
Candidate for state office



Plant Trees Anytime Now: Besides adding beauty, trees cut energy costs, purify air, collect dust and cut down noise. Trees also cool air temperatures during a hot day. Plant trees

anytime in March or April.

Trees use carbon dioxide in air and return oxygen. They trap dust and other particles of matter people shouldn't breathe. And trees filter out unwelcome light and noise associated with more people living in an area. Under a shade tree the air temperature is 10 to 20 degrees F. cooler than surrounding air. When trees are placed so they shade a home, the inside temperature is lowered.

Generally, trees properly placed around the house will shorten the time by 60 percent when summer temperatures inside the home rise above 75 degrees F. With trees, the temperature inside the home will usually stay about 75 degrees F. for only four hours instead of ten.





Bank does well

 As one graduate student publication recently noted, the ripples "have spread far beyond the banks of the Potomac" and even before "Watergate," polls showed the public becoming increasingly disenchanted with its leaders in all areas. We face a progressive erosion of trust

The political and other ills which led to this erosion are beyond the scope of one corporation's annual report, but large enough for every member of our society to share. Long before Watergate, too many of us had come to tacitly accept or even wink at less than the highest standards of conduct on the part of our public officials. Long before inflation broke loose again in 1973, too many of us had come to accept inflation as an easy expedient, a way to have and consume more than we were prepared to store up or produce. In the hard choice between less inflation and more unemployment, few worried about preserving the value of the dollar.

This is not to say that government and business are without blame. There have been mistakes in both, honest and otherwise, and we all suffer from them. But more fundamentally,

we suffer from our own. Our greatest failures stem from a lack of understanding among the majority of our citizens, and a reluctance among those who might improve it to accept the risks of public argument - or the perils of personal criticism to which opinion leaders are subjected. The Congress has failed to assert the leadership which it was designed to provide in our political system. Business has failed to provide public leadership proportionate to its economic power. We all have been too preoccupied with our own interests to undertake the uniquely difficult and often unrewarding task of studios appraisal and critical comment on public issues. For that we will suffer. Government will be less respected, and business will be subjected to legislative harassment, served-up as a palliative to the public's disenchantment.

In our annual report two years ago, we said that the monetary crisis of 1971 "stemmed from a simple human weakness in all mankind." The human desire of something for nothing is always lamentable, but less so than the irresponsibility of those in government, labor and business who pretend to offer or accept credit for what they know to be largely illusory gains. Government benefits, increased wages and corporate profits are not up as much as they seem to be. Our own corporation's gains in earnings per share that we cited a moment ago were in part less real than apparent. If our five-year compound annual growth rate were "corrected" for inflation by simply using the government's standard GNP-price deflator the rate of gain would be 7.6 percent rather than 12.6 percent.

This of course, is not a perfectly true picture. Our buildings, for example, are depreciated on the books each year, though, as a result of inflation, they may be increasing in market value. But the obvious difference in real and apparent growth rates at least illustrates the point. We set it out because the sooner we all begin to make this distinction and think in terms of what it takes to generate real growth, the sooner we will have more of it and less inflation.

The energy crisis is a case in point. A part of the blame for our present energy shortage is now being placed on the oil companies for not developing greater domestic petroleum reserves. Yet for years those companies have been unable to sell their products in our domestic market at prices sufficient to stimulate adequate additional production. Incentives for developing new domestic oil and gas reserves were inadequate, and even those incentives were under constant attack. Populists assailed the oil depletion allowance, which they saw as an unwarranted tax shelter rather than as a stimulus to more exploration and drilling. Environmentalists stilled new refineries, off-shore wells, pipelines, and the development of the North Slope. Various agencies of government regulated prices at the well head, in interstate commerce, and in recent years even at the corner filling station.

The folly of all this was bound to lead to future shortages, but now that the day of reckoning has been thrust upon us by unexpected developments beyond anyone's control, we blame the oil companies for being unable to immediately expand domestic production and thus continue to provide the plentiful, low-cost fuel supplies we had long enjoyed in ever-increasing quantities at their expense. For until recently, the replacement cost of a barrel of domestic crude has been going up much faster than the selling price. Thus, after deducting the cost of replacing their reserves used up during the past decade, these companies' real profits on their domestic operations have been substantially less than reported under the standard accounting rules, which base depreciation on historical rather than replacement costs.

Steel, paper and other basic industries have fared little better. That any inadequately profitable business has difficulty attracting new equity capital to increase production is abundantly clear in the present shortages of many previously plentiful goods. Long before the events of 1973 precipitated an energy crisis around the world, few listened to or believed the repeated warnings of the energy producers. Now we see that there was indeed cause for concern, but few of us recognize our own failure to heed the energy producers' warnings. The public instead blames them for being diverted to more profitable foreign fields; and urges the government to regulate and tax them in ways that won't produce another erg of energy and may even discourage the urgently needed ex-

Watergate, inflation and the energy crisis are unfortunate enough in themselves. Yet their worst effects may prove to be in generating popular support for legislative measures that will work greater and more lasting harm. Pension and tax reform measures now pending in the Congress are examples of the kind of legislation that will be aimed at the business establishment and attract more popular support than heretofore.

In these respects, 1973 was not a good year, and 1974 may not be the kind that serves to dispel disenchantment if the present economic consensus proves correct. The shortage of supply in raw materials and various products which presently affects the U. S. economy may turn into an unexpected shortage of demand later in the year. The gross national product may grow less than in recent years in real terms, with perhaps somewhat less inflation than in 1973 but more unemployment.

Other countries have their own difficulties, and many might well envy the U. S. its problems. The energy crisis, which is seen as a temporary catastrophe here in comparison to a virtual indigenous energy sources, England, beset by strikes and a protracted slowdown in coal production, is suffering severe economic displacements, and the rest of Western Europe is far more seriously affected than we. Inflation, unemployment, and even political scandals are not unique unto the United States. In fact, our foreign friends feel that the events of 1973 which have so distressed us here at home are not nearly so disastrous for us as we ourselves seem to think.

Surely they won't be, if we do not make our future a prisoner to our past mistakes. For this remains a great country. Its greatest strengths are in the resiliency of its people and institutions to surmount such difficulties and work out common-sense solutions. Give us the thought and calm reflection to call them forth.

For our own part, we are determined to make 1974 more productive for First Chicago and all that it serves, in the U. S. economy and those of other countries around the world. Although the economic and political environment may be more challenging, your corporation's growing strengths are set for the task, with the brightest and most creative organization in its 110-year history. We who work for First Chicago are proud of the stewardship you have placed in us.
