# Small towns face many hazards and hurdles

After going through a couple of weeks of studying and writing about our local gas company, many, many years recounting various problems as they have come on in this town around 1300 people, then a couple of hours this week listening to Lincoln County Municipal Hospital board of directors talk about their problems -- no question but that we have hazards to overcome in Carrizozo.

One of the questions people need to face up to, like many other communities: what of the present services, luxuries, entertainment, educational advantages, are we willing to give up or do without in this town.

Life in this small town is wonderful. Most people (maybe not all of the younger generation) do not feel the need of moving here, fish market, theatre or concerts each week, dentist, eye doctor and such, or any of the things that one could do if living in Albuquerque.

Problems at Carrizozo hospital are of such a nature that people need to know and understand, if possible, that this institution may be one we cannot afford, or because of state and federal regulations, cannot manage to license.

Hospital board members had no good words at all for HEW (Health, Education & Welfare Dept.) the federal agency that could or should certify the Carrizozo Hospital for Medicare. Nor were there any good words for Lincoln County commission which could or should help out more with local financing.

The hospital operated during March on a four-patient per day average. During March, cost of operation was about \$10,000 more than income. (see financial statement at end of this story). Even a twelve-patient per day average would not get Carrizozo hospital to a break-even point.

At the same time there are lots of good things going on in and around the Carrizozo hospital. The good grace of the A. N. Spencer family has actually kept the operation afloat. Dr. Amy Barton has been working long hours seeing patients and tending to private practice. Laboratory work in the hospital has improved greatly and could well be making money for the institution. The Annex is serving its intended purpose, though not full at this time. Medical emergencies are being met and people of this area have real good medical service now.

Hospital officials say that a staff of 32 people is needed just to conform with government regulations -- this to service four patients each day. Total expenses for March were \$15,249.00. There could well be some fat in that expense account but we don't see it being cooked out under present circumstances.

Hospital directors saw a new microscope, just received, at their Monday meeting. Money for this tool came from donations. They ordered a new colorimeter also for the lab, which will be paid from funds such as the Hospital Auxiliary people are raising.

Emergency medical service by radio is now in operation. Carrizozo has contact with hospitals in Carlsbad, Ruidoso, Roswell, also the ambulance and sheriff's office by radio.

This hospital situation does need more publicity, along many lines, but it is somewhat up to the doctor, nurses, and administration. People in a big area around and in Carrizozo are enjoying a high quality of medical care -- they could be taking more advantage of this service -- and really should if they value their hospital. It's rather easy to think that "everyone knows" which is not the case at all about a hospital or any other business, and we don't start worrying until the critter dies.

## Funeral occasion gets full treatment in Mississippi

Mr. and Mrs. Archie Witham returned Monday from Meridian, Miss., where they attended what was a second funeral service for Mrs. Witham's father, Norman Clavin Blackwell.

Mr. Blackwell, age 64, had gone to the Texas Heart Institute at St. Luke's Hospital in Houston for open-heart surgery. He did not survive the operation. A short funeral service was held at the funeral home in Houston, then the trip to Meridian, Miss., where the family lived.

Meridian is on the border with Alabama, possibly best known as the burial place of singer Jimmy Rogers. It's hill country and the routine of honoring a loved one who has died seemed quite different than we know here, at least to Archie Witham.

The funeral procession arrived in Meridian, Friday, the body was taken to private home in the early evening and the large group of relatives and friends who had come from hundreds of miles around stayed up all night, talking

and consoling the widow. This gathering did not break up until time for the funeral Saturday afternoon at 2:00 p.m.

At the church there was a 30-minute period for viewing the body, two preachers preached, there was singing, and the prayers were long. All-in-all it added up to nearly 24 hours of constant attention to the memory and passing of a good friend. Much food was brought which was enjoyed as well as the conversation at what could have seemed like a big family reunion, except that it had another purpose.

Those people could know better than we do about grief. Maybe after such a prolonged period in intense mourning it is easier to bury the dead in a way that removes the thoughts that frequently linger in a persons mind over the passing of a loved one.

# Career Education proves interesting

An unusual program is going on at Carrizozo School this week where many of the students are listening to speakers on a great variety of subjects that are intended to help the students with choosing a career and seeking employment after graduation.

Jerry Sweeney, from Federal Manpower Commission, talked about child labor rights. The Child Labor law includes young people up to age 16 and actually refers to young adults. Sweeney said that in cities the size of Albuquerque they will have lots of complaints, not so many from the small communities. He stressed that regulations do protect people under age 16 but that wage-hour does not apply. Students can work for no wage, or the experience, or whatever the employer will pay.

The new Minimum wage law does not apply to businesses doing less than \$250,000 gross a year, they remain under the state minimum of \$1.60, pending whatever the state legislature may do at its next session. Business engaged in interstate commerce come under the new federal law of \$2.00 minimum.

