C of C reviews future of Zozo

The Town of Carrizozo is making strides toward solving some rather tough problems of traffic through town, safety of school children, elimination of many hazards and eyesores around town, zoning the town for residential, business, industrial use, trying together parts of town on each side of the tracks, beautification in general and other similar problems.

A public hearing has been set for Friday, May 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the Carrizozo Recreation Center as a prelude to the adoption of the proposed zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan.

Copies of both the zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan may be seen at the town hall. They are lengthy and complex. Town residents who are interested in the welfare of their town, their family, will do well to attend the public hearing where they can get answers to questions, voice approval or objections, and work with the people who are working to make Carrizozo a better place for the people who now live here.

The Chamber of Commerce has provided considerable spark for this new program, however the entire business is in the hands of the town council which will implement zoning and the comprehensive plan.

C of C directors and committee members attending the regular meeting Monday night were: President Dutch Cox, Archie Witham, Jim Cantrell, Bob Stearns, Mary Rich, Jim Steinepreis, Tom Ward, Dan Wright, Wesley Lindsay and Nick Serina. Thelma Zumwalt, secretary and Paul Payton were present.

Discussion of zoning and the plan took considerable time, and led to talk about highways leading into town, and possibility of beautification program on courthouse grounds. It was reported that US-54 and US-280 are

marked as critical in need of repair on state highway map, but no budgeting is planned for any road work in this area except for the railroad overpass. C of C members were urged to attend meetings of the highway department to request some action in the future.

It is possible for the county to get financial aid for beautification of the courthouse grounds, up to 75 percent, but action will have to be taken immediately to get any results this year. Three plans do exist for the grounds, and with addition of simple recreation facility would qualify any one of the plans for State-Federal funding. Kenneth Larsen, planning consultant, talked with commissioners about this matter this week, and the request for funds may be made.

Circus ticket selling is going good reported Bob Stearns. Over \$600 worth of children's tickets have been sold, next will be push to sell adult tickets by two teams, Jim-Dan-Nick on one, Dutch and helpers on other, ground rules to be drawn up this week.

Treasurer Archie Witham reported a cash balance of \$1503.36 in the C of C account, most bills paid.

Oktoberfest events have been scheduled and stand a good chance of coming off as planned. They include: golf tournament sponsored by Country Club, fiddlin' contest sponsored by C of C, folk dancers sponsored by CCAPA, bowling tournament sponsored by C of C but handled by Joe Light, chuck wagon breakfast sponsored by Hospital Auxiliary, tour of White Oaks sponsored by Historical Society, fishing derby in Carrizozo Lake, sponsored by C of C and town.

Part of Carrizozo beautification program will be "Yard of the Month" awards for prettiest yard and most improved yard. Ten dollar awards will be made for each toward end of May, June, July, August and September. More about this later as rules are drawn up.



Department will begin actively enforcing Senate Bill 47. "It is very important that the general public be aware of this change in the law to avert costly detainment of their mobile homes", Hays noted.

(1) All property taxes due on the mobile home for the current tax year or past years have been paid; or
(2) No liability for property taxes on the mobile home exists for the current tax year or any past tax years.

Beef industry will pay for mistake

In the next ten years the beef industry will "pay for its mistake" of mostly ignoring consumer concerns in the past decade, an Oklahoma State University economist predicted recently at OSU's Cattle Feeders Seminar.

marked by a most unusual economic phenomena rising per capita consumption of beef at rising prices.

Dr. Wayne Purcell told cattlemen their industry would pay because it has failed to gather information needed to understand past consumer actions and necessary to predict and prepare for future actions.

He also predicted supplies to increase and prices to fall for pork, poultry and other natural substitutes for beef.

"The best time to prepare would have been the period when things were going well, not after we have witnessed boycotts, price controls and harmful cost-price squeezing," the marketing specialist said.

Another factor that will help restrain high beef prices will be increased competition from synthetic foods made from vegetable protein.

"We are prone toward incessant complaining about the 'disastrous price freeze', but the price freeze might not have occurred if the industry had been better prepared to respond to the clamors of consumer concern when they first arose," he added.

Citing a 6 percent decline in per capita beef consumption in 1973, Purcell said consumer decisions in the next two years - as beef prices adjust downward - will be crucial and pivotal for the industry.

Purcell criticized the "hit back" of some cattlemen.
"Telling the consumer in effect to 'pay the price, buy the product, and shut up because beef's a good deal' will not get the job done," he said.

