Bowling tournament rated terrific

Joe Light keeps the big money at home by winning the PBA Open

In many ways the Carrizozo PBA Open Bowling Tournament concluded last Sunday at 5:00 p.m. was rated terrific by the people at the Calcutta, professional bowlers in the tournament, and a great many spectators who were in the Recreation Center during the action.

In one very special way this tournament, sponsored and managed largely by Joe Light, was terrific to the home folks -- Joe won first place money of \$750.00 with a total pin score of 4667, 94 pins higher than Butch Gearhart who was last year's winner and took second this year.

To start off this weekend of bowling action and entertainment for 32 visiting pinmen coming from Houston, Carlsbad, El Paso, Dallas, Farmington, Alamogordo, Ruidoso, Las Cruces, Albuquerque, Midland, Roswell, and Aztec, a social hour followed by dance and then about 10:00 p.m. the Calcutta was held at the Country Club.

Last year the Calcutta total \$900.00, as the amount bid on all the bowlers. This year the bidding was really active and the total money was \$2850.00, Butch Gearhart selling for \$475 as the highest. The evening at the Country Club was exciting all the way and enjoyable for visitors and the home folks.

The Pro-Am part of the tournament was largely a home town affair with Barney Baca scoring 1291 to win the \$250.00 first-prize money, followed by Mary Means, Dale LaMay, and Juanita Vallejos.

The pro bowlers started qualifying rounds Saturday morning, rolled eight games that day and four more Sunday morning. Butch Gearhart of Houston was the leader after eight games with 1826 plus 226, followed by Joe Light of Carrizozo at 1769 plus 168, then Lionel Jordan of Carlsbad 1760 plus 160, Chuy Castaneda of El Paso 1737 plus 137, Fred Vega of Carrizozo 1725 plus 125, Jim Melton of Dallas 1717 plus 117, Phil Prieto of El Paso 1706 plus 106, Larry Thompson of Houston 1689 plus 89, Cecil Caddel of Dallas 1678 plus 78 and Tito Fernandez of Albuquerque 1671 plus 71.

After twelve games Sunday the leader was Pat Brownfield of 263 over, Joe Light was second 235 over, Lionel Jordan 232 over and Butch Gearhart 224 over.

When the eight-game series for the cash money started Sunday, Joe Light had the hot hand all the way -- he never lost a game and wound up with 4427 pins plus bonus of 240 and total of 4667 to win first money of \$750.00.

Lincoln preservation planned

Keep it the way it was

A Plan for Preservation and Growth was created as a comprehensive, long range, guide for restoration and maintenance of the town which was the focal point of the Lincoln County War of 1878-1881. The study is the first of its kind, addressing itself to Lincoln's history, environment and architectural aesthetic in considering an approach to protecting and preserving the town's identity and character.

Acting as historic preservation officer for the state, Mr. David King initiated the study in 1972, in cooperation with Mrs. Dessie Sawyer, who has been the chairman of the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission for 25 years. "It was my feeling at the time," Mr. King said, "that a town with the historical significance of Lincoln should have available to it, the information necessary to help maintain its sense of identity where growth is a real possibility. This plan is a service to the members of Lincoln, to be used as they see fit."

Of the 64 people that live in Lincoln, approximately 50 were in attendance at the commission meeting when David King presented the book, A Plan for Preservation and Growth, to the 10 committee members.

The committee members are Bill Payne, Chairman; Ophelia Salas, Maurildia Perry, Al Bookey, Bert Pfingston, Florence Racher, Walter Henn, and Arnold Dockery.

After the presentation Mr. King commented, "this is the first step in a long journey." He also asked for the help of the community to keep their goal in view and if the committee got sidetracked, "hit them over the head with a tire tool."

In preparing the study, State Planning Office staff members relied heavily on the community input to determine which plans of action would be most suitable to Lincoln. Residents were also invaluable in assisting researchers with information of building structures which had long

since deteriorated, and in some cases where only foundations remain today.

Funding for the study came from the State Planning office, U.S. Parks Service, Four Corners Regional Commission, and the Department of Development. Total cost of the plan including publication was \$14,000.

Many of the structures in Lincoln are owned by the state as well as private citizens. In funding future restoration, Mr. King has made it clear that the state structures will in no way take president over privately owned dwellings. "We plan to apply for the funds just like anyone else," Mr. King said, pointing out, "The monies will be designated on the merits of the request."

King emphasized that requests for funds will be handled by the county appointed historical styles committee and not by a state agency.

The state is currently applying for a federal matching grant to begin implementation of the plan. With the matching grant the government would give a person a certain amount of money with the specification that the receiver would have to match the amount with money and or labor.



