Council OKs Zoning report

In February of 1973 Kenneth W. Larsen & Associates completed the preliminary draft of Comprehensive Planning Report of the Town of Carrizozo, labeled Phase Report no. 1. At a special meeting Monday the Carrizozo Town Council gave a "go ahead" sign to having Phase 11 Report completed by the Larsen firm. This report will include zoning laws for the town. Financing for Report no. 1 came from the Town and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Town will pay \$750 and the State Planning Office \$2250 on the Phase 11 Report. Larsen was present at the meeting.

Skeen pledges performance as Governor

Joe Skeen, candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, Thursday pledged to return a performance-oriented administration to New Mexico if elected governor. Speaking at the luncheon meeting of the Duke City Exchange Club at the Sundowner, Skeen said he would reduce boards, commissions and committees appointed to oversee the operations of a wide variety of business, professional and service operation. In addition, Skeen said "In my administration the governor will reassume the compilation of the state budget." "I also will make the State Highway Dept. once more a unit of our government responsible to someone.

Lincoln County does not have quite as many candidates as does the Albuquerque mayor race but there are more contests than normal for county offices in the 1974 election.

The June 4 primary election took on some meaning Tuesday when contestants on the Democratic ticket developed in Commissioner District 3 where John R. Harrelson and W. A. Hart, both of Ruidoso, will take their case to the voters.

The Probate Judge race will be about like the fourth go at Ruidoso Downs because this one is loaded. George P. White of Ruidoso, Ramon S. Luna of Carrizozo, John W. Thompson of Ruidoso and Amelita Jenkins of Capitan all filed as candidates which pretty well spreads the county. By the time the primary is out of the way, Lincoln County people may know who they want for sheriff the next two years. Bill Elliott and Haskell Lee Graham of Ruidoso both filed on the Democratic ticket.

County magistrates in all three districts get a free ride this year. B. G. Payton in No. 1, Gertrude A. Huey in No. 2 and A. A. Pritchett in No. 3 have no opposition in either primary or general. All three are Democrats.

Roman Nunez for commissioner in District 1, Carl Jorren for county assessor, Emmeline W. Beck for county treasurer complete the Democratic ticket.

Republican voting in the primary election will have choices to make in three offices. Don B. Stark and Paul Pacheco filed for commissioner in District 1. J. O. Payne and Michael H. Hernandez are unopposed in the other two commissioner districts.

L. Warren Tucker and Veta Tadlock Allen will make a race for the county treasurer office. Alfred Leroy Montes and Leandro Vega Jr. are both going for county sheriff.

Clerk Barbara Lovelace has no opposition in either primary or general. Assessor Julia Samora is unopposed in the primary, then will lock horns with Democrat Carl Jorren in the general.

A total of 25 candidates filed for office in Lincoln County.

Three bowling records set here

Joe won Association championship

The Alamogordo Bowling Association 21st Annual Championship doubles and singles matches were held at the Carrizozo Recreation Center over the past weekend with center manager Joe Light winning both the singles and high scratch all-events.

The Association includes two lanes in Alamogordo, Holloman AFB, Ruidoso and Carrizozo.

Fred Vega of Carrizozo rolled his second 300 game in a week to set the first record in the Association tournament. This is the first 300 game bowled in the Association championship matches in 21 years.

Joe Light set the second record with a high scratch singles score of 778, which won him the championship. Larry Coleman was second at 700, Ben Gutierrez from Ruidoso was third at 697 and Jeff VonRosenberg fourth at 680 in the singles.

The third record was also set by Joe Light with a 2085 score in the scratch all-events competition.

Bob Newton paired with Joe Chizmadia to win the doubles with score of 1382. Artie Ortiz and Fred Vega were second at 1341, Rusty Howell and J. B. Blaylock third at 1329, Dale LaMay and Joe Light fourth at 1314.

Any league member at the five lanes is eligible to bowl in the Association tournament.

Carrizozo bowlers will see action next at the state tournament in Santa Fe April 20-21. Three teams will make the trip.

