "Downed Dunker" began, almost round-the-clock. Finally, Wednesday morning at 7:30 after an all-night session by our two noble mechanics and Bruce, the test drive was successfully completed and we were on our way again! We had spent an unscheduled nine days, a large sum of money, and hours of worry in that little New Mexico town but in exchange had collected friends, experiences in a different life-style than that which we had left behind and a simple, relaxing good time. We wound up our month together and discussed our travels, we agreed that this experience - unplanned as it was - was the high point of the trip. As one of our wise philosophers summed it up, "There we got to know people and how they live - not just look at things."

Another interesting point about the Carrizozo town election. There was no way a newspaper could tell voters to put all their write-in votes for one candidate in one position. For instance, write Willie's name only in Position 3, and another candidate in Position 4 - because we did not know who all the write-in candidates would be, and we do not choose to show preference in such instances. However, if you were to add up total votes both Roy Harman and Willie Silva received in both positions, or add up the votes any way you like, Harman and Silva would have still won. Leandro got 51 votes in Position 3 and 36 in Position 3, not enough to win.

Three sets of eight square dancers, most from Ruidoso area, put on a nice show at the CCAPA (Carrizozo Community Association of the Performing Arts) program Friday night - almost as good as Myrtle Williams second graders. Hardly anything cuter than youngsters at their play. Proof enough that this program that beginning square dancers do not really want two bleachers full of audience, like at the CCAPA program - they wouldn't come out for a trial run. A square dance club may get going as a result of this fine program.

Melvin Romero, assistant principal in Las Cruces High School, dropped in Monday on way to Capitan. His school is having spring break. \$2650.00 in prize money Carrizozo welcomes bowling pros

The Carrizozo PBA Open Bowling Tournament will make for a lively weekend at the Country Club and Recreation Center. Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and many merchants are helping in various ways to make this weekend eventful for many of the country's best bowlers on the PBA circuit as well as many pro-am bowlers from the Carrizozo area.

Prize money in this tournament, arranged and sponsored by Carrizozo Recreation Center under the direction of Joe Light, totals \$2650.00 for the pro bowlers, which includes \$750.00 added money. The total pro-am purse is expected to run around \$1,000.00. Put it all together and it's the most prize money seen around this town in many years.

One of the most popular features of the tournament last year was the Calcutta, scheduled for 10:00 p.m. at the dance at the Country Club. The Calcutta drawing will be for the 32 professional bowlers who will be auctioned to the highest bidders during the dance.

Payne seeks second term

After talking to my many friends, I wish to announce that I will run again for County Commissioner.

After serving for a little over a year, I have become aware that it is impossible to get all things done that a commissioner would like to get done. Some of the things which we have made gains on but have not completed is the paving of Highway 37, Highway 42, and a program of improving Highway 14 to Gran Quivera.

Some of the things which I feel are of interest to the public and for which I would like to state my position on is the improved quality of our county road system. Although there is always work to be done in improving many roads, we do feel that most roads have been noticeably improved. We were fortunate in being able to secure approximately \$100,000 of new road equipment and this has enabled us to move approximately five times as much gravel and road material in an effort to improve our road system.

I have strong feelings for our hospitals and feel that we should do everything in our power to give them the necessary help they need. Due to the Attorney General's opinion in 1973, it was necessary for us to remove the 3/4 mill levy. Recent legal opinions have enabled us to go on record to the effect that the 3/4 mill levy will be reinstated with the beginning of the new fiscal year, July 1, 1974. I would hope it may be possible for us to assist both hospitals through some other area, possibly through Revenue Sharing.

Presently we are in the process of obtaining a water system in the historic site of Lincoln. I feel very optimistic that this will be finalized in the very near future.

The 1973 New Mexico Legislature required all counties to institute their own subdivision regulations and meet the minimum state

guidelines. Although this presented quite a hardship on the commissioners, workable subdivision regulations were developed which met the state requirements. I feel that the regulations are good but will become better with



revisions which will be made periodically. Due to our increased operations, our increased subdivision areas and with the big increase in cost in 1973-74, it has been increasingly difficult to live within our budget that was formulated in early 1973 and approved in June 1973. Another interesting matter is the fact that the State Legislature has now set the salary of elected officials at \$12,000 per year and each commissioner will receive \$3600 per year. This will become effective January 1975. Regarding taxes I would like to point out that your tax is very near 20 mills whereas the state receives this 20 and returns to the county approximately 1/2 with certain restrictions attached. The only tax that stays 100 percent in the county is the hospital 3/4 mill levy. In lieu of the 3/4 mill levy, the county furnished approximately \$25,000 to offset this temporary loss.


During 1973-74 we, as commissioners, have had several requests to close roads. I am opposed to closing any road that leads to the forest. I feel that the main attraction in our area is the climate and mountains which attracts many tourists. I feel that more access roads to forest lands and campsites should be developed. In closing, numerous projects are still in the preliminary stage. Again, thank you for the opportunity in allowing me to be a part of your community. May I say it has been a privilege to serve as your commissioner in District 2. I will appreciate your consideration and approval to serve you for the next two years.