Paul Pacheco Seeks reelection to commission

In making my candidacy for re-election as County Commissioner of District one a matter of public record let me review some of the highlights of past year.

Lincoln County has now entered into Class C category. No longer are we to be considered one of the small counties. Along with the throes of growing pains have come the demands for additional services.

It became apparent after the first few weeks that the job of administering the business of the county on a day-to-day basis is imperative. With this in mind the Board of County Commissioners after considerable deliberation hired a county manager. In this selection we were fortunate to find someone with qualifications that exceeded our expectations. It was also gratifying to fill this position with one of our county residents.

One of the developments that has brought forth strong responses have been the division regulations. Lincoln County has adopted regulations that concur with the Act passed by the legislature and is now law. It is a sincere belief on my part that the subdivision regulations, though not perfect, will ultimately benefit our entire State for decades to come.

All of us are aware of the reappraisal program and the problems which have affected each and every county as a result. The transition has not been easy for our county. It is also well to remember that whatever the undertaking the results are no better than the effort and input that goes into it. In this respect I would like to mention that in our county, reappraisal was already a fact before the present Board of County Commissioners took office.

In closing let me compliment the Planning and Zoning Committee for the interest they have shown in a trying and hard task which is assigned to them. To the road Department I would like to impart the good feeling of a job well done.

Lottery numbers drawn March 20

Young men born in 1955 will have their Selective Service lottery numbers drawn on March 20, even though there is no draft or plans to resume callups for involuntary military service, Colonel John P. Jolly, State Director of Selective Service for New Mexico announced today.

The sixth annual Selective Service lottery drawing for the nation's young men who become 19 years of age during 1974 will be held in Washington, D.C. on that date.

"The President has been successful in bringing peace to America but both he and the Congress recognize the need to maintain a strong defense capability in order to insure continued peace," Colonel Jolly said. "The present 'standby' Selective Service System, which continues to register and classify young men, is a vital part of our defense preparedness program."

New Mexico has approximately 10,000 19 year olds who will have their lottery numbers established by this drawing, according to Colonel Jolly.

The Military Selective Service Act requires all young men to register with the System at the time of their 18th birthday. They are assigned their Random Sequence Number through the lottery which is held during the year in which they become 19 years of age. They are potentially vulnerable to induction throughout the calendar year of their 20th birthday; thereafter each year, they are placed in a lower priority selection group.


As a result of the lottery numbers which are drawn, some of the young men born in 1955 will be placed in a class available for military service by their local boards. This group will form a standby pool of "readily inductible" men during calendar year 1975. This pool would be available to supplement the all-volunteer armed forces in the event of a national emergency. The President's induction authority would have to be restored by the Congress before these young men could be inducted. The Defense Department has issued no calls for draftees since December 1972.

The lottery is conducted in the following manner: Two plexiglass drums are placed on the stage. Capsules containing the 365 dates of the year are placed in done drum in a random manner. Both sets of capsules will be thoroughly mixed.

In reminding New Mexico's young men that penalties for failing to register can range to as much as five years' imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000, or both, Colonel Jolly said that Selective Service has provided ways which enable men to register with minimum inconvenience.

"Volunteer registrars, many of whom are located in high schools, have been appointed in areas where there are no local board offices," he reported. "In areas not covered by a registrar or a local board site, we plan to initiate a mail-in registration program in March. Forms will be available from colorful poster displays to be placed in such locations as Post Offices and banks."

Trout stamps in April 1

SANTA FE, N.M. - Trout stamps, junior-senior licenses and licensing 12- and 13-year-olds mark the main changes for New Mexico's 1974-75 fishing license year, which begins April 1.

The changes, instituted by the 1973 Legislature, also include a new system of paying license vendors' fees. Trout stamps, required April 1 for fishing in trout streams and lakes, cost \$3.00 if they are to be attached to: 1 \$12.00 residents-only general hunting and fishing license; a \$5.50 resident, year-round fishing license or a \$10 nonresident, year-round fishing license.

A \$1.00 trout stamp can be affixed to: the \$1.00, residents-only junior-senior fishing license; the \$2.00 resident or nonresident one-day fishing license; the \$5.25 five-day, nonresidents-only fishing permit.

The \$1.00 junior-senior fishing license can be purchased by resident anglers who are 12 or 13 years old or who are 65 years old or older. Non-residents 12 or 13 years old or 65 or older must purchase regular, nonresident fishing licenses.

The Fisheries Division of the Department of Game and Fish emphasized that the only legally unlicensed anglers are those who have not reached their twelfth birthday at the time of purchase.

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

 L. Gov. Roberto Mondragon, 33, of Nambé, Santa Fe County, announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for the U.S. House in Northern District 1. Mondragon had no announced Democratic opposition. He is set to oppose U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque Republican, Nov. 5.