Tularosa girls and Socorro boys stack up points in Zozo Relays

The town of Carrizozo was full of a lot of strange faces, strange uniforms, and satchels being carried around by tracksters and bowlers, both male and female last Saturday. It was the day for the annual Grizzly Relays plus a bowling tournament. This year the relays included both boys and girls teams which nearly doubled the attendance.

Tularosa girls amassed 98 points to win their part of the meet with firsts in the high jump; shot put, 80-yard low hurdles, 50-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash; 880-yard relay; 880-yard run, and standing broad jump. 
Youth Choir in Albuquerque

DEBATE STILL RAGES OVER MYSTERIOUS MOON NUGGETS

 Washington—Some superstitious people once believed that witches could call down a vapor from the moon for use in their incantations. Something far more solid than Hecate's "vaporous drop" may indeed have reached earth from the moon.
 Many scientists believe that tektites—small blobs of black or green glassy material—splashed to earth about a million years ago when a huge meteorite struck the moon, forming the crater Tycho.
 The friction of the impact and of their fall through the atmosphere heated and shaped the fragments that reached earth.

Assume Many Shapes
 Tektites usually weigh from a fraction of an ounce to a pound. They sometimes appear in symmetric shapes such as spheres, teardrops, dumbbells, and disks.
 The nuggets of moon matter have been found in Southeast Asia, Australia, the Ivory Coast, Czechoslovakia, and the United States. Some of the nodules have been found on the ocean floor, the National Geographic Society says.
 Cave men supposedly tipped their weapons with tektites, and Australian aborigines used them for slingshot ammunition.
 Dr. Dean Chapman, chief of the Thermo and Gas Dynamics Division at Ames Research Center, near San Francisco, believes the tektites found in Australia probably were melted on their way through earth's atmosphere about 700,000 years ago.
 "We know how fast they were traveling by the way they have melted," says Dr. Chapman. "And by their distribution on earth—we can calculate their trajectories."
 "All this points squarely toward the southern part of the moon for their origin, and Tycho fits exactly. We believe it is a relatively young crater, about the same age as the Australian tektites, because its rays have not yet eroded away."
 Many Dispute Theory
 Not all scientists agree that tektites originated on the moon. Some suggest that they were gouged from the earth by meteors. Others think they are melted fragments of the earth's crust that were catapulted into orbit by a meteorite impact and have since returned to earth.
 One investigator suggested that a comet head collided with the earth, exploding with the energy of a half-million hydrogen bombs. Bits of melted earth materials—tektites—would have been scattered over large areas by the impact.

Walter B. Jones

Mr. Walter B. Jones, 89, Roswell passed away the first part of March. Rev. Austin H. Dillion of the First Methodist Church and Rev. David Moore of the First Baptist Church presided at funeral services in Ballard Chapel. Mr. Jones died on Tuesday in St. Mary's Hospital of natural causes following a lengthy illness.
 Burial was Thursday at the South Park Cemetery with Masonic graveside services. Vocal selections were rendered by Ralph Kaler.
 Mr. Jones was a retired rancher. He was born to Charlie B. and Mattie J. Jones. He came to New Mexico in 1898 with his family and settled near Capitan, where his family ranched. He went to school at Angus. He and Floyd Skinner attended that school at the same time.
 In 1909 he and his brother, the late R.B. Jones moved to Roswell where they operated the Star Livery Stable. On August 3, 1909 he married Essie Porter of Roswell who survives him.
 Mr. Jones had been a resident of Roswell and New Mexico 76 years. He ranched west of Roswell on Pine Lodge Road until his retirement in 1968. He was a member of Roswell Lodge No. 18 AF and AM of the York Rite, the Ballut Abayad Shrine and the Order of the Eastern Star. He was also a member of the Cattle Growers Association, The New Mexico Angus Association and the First Methodist Church in Uvalde.
 Other survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Nell B. Doolin of Roswell; a son, Charlie A. Jones of Capitan; four grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.
 Pallbearers were Bill Ball, Buster Bronson Corn, Bob Naylor, and Francis Owen.

SCMRA meeting report

Ag service center to locate in Capitan

The South Central Mountain Resource Area met March 12, at the Recreation Center at Carrizozo with Bill Gallacher presiding in the absence of Vice-Chairman Bill Gage. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as mailed.