"The homemaker must decide whether she will leave the non-beef dishes she learned to prepare during 1973 and come back to beef," he said.

"And publicly announced threats to withhold cattle from the market is not the way to win friends and favorably influence consumers," he continued. "The homemaker bowed her back-which is exactly what you would have done if you had been in her place."
The beef industry in the past decade, Purcell said, has been blessed with consumer acceptance at a level without parallel in other agricultural commodities. The period was

The agricultural economist told the cattle feeders they "have been paupers when it comes to telling your story and merchandising your product."

He urged them to immediately begin a three-part "action program" to improve their relationship with consumers.

The first part would be to develop a research and analysis program to find out what the consumer is thinking regarding a variety of decision making factors.

Another part would be to greatly step up an on going promotional and educational program to "help the consumer through" the adjustment processes required during periods of rising beef prices.

SCMRA talks merger

The Steering Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met in Ruidoso Downs, April 30, with Chairman Bill Gallacher presiding. J. J. DiPaolo, Mayor of Ruidoso Downs, welcomed our group to their city. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved with corrections.

to use federal monies available for planning and or building. We do need to retain the identity of two different groups and would not want to lose the present staff. He suggested we list all the advantages and disadvantages and weigh them. Joining would help the EDD with areawide planning. There is a strong emphasis on regional basis for federal spending.

The scheduled speaker, David King of the State Planning Office, was unable to be at the meeting due to inclement weather. The time was utilized to discuss the proposed merger of SCMRA and SENMRC&D. The discussion went as follows:

Bob Scribner has mixed feelings. If we could retain our identification and still gain finances there would be great advantage to the merger. Travel would be a great disadvantage however.

Bert Pfingsten spoke on remaining as we are without the merger because we have accomplished many things without funding.
Tom McCalmont stated that if we joined the SENMRC&D our boundaries would conform with District 6 - the State Planning District, and representation on the steering committee would be part of the decision making body.

Greg Haussler stated that a project must qualify before it can be funded.
Harve Abercrombie said that approximately 10 million dollars is allotted annually for the RC&D movement for the nation. This is 50 percent cost-sharing and is to be used for natural resource projects. Technical assistance is also available through this money. Eligible practices for funding are critical area treatment, flood prevention, farm irrigation, and public fish and recreation development.

Robert Bell spoke for consolidation. He said we would still be a separate group and the advantage would be in the funding of projects. Possibly our name would be changed and we would have representatives who would meet with their representatives to decide on the projects funded with available money. Bell stated that the argument against consolidation would be that there would only be one coordinator - Buck Brinneman - which would be bad.

Clara Snow brought up the fact that the office in Carrizozo could be closed if consolidation takes place and that it would be a blow to our area because now the group has a place to contact with their problems and ideas. Bill stated that it is very important that we can contact a coordinator to discuss projects when needed.

Nick Pappas gave the pros and cons of merger. He said the area is really too large for one operation to try to handle, but it does qualify us.

Mr. Pfingsten suggested that all members take this idea of consolidation under advisement before the vote at our next annual meeting in June. Mr. Merritt suggested that we get all the facts before the next meeting. Mr. Bell asked those present to consider the others in the consolidation they have to vote acceptance of us also. He thinks we do not have the complete picture of funding of projects and thinks Mr. Brinneman should explain further. Mr. Bell motioned, seconded by Mr. Gage for Mr. Gallacher to contact proper authorities to get

Mrs. Mario B. Gonzales is the 1974 chairman of the fund raising drive for N.M. Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation and has planned a full week of activities for the week of May 19 - 25.

There will be a dance at the Nike on May 18, road blocks at three entrances to town on May 19, bake sale the 20th, car wash the 21st, bingo the 22nd, kidnap coffee the 23rd, enchilada dinner the 24th and crazy day on the 25th.

Mrs. Gonzales, stressed that parents and prospective parents should become more aware of the symptoms of cystic fibrosis, the most serious lung-damaging disease, and the other diseases affecting children's breathing. "We would all be more informed about the programs of research and care for these youngsters, available in New Mexico," she said.

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C-F, usually without knowing it. Mrs. Gonzales said it was believed that one in every twenty people may be a carrier of the C-F gene, or about 10 million people in the U. S. Current research, funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation, is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers. Although cystic fibrosis is still incurable, improved therapy is now making it possible for many affected children to survive into young adulthood.