An employer can dismiss an employee, with no reason given, and does not have to give any sort of dismissal notice. The employee has the same privilege, he/she may quit without notice if they choose.

The most important thing for students to determine is "Condition of Employment" before going on a job, such as wages, hours, kind of work.

Sweeney said the new minimum wage law is very difficult to decipher, that a reference brochure is expected out soon, but would not help a lot.

Bob Stearns was the first speaker Tuesday and fielded a lot of questions on insurance. He explained what deductible means on an insurance policy. For instance if you break a windshield, repair cost is \$150, you have a \$50 deductible policy, your cost for windshield would be \$50, insurance pays \$100.

The reason for buying a policy with \$50 or \$100 deductible clause is that the insurance premiums will be much lower.

Bob was asked if insurance cost is the same for foreign cars and on U.S. cars. Answer was "No". Companies must figure that small cars are not driven so fast as the larger U.S. models.

There was a refreshment break at 9:45 Tuesday, then two others speakers on the days program.

## Heavy damage to valley fruit

It is too early to get an accurate estimate of the damage as there may be some late blooms on the trees at least on some of them. Also we are still having cold nights in the Hondo-Bonto-Ruidoso Valley.

I attended the Beef Information Session sponsored by the Chaves County Livestock Feeders at the Wortley on Monday evening.

Bill Langenegger emphasized that beef is a bargain. Prices of live animals are below a year ago, yet we are buying less beef over the grocery counter. The beef cattle feeders troubles started with government intervention and the beef industry has been in trouble ever since that time. The feeding industry cannot compete for grain when it is used as food. A considerable portion of our grains go into human consumption. If consumer has only grass fat beef to buy we are in trouble.

Bill Langenegger pointed out that 1.67 percent of the people raise 80 percent of the food and fiber in the U.S. The feeders need the public to better understand their problem. They are losing about \$100.00 per animal now being sold out of the feed pens.

John Bruson, Security National Bank in Roswell gave a typical cost break down on one pen of cattle, and the losses on the pens. His

bank has \$15 million dollars in feedlot loans unless that can do better we all are in trouble.

Sid Goodloe was in charge of the evening meeting. It was brought out at the meeting that agriculture is a price taker not a price setter. In that the cattle feeders ask what will you give me. Most manufactured products are price setter as they ask a given price and will not sell for less.

## 'ROUND THE CAPITOL

CARLSBAD-FARMINGTON—Impressions on the campaign trail:

Sen. Tibo Chavez, Belen, leads the Democratic governor race but his margin is narrow. Gov. Bruce King's help will not nominate Tibo. King is unpopular in some areas.

Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces, is running second in the Democratic governor race. Sen. Odie Echols, Clovis, is the unknown quantity. Odie might charge through to grab the lead in the remaining campaign segments.

Bob Mayfield of Albuquerque, an ex-House member, will not win. Gov. King switched his support last fall from Mayfield to Chavez. Some cynical observers foresee a King switchback to Mayfield in the closing campaign weeks.

Albuquerquean Drew Cloud and Santa Fean Boston Witt will run far behind the leaders. Cloud says he depends on volunteer support. Witt is spending much campaign money.

Heavily Democratic Eddy County Tibo Chavez and Jerry Apodaca split organized labor support. The Eddy County labor vote has been ineffective in recent elections. Mayfield, a lawyer, leads in San Juan County.

Probably Sen. Chavez will ultimately win an edge in Eddy County which is 5-1 Democratic over Republicans.

Lincoln County rancher Joe Skeen, 46, of Picacho has clear leads in Eddy and San Juan Counties in the Republican governor primary. Skeen's conservatism and open style of campaigning win support.

But Skeen has campaign organization problems. His scheduling is sometimes confused

and his transportation arrangements are kinked too often.

Skeen probably leads ex-Sen. Jack Eastham of Albuquerque and three other candidates in the Republican governor primary.

But the pivotal area for Republicans is the vote-heavy Albuquerque Heights. Eastham says he leads Skeen 2-1 there. Big, affable Joe must chop into Eastham's Albuquerque lead to win the GOP governor nomination. Bernalillo County casts 43 per cent of the total Republican primary vote.

Democrats are tearing themselves apart in the governor primary. Chavez and Apodaca may dilute their strength opposing each other and another candidate may win the party nomination.

Gov. King has not built a state party organization so there is little base for the general election campaign effort. Six hard-campaigning Democratic governor candidates in the primary may soak up most available campaign funds and leave only a small potential for the main event.

U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, subject to reelection in 1976, says he is uncommitted in the Democratic governor primary. But Montoya's friends are generally supporting Tibo Chavez. Will Gov. King oppose Sen. Montoya in 1976 in the Democratic primary? King is ineligible for reelection this year. We are unconvinced that Bruce will go back to his ranch in January. King has been in politics 20 years.