Financial report: Lincoln County Commissioners gave \$450 toward the salary of the secretary in Carrizozo. Otero County will also give that amount to keep the secretary.

Postage was discussed and the regular method will be utilized for the foreseeable future.

It has been proposed and endorsed by SCMRA that the State Agricultural Service Center be located in Capitan in the old Forest Service Building. The office of SCMRA will remain in Carrizozo.

Five new project proposals were discussed for presentation to the Steering Committee. See Steering Committee report.

There was a discussion on game enclosures. A plan has been drawn up and presented to the State Park Director. This all depends on the availability of adequate financing. Mr. Abercrombie discussed:

1. It is now time for making plans for the 1975 meetings.
2. It is also time for project measure review active, and completed.
3. Discussed the combination of the two resource areas - the SCMRA and SENMRC&D. Mr. Buck Brinneman of SENMRC&D gave the advantages and disadvantages of merger. He told of his experience with RC&D funded projects in New Mexico.
4. The Lincoln water system was discussed; it will require more financial aid.

The next meeting will be in Ruidoso April 30th. The meeting adjourned for lunch.

The Steering Committee session started after lunch.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved with one correction.

The guest speaker, Mrs. Jarratt of Ruidoso, spoke on senior citizens activities of Lincoln County. There will be five satellite areas out of Ruidoso for the Lincoln County Senior Citizens group. All people 55 and over are eligible for membership. There are no dues. This project is funded with 75 percent coming from a grant through Title III and the remainder being financed by a sponsoring party which is Ruidoso.

A building is under construction. The county helped with the cost. Presently the group is using a donated building for its activities. There is a nine member committee of which Mr. Nunez is chairman. Since this organization was formed in October of 1973, 1592 persons have used this facility. A breakdown of available persons over 55 who are eligible to take part in the organization within the county are: Capitan and Lincoln: 148; Carrizozo-250; Corona-84; Hondo Valley-218; Ruidoso Downs-117; Ruidoso-554. There are three main areas of service offered: recreational information and referral, adult education and transportation. At present there is a need for help with the transportation problem. It is interesting to note that the Lincoln County Senior Citizens was the first project of this type in the state to be approved for funding.

The executive Committee report was given by Bill Gallacher in the absence of Mr. Gage.

A discussion was held on the joining of the SCMRA and SENMRC&D. Mr. Buck Brinneman of the SENMRC&D gave the advantages and

disadvantages of the merger. The primary advantage would be the cost-sharing source of monetary assistance. Mr. Bell spoke on the purpose of SCMRA and the advantages and disadvantages of joining together. There will be a vote on this June 25th at the annual meeting.

Mr. Abercrombie explained the purpose of the new Agricultural Service Center and which agencies would be housed under one roof. It has been proposed and endorsed to have the center located in Capitan.

The following were submitted as new proposals:

1. Mrs. Lyda Haynes presented a proposal for returning Smokey Bear to Capitan for burial. This carried as PM-131.
2. Mr. Chevo Baca requested technical assistance for formulating a plan for improving the Carrizozo Catholic cemetery. Mr. Bell moved, Mr. Lueras seconded and it carried as PM-132.
3. The Carrizozo NRCD requested assistance in the relaxation of present standards in predator control. Mr. Harman motioned, seconded by Bell, and carried as PM-133.
4. The Carrizozo NRCD requested assistance in getting a water study of quantity and quality for their district. This carried as PM-134.
5. The Carrizozo NRCD requested assistance and monitoring of atomic waste disposal in this region. A motion was made by Gallacher, seconded by Bell, and carried as PM-135.

Mr. Hayden from Orogrande spoke on the problems of the Sacramento River Pipeline of 42 miles. The cost of repair would be estimated at \$80 to \$90 thousand dollars. He will present this as a project proposal at our next meeting.

Audean Davis, representative of Congressman Runnels, reported that he is working on the energy problems. He will be back in New Mexico soon. His offices are in Lovington and Las Cruces.

Progress on project measures is as follows: PM-67: Lincoln Water: There is a need for \$20-30 thousand more than was obtained. Four-Corners will be contacted for funding.

PM-118: Carrizozo Cemetery Ownership: A deed was turned over to the city commission.