The State Republican Central Committee voted last night to change its rules so Murray Ryan of Silver City can stay on as New Mexico GOP chairman and seek reelection to the State House.

Ryan will try for a fourth term. He represents all of Sierra and part of Grant Counties.

Sen. Conway was named to the interim Legislative Insurance Study Committee. Sen. Ray Leger, D-Guadalupe-DeBaca-San Miguel, was placed on the Health and Aging Study Committee. Leger replaced governor-running Sen. Jerry Apodaca, D-Las Cruces.

Reps. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, and Dan Barry, D-Eunice, were picked on the host committee of the National Legislative Conference expected to attract 3,000 to Albuquerque in August.

Governor-running Sen. Odis Echols, D-Clovis, resigned as chairman of the Health-Aging Committee, but Echols remained on the committee.

Results of a \$14,000 Town of Lincoln restoration study were presented Saturday (March 16) by State Planning Officer David King to a 10-member Lincoln citizens advisory committee.

Two thousand copies of a report, "Lincoln, New Mexico, A Plan for Preservation and Growth," were printed. State brass said Lincoln citizens will make decisions on restoration of the historic town. Mrs. Dessie Sawyer, Crossroads, Lea County, cooperated in the venture as chairman of the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission. Federal planning funds are sought.

The Highway Commission will open bids Friday (March 22) to build a bridge over Carrizo Creek 15 miles south of Clayton on NM-18 in Union County.

U. S. Sen. Joe Montoya urged a Senate subcommittee to approve \$2.5 million for construction on Los Esteros Dam project near Santa Rosa in fiscal 1974-75.

State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo approved a liquor license ownership transfer at Jal from Don Lee Gillit, doing business as Cactus Bar, to Elias Garcia. Price was \$29,000 for the permit, two lots, stock and other items.

SANTA FE — State brass decided in a quiet meeting property tax ceding with a \$2.5 million impact can be used one more year.

But a 1974 property tax law amendment requires this procedure to boost school local revenue. School budget forms were revamped to reflect the change. Cities and school districts will enter formal ceding contracts. State approval of agreements must be obtained.

The new property tax code will wipe out ceding next Jan. 1. But it can be legally used in fiscal 1974-75, beginning July 1. Seventy-one of 88 school districts apply ceding -- a swap of up to 2.25 mills of property tax that adds dollars to school districts' revenue.

Ceding added these amounts in the current year: Animas, \$11,033; Belen, \$113,426; Bernalillo, \$32,045; Capitan, \$15,179; Carrizozo, \$7,826; Clayton, \$22,473; Corona, \$22,456; Cuba, \$15,237; Des Moines, \$6,845.

Also, Eunice, \$99,723; Fort Sumner, \$18,189; Grady, \$7,655; Hondo, \$9,631; House, \$4,816; Jal, \$88,359; Jemez Springs, \$44,442; Los Lunas, \$49,575; Maxwell, \$3,369; Melrose, \$13,716; Ojo Caliente, \$18,304.

Questa, \$29,936; Penasco, \$3,730; Raton, \$7,239; Santa Rosa, \$17,744; Springer, \$8,594; Taos, \$21,394; Tatum, \$93,437; Texico, \$12,185, and Vaughn, \$7,434.

Among school districts not using ceding are Truth or Consequences, Cimarron, Clovis, Deming, Lordsburg and Ruidoso. After fiscal 1974-75 a method must be found to replace the \$2.5 million lost to the 71 districts.

Sen. John Conway, R-Alamogordo, seeks reelection in a district of all of Lincoln and part of Otero Counties. Reportedly, Alamogordo Democrat Rolla Buck will seek the primary nomination to oppose Conway in the main event Nov. 5. Buck is a former Otero County Democratic chairman and retired State Corporation Commission employee. Conway is Senate GOP leader.

A statewide political committee, good government, was formed by conservatives to push for fiscal responsibility in the legislature. Santa Fean Peter Hanagan said the nonpartisan committee believes in limited government.

Hanagan said: "Profit is not a dirty word. The state should not spend money it doesn't have." Among initial committee directors are ex-State Rep. George Blocker, Jal; Les Davis, Cimarron; W. R. Nicks, Springer, and Reuben Pankey, Truth or Consequences.

The influential Legislative Finance Committee voted narrowly 4-3 not to file a suit challenging constitutionality of some of Gov. Bruce King's partial vetoes of the General Appropriations Act.

LFC Chairman C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, strongly supported court action. Trujillo is a state senator representing Taos, Mora and San Miguel Counties. The LFC whacked King's vetoes of contingency language -- language effecting appropriations only if expected federal money is received by a state agency, for example. The purpose is control over state spending.



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