Bruce will build a home in the Santa Fe area. He could stay in the public eye and try to unseat Sen. Montoya in two years.

Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts will not run for president in 1976. If Kennedy announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination, he would be a target for another political assassination.

Kennedy could easily be the Democratic presidential candidate in 1976. If he does not run, Democrats have no outstanding prospect.

Washington Sen. Henry (Scoop) Jackson has disappointed many admirers with his calculated, recent attempts to build support for a presidential bid.

Gov. King, Hobbs banker Jack Daniels and other New Mexico leaders pledged support to Sen. Jackson. But Jackson has tried to broaden his appeal beyond his conservative base and eroded his backing in the process.

Rep. Murray Ryan of Silver City told an Eddy County Republican audience: "We've had four years of drifting and dreaming and doing nothing

in the executive branch."

Ryan, state Republican chairman, pointed his remarks at Democratic Gov. King's administration. Ryan represents Sierra and Grant Counties. He is opposed for reelection.

Rep. Ryan said: "We've had about all of the 'good old boy' syndrome that we can stand." Ryan said he was amazed at the "torpedoing" that has been under way against President Richard M. Nixon.

Ryan told 200 Republicans at Carlsbad: "It's time for us to stand extremely solid, not to panic." He said he is active in politics "because of an ingrained belief in the two-party system."

Skeen, 46, says he wants to poll 25,000-30,000 votes in the Republican governor primary. He disdains labels but says he is a conservative. Skeen emphasized a need to underscore programs in public schools in talks at Carlsbad and Farmington. He says the stress has been on more school money for years.

Sen. Chavez issued a position paper on eight basic issues. They are good jobs, the energy shortage, quality of life, education and training, economy in government, taxation, cost of living, crime and drug abuse.

Sen. Apodaca said his campaign bought a plane because planes of friends were often unavailable for use for campaign trips. Jerry is responsible for the obligation. The plane will be sold after the campaign ends.

### Former Editor Writing Books

Cuernavaca, Morelos, Mexico—Lyman Jones, formerly of Carrizozo, has had three books accepted for publication in late 1974 and early 1975.

The first, slated for publication in late 1974, is a biography of North and Central America's most famed big game hunting outfitter, Colonel Marshall "Tex" Purvis of Cuernavaca, an American who in the 1950s opened Mexico to big game hunting. His speciality was hunting for Central America's biggest wild cat—the jaguar. In addition, Purvis developed Mexico's newest deep sea fishing area, off the islands of Cozumel and Isla Mujeres, islands near the Yucatan peninsula.

Purvis also has led a spectacular life as a World War 11 soldier in Europe, as a lawyer in the days when Hot Springs, Arkansas, was a gangster-ridden "wide open" gambling resort, as a deep water sailor, as a revolutionary mercenary in Honduras in the 1920s, as a big game outfitter in the Jackson Hole country of Wyoming and as a political intimate of the late Huey Long of Louisiana.

The University of Oklahoma press has accepted the two biographies. Fawcett Publishing Company will publish the fishing guide book.

The Purvis biography is to be published in Spanish as a serial in "Camino del Aire," house organ magazine of Mexicana Airlines. Portions of the biography also are to be published in "True West" magazine.

And the fishing book is to be published in a synopsis version in "True" magazine.

Jones is also writing a biography of Dr. Armando Cruet, now of Cuernavaca, a refugee surgeon from Castro's Cuba. Cruet was imprisoned by Fidel Castro after having served as chief of medical services in Cuba—a position comparable to Surgeon General of the United States.

Jones has also in the works a book on salt water fishing in the Cozumel-Isla Mujeres Yucatan area—a guide book.

Dear Roby,  
The following Casserole freezes well, and I the aluminum loaf pans that come 4 in a pack for about 50 cents. I can get 3 of these filled with one recipe for this casserole. I freeze it and have them on hand for emergencies.

Hurry up Lasagna  
1 lb. ground beef; 1 cup sour cream; 1 1/2 minced onion; 1 cup cream; 1 clove garlic minced; 1/4 cup parsley flakes; 2 (8 oz) c tomato sauce with mushrooms; 1 c mushrooms; 1 tsp salt; 8 ounce medium noodle cooked & drained; 1/4 tsp. pepper; 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese.

Brown beef in skillet, when meat begins to color, add onions, mushrooms and garlic. Saute until meat is well browned. Drain-add tomato sauce. Simmer uncovered 5 min.

Combine sour cream cottage cheese & parsley, add to cooked noodles. Mix well. Alternate layers of the meat mixture and cottage cheese mixture in greased 3 qt. casserole beginning and ending with noodles and top with cheddar cheese.

Bake 350 oven for 30 min. or until hot. Frozen, heat covered at 400 for about 45 min. until bubbly. It serves 6 to 8.





That would take alot of "Grav Train"...