PM-122: Horizontal Well Drilling: Seeking funding (Otero County).

PM-126: First Aid Training: This was held in Capitan with eleven taking the course.

PM-90: Capitan Park: The Womens Club and town council are working on this. Leveling and filling have begun.

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Tom McCalmont of the State Planning Office gave a brief report of the legislative session:

1. State Aid to recreation - 50 percent matching grant defeated.
2. Water supply construction act: Money will be available.
3. Indian Divide Rest Area: Plans are now being drawn up - preliminary plans were sent to the Highway Commissioner in Hobbs.

Mr. Bell reported on the Pinon pipeline: 50 percent funding was obtained from Great Plains. Fifty percent more is needed. This is a \$300,000 project and funding is still being sought. Eleven miles of 3" plastic pipeline is required. He said that the Great Plains conservation project will be over in July of this year.

Our annual meeting will be in June at which time new officers will be elected Bill Gallacher named nominating committee: Bob Bell, Bud Bagley, and Bill Stephenson. The meeting adjourned at 3:30 p. m.

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'ROUND THE CAPITOL

ALBUQUERQUE--The New Mexico Democratic party called for a return to primary nominating conventions despite opposition from Lea County delegate Bob Ward.

Ward told the state party platform convention the pre-primary nominating convention was unpopular. It was in use in 1960 and 1966. Candidate nominating petitions in 1974 for the first time this year are generating waves of complaints.

Ernest Rondeau of Eunice fought successfully to table a plank calling on the U.S. to supply Israel with non-nuclear arms necessary to defend itself. The plank said the purpose of U.S. aid is also to maintain a balance of arms between combatant countries.

Rondeau is a Eunice High School government and social studies teacher. He moved to New Mexico from Massachusetts about three years ago. He said the plank called for a commitment American people do not want to make.

The Democratic platform convention passed combined resolutions calling on New Mexico U. S. House members Harold Runnels, D-Lovington, and Manuel Lujan Jr., R-Albuquerque, to vote for impeachment of President Nixon.

The resolution said: "We direct our Congressional representatives to vote to ascertain the truth, through constitutional means, by voting for impeachment proceedings for the ascertainment of said truth."

The convention adopted a campaign reform plank limiting campaign spending in statewide and U.S. House elections, requiring each candidate to have a single campaign financing committee and stipulating pre-election reporting of substantial contributions and expenditures. Soundings in the governor primary races at the state convention showed:

Lincoln County--Sen. Tibo Chavez, Belen, has substantial support for the Democratic governor nomination. Republican Joe Skeen of Picacho, Lincoln County, will sweep the county in the GOP governor primary.

Lincoln County delegates at the state Democratic convention; Fern Sawyer, Nogal, county chairman; Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Padilla, Ruidoso; Mr. and Mrs. Mel O'Reilly, Ruidoso; Father John Miner, Ruidoso; Mrs. Lucy Yeaman, San Patricio.

Fern said the 1974 Democratic platform was the most acceptable to her in years. She said the platform "is more moderate and middle-of-the-road."

Curry County--Forty-seven of 48 delegates support Sen. Odis Echols of Clovis for the Democratic governor nomination. One Curry delegate favors Sen. Chavez. Norman Day of Clovis, Odis Curry County campaign manager, said petitions with 2,200 Curry County names would be filed for Echols.

Taos County--Tibo Chavez leading by a small margin over Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces. Ex-Atty. Gen. Boston Witt, Santa Fe, and Drew Cloud, Albuquerque, follow. Thirty-one Taos County delegates attended the state convention.

Taos County Chairman James Duran predicted a county Democratic primary vote about 3,500. Duran said he is not committed to any candidate.

Union County--Tibo Chavez and Drew Cloud appear to be on top with Boston Witt following in the Democratic governor's race. Union County delegates at the state convention; Ben Beckner, Clayton, county party chairman; Karl Butt, Clayton, a State Fair Board member; Foster Zimmerman, Clayton; Union County Clerk Paul Keener, Clayton, and Candido Archuleta, Des Moines.

Lea County--Tibo Chavez and Bob Mayfield are still the Democratic governor primary leaders, Mayfield would probably win a plurality today.

National Democratic Committeewoman Dessie Sawyer of Crossroads attended the state platform convention.

Rolla Buck, 66, Alamogordo Democrat, said he will run for the State Senate seat held by John Conway, Alamogordo Republican, in District 39--all of Lincoln County and Tularosa, La Luz and four Alamogordo precincts, in Otero County.

Buck was manager and comptroller of Ruidoso Natural Gas Co. in 1967-72. He said the nominating petition signature requirement is 64 names in the district. Buck said he has more than 300 names on petitions. A retired state employee, Buck moved back to Alamogordo from Santa Fe in 1967.

Colfax County--A tight race among Tibo Chavez, Jerry Apodaca and Odis Echols for the Democratic governor nomination.

In Colfax County in the Democratic lieutenant governor race Rep. Fred Chavez, Albuquerque; Sen. Bob Ferguson, Artesia, and Albuquerque lawyer, Les Houston show strength.

Republican rancher Joe Skeen is expected to run well in Colfax County in the Republican governor primary. Rep. Alvino Castillo, D-Colfax-Union, apparently had no primary opposition for renomination. Castillo is Colfax County Democratic chairman.

Democratic state auditor candidate Max Sanchez, Espanola, campaigned in Raton, Clayton, Springer, Maxwell and Cimarron.

Rep. Castillo said an all-candidate Colfax County Democratic barbecue rally will be held May 18 at Raton. Castillo is chairman of the interim legislative committee on insurance. He said the committee will study methods of handling workman's compensation claims and increases in benefits this year. Legislation pending in Congress would place claims in commissions instead of courts.


Granthams celebrate anniversary

Section 2. The Governing Body hereby declares and determines that, until such time as this resolution is appropriately amended or repealed by additional resolution of the Governing Body, the following notice of public meetings shall constitute reasonable notice as required by Chapter 91, Laws of New Mexico, 1974:

a. Notice of regular meeting may be given:

1. By written notice published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City at least three days prior to the regular meeting; or

2. By posting a written notice in the office of the City Clerk at least three days prior to such meeting; or

3. By public oral announcement of the time and place of such meeting, made at the previous regular meeting of the Governing Body.

b. Notice of special meetings may be given:

1. By publishing a written notice in a newspaper of general circulation in the City not later than the day prior to the day on which the meeting is to be held; or

2. By oral announcement to be made at a prior regular or special meeting which must have been adjourned at least twenty-four hours prior to the special meeting; or

3. By oral notice to a representative of a newspaper of general circulation in the City at one hour prior to the scheduled commencement of such special meeting.

c. The foregoing notice (either written or oral) is sufficient so long as the time and place of such meeting is given; but as to special matters, the Governing Body, in its sole discretion, additionally may include in such notice a brief description as to an item or items to be considered at such meeting, by reference to the general topic or by reference to all or a portion of the agenda.

Section 3. Substantial compliance with any one of the foregoing methods of giving of notice and with Chapter 91, Laws of New Mexico, 1974. Nothing herein shall prevent the use of additional means or methods of giving notice of regular or special meetings; and nothing herein shall require new notice for any public meeting for which notice has been given pursuant to this resolution and which recessed or adjourned except an oral announcement of the time and place which shall be made by the presiding officer before such meeting is recessed or adjourned. The City Clerk or anyone designated by such Clerk hereby is authorized to vie any such foregoing notice, and also any additional notice of regular or special meetings as such City Clerk or designate, in his sole discretion, may consider to be appropriate.

Section 4. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this resolution or its application to other situations.

Section 5. All by-laws, orders, and resolutions, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any by-law, order, or resolution or part thereof, heretofore repealed.


When I tried to purchase 'oil-cloth' lately I couldn't find it because I was told it was old fashioned and 'out'.

Roman Nunez, born in Picocho and a life-long resident of the county, is one of the old acquaintances. He is seeking election as county commissioner in District 1 on the Democratic Ticket.

Nunez served as commissioner with Clint Sultemeier, Emmett Reece, Charley Jones and Kenneth Nosker from 1960 through 1964. He also was Democratic County Chairman for six years.

Lots of improvements were made in the county during the time Roman was on the county commission.
